

## TOWN CLERK'S REPORT.

### UPTON RECORDS, 1934.

### WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, FEBRUARY 5, 1934.

Worcester, SS.

To the Constable of the Town of Upton, in the County of Worcester, Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are directed to notify the inhabitants of the town of Upton, qualified to vote in Elections and in Town Affairs, to meet at the Town Hall, in said Upton, on Monday, the fifth day of February, 1934, punctually, at six o'clock A. M., then and there to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year: Moderator, three Selectmen, Town Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Auditor, five Constables, Tree Warden and Road Commissioner, all for one year; one Assessor of Taxes, one member of the Board of Public Welfare, one Cemetery Commissioner, one School Committee and three Trustees for the Public Library, all for three years; also for said voters to give in their votes, Yes or No, in answer to the following questions:

1. Shall licenses be granted in this town for the sale therein of all alcoholic beverages (whiskey, rum, gin, malt beverages, wines and all other alcoholic beverages)?

2. Shall licenses be granted in this town for the sale therein of wines and malt beverages (wines and beer, ale and all other malt beverages) ? all on one ballot.

The polls shall be closed at four o'clock in the afternoon on said day of meeting.

In accordance with Section 1, Article 1 of the By-Laws of the Town of Upton, the remaining articles of this warrant will be acted upon at an adjourned meeting of the Town held Saturday afternoon, February tenth, at two o'clock.

Article 2. To hear the reports of all town officers, and act thereon.

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and act thereon.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the town treasurer, with the approval of the selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of revenue of the present municipal year.

Article 5. To determine the wage to be paid the Road Commissioner for the ensuing year, and act thereon.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars for further extension of the Westboro Road under Chapter 90, provided the State and County will together allot \$8,000.00 or more for the same, or take any action thereon. This appropriation is not recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars for further extension of the Mendon Road under Chapter 90, provided the State and County will together allot \$8,000.00 or more for the same, or take any action thereon. This appropriation is not recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of three hundred (\$300.00) dollars for Chapter 90 Maintenance, provided the State and County will together allot \$600.00 or more for the same, or take any action relating thereto. This appropriation is not recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to accept the cut-off between Mendon and West River Streets as laid out by the Selectmen, appropriate \$30.00 for land damage and expenses for same, as recommended by the Finance Committee, or take any action thereon.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of one thousand (\$1,000.00) dollars to buy a truck for the Highway Department, or take any action pertaining thereto. This appropriation is not recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of twelve hundred and fifty (\$1,250.00) dollars to purchase for the Fire Department one hose and ladder motor truck and equipment for same, as petitioned for by George N. O. Poirier and others. This appropriation is not recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of five hundred (\$500.00) dollars for material, labor and cartage on C. W. A. projects, or take any action thereon. The Finance Committee recommend this appropriation for projects started previous to February 1st.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to sell the East Upton school house on Glen View street, or take any action pertaining thereto.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars for repairs to the town clock, as recommended by the Finance Committee, or take any action thereon.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to appoint a Committee to make plans for the observance, in June, 1935, of the two hundredth anniversary of the incorporation of this town, or take any action thereon.

And you are directed to serve this Warrant by posting up attested copies thereof at each of the following places in said Town, seven days at least before the time of holding said meeting:—At each of the Post-offices and on the Town House in said Town.

Hereof fail not, and make due return of this Warrant, with your doings thereon, to the Town Clerk, before the time and place of meeting aforesaid.

## PROCEEDINGS OF THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING,

FEBRUARY 5, 1934.

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS.

*Worcester, SS.*

Pursuant to the foregoing warrant, the legal voters of the Town of Upton met in the Town Hall in said Upton, on Monday, the fifth day of February, 1934. The meeting was called to order at six o'clock A. M. by the town clerk, who then read the warrant and the officer's return thereon.

## TOWN OFFICERS.

Article 1. The selectmen having appointed Henry E. Allard, C. Samuel Aldrich, Joseph W. Gorman and Verne W. Childs, election officers, they were duly sworn to faithfully perform the duties of the office by the town clerk.

Cards of instruction and specimen ballots having been posted as the law directs, a package said to contain 1200 official ballots, to be used at this election, was delivered to the ballot clerks.

