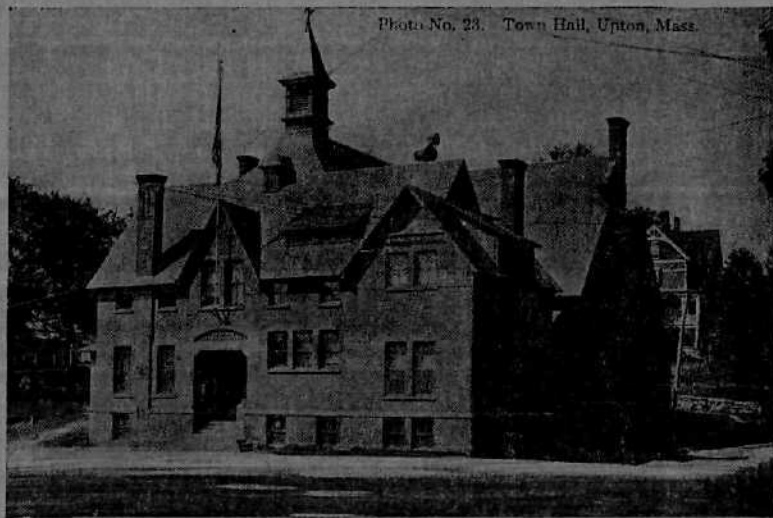

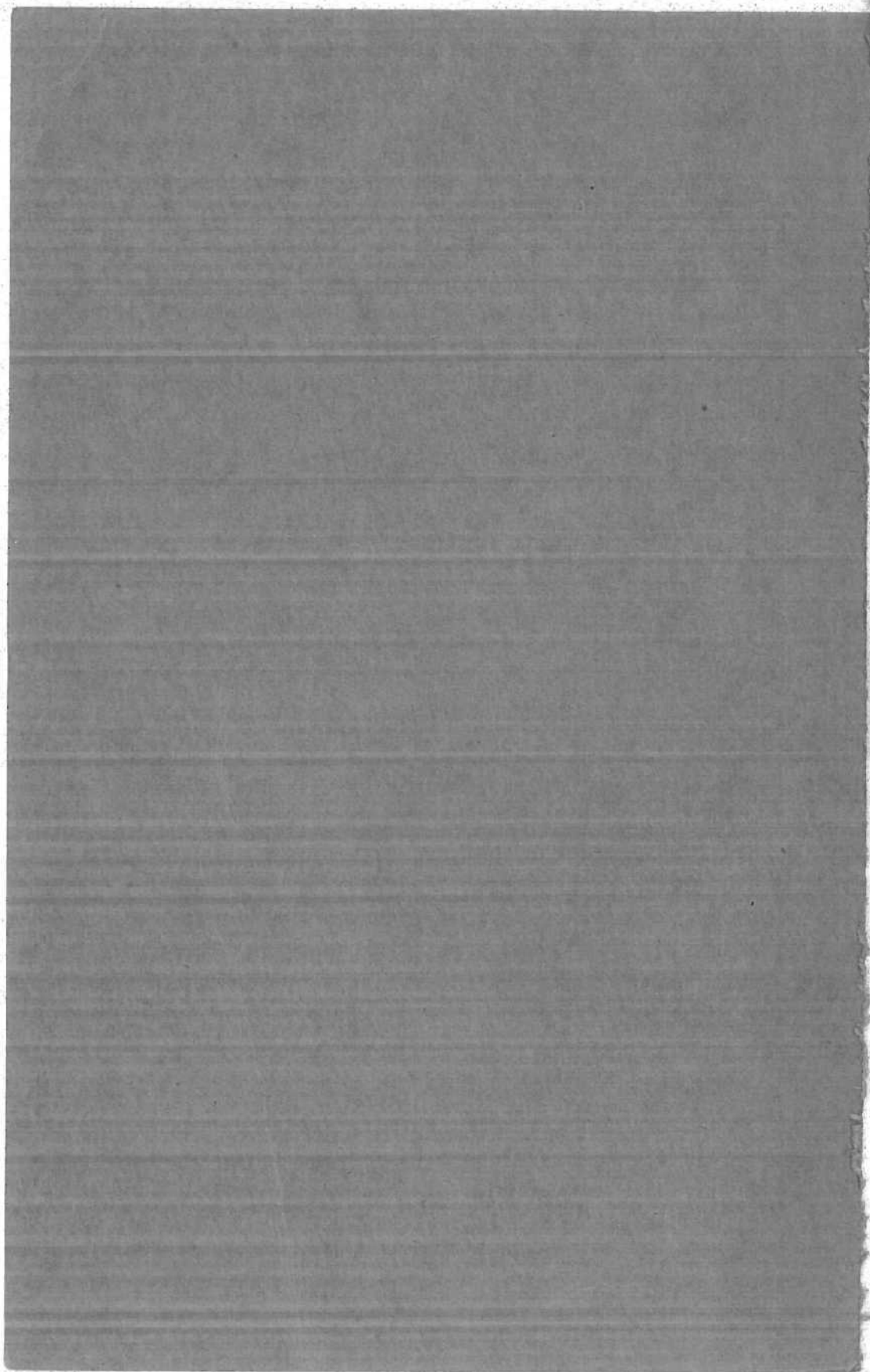

TOWN CLERK'S REPORT.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, FEBRUARY 3, 1947.

Pursuant to the foregoing warrant, Moderator George F. Whittemore called the meeting to order at 7 a. m. and directed the Town Clerk to read the warrant after the ballot box had been shown by the Moderator to the voters present to be empty and indicator set at 0000.

After reading of Article 1 calling for the election of town officers on this date, Chairman of Selectmen Earl G. Crockett moved to dispense with the reading of the remaining articles until they were taken up for disposition at the adjourned meeting, Saturday, February 8, 1947, and it was so voted.

Moderator Whittemore then addressed the voters present during which he stated that as moderator he had taken an oath to perform the duties of the office and had been qualified. He inquired if the 1946 Town Report ready for distribution contained a report of the Town Auditor. He was informed by the Town Clerk that it did not. The Moderator also said that while it was technical there were but 17 persons in the hall when the meeting was called to order and that a quorum was 20 by the town by-laws.

As Moderator Whittemore continued his remarks, Chairman of Selectmen Crockett addressed the chair and requested that balloting be allowed to proceed as there were some voters present who had to leave to make train connections.

Ernest L. Aldrich moved to proceed with the election.

In closing his remarks later, Moderator Whittemore said he was adjourning today's meeting until Saturday, Feb. 8 at 2 p. m.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE ADJOURNED ANNUAL TOWN MEETING FEBRUARY 8, 1947.

