



TOWN CLERK'S REPORT.

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING,

FEBRUARY 7, 1938.

THE COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS.

*Worcester, SS.*To the Constable of the Town of Upton, in the County of
Worcester, Greeting:In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you
are directed to notify the inhabitants of the Town of Upton,
qualified to vote in Elections and in Town Affairs, to meet at
the Town Hall, in said Upton, on Monday, the Seventh day of
February, punctually at Seven o'clock, A. M., then and there to
act on the following articles, to wit:—Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the
ensuing year: Moderator, Town Treasurer, three Selectmen,
Collector of Taxes, Auditor, Road Commissioner, five Constables,
Tree Warden, one member of Board of Public Welfare
(to fill vacancy), and one trustee of Public Library (to fill
vacancy), all for one year; one Assessor of Taxes, one member
of Public Welfare, one member of the School Committee, one
Cemetery Commissioner, three Trustees of the Public Library,
and Town Clerk, all for three years.

All of the above to be voted for upon one ballot.

The polls shall be closed at six o'clock in the afternoon on
said day of the meeting.

In accordance with Article 2, Section 1 of the By-Laws of the Town of Upton the remaining articles of this warrant will be acted upon at an adjourned meeting of the Town held in Town Hall, Saturday afternoon, February 12, at two o'clock.

Article 2. To hear the reports of all town officers, and act thereon.

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and act thereon.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1938, and to issue a note or notes therefore, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2000.00) for further improvement of Westboro road, said money to be used in conjunction with any money which may be allotted by the State or County, or both, for this purpose; or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700.00) for Chapter 90 Maintenance; said money to be used in conjunction with any money which may be allotted by the State or County, or both for this purpose; or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Two Thousand Dollars (\$2000.00) for the improvement of Northbridge Road, said money to be used in conjunction with any money which may be allotted by the State or County, or both, for this purpose; or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.00) to be used under the direction of the Selectmen for materials, truck hire, and administration of WPA projects, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$520.00) to be used toward the settlement of an Industrial Accident Board decree in the case of Laura Walker, administratrix of the estate of Samuel Walker, against the Town of Upton, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to be deposited in a Savings Bank by the Town Treasurer, compensation to be paid from this fund under Workmen's Compensation Act (Acts of 1913, Chapter 807, accepted by the voters on November 4, 1913) with said claim to be handled by the Selectmen, or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) for the purchase of filing cases to be placed in the Town Hall vault for various Town departments, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to appoint a committee to confer with the Department of Public Works relative to the construction of a sidewalk on Milford street between Central Square and the residence of Taylor C. Lyford, as petitioned for by Edward A. Page and others, or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the use of the Town Farm property as an infirmary as recommended by the Finance Committee, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Assessors of Taxes to use Five Thousand Dollars (\$5000.00) from unappropriated funds in the Town's Treasury in establishing the 1938 tax rate, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to adjust the following salaries as recommended by the Finance Committee: (a) To reduce the salary of the chairman of Selectmen from \$200.00 to \$150.00; (b) to increase the salary of Town Auditor from \$75.00 to \$100.00; (c) to reduce the maximum sum that the chairman of the Assessors of Taxes may draw from \$300.00 to \$250.00; (d) to increase the maximum sums that the other two members of the Assessors of Taxes may draw from \$200.00 to \$225.00 each, or take any action pertaining thereto.

Article 16. To see if the Town will instruct the Selectmen to investigate the advisability of placing all insurance on Town buildings and contents under a blanket policy, and report at a future town meeting, or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Nine Hundred Dollars (\$900.00) for the purchase of the so-called Box Mill property and water rights at West Upton from Angelo Mazza as petitioned for by George E. Bradley and others, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to accept an offer of the Lake Wildwood Improvement Association to convey certain real estate, together with water rights, in return for the payment of a sum of money on a mortgage and interest, with certain expressed conditions that the Town will construct a dam, as petitioned for by Joseph J. Driscoll and others, or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to be

expended at the Playgrounds in the rear of the High School grounds, to complete the construction of a fence and tennis courts, with other improvements, and with any sum of money that may be available from other sources, as petitioned for by Eben T. Hall and others, or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used in paying two weeks' vacations to eligible employees of the Town in accordance with the Acts of 1914, Chapter 217, which was accepted by the voters in November, 1914, or take any action in relation thereto.

And you are directed to serve this Warrant by posting attested copies thereof at each of the following places in said Town, seven days at least before the time of holding said meeting:—At each of the Post-Offices and on the Town House in said Town.

Hereof fail not, and make due return of this Warrant, with your doings thereon, to the Town Clerk, before the time and place of meeting aforesaid.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING,
FEBRUARY 7, 1938.

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS.

Worcester, SS.

Pursuant to the foregoing warrant, the legal voters of the Town of Upton met in Town Hall in said Upton, on Monday, the Seventh day of February, 1938. The meeting was called to order at seven o'clock, A. M. by Moderator David J. Moroney, and the warrant and officer's return thereon was read by the town clerk.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

Article 1. Kenneth W. Wood, Patrick J. Slattery, Henry E. Allard and Raymond F. Lyford, having been appointed as election officers, with Edwin B. Houghton at the ballot box, were duly sworn by the town clerk.

ELECTION OFFICERS.

Cards of instruction and specimen ballots having been posted as the law directs, a package containing 1300 official ballots, to be used at this election, was delivered to the ballot clerks, Messrs. Wood and Slattery.

The ballot box was then shown to the voters present to be empty, the index being set on 0000, it was locked and the keys thereof were kept in the possession of Constable Charles S. Kelley, who was the officer in attendance at said meeting.

The first ballot was cast by Mrs. Ruth Sweet after the polls were declared open by Moderator Moroney.

At various intervals during the voting hours, the ballot box indicator tabulated the following totals: 7.30 A. M., 122 ballots; 10 A. M., 297 ballots; 12 noon, 407 ballots; 2 P. M., 637 ballots; 3 P. M., 725 ballots; 4 P. M., 785 ballots; 5 P. M., 884 ballots and 6 P. M., when the polls were declared closed by Moderator Moroney, 976 ballots, the highest total ever cast at a local town election.

The following persons were appointed to canvass the vote and reported at 1 P. M. to be duly sworn by the town clerk: Miss Helen A. Fay, Miss Grace Murphy, Miss Dora M. Whitney, Miss Margaret Gurry, LeRoy W. Prentiss, James Kearnan, Gerald Shaughnessy, Joseph J. Driscoll, Ernest Henchey, Stephen McCauley, Burton Walker and Miss Eleanor B. Adair.

Chester W. Walker and Joseph W. Gorman tabulated the vote.

The check lists were compared by the respective officials after the close of the polls and showed that 976 persons had voted.