The ballot box was then shown to the voters present to be empty, the index being set on 0000, it was locked and the keys thereof were given to Herbert A. Bagley, constable in attendance at said meeting.

The polls were declared open at six o'clock A. M.

At the close of the polls, the register in the ballot box stood at 774. The check-lists were compared and showed that 774 had voted.

REPORT OF  
FINANCE COMMITTEE  
UPTON, MASSACHUSETTS  
FEBRUARY, 1934.

TO THE VOTERS OF UPTON:—Your various boards have asked for appropriations totalling \$76,199.98 as against \$67,098.47 appropriated at the regular February town meeting last year. This is in spite of the fact that the various C. W. A. projects should help the welfare of the unemployed.

The total cash payments of the town for the past two years were

1932—\$109,910.01

1933— 121,303.86

In 1932 your cash balance was \$8,366.98. It has now shrunk \$4,544.23 although your tax rate for last year was increased \$.90. This shows that at the rate of the town expenditures last year, the tax increase should have been considerably more in order to keep our balance.

We are faced with additional expenses this year, which we must meet, such as material for C.W.A. projects, Tubercular Hospital, and so forth, and it is quite possible that our revenue from the State and County will be substantially reduced.

Our recommendations for 1934 total \$65,449.98. Figuring in the decrease in cash balances, the Finance Committee earnestly feel that any added appropriation would cause a direct tax increase over last year. We now have \$18,804.03 in uncollected taxes and we do not believe sincere voters want to add more to that burden.

We recommend the following appropriations for 1934:

## PROCEEDINGS OF THE ADJOURNED TOWN MEETING,

FEBRUARY 10, 1934.

About three hundred legal voters of the Town of Upton met at the Town Hall on Saturday, February 10, 1934. The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Malcolm C. Temple.

## REPORTS OF TOWN OFFICERS.

Article 2. Voted: to accept the reports of town officers as printed.

## APPROPRIATIONS.

Article 3. The appropriations as recommended in the Report of the Finance Committee were taken up and acted upon separately.

On motion of Daniel H. Bates, \$500.00 was appropriated for the Police Department instead of \$400.00 as recommended.

Edward B. Newton moved that \$7,500.00 be appropriated for Public Welfare. This was amended to \$5,000.00 and the amendment was carried.

Newton J. Frost moved that \$24,000.00 be appropriated for schools. He said the additional \$500.00 was needed to cover the pay of a part time commercial teacher and more fuel because of extreme cold. The \$24,000.00 was voted.

Voted: on motion of Henry Hoyle to transfer \$310.96 machinery rental of 1933 and appropriate same for the machinery fund of 1934.

When a motion to appropriate \$2,700.00 for street lights was made, the Moderator requested Henry R. Hoyle to preside while he, Malcolm C. Temple, discussed from the floor, the electric light situation in Upton. He offered an amendment that a committee be appointed to look into the matter of getting reduced rates for street lighting. This amendment was carried.

Voted: that the matter be left in the hands of the Moderator and Selectmen with the Moderator to be chairman of the committee.

Voted: to appropriate \$2,700.00 for street lights.

#### BORROWING MONEY.

Article 4. Voted: that the town treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, be and hereby is authorized to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the municipal year, beginning January 1, 1934, to an amount not exceeding in the aggregate \$30,000.00 and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and debt or debts incurred under this vote to be paid from taxes of said municipal year.

Article 5. Voted: that the matter be left in the hands of the Selectmen. A rising vote was taken: Yes—102, No—17. Michael Shaughnessy stated that the voters must determine the salary of an elected officer. John E. Dearth said that the Road Commissioner could serve without pay.

#### WESTBORO ROAD.

Article 6. A motion to pass over the article was lost. A standing vote was taken: Yes—49, No—94. After much discussion during which several spoke, Eben T. Hall in favor, Merrill White, who warned of a high tax rate, David Moroney and others opposed, it was voted: on motion of Harry C. Snow, to appropriate the sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00)

dollars for further extension of the Westboro Road under Chapter 90, provided the State and County will together allot \$8,000.00 or more for the same.

#### **MENDON ROAD.**

Article 7. Voted: to appropriate the sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars for further extension of the Mendon Road under Chapter 90, provided the State and County will together allot \$8,000.00 or more for the same. A rising vote was taken, Yes—81, No—56.

