REPORT OF TOWN CLERK.

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, MARCH 2ND, 1903.

TOWN RECORDS, 1903.

WORCESTER, SS.

TO THE CONSTABLE OF THE TOWN OF UPTON, IN THE COUNTY OF WORCESTER,

GREETING:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are directed to notify the inhabitants of the Town of Upton, qualified to vote in elections and in town affairs, to meet at the Town Hall in said Upton, on Monday, the second day of March, punctually at six o'clock forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To hear the reports of all Town Officers and Committees, and act thereon.

Article 3. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing—three Selectmen, three Assessors of Taxes, three Overseers of the Poor, Town Treasurer, one School Committee for three years, Collector of Taxes, Auditor, one Highway Surveyor for three years, five Constables, three Fence Viewers, one Cemetery Commissioner for three years, Sexton, three Library Committee for three years, Tree Warden; also for said voters to give in their votes, yes or no, in answer to the question, "Shall license be granted to sell intoxicating liquors in this Town the ensuing year?" all on one ballot.

Article 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, make appropriations for the same, and determine the time the same shall be paid, or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 5. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money to defray in part the expense of Memorial Day.

Article 6. To see if the Town will authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of the taxes of the present municipal year.

Article 7. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money to pay State Aid, under Section 2, Chapter 79, Revised Laws of Massachusetts, 1902, and act thereon.

Article 8. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money to pay Military Aid, under Section 9, Chapter 79, Revised Laws of Massachusetts, 1902, and act thereon.

Article 9. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money to pay Soldiers' Relief, under Section 18, Chapter 79, Revised Laws of Massachusetts, 1902, and act thereon.

Article 10. To see if the Town will accept the list of Jurors submitted by the Selectmen.

Article 11. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money to care for and light the street lamps belonging to the Town Improvement Association, and act thereon.

Article 12. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money for the annual expense of the Town Library, and act thereon.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to rescind so much of the vote, whereby they voted on November 5th, 1901, that the Town Clerk serve as clerk of the Overseers of the Poor, or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 14. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money for the care and repairs of their Cemeteries, or act thereon.

Article 15. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money to suppress the illegal sale of intoxicating liquors, or act thereon.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to purchase the set of Cemetery Books, now on exhibition, showing the number of each lot, in Lakeview Cemetery, also the owner's name and the location, and name of each interment in said Cemetery, and appropriate \$225 for the same.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Cemetery Commissioners to remove from Pine Grove Cemetery such trees as in their judgment would seem best for the interest of said Cemetery.

Article 18. To see if the Town will establish a by-law or by-laws to regulate the purchase, sale or barter of junk, old metals and second-hand articles, in accordance with the provisions of Sections 29 to 32 inclusive of Chapter 102 of the Revised Laws of Massachusetts, 1902.

Article 19. To see if the Town will instruct its Fire Engineers to place reservoirs where needed, to be used as a water supply in case of fire, and appropriate money for the same.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to buy 100 feet of hose, the cost not to exceed 65 cents per foot, or act in any manner relating thereto.

Article 21. To see if the Town will purchase two Chemical Extinguishers for Brush and Chimney fires, and appropriate money for the same.

Article 22. To see if the Town will pay the School Committee a salary, or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 23. To see if the Town will appropriate Fifty Dollars to pay land damage awarded to Charles A. Legge.

Article 24. To see if the Town will accept the provisions of Chapter 346, Acts of 1902, relating to the election of a Moderator for one year, and act thereon.

And you are directed to serve this Warrant, by posting up attested copies thereof at each of the following places in said Town, ten days at least before the time of holding said meeting: At each of the Post-Offices and on the Town House in said Town.

Hereof fail not, and make due return of this Warrant, with your doings

thereon, to the Selectmen and Town Clerk, before the time and place of meeting aforesaid.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING,
MARCH 2ND, 1903.

Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

WORCESTER, SS.

Pursuant to the foregoing Warrant, the inhabitants of the Town of Upton, qualified to vote in elections and town affairs met in their Town Hall in said Town on Monday, the second day of March, A. D. 1903, at six o'clock in the forenoon and proceeded as follows:

The meeting was called to order by the Town Clerk, who then read the Warrant and the Officer's return thereon.

MODERATOR.