The ballots having been counted, public declaration was made by the town clerk in open meeting at 9.20 P. M. with a large crowd present. The votes were recorded as follows:—

PROCEEDINGS OF ADJOURNED
ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, FEBRUARY 12, 1938.

The meeting was called to order by Moderator David J. Moroney with a large attendance of voters. In observance of the birthday anniversary of Abraham Lincoln the voters stood in silent tribute to his memory.

1937 TOWN REPORT.

Article 2. Voted: on motion of Daniel H. Bates and amended by Walter E. Stearns, to accept the reports of the town officers as printed with the exception of one line on Page 62, WPA co-ordinator's report referring to "100 cords of wood cut and turned over to the Welfare Department." Charles W. Childs, chairman of the Public Welfare department in 1937, took exception to the amount of wood cut as stated in the report. He asserted there were 222 cords of

wood cut and 44 acres of land cleared under a WPA project according to a report he obtained from the District WPA office at Worcester. Dr. Earl G. Crockett, a selectman and local WPA co-ordinator, informed voters that apparently there had been a misunderstanding. He stated he asked Mr. Childs the amount of wood that had been cut on the project the past year (1937) in the presence of other members of the 1937 Board of Selectmen and Mr. Childs replied about 100 cords. By Mr. Stearns' amendment it was voted to stricken "100 cords of wood cut and turned over to the Welfare Department" from the records and a re-audit made.

At the opening of the article, Henry R. Hoyle, chairman of the Finance committee, said that the committee had conferred with heads of the various town departments and an effort made in the recommendations by the committee to effect as low a tax rate as possible.

Fire Chief George N. O. Poirier favored an increase in the appropriation for the Fire Department from \$1,300.00 to \$1,350.00 in order that helmets could be purchased, and it was so voted.

Walter E. Stearns spoke on the need of street signs in the outlying sections of the town.

Chairman Hoyle of the Finance committee explained the recommendation of only \$500.00 for the Police Department. He said with a recommended increase in the Reserve fund, that if an emergency arose that a transfer could be made from the fund to the Police account.

Action on the appropriation for operating the Town Infirmary was deferred until after Article 13 was acted upon. Subsequently \$2,200.00 was appropriated for the Infirmary account.

A motion by Herbert A. Bagley to pass over an appropriation for Tree Warden was defeated. Then the sum of \$125.00 was appropriated.

BORROWING MONEY.

Article 4. Voted: on motion of Town Treasurer Leo F. Murphy that the town treasurer, with the approval of the selectmen, be and hereby is authorized to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1938, and to issue a note or notes therefore, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws.

WESTBORO ROAD.

Article 5. Voted: to appropriate One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.00) for further improvement of Westboro Road, said money to be used in conjunction with any money which may be allotted by the state or county, or both, after some discussion as to the amount needed to complete the job to the termination of said highway. Harrison E. Bates motioned for an appropriation of \$2000.00, amended by Malcolm C. Temple to \$1000.00. Walter E. Stearns, Peter Robson, Dr. Earl G. Crockett, Eben T. Hall and Henry H. Wood among those to speak on the article.

CHAPTER 90 MAINTENANCE.

Article 6. Voted: on motion of Merrill S. White to appropriate Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700.00) for Chapter 90 Maintenance on local highways, said money to be used in conjunction with any money which may be allotted by the state or county, or both, for this purpose.

NORTHBRIDGE ROAD.

Article 7. Passed over on motion by Peter Robson.

WPA PROJECTS.

Article 8. Voted: on motion by Peter Robson to appropriate One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.00) to be used under the direction of the Selectmen for materials, truck hire, and administration of WPA projects.

SAMUEL WALKER CASE.

Article 9. Voted: on motion of Walter E. Stearns to appropriate Five Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$520.00) to be paid to Laura Walker, administratrix of the estate of Samuel Walker, toward the settlement of an Industrial Accident Board decree. Mr. Walker was fatally injured on August 14, 1936 while employed in the town's highway department.

WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION FUND.

Article 10. Voted: on motion of Daniel H. Bates to appropriate Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to be deposited in a Savings Bank by the Town Treasurer, compensation to be paid from this fund under the Workmen's Compensation Act, with claims to be handled by the Selectmen.

NEW FILING CABINETS.

Article 11. Voted: on motion of William B. Walker to appropriate Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) to be used in purchasing filing cabinets for the Town Hall vault.

MILFORD STREET SIDEWALK.

Article 12. The Selectmen were named as a committee to confer with the Department of Public Works relative to the construction of a sidewalk on Milford street between Central Square and the residence of Taylor C. Lyford. Peter Robson, Daniel H. Bates and Eben T. Hall spoke on this article. Acting Chief of Police Bates stated the need of such a walk and referred to a recent accident in which a pedestrian that was struck by an automobile on this street was hospitalized for several weeks.

DISCONTINUANCE OF TOWN INFIRMARY.

Article 13. Voted: on motion of Harrison E. Bates to pass over the article concerning the closing of the Town Infirmary, that had been recommended by the Finance committee.

USE OF UNAPPROPRIATED MONEY.

Article 14. Voted: on motion by William B. Walker that the Assessors of Taxes be instructed to use Five Thousand Dollars (\$5000.00) from unappropriated funds in the Town's Treasury in establishing the 1938 tax rate.

ADJUSTMENT OF CERTAIN SALARIES.

Article 15. Voted: on motion of Walter E. Stearns to adjust the following salaries as recommended by the Finance committee (a) reduce the salary of the chairman of Selectmen from \$200.00 to \$150.00, (b) increase the Town Auditor from \$75.00 to \$100.00, (c) reduce the maximum sum that the chairman of Assessors of Taxes may draw from \$300.00 to \$250.00, and (d) increase the maximum sums of the other two members of the Assessors of Taxes that may be drawn from \$200.00 to \$225.00.

BLANKET INSURANCE.

Article 16. Voted: that the Selectmen with Joseph W. Gorman and Raymond F. Lyford be named as a committee to investigate the advisability of placing all insurance on Town buildings and contents under a blanket policy, and report at a future town meeting.

BOX MILL POND, WEST UPTON.

Article 17. Passed over on motion by Raymond Smith.

LAKE WILDWOOD.

Article 18. Passed over on motion by Merrill S. White after some discussion.

Joseph J. Driscoll motioned "that the Town authorize the Board of Selectmen to purchase the real estate and water rights owned by the Lake Wildwood Improvement Association in accordance with the terms and conditions of an offer submitted by the said association to the Town through the Board of Selectmen, and to pay, therefore, a sum of money sufficient to discharge the present mortgage of \$700.00 with accrued interest, to pay taxes accrued to date and to defray the reasonable expense incident to the transfer, but in no case shall the sum paid exceed \$1000.00; and that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000.00 for the foregoing purpose."