#### **CHAPTER 90 MAINTENANCE.**

Article 8. A motion to appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for Chapter 90 Maintenance was lost, a rising vote was taken, Yes—31, No—48. Voted: to pass over the article.

#### **MENDON AND WEST RIVER STREETS CUT-OFF.**

Article 9. Voted: on motion of Eben Hall to appropriate \$30.00 for land damage and expenses of the cut-off between Mendon and West River Streets. Voted: to accept the cut-off as laid out by the Selectmen.

#### **TRUCK FOR HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT.**

Article 10. Voted: to pass over the article.

#### **TRUCK FOR FIRE DEPARTMENT.**

Article 11. A motion to pass over the article was lost, a standing vote being taken, Yes—64, No—67. George Poirier, Chief of the Fire Department, described the truck desired and the need of the same and spoke strongly in favor of the appropriation.

Voted: to appropriate \$1,250.00 to purchase for the Fire Department a hose and ladder motor truck and equipment for same.

## C. W. A. PROJECTS.

Article 12. Voted: on motion of Harry Snow, to appropriate five hundred (\$500.00) dollars for material, labor and cartage on C. W. A. projects started previous to February 1st.

## EAST UPTON SCHOOL HOUSE.

Article 13. Voted: to leave the matter in the hands of the Selectmen to investigate and find out what disposition, if any, can be made of the East Upton School House.

## TOWN CLOCK.

Article 14. Voted: to appropriate twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars for repairs to the town clock.

## TWO HUNDREDTH ANNIVERSARY.

Article 15. A motion that the Selectmen and Moderator be a Committee to make plans for the two hundredth anniversary of the town was amended, that the Selectmen appoint a committee of nine for this purpose. This amendment was carried. Voted: that the Selectmen appoint a committee of nine to make plans for the observance in June, 1935, of the two hundredth anniversary of the incorporation of this town.

Voted: to raise by taxation a sum necessary to defray town expenses after all other revenue has been deducted.

Voted: to dissolve the warrant.

QUESTION 1.

LAW SUBMITTED UPON REFERENDUM PETITION.

Shall a law described as follows:—

This law amends General Laws, Chapter 131, as previously amended, by repealing Section 105A thereof and adding thereto three new sections, 105B, 105C and 114A.

Section 105B provides that whoever uses any trap or other device for capture of fur bearing animals, which is not designed to kill such animal at once or to take it unhurt and which is likely to cause continued suffering to an animal caught therein, shall be fined \$50, but traps or other devices for protection of property, set not more than 50 yards from any building, cultivated plot, or enclosures used for rearing poultry or game birds, to the use of which the presence of vermin may be detrimental, are excluded from the application of this section.

Section 105C provides for the submission to the voters at a municipal election in any city or town upon petition of the question of whether the operation of Section 105B shall be suspended or if it has been already suspended, of the question whether it shall again be operative in such city or town.

Section 114A provides that the Commissioner of Conservation may suspend the operation of Section 105B for a period not exceeding 30 days within any specified territory under the control of his department.

The law also provides for the submission, by the selectmen to the voters at a special town meeting in the current year, upon petition, of the question as to whether the provisions of Section 105B shall be suspended in any town; and which was approved by both branches of the General Court by vote not recorded, be approved?

To obtain a full expression of opinion, voters should vote on both of the following questions:

- (a) If a voter desires to permit the sale of any and all alcoholic beverages in this town he will vote "Yes" on both questions.
- (b) If he desires to permit the sale of wines and malt beverages only herein, he will vote "No" on Question 1 and "Yes" on Question 2.
- (c) If he desires to prohibit the sale of any and all alcoholic beverages herein, he will vote "No" on both questions.

#### QUESTION 2.

1. Shall licenses be granted in this town for the sale therein of all alcoholic beverages (whiskey, rum, gin, malt beverages, wines and all other alcoholic beverages)?

2. Shall licenses be granted in this town for the sale therein of wines and malt beverages (wines and beer, ale and other malt beverages.)

QUESTION 3.