Article 1. The meeting made choice of William H. Wellington for Moderator, as the law directs. He was duly sworn to perform the duties of his office by the Town Clerk.

TOWN OFFICERS.

Article 3. J. Frank Despeaux, Thomas J. Gorman, Roger Shaughnessy and Frank E. Lyford, having been appointed Ballot Clerks and inspectors, were duly sworn by the Town Clerk. The cards of instruction and specimen ballots having been posted both outside the guard-rail and in the marking shelves, as the law directs.

A package of official ballots to be used at this election were delivered to the Ballot Clerks, for which a receipt for the same was given to the Town Clerk.

The ballot-box furnished by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to be used at all elections, was opened in public meeting and shown to the voters present to be empty, and examined by the Moderator and Town Clerk and found to be empty. The register having been set at 000, said box was locked and the keys thereof delivered to William F. Parshley, Constable in attendance at said meeting.

The ballot-box was in charge of Roger Shaughnessy and the check-list at the ballot-box was in charge of the Town Clerk.

The polls were declared open for the reception of ballots for Town Officers at 6.12 A. M.

No person was allowed to deposit his vote until his name was found on the check-list and checked.

The ballots were given out and received at the ballot-box, as by law provided.

Voted to close the polls at 4 P. M.

George F. Prentiss, George E. Ambler, William J. Pillion and Frank A. Brown, having been appointed Tellers to count the votes, were duly sworn to faithfully perform that duty, by the Town Clerk.

During the voting the ballot-box was opened by the unanimous consent of the election officers and ballots taken therefrom for the purpose of counting the same. All said ballots and check-lists were kept within the unobstructed view of the voters, as the law directs.

At 1.30 P. M. the Moderator took up the Warrant for consideration.

Article 2. Voted, to accept the reports of the Town Officers as printed.

MEMORIAL DAY.

Article 5. Voted, that the Town appropriate the sum of one hundred twenty-five dollars (\$125) to defray in part the expenses of Memorial Day.

BORROWING MONEY.

Article 6. Voted, that the Town Treasurer be, and hereby is authorized, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow what money is needed in anticipation of the taxes of the present municipal year.

Unanimous vote.

STATE AID.

Article 7. Voted, that the Town appropriate the sum of six hundred dollars (\$600) to be used to pay State Aid, as provided in Section 2, Chapter 79, Revised Laws.

MILITARY AID.

Article 8. Voted, that the Town appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) to be used to pay Military Aid, as provided in Section 9, Chapter 79, Revised Laws.

SOLDIERS' RELIEF.

Article 9. Voted, that the Town appropriate the sum of eight hundred dollars (\$800) to be used to pay Soldiers' Relief, as provided in Section 18, Chapter 79, Revised Laws.

JURY LIST.

Article 10. William Walker, whose name was on the list, was excused and Charles H. Rogers' name substituted.

STREET LIGHTING.

Article 11. Voted, that the Town appropriate the sum of six hundred fifty dollars (\$650) for care, lighting and repairs of the street lamps, belonging to the Town Improvement Association, the ensuing year.

TOWN LIBRARY.

Article 12. Voted, that the Town appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300) for the annual expense of the Town Library.

Voted, that the Town appropriate the sum of sixty dollars (\$60) to purchase books for the Carpenter Alcove in the Town Library.

CLERK OF OVERSEERS OF POOR.

Article 13. Voted, to rescind so much of the vote, whereby the Town voted on November 5th, 1901, that the Town Clerk serve as clerk of the Overseers of the Poor.

Article 14. Voted, to pass over Article 14 in regard to an appropriation for care and repairs of Cemeteries.

Article 15. Voted, to pass over Article 15 in regard to an appropriation to suppress the illegal sale of intoxicating liquors.

SET OF BOOKS OF LAKEVIEW CEMETERY.

Article 16. Mr. Stephen B. Fiske, in explanation, said in part, that the set of books were comprised of one large and two small ones. The small books, for some reason, were detained in some express office, as they had been sent and should have been here to-day; that the books contained

a large amount of information relating to interments in Lakeview Cemetery; that in order to gather this information the owner had spent a greater part of last summer; that a great number of persons are buried there without a headstone, and as the people who know who they are, are fast passing away, a book of this kind is becoming a necessity.