Mr. White then motioned to pass over the article and it was so voted.

A claim was made that Mr. Driscoll's motion should have been given to the voters for consideration on the ground that it had been seconded. Moderator Moroney stated that he did not hear or see any voter arise to second Mr. Driscoll's motion.

PLAYGROUND FENCE.

Article 19. Voted: to appropriate Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) to complete the construction of a fence between the town's playgrounds and land owned by Eben T. Hall at the rear of the High School building as Mr. Hall claimed had been agreed to when he gave permission to remove a section of a stone wall.

Herbert A. Bagley moved to pass over the article after it was read. Mr. Hall explained the agreement to erect a fence and stated he had a legal claim if he so desired to press it. Mr. Bagley's motion was defeated. Mr. Hoyle, chairman of the Finance committee, moved that \$800.00 be appropriated and was so voted.

TOWN LABORERS' VACATIONS.

Article 20. Voted: to appropriate Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) to be used in paying two weeks' vacations to eligible

employees of the Town in accordance with Acts of 1914, Chapt. 217, that the voters accepted in November 1914.

Voted: to raise all appropriations made during the meeting by taxation.

Total appropriations: General and special articles, \$77,381.48.

Voted to dissolve the warrant.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE SPECIAL TOWN MEETING,
OCTOBER 14, 1938.

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS.

Worcester, ss.

Pursuant to the foregoing warrant, one of the largest gatherings for a special town meeting to take place in Upton, assembled in Town Hall, Friday, the Fourteenth day of October, 1938.

The meeting was called to order by Moderator David J. Moroney. The call for the meeting and officer's return were read by the Town Clerk. Reading of the articles was dispensed with by unanimous approval of the voters.

William T. Teachout, clerk of the Finance committee, reported that the Finance committee had met and approved of all articles excepting Article 6.

Article 1. On motion of Selectman Earl G. Crockett it was voted to transfer the following appropriations: Care of Patients, One Hundred Dollars; Gypsy Moth Suppression, One Hundred Dollars; Sidewalks and Signs, Sixty Dollars; Street Lights, One Hundred Dollars; Vacation for Town Employes, Forty Dollars, totaling Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) to the Police Appropriation, or take any action relative thereto.

Article 2. On motion of Halbert K. Struthers of the School committee to transfer from Public Welfare, Outside Aid appropriation, Four Hundred Dollars, and from Soldiers' Relief appropriation, Three Hundred Dollars, totaling Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700.00), to the appropriation for the School department.

Article 3. On motion by Selectman Merrill S. White, it was voted to transfer from the following appropriations: State and Military Aid, Fifty Dollars; Notes and Interest, Forty-Four Dollars; Playground Fence, One Hundred Thirty-Six Dollars; New Filing Cabinets, Twenty-Seven Dollars and Seventy-Eight Cents, totaling Two Hundred Fifty-Seven Dollars and Seventy-Eight Cents (\$257.78) to Town Halls and Repairs appropriation.

Article 4. Voted: on motion of William T. Teachout to take Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) from unappropriated funds in the Treasury for Town Halls and Repairs account.

Article 5. Voted: on motion of Walter N. Davis of the Public Welfare board to take Eight Hundred Dollars (\$800.00) from unappropriated funds in the Treasury for Town Infirmary account.

On motion of Selectman Crockett it was unanimously voted to take up Article 7 prior to Article 6. Walter N. Davis of the Public Welfare board then moved that the town vote to raise and appropriate Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1500.00) for Old Age Assistance in the Department of Public Welfare and authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow under authority of and in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 58 of the Acts of 1938, and it was unanimously voted. A two-thirds vote at least was necessary inasmuch as money was being borrowed.

Article 6. Henry R. Hoyle, as chairman of the Finance committee reported that the committee had unanimously agreed to recommend postponement of the article until the

next annual town meeting in February after Selectman Earl G. Crockett had motioned:

"For the purpose of constructing a water supply system for domestic and fire protection purposes and to enable the town to secure the benefits of funds granted by the Federal Government under the Public Works Administration Act of 1938, there be raised and appropriated the sum of One Hundred Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$180,000.00) and the treasurer, with the approval of the selectmen be and hereby is authorized to borrow the sum of Ninety-Nine Thousand Dollars (\$99,000) and to issue bonds or notes of the town therefor, under authority of and in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 50 of the Acts of 1938, said bonds or notes to be payable in not more than 30 years at such term and maximum rate of interest as may be fixed by the Emergency Finance Board.

All moneys received by way of grant from the Federal Government on account of this project shall be applied first to meet the cost of construction thereof and any balance shall be applied to the payment of the loan herein authorized.

The selectmen are hereby authorized and directed to accept on behalf of the town, for use in carrying out such project, a Federal grant of money, pursuant to the Public Works Administration Appropriation Act of 1938; and the selectmen are authorized to proceed with the construction of said projects and to enter into all necessary and proper contracts and agreements in respect thereto, all subject to applicable Federal regulations; and the selectmen authorized to do all other acts and things necessary or convenient for obtaining said grant, making said loan, and constructing said project."

Edward Gorman seconded the motion made by Selectman Crockett.

Permission was asked by Selectman Crockett and granted by the voters that John W. Greenleaf, Jr., of X. Henry Goodnough, Inc., Engineers, 14 Beacon Street, Boston, be privileged to speak on the proposed water system for Upton and answer questions on which voters desired information.

Among those querying Mr. Greenleaf, Jr. concerning various phases of the proposed town water system were: David Thompson, Fred Alexander, Mrs. Ethel F. Hopkins, Arthur Cobbett, Leon J. Allen, Harrison E. Bates, Frank Fowler, Eben T. Hall, Malcolm C. Temple, Fire Chief George N. O. Poirier, and Charles S. Leland.

With Mr. Greenleaf, Jr. having completed the answering of many questions and commended by Moderator Moroney for the manner in which he made his answers, Malcolm C. Temple motioned an amendment that the water system question be deferred to the annual town meeting in February, which was seconded. Mr. Temple added he did not care to close discussion of the question if it was the desire of the voters.

Selectman Crockett and Leroy W. Prentiss were among the speakers to inform the voters that information from the PWA Regional office at New York to local officials stated that such projects must be commenced not later than Jan. 1, and that it would be too late to take advantage of the Federal grant of \$81,000 toward the proposed water system if the voters deferred action until the annual town meeting in February.

Joseph W. Gorman said there was a large attendance of voters at this special meeting for the purpose of acting on the question at this time.

A voter called for the previous question. In explaining to the voters what a "yes" or "no" vote meant on the amendment there was considerable discussion including a verbal dispute between Moderator Moroney and Mr. Temple.