1. Shall the pari-mutuel system of betting on licensed horse races be permitted in this county?

2. Shall the pari-mutuel system of betting on licensed dog races be permitted in this county?

All of the above are to be voted for upon one ballot.

Pursuant to the foregoing warrant, the legal voters of the Town of Upton met in the Town Hall in said Upton, on Tuesday, the sixth day of November, 1934, punctually, at six o'clock forenoon.

The meeting was called to order and the warrant read by the town clerk.

The specimen ballots and cards of instruction having been posted as the law directs, the ballot box to be used at this election was opened in public meeting and shown to be empty, the register having been set at 0000, the box was locked and the keys thereof were delivered to Herbert A. Bagley, constable in attendance at said meeting.

Edward G. Rawson, Edward Gorman, Verne Childs and Frank Ford having been appointed election officers by the selectmen, were duly sworn by the Town Clerk.

Fourteen hundred forty-five official ballots received from the Secretary of the Commonwealth were delivered to the ballot clerks.

The polls were declared open at six o'clock A. M.

Edward G. Rawson had charge of the ballot box and Edward Gorman had charge of the check-list at the ballot box.

With Selectman Eben T. Hall presiding, John E. Dearth, made a motion that the polls close at six o'clock P. M. and was so voted.

Edwin W. Sadler, Eleanor B. Adair, Grace M. Murphy, Joseph Slattery, Raymond F. Lyford, A. Kleber McCarty, Edwin B. Houghton and James Kearnan having been appointed to canvass the vote, and Frank O. Ogden and Joseph Gorman appointed as tabulators of vote, were duly sworn by the Town Clerk.

Due notice having been given, the polls at six o'clock P. M. were declared closed by Harry C. Snow, chairman of selectmen.

Nine hundred twenty-seven votes were cast, of this number eleven ballots were received from absent voters and were cast by the Town Clerk. The names of those on the list of voters, both at the polls and at the table of the ballot clerks which had been checked, were counted and found to agree with the number of ballots cast, nine hundred twenty-seven (927).

Parents and others are requested to carefully examine the above lists and if any errors or omissions are discovered report them at once to the town clerk, that the record may be corrected, as it is of importance that the records of Vital Statistics should be complete. Herewith are extracts from the General Laws, Chapter 46.

**GENERAL LAWS, CHAPTER 46, SECTION 3.**

(As Amended by Chapter 281, Section 1, Acts of 1925).

Every physician, or hospital medical officer registered under section nine of chapter one hundred and twelve, in this chapter called officer, shall keep a record of the birth of every child in cases of which he was in charge, showing date and place of birth, the name, if any, of the child, its sex and color, the name, age, birthplace, occupation and residence (including the street number, if any, and the ward number, if in a city) of each parent, the maiden name of the mother and the name of the physician or officer, if any, personally attending the birth. If the child is illegitimate, the name of, and other facts relating to the father shall not be set forth except upon written request of both the father and mother; provided, that if an illegitimate child shall have become legitimate by the intermarriage of his parents and the acknowledgment of his father, as provided in section seven of chapter one hundred and ninety, prior to the mailing or delivery of any report herein required, such report shall read, in all respects, as if such child had been born to such parents in lawful wedlock. Said physician or officer shall, within fifteen days after such birth, mail or deliver to the clerk or registrar of the town where such birth occurred, a report stating the facts hereinabove required to be shown on said record and also the said written request, if any; provided, that if said report is not so made within forty-eight hours after such birth, said physician or officer shall, within said

forty-eight hours, mail or deliver to said clerk or registrar a notice stating the date and place of the birth, the street number, if any, the ward number, if in a city, and the family name. Upon presentation to him of a certificate of the town clerk stating that any such birth has been duly reported, the town treasurer shall pay to such physician or officer a fee of twenty-five cents for each birth so reported. Any physician or any such officer violating any provision of this section shall forfeit not more than twenty-five dollars. The said town clerk or registrar shall file daily with the local board of health a list of all births reported to him, showing, as to each, the date of birth, sex, color, family name, residence, ward and physician or officer in charge.

GENERAL LAWS, CHAPTER 46, SECTION 6.

Parents, within forty days after the birth of a child, and every householder, within forty days after a birth in his house, shall cause notice thereof to be given to the clerk of the town where such child is born \* \* \*.