Voted, on a motion by Mr. T. F. Boyd that the Town appropriate two hundred twenty-five dollars (\$225) to purchase the Cemetery Books.

PINE GROVE CEMETERY.

Article 17. Voted, to allow the Cemetery Commissioners to remove such trees as in their judgment seems best for the Cemetery.

BY-LAWS RELATING TO SALE OF JUNK, ETC.

Article 18. Voted, to accept and adopt the following By-Laws:—

Section 1. That the Selectmen may license suitable persons to be dealers in and keepers of shops for the purchase, sale or barter of junk, old metals or second-hand articles, subject to the provisions of Sections 186 to 189 inclusive, of Chapter 102 of the Revised Laws of Massachusetts, and may revoke such license at pleasure.

Section 2. That every shop-keeper shall keep a book in which shall be written, at the time of every purchase of any such article, a description thereof, the name, age and residence of the person from whom, and the day and hour when such purchase is made; that such books shall, at all times, be open to the inspection of the selectmen, constables and police officers of the Town; that every keeper of such shop shall put, in some suitable and conspicuous place on his shop, a sign having his name and occupation legibly inscribed thereon in large letters; that such shop and all articles of merchandise therein may be at all times examined by the selectmen, constables and police officers of the Town; and that no keeper of such shop shall, directly or indirectly, either purchase or receive, by the way of barter or exchange, any of the articles of a minor or apprentice, knowing or having reason to believe him to be such; and that no article purchased or received shall be sold until a period of at least one week from the date of its purchase or receipt has elapsed.

Section 3. That whoever, not being so licensed, keeps such shop or is such dealer in such town, or being licensed keeps such shop or is such dealer in any other place or manner than that designated in his license, or after notice to him that his license has been revoked, shall forfeit twenty dollars for each offence, and whoever violates any rule, regulation or restriction contained in his license shall forfeit a sum not exceeding twenty dollars for each offence.

Section 4. That these By-Laws shall not take effect until they have been approved by the Superior Court and such approval entered and recorded, as provided in Section 26 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Laws of Massachusetts.

Article 19. Voted, to pass over this article relating to reservoirs.

Article 20. Voted, to pass over this article relating to the purchase of 100 feet of hose.

Article 21. Voted, to purchase two extinguishers and appropriate fifty dollars (\$50) to pay for the same.

Article 22. Voted, to pass over this article relating to salary of School Committee.

Article 23. Voted, that the Town appropriate fifty dollars (\$50) to pay land damage awarded to Charles A. Legge.

Article 24. Voted, to pass over this article relating to the election of the Moderator for one year.

Voted, that all taxes be paid on or before November 15th, 1903; that on all taxes unpaid after that date, interest be added at the rate of 6 per cent. per annum.

Due notice having been given, the polls were at 4 P. M. declared closed.

At the close of the polls the register on the ballot-box showed that 364 ballots had been cast therein. The names checked as voted on each list were then audibly counted and the number checked on the list was 364. The remaining ballots were then taken from the ballot-box and audibly counted, making the total number of ballots cast 364.

BY-LAWS RELATING TO JUNK DEALERS AND DEALERS
IN SECOND HAND ARTICLES.

Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

WORCESTER, ss.

TO THE HONORABLE THE JUSTICE OF THE SUPERIOR COURT.

Respectfully represent the inhabitants of the Town of Upton at their annual meeting held on Monday, March 2, 1903, the warrant of said meeting contained the following article:—

Article 18. To see if the Town will establish a by-law or by-laws to regulate the purchase, sale or barter of junk, old metals and second-hand articles, in accordance with the provisions of Sections 29 to 32 inclusive of Chapter 102 of the Revised Laws of Massachusetts, 1902.

Under said article it was voted by the Town to adopt the by-laws, a copy of which is hereto annexed, and said inhabitants hereby petition that said by-laws as accepted, be approved by this Honorable Court.

Article 18. Voted, to accept and adopt the following by-laws:—

Section 1. That the Selectmen may license suitable persons to be dealers in and keepers of shops for the purchase, sale or barter of junk, old metals or second-hand articles subject to the provisions of Sections 186 to 189 inclusive of Chapter 102 of the Revised Laws of Massachusetts, and may revoke such license at pleasure.