George N. O. Poirier asked all voters to give the important question their calm and considerate thought, saying in substance, "If you think the town can afford it, vote 'yes', and if you don't think the town can, why then vote 'no.' "

Mrs. Sarah E. Pearson stated she did not favor the installation of a town water system at this time with the town having other expenses to meet.

Arthur E. Fairbanks, Jr. and Alanson J. Varney, Police Officers, were appointed by Moderator Moroney to make a count by standing vote. Because of the large attendance there was some difficulty in polling the standing vote.

Mr. Temple was asked to withdraw his amendment to clarify the question before the voters but he declined at the time, stating he had made it for a purpose.

Henry E. Allard moved that the meeting be adjourned to the next Monday night (Oct. 17) but it was defeated by a majority voice vote.

Selectman Merrill S. White motioned that the vote on the amendment be taken by use of the check list and ballot. It was so voted.

Moderator Moroney showed a "yes-no" perforated ballot to the voters, and endeavored to explain what the "yes" and "no" vote would mean on the amendment. There was further questioning by some voters of Moderator Moroney's explanation.

Mr. Temple then withdrew his amendment which placed the original motion made by Selectman Crockett before the voters on whether they favored or opposed the appropriating of \$180,000 of which \$99,000 would be borrowed by the town over a period of not exceeding 30 years, and accepting a Federal grant of \$81,000 under a PWA project. Moderator Moroney asked the voters if the question was now clear to be voted upon with the "yes-no" ballots and check list. It was apparent it was understood as no further questions were asked.

Raymond F. Lyford was appointed to distribute the ballots at the check-in table. Assisting in the poll of the vote were: Joseph W. Gorman and Miss Helen A. Fay at check-in voting list; Constable Charles S. Kelley at ballot box; Constable Alanson J. Varney to call names at check list at ballot box; Peter Robson and Mrs. Irma Prentiss as checkers at voting list.

The "yes" and "no" ballots were counted by the checkers after Moderator Moroney had inquired if there were any other voters who desired to cast a ballot and none appeared. He then declared the voting closed.

The result reported by the tellers to Moderator Moroney showed 220 votes cast.

OCTOBER 31, 1938.

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS.
Worcester, SS.

Pursuant to the foregoing warrant, a large gathering of voters assembled in Town Hall, on Monday, the Thirty-First day of October.

After calling the meeting to order, Moderator David J. Moroney informed the voters that they had been called together to take action upon substantially the same question as defeated on the evening of Oct. 14th, current year, and that no intervening business had been transacted.

Moderator Moroney referred to Article 2, Section 7 of the Town Bylaws that "No vote shall be reconsidered at the same meeting, or any adjournment thereof, except upon a motion made within one hour of the adoption of such vote, or unless ordered by two-thirds of the voters present and voting." Also to Article 3, Section 16, Town Bylaws which

states "No motion carrying an expenditure of money, except where such expenditure is required by law, shall be acted upon at any town meeting until it has been submitted to the Finance Committee."

However, Moderator Moroney said that many years ago that he received an opinion from the late Attorney General Knowlton that voters in a New England town meeting could take such action as they saw fit if they had the majority vote.

He added that he had called the above matter to the attention of the voters in fairness to himself and to the townspeople, but believed with such a large attendance of voters that the subject matter of the article could at least be discussed.

As there was no attorney-at-law in the hall, Selectman Merrill S. White asked former Moderator Malcolm C. Temple for his opinion as to the legality of proceeding with the article as a result of the question raised by Moderator Moroney. Mr. Temple said he did not see how Article 2, Section 7 applied in this instance as this meeting was not "the same meeting, or any adjournment thereof" of the Oct. 14 special town meeting at which the water supply system question was acted upon by the voters. The speaker referred to a comment once reputed to have been made by Abraham Lincoln which was in substance "Show me common sense and I'll find a law to fit it."

Henry R. Hoyle, chairman of the Finance committee, motioned to proceed with the warrant, and it was so voted.

Dr. Earl G. Crockett, chairman of the Selectmen, then motioned "For the purpose of constructing a water supply system for domestic and fire protection purposes and to enable the town to secure the benefits of funds granted by the Federal Government under the Public Works Administration Act of 1938, there be raised and appropriated the sum of One Hundred Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$180,000.00) and the treasur-

er, with the approval of the selectmen, be and hereby is authorized to borrow the sum of Ninety-Eight Thousand Nine Hundred and Ninety-Nine Dollars, (\$98,999.00) and to issue bonds or notes of the town therefor, under authority of and in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 50 of the Acts of 1938, said bonds or notes to be payable in not more than 30 years at such term and maximum rate of interest as may be fixed by the Emergency Finance Board.

"All moneys received by way of grant from the Federal Government on account of this project shall be applied first to meet the cost of construction thereof and any balance shall be applied to the payment of the loan herein authorized.

"The Selectmen and committee are hereby authorized and directed to accept on behalf of the town, for use in carrying out such project, a Federal grant of money, pursuant to the Public Works Administration Appropriation Act of 1938; and the Selectmen and committee are authorized to proceed with the construction of said project and to enter into all necessary and proper contracts and agreements in respect thereto, all subject to applicable Federal regulations; and the selectmen and committee authorized to do all other acts and things necessary or convenient for obtaining said grant, making said loan, and constructing said project."

Edward Prentiss seconded the motion.

Selectman White said he believed there was a discrepancy of one dollar in the total amount in the motion to be raised (\$180,000); the amount to be borrowed by the town, (\$98,999) and the Federal grant (\$81,000). Dr. Crockett, chairman of the Selectmen, replied that the one dollar would be donated by an individual.

Malcolm C. Temple offered an amendment that "If the legality of this meeting is questioned, the voters shall again have the opportunity to vote upon the question before any contract is let." Favorable action was taken on the amendment.

Selectman White in opening the discussion on the article stated he was in favor of the project prior to the hurricane storm of Sept. 21, and that if the voters decided to install the system, he would be a subscriber, but he believed that in view of the loss in valuation in town due to the storm, the expense that some taxpayers were now under to make repairs to their buildings, and increase in taxes that would obviously be necessary if the water system was installed, that the project was not advisable at this time. He said there was expected to be a decrease of at least \$50,000 in valuation in property owing to the storm.

Continuing, Selectman White informed the voters that he had been informed by officials of the William Knowlton & Sons Co. Inc. hat plant and privileged to speak for them that they did not oppose the water system, "if the increase in taxes, plus the cost of water to the shop and to their tenants, does not exceed their present cost of water which is less than \$250 a year."