## TOWN TREASURER'S STATEMENTS.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank, known as the Knowlton School Fund, in trust with the Town Treasurer as trustee, \$30.95 to be used by the School Committee to defray the extraordinary expenses of the Knowlton School Building.

There is deposited in the Milford Home National Bank, known as the Ella (Whitney) Risteen Fund, in trust with the Town Treasurer and School Committee as Trustees, one thousand dollars, (\$1,000.00) the income to be divided between the two pupils in our public schools who make the most progress during each year. The amount of the Fund, Jan. 1, 1935, \$1,017.50. \$35.30 interest of this fund was used this year.

There is deposited in the Worcester County Institution for Savings, known as the Charlotte A. Batchelor School Fund, in trust with the Town Treasurer as trustee, five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars, the income to be used for the Public Schools. \$162.50 was used this last year.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank, known as the Charlotte A. Batchelor Library Fund, in trust with the Town Treasurer as trustee, five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) the income to be used for the Public Library. \$175.00 was used last year.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank as a nucleus of a fund for a library building as voted by the Town, February 7, 1925, the sum of \$2,446.60.

There is deposited in the Milford Home National Bank, the sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars, known as the "George W. Knowlton Fund." This Fund is subject to withdrawal by the Town Treasurer. The income only to be used to help the Townspeople who are in distress.

There has been drawn of this fund this year \$50.00.

## NOTE.

At this time of the State Audit of Municipal accounts at June 12, 1933, the total of this Fund was \$5,396.65.

After the Audit in July, 25% of this account, \$1,353.61 was Waived to Trust as per Bank Holiday Law and with allowance of Interest due \$17.81 brought this Fund to \$4,060.-85 as per last Town Report.

This year 50% of this Bank Waiver \$676.81 was paid back and with the addition of accumulated interest brings the total of this Fund as of January 1, 1935 to \$4,802.75.

## TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE UPTON LIBRARY:—

The librarian herewith submits the annual report with library statistics and the catalog of new books.

That the town may receive the income from the Carpenter Fund of \$1,000.00, at least sixty dollars worth of books must be added each year to the "Carpenter Alcove". This has been done the past year.

On Bird Day Mrs. Newton J. Frost gave a very interesting and helpful talk on the construction and care of bird houses.

A low round table and small chairs now stand in front of the fire place in the reading room. This gives the younger borrowers a place where they may enjoy their own magazines and books.

A bulletin screen has been purchased for the library, also a new filing cabinet to replace the old one that was much too small and out-of-date.

During Book Week in November more than fifty new books, purchased for young folks, made a very attractive display. Ten five-book certificates and four twenty-book certificates were earned by the children with their summer reading.

In December a collection of fifty pictures, examples of the best in photographic art were on exhibition. These were loaned to the library for four weeks by the Library Committee.

Gifts of flowers from Upton gardens during the summer were much appreciated at the library.

The Upton Woman's Club gave the Library "The Story of Gardening" in memory of Miss Daisy V. Snow. Mrs. Everett T. Brown gave "Soldiers What Next", "Merchants

The following is my fourteenth annual report:

ENROLLMENT.

This will leave the situation much as at present, but with a slight increase in the high school.

ENTRANCE AGE TO FIRST GRADE.

For some time I have been convinced that the entrance age to first grade of 5 years, 6 months, allows a number of pupils to enter school each year who would do much better to wait a year. For some years we have been allowing child-

ren under this age who seemed, upon test, to be sufficiently mentally and physically mature, to enter the first grade. A study has recently been made of the retardation of Upton first grade pupils which the accompanying sheet attempts to put in tabular form. From this it will be seen that among those admitted by test, even though under age, there was no retardation. The highest percentage of retardation occurs among those who enter at ages between 5 years, 6 months, and 5 years, 9 months, but that nearly half of this group who failed of promotion the first year were regularly promoted thereafter. Of those who entered school at ages over 5 years, 10 months, and failed of promotion the first year over half were regularly promoted thereafter.

The results of the study lead me to propose that the age entrance rule be changed so that on and after September, 1935, no child under 5 years, 10 months old on September 1 be admitted to the first grade except under tests indicating that he is sufficiently mature mentally and physically, to do first grade work.