Section 2. That every shop-keeper shall keep a book in which shall be written, at the time of every purchase of any such article, a description thereof, the name, age and residence of the person from whom, and the day and hour when such purchase is made; that such book shall, at all times, be open to the inspection of the selectmen, constables and police officers of the Town; that every keeper of such shop shall put, in some suitable and conspicuous place on his shop, a sign having his name and occupation

legibly inscribed thereon in large letters; that such shop and all articles of merchandise therein, may be at all times examined by the selectmen, constables and police officers of the Town; and that no keeper of such shop shall directly or indirectly, either purchase or receive, by the way of barter or exchange, any of the articles aforesaid, of a minor or apprentice, knowing or having reason to believe him to be such; and that no article purchased or received shall be sold until a period of at least one week from the date of its purchase or receipt has elapsed.

Section 3. That whoever, not being so licensed, keeps such shop or is such dealer in such town, or being licensed keeps such shop or is such dealer in any other place or manner than that designated in his license, or after notice to him that his license has been revoked, shall forfeit twenty dollars for each offence, and whoever violates any rule, regulation or restriction contained in his license shall forfeit a sum not exceeding twenty dollars for each offence.

Section 4. That these by-laws shall not take effect until they have been approved by the Superior Court and such approval entered and recorded, as provided in Section 26 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Laws of Massachusetts.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT.

The number of volumes in the Upton Town Library, July 1st, 1902, was, 4,253.

There were added during the year 131 volumes, making at the beginning of the Library year, July 1st, 1903, 4,384 volumes; of these 71 volumes were added from Town Appropriation, and 60 volumes from the "Dr. Carpenter Fund."

The number of books rebound were 39 volumes in juvenile, 34 in fiction, and 4 volumes of magazines; total, 77 volumes.

There were 24 volumes of magazines bound.

8,359 volumes were circulated during the year, and the Library was open 92 days.

By a vote of the Committee, the Library was opened Wednesday evening of each week, from 7 to 9 o'clock, beginning in July, 1902.

The number of volumes circulated on that evening were 2,121; the number on Saturday afternoon and evening were 6,238.

The gifts to the Library were as follows:—

Atlas of Mass., 1884-1890 Topographical Survey, Commonwealth of Mass.; "Birds of North and Middle America," Smithsonian Institute; Annual Report of Smithsonian Institute 1900; "Mass. Soldiers and Sailors of Revolutionary War"; Acts and Resolves of Mass., 1902; 65th and 66th Report of Board of Education 1900-01; Reports from "The Hatch Experiment Station of Mass. Agricultural college"; Reports from "Commission of Education 1901"; "Interstate Com-

mercee Commission"; Journal of the House; Journal of the Senate; Revised Laws of Mass.; Vital Records; "Crofton Boys"; "Around the Capital with Uncle Hanks," by Thomas Fleming; "Lawson History of America's Cup."

Several improvements have been made in our Library room, but we would call especial attention to our reading-table, and to our magazines, which are kept on the table for one month before shelving.

We find our magazines are being read to such an extent, that we anticipate, in the near future, having a second, larger table and more reading matter each month.

A nice comfortable reading-room is one of our great needs, which we hope soon to see fully equipped and patronized by many of our readers.

BY-LAWS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UPTON TOWN LIBRARY.

ARTICLE I.

THE ORGANIZATION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

Section 1. The Board of Trustees shall annually at their first meeting after the annual town-meeting elect by ballot a Chairman, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and an Executive Committee of three, of which the Chairman shall be a member.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Chairman to preside at all the meetings of the Board of Trustees and Executive Committee.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to attend all meetings of the Board of Trustees, to keep a faithful record of their meetings, to hold in custody all papers belonging to the Library, and to perform such other duties as may naturally devolve upon his office.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to hold in custody all funds of the Library, to keep an account of all receipts and expenditures, to pay such bills as may be approved by any one member of the Executive Committee, and to render

at the annual meeting and at such other meetings as may be required a financial statement of the Library.

Section 5. The Executive Committee shall have general charge of the conduct of all business affairs of the Library and the control of its administration, but no contract involving any expenditure of money exceeding ten dollars shall be made without a vote of the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE II.

MEETINGS.

The annual meeting of the Board of Trustees shall be held the third Monday in March for the election of officers and transaction of all proper business.

Stated meetings shall be held the third Monday in June, September and December.

Special meetings may be called at the order of the Chairman.