Mr. White referred to the necessary increasing cost for Old Age Assistance, WPA, need of more room in the school buildings, and expected increase in state and county taxes.

Walter E. Stearns opposed the article he said on the ground that the farmers in the outlying section of the town would receive no advantage from the water system but would be called upon to pay their share of the expense.

Mr. Hoyle said that while the Finance committee had not met to consider the article at this special town meeting, that he had talked with members of the committee and that the majority were opposed to installing the system at this time. He informed the voters that he was not opposed to a water system, stating it was a very good asset for a town, but believed that there will be Federal money available at a future date. He referred to the costs of the Grafton and Shrewsbury water systems.

Dr. Crockett, chairman of the Selectmen, said he favored the installation of the water system as an asset for the town and its installation would result in more houses being constructed which would afford more taxable property.

He read correspondence he had received from Uxbridge, Medway and Holliston Water Companies. In 1905 at Uxbridge, he read, there were but 260 customers, 451 in 1911 and now there are 911, showing a profit for 1937 of over \$2700. Likewise he said, Holliston and Medway companies were on a paying basis. Already there are 210 persons who have signified their intention of taking water if the Upton system was installed, he said he had been informed.

Dr. Crockett pointed out that the project considered for Upton was PWA with a contract to be awarded and not to be built under WPA. He added that he considered the figures submitted by Selectman White as to drop in valuation and estimated increase in taxes were too high.

Other speakers during the meeting were Peter Robson, Harrison Bates, Frank Fowler, David Thompson and William B. Walker.

On motion by Mr. White it was voted to take the vote on the question before the voters by use of check list and ballot.

Daniel H. Bates was appointed by Moderator Moroney to distribute the ballots. Miss Helen A. Fay and Joseph W. Gorman were at the check-in voting list and Edwin W. Sadler and Walter N. Davis presided as checkers at the ballot box. Officers Clifton A. Temple and Charles S. Kelley were on duty at the ballot box.

The tellers were Leroy W. Prentiss, Harry C. Snow, Mrs. Helen Poirier and Mrs. Margaret DesBarres.

LAW PROPOSED BY INITIATIVE PETITION.

Shall the proposed measure which provides that any city or town which accepts its terms, the licensing authorities shall establish free public taxicab stands for the use of all taxicabs and motor vehicles for hire whose owners are licensed within such city or town, and shall abolish all other forms of taxicab stands on any public highway within such city or town—which was disapproved in the House of Representatives by a vote of 96 in the affirmative and 109 in the negative and in the Senate by a vote of 4 in the affirmative and 35 in the negative,—be approved?

(e) If he desires to prohibit the sale herein of any and all alcoholic beverages whether to be drunk on or off the premises where sold, he will vote "No" on all three questions.

1. Shall licenses be granted in this town for the sale therein of all alcoholic beverages (whisky, rum, gin, malt beverages, wines and all other alcoholic beverages?)

2. Shall licenses be granted in this town for the sale therein of wines and malt beverages (wines and beer, ale and all other malt beverages?)

3. Shall licenses be granted in this town for the sale therein of all alcoholic beverages in packages, so called, not to be drunk on the premises?

1. Shall the pari-mutuel system of betting on licensed horse races be permitted in this county?

2. Shall the pari-mutuel system of betting on licensed dog races be permitted in this county?

QUESTIONS OF PUBLIC POLICY UNDER GENERAL LAWS.

"Shall the representatives to the General Court from this district be instructed to vote in favor of legislation barring

Parents and others are requested to carefully examine the above lists and if any errors or omissions are discovered report them at once to the town clerk, that the record may be corrected, as it is of importance that the records of Vital Statistics should be complete. Herewith are extracts from the General Laws, Chapter 46.

GENERAL LAWS, CHAPTER 46, SECTION 3.

(As Amended by Chapter 281, Section 1, Acts of 1925).

Every physician, or hospital medical officer registered under section nine of chapter one hundred and twelve, in this chapter called officer, shall keep a record of the birth of every child in cases of which he was in charge, showing date and place of birth, the name, if any, of the child, its sex and color, the name, age, birthplace, occupation and residence (including the street number, if any, and the ward number, if in a city) of each parent, the maiden name of the mother and the name of the physician or officer, if any, personally attending the birth. If the child is illegitimate, the name of, and other facts relating to the father shall not be set forth except upon written request of both the father and mother; provided, that if an illegitimate child shall have become legitimate by the intermarriage of his parents and the acknowledgment of his father, as provided in section seven of chapter one hundred and ninety, prior to the mailing or delivery of any report herein required, such report shall read, in all respects, as if such child had been born to such parents in lawful wedlock. Said physician or officer shall, within fifteen days after such birth, mail or deliver to the clerk or registrar of the town where such birth occurred, a report stating the facts hereinabove required to be shown on said record and also the said written request, if any; provided, that if said report is not so made within forty-eight hours after such birth, said physician or officer shall, within said

forty-eight hours, mail or deliver to said clerk or registrar a notice stating the date and place of the birth, the street number, if any, the ward number, if in a city, and the family name. Upon presentation to him of a certificate of the town clerk stating that any such birth has been duly reported, the town treasurer shall pay to such physician or officer a fee of twenty-five cents for each birth so reported. Any physician or any such officer violating any provision of this section shall forfeit not more than twenty-five dollars. The said town clerk or registrar shall file daily with the local board of health a list of all births reported to him, showing, as to each, the date of birth, sex, color, family name, residence, ward and physician or officer in charge.

GENERAL LAWS, CHAPTER 46, SECTION 6.

Parents, within forty days after the birth of a child, and every householder, within forty days after a birth in his house, shall cause notice thereof to be given to the clerk of the town where such child is born * * *.

There is deposited in the Worcester County Institution for Savings, one thousand dollars (\$1000.00) known as the Dr. Carpenter Library Fund, the income of which is to be used for the Public Library. \$25.15 was received this year.

Charlotte A. Batchelor and George W. Knowlton established a Trust Deed at the Worcester County Trust Co., with the Bank as trustee, the income to be paid to the Town of Upton for use of Public Schools. \$240.93 was received this year.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank, five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) known as the Charlotte A. Batchelor Library Fund in trust with the Town Treasurer as trustee, the income to be used for the Public Library. \$125.00 was received this year.

There is deposited in the Worcester County Institution for Savings, five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) known as the Charlotte A. Batchelor School Fund in trust with the Town Treasurer as Trustee, the income to be used for the Public Schools. \$125.00 was received this year.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank a War Bonus Surplus Fund to be used as a nucleus of a Fund for a Public Library Building as voted by the Town, February 7, 1925. Interest received is \$99.83 and the amount of this fund on January 1, 1939 is \$2,728.99.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank of Milford, five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) known as the George W. Knowlton Fund. The income is subject to withdrawal by the Town Treasurer on order from the Board of Selectmen, to be used to help the Townspeople who are in distress. \$50.00 was used this year. \$106.68 interest was received and the balance on January 1, 1939 is \$5,460.32.