A check list was established at the main door of the main hall, Town House building, in charge of George F. Daigle and Raymond F. Lyford, the purpose to permit only registered voters on the main floor.

George A. Whittemore, presiding as Moderator, opened the adjourned town meeting at 2 p. m. and offered a short prayer.

George C. Messenger, who received the highest number of votes cast for Moderator on February 3, 1947, was also seated at the Moderator's table.

Mr. Whittemore as moderator called upon the Town Clerk to read the minutes of meeting of February 3, 1947. The Town Clerk was stopped by the presiding Moderator after reading: "Moderator Whittemore said he was adjourning today's meeting until Saturday, February 8 at 2 p. m."

Mr. Messenger moved "that we accept the minutes as read to and including the adjournment" which was seconded by Malcolm C. Temple.

A lengthy discussion followed, with questions asked why the remainder of the minutes of Monday's meeting could not be read and record amended to include the balloting for town officers. Mr. Whittemore presiding as Moderator informed the voters that Monday's meeting had been adjourned before there was any balloting.

After further discussion, Malcolm C. Temple moved for the previous question.

Town Counsel Henry C. Walker stated that an election had taken place and 944 voters had cast ballots. He further said that if the voters acted favorably upon the motion before the assembly, there had been "no election"; if they voted "No", there had been an "election."

A voice vote was taken on Mr. Messenger's motion and was declared a "No" vote by the presiding Moderator (Mr. Whittemore). He subsequently said that by this action there was now no authority for this meeting.