ARTICLE III.

QUORUM.

A majority of the Board of Trustees shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE IV.

AMENDMENTS.

These By-Laws may be amended or changed at any regular meeting of the Board of Trustees by a two-thirds vote of those present, provided notice of such amendment or change shall have been proposed at a previous meeting.



REPORT
OF THE
SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

GENTLEMEN OF THE UPTON SCHOOL COMMITTEE:

I hereby submit to you my report. It covers the school year 1903, and in point of order is my first.

The province of a report is that of furnishing information regarding the department considered; combined with information I shall present recommendations and suggestions which should be submitted to the citizens as well as the School Committee.

Attendance. Few towns in the Commonwealth can stand more favorably, a comparison of the school enrolment and the school census. Every child in Upton, of legal school age, listed in the school census book, is enrolled in some school, excused from attendance, or at work with the proper certificate. All of those enrolled do not attend school as regularly as they should. In a majority of cases it is not the fault of the child, but is the fault of the parent or guardian. Excerpts from the school laws, pertinent to this phase of Upton schools are included in this report. Parents and guardians should become familiar with them, and the laws should be enforced with a broad application of common sense, or they should be repealed.

[REVISED LAWS, CHAPTER 44.]

OF SCHOOL ATTENDANCE.

Law regarding Attendance. "SECTION 1. Every child between seven and fourteen years of age shall attend some public day school in the city or town in which he resides during the entire time the public day schools are in session." (Subject to legal exceptions as to children, places of attendance, and schools.)

"Every person having under his control a child as described in this section shall cause him to attend school as herein required; and if he fails for five day sessions or ten half day sessions within any period of six months while under such control to cause such child, whose physical or mental condition is not such as to render his attendance at school harmful or impracticable, so to attend school, he shall, upon complaint by a truant officer and conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not more than twenty dollars.

Whoever induces or attempts to induce a child to absent himself unlawfully from school, or employs or harbors a child who, while school is in session, is absent unlawfully from school shall be punished by a fine of not more than fifty dollars."

"SECTION 6. A child who has not been vaccinated shall not be admitted to a public school except upon presentation of a certificate signed by a regular practising physician that he is not a fit subject for vaccination. A child who is a member of a household in which a person is ill with smallpox, diphtheria, scarlet fever or measles, or of a household exposed to such contagion from another household as aforesaid, shall not attend any public school during such illness or until the teacher of the school has been furnished with a certificate from the board of health of the city or town, or from the attending physician of such person, stating that, in a case of smallpox, diphtheria or scarlet fever, at least two weeks, and in a case of measles, at least three days, have elapsed since the recovery, removal or death of such person, and that danger of conveying such disease by such child has passed."

[REVISED LAWS, CHAPTER 46.]

OF TRUANTS AND TRUANT SCHOOLS.

Truants. "SECTION 3. A child between seven and fourteen years of age who wilfully and habitually absents himself from school shall be deemed to be an habitual truant."

"SECTION 4. A child between seven and sixteen years of age who may be found wandering about in the streets or public places of any city or town, having no lawful occupation, habitually not attending school and growing up in idleness and ignorance, shall be deemed to be an habitual absentee."

"SECTION 5. A child under fourteen years of age who persistently violates the reasonable regulations of the school which he attends, or otherwise persistently misbehaves therein, so as to render himself a fit subject for exclusion therefrom, shall be deemed to be an habitual school offender, and"—for offences of sections 3, 4 and 5—"upon complaint by a truant officer and conviction thereof, may, if a boy, be committed to a county truant school or to the Lyman school for boys, and, if a girl, to the state industrial school for girls."

"SECTION 13. A truant officer may apprehend and take to school, without a warrant, any truant or absentee found wandering about in the streets or public places thereof."

EMPLOYMENT OF WOMEN AND CHILDREN.

Employment. "SECTION 28. No child under the age of fourteen years shall be employed in any factory, workshop or mercantile establishment."

"SECTION 29. No child under sixteen years of age shall be employed in a factory, workshop or mercantile establishment unless his employer procures and keeps on file an age and schooling certificate."

"SECTION 30. An age and schooling certificate shall be approved only by the superintendent of schools, or by a person authorized by him in writing, or, if there is no superintendent of schools, by a person authorized by the school committee."