There is deposited in the Worcester Five Cent Savings Bank \$175.62, known as the "Town of Upton Memorial Fund". The Bank records show this fund was established by the late

Velorus Taft many years ago, but do not state for what purpose this money may be used.

In accordance with a vote of the 1937 Annual Town Meeting to establish an "Industrial Accident Insurance Fund" with the Selectmen and Treasurer as Trustees, I have deposited \$500.00 in the Milford Savings Bank. Payment from this Fund is to be made only in accordance with rules to be established by the Board of Selectmen. Interest received is \$17.77 and balance January 1, 1939 is \$1,017.77.

Sir:

As directed by you I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Upton for the period from November 24, 1935, the date of the previous audit, to May 10, 1938, and report thereon as follows:

The financial transactions, as recorded on the books of the several departments receiving or disbursing money for the town or committing bills for collection, were examined and checked, and a balance sheet, which is appended to this

report, was prepared showing the financial condition of the town as of May 10, 1938. An examination of this balance sheet shows the town to be in good financial condition.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked in detail. The recorded receipts were analyzed and checked to the records of the several departments collecting money for the town and with other sources from which money was paid into the town treasury, while the payments were checked with the Selectmen's orders authorizing the disbursement of town funds.

The treasurer's cash book was footed and the cash balance on May 10, 1938, was proved by a reconciliation of the bank balance with a statement furnished by the bank of deposit, by examination of the savings bank book, and by actual count of the cash in the office.

The savings bank books representing the investment of the trust funds in the custody of the town treasurer were examined, the income and withdrawals being proved.

The tax title deeds held by the town were checked and listed, and the subsequent taxes added to the tax title account were proved.

The books and accounts of the tax collector were examined and checked. The commitments of taxes were compared with the warrants issued by the board of assessors, the abatements as recorded were checked with the payments to the treasurer as recorded on the treasurer's cash book, the cash on hand on May 10, 1938, was verified by actual count, and the outstanding accounts were listed and proved.

Verification of the outstanding taxes was made by sending notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, and from the replies received it appears that the outstanding accounts as listed are correct.

The town clerk's record of dog licenses issued on behalf of the county and of sporting licenses, the proceeds of which are paid to the State, were checked, and the payments to the town and to the Division of Fisheries and Game were verified.

The surety bonds of the officials required by law to furnish them were examined and found to be in proper form.

In addition to the departments mentioned, the books and accounts of the selectmen, the sealer of weights and measures, and of the highway, public welfare, infirmary, school, library and cemetery departments were examined and checked, the payments to the treasurer being verified.

Appended to this report, in addition to the balance sheet, are tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's and the tax collector's cash, summaries of the tax and departmental accounts, together with tables showing the trust fund transactions.

For the co-operation extended by the several town officials during the process of the audit, I wish, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, to express appreciation.

FARM TO MARKET.

On the Farm-to-Market roads project, eight-tenths of a mile of road work was completed on North Street, or Old Westboro Road. Beginning at the Westboro line and working toward the town, there were 876 cu. yards of ledge drilled and blasted. The trees and brush were cut with the wood going to the abutters and the brush burned. All stone that was blasted was used for rock fill and later graveled over and graded. Culverts were put in to care for drainage. When the work was completed, the road was in first class condition and prepared to be oiled which work has since been done.

On the Riverdale Road, all trees were removed that would interfere with the removal of curves from Vales bridge to the Northbridge line. There were 470 cu. yards of ledge drilled and blasted and all curves were then removed. The road at these points was refilled and graded, then being ready to receive oil. The road was oiled soon after completion.

At the junction of West Street and Hartford Avenue, trees were cut, the brush was trimmed and burned and the banks were removed, eliminating a dangerous intersection.

On West Street extention, a dangerous curve was removed between the Wallace residence and the home of Mr. Alfred Lawrence with the aid of a steam shovel. Five hundred yards of gravel was excavated and used for fill to widen the road at other points. A dangerous blind incline was removed by drilling and blasting 50 cu. yards of stone. The incline was then excavated and partly graded. Work is still in progress.

On Pearl Street, from East toward the town, a trench 10 feet wide and 3 feet deep was dug for a distance of 300 feet. It was then stone filled and graveled over. At this point in the road it was practically impassable in the spring of the year.

From Pond Street, to the residence of Jerome Mowrey, trees were cut down and the wood given to the abutters, brush was cut and burned. Fifty cu. yards of ledge was drilled and blasted, curves were removed and the entire road was regraveled and graded. Two culverts were installed to care for water drainage. Before work was started on this road it was practically impassable.

From Pond Street, to the Holberg residence, brush was cut on either side of the road and burned.

On Brookside Street, from South Street, to the residence of Walter Brousseau, 50 cu. yards of stone was drilled and blasted, trees and brush was removed, the road was widened the entire length, gravel filled and graded.

On East Street, a gutter was dug 3 feet wide and 2 feet deep from the Hopkinton line to the Tilton residence, to take care of the surplus water of Spring floods, etc. Two culverts were put in and the road was regraveled and graded.

On East Street, from the Hopkinton line to the FitzPatrick residence, the trees were trimmed and the brush cut and burned. A distance of approximately one mile.

A new Farm-to-Market project has been recently approved of with an appropriation of \$30,000 for road construction and an additional \$2,000 for oil and tar to apply to same roads after they have been completed.

HIGH SCHOOL SIDEWALK.

A sidewalk was recently completed under a WPA project, 256 feet long and 6 feet wide with wings at the side entrances 50 feet long and ten feet wide. The main walk and the South

wing was excavated to a depth of 20 inches, which was refilled with 12 inches of stone, 4 inches of gravel and 4 inches of cement. The North wing was excavated to a depth of 30 inches and refilled with 18 inches of stone, 4 inches of gravel and 8 inches of cement. Particular attention was given the North wing so that the weight of heavy trucks drawing coal to the school and backing over the walk would not break it down. The granite steps at the end of the walk were taken up and reset so that they would line up with the walk which they did not do prior to building the new walk. A sturdy foundation of stone was laid before the steps were returned to their permanent position.

At the North side of the school building a plot 12x12x4 was excavated for the purpose of installing a septic tank.

REHABILITATION.

Each and every road in the town has been cleared of fallen trees from wall to wall. All brush was trimmed and burned. All cord wood was disposed of, either going to the town farm or to relief workers in the event that the abutters did not want it.