#### EARLIER GRADUATION.

I wish to call attention to the recommendation of Mr. Cowing in his report that the graduation exercises be held earlier than has been the custom and his reasons for the same, and to add that this meets with my approval.

#### PENMANSHIP.

Mr. W. L. Rinehart was engaged in September to supervise the penmanship of the schools of Upton. The teachers and pupils have given him splendid cooperation and the work seems to be progressing well. A full report of the results will be given to the Committee at the end of the school year.

## MANUAL TRAINING.

## MR. STANLEY REPORTS:

"I am glad to be able to assure you that, the outlook is very promising.

"The seventh grade is very large, necessitating two divisions and because of this it has been necessary to give an extra afternoon every other week to this class. Each of the three classes is now able to devote the usual period every two weeks to this work. On many dark afternoons we have reason to be increasingly thankful for the electric lights which we lacked during so many years.

"The boys in the seventh grade while learning the use of tools and the different processes of construction are able to make several articles which though small, are useful. When they reach the eighth grade, a wider choice is available and every boy can choose his own project. At the present time the boys in the eighth grade are constructing such pieces as a book-case, table, end table, fire-making sets, book-ends and knife-boxes. It is remarkable how much they accomplish in such a short time and it speaks well for their interest, ability and perseverance."

#### MISS SANDSTROM REPORTS:

#### HEALTH.

"I wish the pupils who can draw could be allowed more time for the subject in school and that the parents of those same children would regard their talent as a gift to be seriously encouraged."

"Drawing should have a place on the High School program. In my first year at Upton High I spent one period every day in the Latin class. From that time spent I have have at least been a period of achievement.

"I know of children in this town who have much talent in hand work. These children would profit greatly, if given the encouragement of materials to work with at home.

"To some teachers and to many parents this subject is considered of little or no importance. Yet leading educators of today are quite agreed that hand work is necessary to mental development. This applies to all children. But to the child of undesignable ability in this direction, drawing is of major importance. If properly encouraged and correctly guided and trained now, some branch of it may be chosen for their means of livelihood. If it is only a means of filling those leisure hours that the future holds for the youth of today, it is well worth the time spent in training now.

"The annual physical examination by Dr. Capen has been completed. Dr. Capen found the pupils' teeth much improved. Defects found and notices sent to parents for attention.

"During the measles epidemic Dr. Capen and the school nurse made frequent examinations of all pupils in the Ball and Knowlton schools. All contacts in family were excluded from school.

"In May the Chadwick Clinic follow-up examination was held in Grafton. Five pupils were X-rayed and examined. All were found improving.

"All pupils in the Ball and Knowlton schools have had their sight and hearing tested.

"All pupils have been weighed and measured. In grades from one to six notices were sent to parents stating weight, height and normal weight of each pupil.

"Through the kindness of the Women's Club and The King's Daughters, underweight pupils from the Ball and Knowlton Schools were given milk every morning at recess during November and December. I hope we will be able to continue this all year."

The following is my second annual report:

The total enrollment in the high school building is 163.

Because of the large number of students in the seventh grade, it was necessary to exclude the sixth grade from the high school building. The sixth grades now remain at the Ball and Knowlton school buildings.

I recommend the omission, next year, of 3rd year French and the following year, third year Latin. These two courses would be replaced by Social Science studies. A very small percentage of students include these advanced courses in their course of study. Therefore, the change would benefit the majority of students. The majority of colleges today are requiring only two years of a foreign language for entrance credit. The courses replacing those omitted would be of such quality as to meet the college standards for entrance credit.

From a study of several school calendars it has been observed that many senior classes are graduated at least one week before the end of the school year. This is an excellent plan for the following reasons:—

1. Undivided attention may be given to the final examinations of the undergraduate students, and those seniors preparing for college entrance.

2. With the graduation exercises over, less confusion is present at the business of terminating the school year.

I recommend this procedure be adopted for the Upton High School calendar.

The Upton High School Basketball Team has again been invited to participate in the annual Small High School Tournament held at Framingham in March. Upton High School is also a member of the newly formed Tri-County Basketball League which is made up of the following schools: Hopkinton, Ashland, Northboro, Millis and Upton. We anticipate a successful season for both girls' and boys' teams.