"SECTION 31. An age and schooling certificate shall not be approved unless satisfactory evidence is furnished by the last school census, the certificate of birth or baptism of such minor, the register of birth of such minor, with a city or town clerk, or in some other manner, that such minor is of the age stated in the certificate."

"SECTION 32. The age and schooling certificate of a minor under sixteen years of age shall not be approved and signed until he presents to the person who is authorized to approve and sign it an employment ticket duly filled out and signed. Whoever, being authorized to sign the certificate, knowingly certifies to any materially false statement therein shall be punished by a fine of not more than fifty dollars."

"SECTION 33. Whoever employs a minor under sixteen years of age, and whoever having under his control a minor under such age permits such minor to be employed in violation of the provisions of sections twenty-eight and twenty-nine, shall for such offence be punished by a fine of not more than fifty dollars."

Records. The school records, data concerning Upton schools, and school reports, which had accumulated at the Grafton office, I have had removed to the office in the High School building, and placed where they are more easily accessible. This institutes a policy which should be beneficial to the schools. Definite accessible data, covering essential points, is a prime requisite to understanding what has been accomplished and what is needed.

CONCERNING THE COMMON SCHOOLS.

The Work.

The work done in the Upton common schools, compared with work done under similar conditions, is very creditable. Upton citizens should not be content with the present standard. Conditions should be made such that a higher standard may be easily attained.

Teachers.

Upton citizens may feel confident that their schools are in charge of industrious and conscientious teachers. They are a hard working, and faithful body of public servants, doing their work under conditions which give unequalled opportunity for criticism. They need the support of the citizens more than their criticism: criticism, when just, is beneficial, and so is praise.

Changes in Teaching Corps. Miss Nellie A. Snow resigned: Miss Claire W. Hastings transferred to the West Upton building: Miss Margaret I. Wood elected at the Center building: Miss Annie P. Gerald transferred to the Center building. The remainder of the corps of teachers is as last year: the table shows the grades which each teacher has charge of.

Change in Organization.

The most important and significant change of the year is the opening of a fifth grade at Upton Center, for pupils living near the center of the town. It is important, since it relieved the congestion in the fifth and sixth grades school at the high school building: it is significant, because it denotes the progress and increased usefulness of our schools. I shall call your attention to other changes which would make our schools more efficient.

Additions and Repairs.

The usual minor repairs have been attended to as they have appeared necessary. The largest item under this head is the painting of the exterior of the Center building, and the fitting up of a room for a fifth grade in this same building. The building needed painting: it needs a properly graded yard now.

Subjects. Writing is not taught in a systematic, developing way. It is too often a task of copying a set model for a certain length of time. I shall try to suggest to the individual teachers ways of correcting this weakness. I am confident that uniformly excellent writing is well nigh impossible, where there is no special teacher for the subject, and the teaching corps is often changed.

Geography should be taught in the eighth grade the entire year: it has not been.

The work in drawing and music is reported by the supervisor.

Text-Books. The text-books in Arithmetic and Geography are not suitable texts, they are old and worn. A change should be made in the books used, and new books should be supplied at the earliest possible date. The text-books in Language and Grammar will soon need to be discarded, and new ones bought to replace them.

New American History text-books have been provided the pupils of the eighth grade.

CONCERNING THE HIGH SCHOOL.

The Work. The work done in the Upton High School is commensurate with the money expended upon it, and the conditions under which the work is done. I have an intimate knowledge of this school and may be expected to speak understandingly regarding it. The work done by the present corps of teachers, in many respects, is superior to any work ever done in the school and the following remarks cannot be construed to reflect upon their service.

I submit three reasons why the high school has not yet reached the degree of efficiency which it should be supported to reach.

First: The pupils come to the school immature in development and in years.

Second: There is not the stimulating environment, which many larger schools have, prompting the pupils to do that which they undertake for definite and well planned ends.

Third: There has been a constant change in the teaching force of this school, or a feeling of unrest on the part of the teachers, largely due to their ambitions, which Upton conditions do not meet.

These are vital causes for the retarded development in our High School. These conditions will long confront high schools in small towns. Upton citizens can do much to make them less operative upon their High School.

The environment is improving; as the school sends successful pupils to higher educational institutions, and as a greater number of the pupils realize that they should work with some definite aim in view, this environment will become equal to that of larger schools.