All pine trees in Old Lakeview Cemetery were cut into logs to be used for boards later on. All boughs, etc., were either hauled off or burned.

In the New Lakeview Cemetery, trees that fell into the waters of Pratt pond were removed and cut up. The small branches of same trees were burned.

At the Old North Cemetery, all trees that were down were cut up into cord wood and remaining smaller branches were burned.

At the Old South Cemetery, approximately three-quarters of all trees that were felled during the storm were cut into logs and stacked. Due to the fact that conditions at the time did not warrant burning the slash from these trees it was necessary to leave it until a later date. Work is still in progress on this job.

At the Town Farm, the roof of the barn which was partially destroyed was reshingled on one side and a temporary job was done on the other. The rear barn which was torn from the main was replaced and bound with 1 inch rods.

At the school buildings the trees were cut and where it was possible were cut into logs. All other wood was cut in 4 foot lengths and left on the premises to be cut for use in the school furnaces. All brush was burned and the stumps of the trees were removed. The manual labor and truck hire was obtained through a WPA grant with no cost to the Town what-so-ever.

Several of the important cart roads in the town were freed of fallen trees and brush. Especially those that lead to ponds or water holes so that it might be an aid in fire prevention. All of the large trees were cut up and carried to the Town Farm where it will be cut up into stove lengths and distributed among the relief recipients. Approximately 50 stumps in various parts of the Town were removed.

FIRE HAZARD.

Under the direction of the United States Department of Forestry, all timberland has been cleared in the vicinity of Lake Wildwood, where one of our most hazardous conditions prevailed.

The timberland of Mr. Chamberlain and Mr. Saucier of Elm Street, was cleared. The wood was cut and left for the owners of said property and the brush was burned.

At the junction of Warren Street, School Street and Hartford Avenue, the timberland of Mr. Cobbett was cleared of the wood and the brush was burned.

This work is still in progress and when it is completed it is expected that all sections of the town will be free from hazard.

40,000 board feet of White Pine has been salvaged.

TOWN INVENTORY.

Work is now in progress on the inventory of the Town. Every article in every Town-owned building is to be checked and a set of files made for each department and left in the possession of the Town Clerk.

It is the first time in the history of the Town that such a record has ever been established. It is the hope that these records will be used in taking an annual inventory by the heads of departments throughout the town.

During the drought which followed the storm, the WPA allotted money to be used for the hire of one man to patrol the hazardous sections of the town four nights a week and to keep an eye on stores or buildings whose owners had the misfortune of having plate glass windows, etc., broken. During this time there were no fires or breaks reported by the watchman, store keepers or by any citizen of the Town.

POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT.

Through the year of 1938 the police department, under my guidance, has tried to protect the interest of all the citizens. Flood and hurricane with the depression added has used up a few extra dollars beyond our usual appropriation but if you stop to give it a thought our records show no fatal accidents and fewer arrests.

Considerable attention has been given to the control of traffic by placing officers along our most heavily trafficked highways at various times. Numbers of cars have been stopped and warnings given. The most flagrant violations have been brought into court or their licenses recommended suspended.

There have been more accidents on outlying roads than usual, which were of the property damage nature. Some of those were where they failed to stop and make their identity known, classed as hit-and-run. All of these were apprehended through the splendid support given me by Investigator W. W. O'Brien of the Registry of Motor Vehicles department, and brought into court and convicted.

Larceny at night time, owing to the depression and the strict enforcement of this type of lawlessness by our larger police departments, has forced them into smaller villages where there are no night patrolmen. With the co-operation of the selectmen, I have been able to keep this type of lawlessness down to a minimum, by using patrolmen and a patrol car at times when we believed for the person or persons to commit these acts. Considerable expense has been saved by the co-operation given our department by the state police.

I recommend that before special police or police officers are appointed that the acting chief of police be permitted to state his judgment as to whether the appointment should be made or not. I also recommend that the number be cut down. In my opinion a good police department should work for the interest of all the people, not a few.

As the acting chief of police, I want to thank the school teachers and other department heads that have co-operated with the police department and from time to time, with the right kind of harmony, costs of enforcing the laws as well as keeping within the various laws that govern our town, will be the result of lower taxes and induce more people to come here to either build or reside.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT.

TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE UPTON LIBRARY:—

The librarian herewith submits the annual library report together with library statistics and the catalog of new books.

Books have been purchased and added to the Dr. Carpenter alcove as required.

Encouraged by Mrs. Durgin, the pupils of the fifth and sixth grades at the Knowlton School keep in their school room, a small collection of books from the library. Choosing the books, returning and borrowing new titles and transporting are all done by the pupils themselves. From the Ball school, the barge children are allowed to come to the library for books at three o'clock, Wednesday afternoons.

Several new books on the Constitution were added to our collection and all material in the library was made available and was used by the High School students while preparing their essays on this subject.

Book Week in November was observed, as usual, by an exhibit of the new books purchased for children.

From the Division of Public Libraries, books on early American glass have been borrowed for members of the Upton Woman's Club, also a collection of Italian books for an Italian family in town.

GIFTS

The Tercentenary edition of the General Laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, presented to the town by George W. Knowlton, Jr., has been placed in the library by the Town Clerk, George G. Newton.

Two books, "Bulwark of the Republic" by Hendrick and "Who's Who in America, 1938-39" by Marquis, have been purchased this year with the balance of the money given by the Compilers of the Upton History.

Ten books from their surplus stock were given to the library by the Harvard University Press and five books were received from the Division of Public Libraries.

Graceful sprays of flowering dogwood from Mrs. Brewer in May, a bouquet of large Japanese iris from Mrs. Barton in July and Christmas greens from Mrs. Hall in December have been appreciated by all who come to the library.

Eight crayon sketches of Dickens characters, drawn by Edward F. Payne at the "Guest Night" meeting of the Upton Woman's Club, were placed in the library by vote of the Club. The picture of "Scrooge" was borrowed and used by the schools during December. The sketches are so large, there is no space in the library to display them properly.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT
OF SCHOOLS.

TO THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE OF THE TOWN OF UPTON:—

The following is my eighteenth annual report:

ENROLLMENT.

The above estimates indicate that the housing conditions for our pupils will not differ essentially next year from what we have had for the last two years. The report of 1937 went into these matters in some detail, and discussed the attempts by the Committee to remedy the same. This fall an enrollment of over 50 pupils in grades one and two at the Ball School was more than could be accommodated at one time and the Committee, after going over again the possible means of taking

care of the situation, decided that the only practical thing to do was to put the two grades on half time,—one in the forenoon, the other in the afternoon,—unsatisfactory to the parents involved as well as shortened school days for the children.

HIGH SCHOOL.