Changes in Teaching Corps. Miss Annabel C. Roe resigned: Miss Anna Burnside was elected to fill the vacancy. The other teachers remain as last year.

Course of Study. The Course of Study should be revised, so that three teachers can do the work to better advantage. The three years' English Course should be changed to a four years' course. Pupils who elect this course rarely get any further school training. They need four years in the High School. It is not fair to rate a three years' graduate with one who has taken a four years' course.

The demands made upon those who present themselves for college are so exacting, that pupils who expect to qualify themselves to meet them should plan to take five years in doing the preparatory work. Large high schools find this necessary: evidently small ones must in many instances. The post-graduate so often found in our school bears testimony to this necessity. Any false pride in this matter, on the part of parent or pupil, should be overcome. It is not how quickly, but how quickly the work can be done well, which concerns

our pupils and especially our college candidates. Those who are able to do the work in four years will have the opportunity to do so, if others spend a longer period in preparing themselves. The skimming process, which short time combined with limited equipment induces, is bad.

College Certification. It has seemed advisable to attempt to secure certificate rights to the New England colleges. The required blank has been filled out and presented to the proper authorities for their consideration.

Repairs. Minor repairs have been made as needed. The High School has never been completed, in-as-much as the grounds have not been graded to a proper setting for the building. An effort to bring about the grading of these grounds and those about the Center building is rapidly taking form. This effort should receive your ready support when opportunity presents. We hope to gain support in this project of every official, citizen, pupil and graduate of Upton.

I call your attention to the report of the High School Principal which is appended.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

RELATIVE TO THE COMMON SCHOOLS.

Repairs. 1. Double windows should be placed upon the West Upton building.
 2. Slate black-boards should replace the wooden ones whenever it is necessary to repair them.
 3. The out-houses at the Center and West Upton buildings should be made more sanitary.

Teachers' Salaries. An increased maximum and minimum salary schedule should be established and maintained. (The constant change of teachers will be remedied by this). This recommendation should apply to all teachers' salaries.

Upton pays as low as eight dollars a week for a teacher's services. This is \$288.00 to provide for 365 days. Is it enough? Can't you afford more? A progressive teacher, if employment could be found, needs the vacation time for rest and further fitting for the profession.

Improvement of Organization. The pupils of the East Part school could be better provided for and more carefully instructed, if this school were closed and they were transported to the other schools. They would receive their share of one-half a teacher's time instead of one-eighth of it.

1. I recommend that the sentiment of the families interested in the school be ascertained, and free expression of that sentiment encouraged, in order that the propriety of making the change suggested may be established, and, if established, that the change be effected at an early date.

Provision should be made to instruct the fifth grade pupils, coming from West Upton, at that village. This provision would place the grades, above the fifth and below the high school, under two teachers. These children would then receive two-thirds of a teacher's time instead of one-half of it, and they would come to the High School more mature in mental development.

2. I recommend that this proposition be brought before the citizens of Upton at the earliest possible date. The proposition entails a new building, or an addition to the present West Upton building.

In a system of common schools upon an eight-grade basis, with two grades to a teacher, a certain maturity of the pupils is necessary, if satisfactory results are to be attained.

3. I recommend that the age of entrance to grade I. be placed at six years. This change would stimulate the work from the first grade through the twelfth.

RELATIVE TO THE HIGH SCHOOL.

Course of Study. 1. The Course of Study for the High School should be revised.

2. The three years' English Course should be increased to a four years' course; this should take effect with the class of 1907 (the class which enters the High School next September.) A certificate may be granted pupils who attend the High School three years and complete the work declared a minimum for those years.

College Candidates. Pupils who expect to enter college should be advised to spend five years in preparation.

Length of Year. The scholastic year for the High School should be forty weeks.

SUMMARY.

As to the Recommendations. I have submitted recommendations and suggestions which are impracticable with any means now at the command of your board. To carry them out more money must be appropriated for the schools by the citizens. I have submitted these recommendations with the conviction that they are expedient and deserve careful thought. I have not attempted lengthy pedagogical defenses for my recommendations. Your board is conversant with their merits; if they appeal to the intelligent knowledge of Upton citizens, I am sure of their support. Endorsement by the good common sense of a community is the strongest argument a cause can have. Consider the following comparative statement taken from the last Report of the Massachusetts State Board of Education. Upton stands 200 in a list of 353 towns in Massachusetts, in the table showing for the several towns and cities of the State the comparative amounts of money expended for the support of public schools per child, as determined, (1) by the number of children between five and fifteen years of age in the town or city, and, (2) by

the number of children in the average membership of the public schools.

Conclusion. I have been connected with your schools as Superintendent five working months. My task has been to discover the needs of schools which have had the careful direction of a competent committee and the thorough supervision of two able Superintendents. Much foundation work has been done and done well. I recognize the responsibility placed upon me of building upon this with whatever means are placed at my disposal. I accept the responsibility.

I thank you for your harmonious assistance and support.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF THE HIGH SCHOOL.

Mr. R. O. Small, Superintendent of Schools,

DEAR SIR:

The growing desire for a higher education, which is becoming very apparent among our students, brings with it, on their part, a closer application, a more determined ambition, and a more definite and decided purpose.

That our High School has been successful during the past year, the results themselves show better than words.

Four young men, graduates of the Upton High School, entered some of our leading colleges and technical schools last fall: and I have yet to learn of one of the four who has failed in a single subject. On the other hand, I have been informed by the faculty of one of these institutions that one of the Upton boys won special honors in his work for the fall term.

The complete preparation these young men received was only made possible by the intelligent supervision of our worthy School Board and Superintendent, and by the untiring efforts of our first assistant who labored in and out of school, often doing unnecessary work that these young men might succeed.

Next fall we plan to send four more students to college, and we do not hesitate in the least to say that some of these also will prove to be honor students.

The true success of a school does not appear on the athletic field nor in the rhetorical exercises, but in the work of the classroom. And to see this work we not only welcome you, but feel it your duty as parents to be present.

Again we wish to thank our School Board and Superintendent for their hearty interest in us and for their manifest belief in our ability.

One suggestion to the parents and I am done. If parents, instead of threatening to put their boys to work, would strive to hold before them bright prospects of a college course the boys would be more studious and kind, and the parents wiser and happier.

REPORT OF THE SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC AND DRAWING.

Mr. R. O. Small, Superintendent of Schools,

DEAR SIR:

In accordance with your request I present to you my annual report of Music and Drawing in the schools of Upton.

The fact that both of these subjects are now everywhere recognized as a vital part of the school curriculum, leads us to a thoughtful consideration of the importance of securing as good results in these as are obtained in the teaching of other subjects.

In giving you a just estimate of the results of the year's work, I have endeavored to carefully consider the conditions favorable and otherwise to the accomplishment of good work in both departments.

While I acknowledge it to be impossible to secure the same results in the two-grade rooms that can be obtained in rooms of one grade, I feel that the music and drawing lessons are periods of such deep interest to both teachers and pupils that the results are necessarily good. In fact they are all that we can reasonably expect in the time allotted to the teaching of these subjects.

Much thought has been given to the work of the primary grades to have the drawings free and spontaneous in character. Children are full of imagination, especially in the earlier years, and this will continue, I believe, if we but know how to preserve and develop it.

Pose drawings and action studies have been continued with good results. These drawings, although often grotesque and out of proportion, are, nevertheless, of value to the teacher in showing how much the child has learned to observe, as here he is easily led to express the full power of his ability.

Memory work occupies an important place, as it enables pupils to make use of previously studied objects in their imaginative and illustrative work.

Picture study has accomplished a great deal for the pupils in all the grades.

Considerable time has also been given to the study of composition and design. The pupils have manifested a great deal of interest in this work, and have shown considerable ability in making original designs for useful articles.

The work in vocal music has been conducted upon the same general lines as last year. All the schools are now supplied with the books of the Natural Course. These books have proved well graded, and contain exercises so carefully and logically arranged that pupils can readily comprehend each new step taken. We need, however, Book No. 3 to complete the set.

The work in the High School continues to improve. A number of difficult choruses have been mastered during the year, and the singing period is one of great pleasure as well as profit to all.

I feel confident in saying that graduates of this school who complete the course of study in music will not only be able to read difficult music with quite a degree of accuracy, but will have cultivated a taste for, and be able to appreciate the highest order of musical composition.

I desire to express my thanks to all who have assisted me in the work of the year.