The estimated enrollment for the High School next fall is 122. While the number will probably be somewhat less on account of pupils leaving school, it is safe to say that the school will be larger than it has ever been by 10% to 15%, making it necessary to employ an additional teacher. The following is quoted from a letter of Mr. Mack, State Department Supervisor of Secondary Education.

"I believe that you should hire an additional teacher at the Upton High School.

"According to Rule No. 2 of the Regulations for the Approval of High Schools, the pupil-teacher ratio, exclusive of the principal, should not be over thirty to one. At Upton High School with 102 pupils in Grades IX, X, XI, XII, and with three teachers exclusive of the principal, your quotient is 102 divided by 3, or 34. It is obvious that your Class A rating should be placed in jeopardy. I hope that with the new financial year, you can hire an additional teacher, alleviating the crowded condition of your classes."

It is a rule of the State Department of Education that, in order for a High School to have an A rating, there must not be more than thirty pupils per teacher, not counting the principal. Upton High School has thirty-three pupils per teacher and Mr. Mack's statement above implies that unless an additional teacher be employed this year, the school will be rated "B" instead of "A". High Schools having an A rating, are privileged to certify their pupils, who average B or higher in their marks, for entrance to state normal schools without examination. If, however, the school has a rating of B, they may still have the privilege of entering pupils in the state normal schools who have averaged B+ or higher in their

marks, provided such pupils are in the first quarter of their class. Since pupils who average B+ or higher would in most cases be in the first quarter of their class, there is no real penalty, because the same number of pupils would be privileged to enter normal schools in either case. They make no criticism of the teachers or principal or course of study. This rating by the Department of Education would not affect the privilege the school now has to certify pupils for entrance to the various colleges belonging to the New England College Certificate Board who base their rating of a school on the college records of the pupils sent from that school. Notwithstanding the fact that there is no real practical difference between a rating of A and a rating of B, it is undoubtedly true that the loss of an A rating would bring undeserved public censure upon the school. There is no doubt that the teachers of the High School are carrying a heavy load and that an additional teacher is much needed.

At present it is hard to see how it will be possible to find recitation rooms in the present building to carry on with a large increase in the number of pupils and the increased size or number of the classes to be expected next fall.

ACTION BY TOWN.

There are, then, two housing problems, one of the lower grades, the other of the high school. How best to provide the needed room is, in my opinion, best left to a special committee for study and I am pleased that the School Committee has already taken steps to have the matter brought before the citizens at the coming annual Town Meeting.

PRESENT HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING.

This building, now over forty years old, was at the time it was built the best in schoolhouse construction that was known at that time, embodying the latest ideas in heating, ventilation and sanitation,—a schoolhouse of which Upton was

reasonably proud. Now, however, not only is the building too small but

1. The toilets are not placed so that they have proper light and air.
2. The heating system is composed of two hot air furnaces and a small steam boiler, the former requiring hard coal, and altogether much more expensive to operate than a good central plant.
3. There is no place for manual training.

The report of a year ago suggested adding to and remodeling the high school. This is, however, for the town to decide upon receiving the advice of a special committee. It is my sincere hope that it may be possible to provide for all the needs suggested above.

The following excerpts are quoted from reports recently received:

MANUAL TRAINING.

MR. STANLEY REPORTS:

"This subject is part of the course of study offered to the seventh and eighth grade boys and this year while the seventh grade is smaller in number than usual, the eighth grade is a very large group. Both classes are interested and doing very good work.

"The seventh grade pupils are well started on the earlier projects necessary for those beginning this course. They are learning the different processes of construction as well as the use and care of tools. Pupils in Manual Training also learn to be neat and accurate, qualities which will be a benefit to them in all lines of endeavor. The eighth grade boys choose what they wish to make and their projects are well under way. End tables, cribbage boards, magazine racks and occasional tables are popular with the class during the current year."

DRAWING.

MRS. STUART REPORTS:

"The work in the art department is very satisfactory. We are doing more painting this year than ever before, and now that we use water colors in Grades V and VI, the pupils are able to do some very good work when they reach Grades VII and VIII.

"We often hear the complaint that girls and boys of today have too many interests and amusements and consequently become indifferent to some of the simpler school activities. I am glad to say that this is not true with the majority of our pupils. The interest they show year after year is so keen that at the end of the drawing period I find that although I have

been hired to inspire them it is they who have been an inspiration to me.

"In looking over the work of all the schools for the past year, I cannot single out any particular grade or certain teacher. To do so would not be fair, when all have worked so faithfully, with results most pleasing."

HEALTH.

MISS SANDSTROM REPORTS:

"The health program has been carried on as usual in our schools this year with classroom visits for general checking in regard to general health of the pupils and absentees. Home visits are made and permission given bus pupils to ride on the school bus to obtain a permission from the doctor to attend school after being absent two days.

"All pupils have been weighed and measured. Dr. Capen, our school physician, has completed the annual physical examination and found less defects this year. Many defects reported before have been corrected and the general health of our school children is good.

"In January we held our annual clinic for Prevention of Childhood type of Tuberculosis in the seventh, ninth and eleventh grades. Pupils having permission from their parents were skin tested, and those having a positive reaction had chest X-rays taken. There was no new positive case reported.

"In April Miss Eleanor Hanson, R. N. of the Department of Public Health, using the State Department audiometer, tested the hearing of all pupils from grade two through twelve.

"Pupils found hard of hearing were retested. Home visits were made to pupils being hard of hearing after second test and advised to see their physician.

"The District Nursing Association sponsored a Well Child Conference in June, conducted by the State Department of Public Health. This included the pre-school children. The defects were explained to the parent and several of these were corrected before starting school."

The total number of typing students this year is forty-two. With this number, it is necessary that we have five typing classes. There being only four divisions on our daily schedule for typewriting, it is necessary to rotate two of these classes, that is, each division has typewriting every other day. With a probable forty-three taking typewriting next year, three additional typewriters would remedy the situation.

There is need in the school library for reference books in English, collections of poems, essays and short stories; Ancient History and Modern History. In the laboratory there should be a new set of apparatus for physics next year.

Through the efforts of Miss Helen Fay and Miss Florence Walker, the Alumni Association bought and presented to the school a set of Nelson's Encyclopedias which is greatly appreciated.

On May 13, 1938, at the Upton Town Hall, the Clifton G. Marshall Post, American Legion No. 173, with the cooperation of the School Committee, and the High School faculty, held an Oratorical Contest. The first prize was taken by Chestin Heald; the second prize was taken by Carolyn Colcord and the third prize was taken by Eleanor Fenner. The public was very much pleased with the efforts of the Legion and School Department. This year the Legion Post plan to enter the State Legion Oratorical Contest and plans are already under way.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank those who have donated money to our extra curricular organization.