There was further discussion during which Mr. Messenger took the gavel and addressed the voters, stating in substance that he did not consider that he was Moderator at the moment on the ground that he had been illegally elected on Monday (Feb. 3, 1947). Mr. Messenger then returned the gavel to Mr. Whittemore.

After further discussion, Selectman Daniel H. Bates, who stated he had voted "No" on the motion to accept the minutes as far as read by the Town Clerk, moved for reconsideration of the motion.

The motion to reconsider was favorably acted upon according to declaration by the presiding Moderator.

Rev. Charles DeVries moved that the minutes as read to and including adjournment on Feb. 3, 1947 be accepted, with the understanding that the Moderator would entertain a motion trying to legalize the taking of office of those people who by expressed wish of this meeting should perform the duties of the various offices for the ensuing term of their office. Motion was seconded by Malcolm C. Temple and so voted by voice vote.

It was then moved and so voted that Article 1 of the warrant be taken up. The article was read by the Town Clerk. The article called for the election of town officers for 1947 and their respective term of office.

George N. O. Poirier moved "that the list of people recorded on the Town Clerk's record as of Monday, February 3, 1947, who received the highest preference for their respective offices be and hereby are duly elected to the offices and for the time specified in the announcement." Motion was seconded. Voice vote was taken and Mr. Whittemore, presiding Moderator, declared it unanimously voted.

George C. Messenger took oath of office as Moderator which was administered by the Town Clerk. (Mr. Messenger had taken a similar oath before the Town Clerk, February 5, 1947).

Town Clerk explained that there was a question under Article 1 pertaining to "Equal Pay for Men and Women

Teachers" which was mandatory to be placed on this year's annual town meeting ballot for a "Yes" or "No" vote in accordance with a Legislative Act.

Charles R. Stuart moved and it was duly seconded, "that the result of the question relative to equal pay for men and women teachers as announced by the Town Clerk, Monday, February 3, 1947, be accepted." It was declared voted by Moderator Messenger by a voice vote.

TOWN REPORT.

Article 2. Charles R. Stuart moved that the 1946 Town Report be accepted as printed and the motion was seconded. George A. Whittemore spoke. Moved to amend the motion to read that the report include all reports as submitted to the Selectmen by officers and committees as of 1947 and thereafter. Motion, with amendment, voted.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE REPORTS.

Article 3. No report being ready by any committee, Moderator passed over the article.

BORROW MONEY.

Article 4. Voted: on motion of Malcolm C. Temple and duly seconded, that the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, be and hereby is authorized to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1947, and to issue a note or notes therefore, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws. There was no opposition.

GENERAL APPROPRIATION.

Article 5. Voted: on motion of Charles R. Stuart that there be a reading of each one of the budget items, together

with the amount recommended by the Finance Committee; that as each item is read any voter who desires to object to the amount recommended shall say "Pass" thereto. After all items have been read, a motion be made incorporating all these items to which no objections have been made. After such vote has been taken, the items to which objection has been made shall be taken up separately for action.

(*) Gypsy Moth—Voted: on motion of Raymond E. Griffin, duly seconded, to raise and appropriate Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for suppression of Gypsy Moth Account. Standing vote directed by Moderator Messenger. Police Officers Edward L. Orff and Charles H. Southland named tellers. Result: Yes 32, No 25.

Finance Committee recommended \$100.00 for Gypsy Moth Account.

(**) Chapter 81, Highways—Voted: on motion of Road Commissioner Harry C. Snow, duly seconded, "that the sum of \$4,500.00 be raised and appropriated to meet the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 81 Highways, and that, in addition, the sum of \$13,275.00 be transferred from unappropriated available funds in the treasury to meet the State's share of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State to be restored, upon their receipt, to unappropriated available funds in the treasury.

(**) Chapter 90 Maintenance, Highways—Voted: on motion of Road Commissioner Harry C. Snow that the sum of \$450.00 be raised and appropriated to meet the Town's

share of the cost of Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance and that, in addition, the sum of \$900.00 be transferred from unappropriated funds in the treasury to meet the State and County's shares of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon their receipt, to unappropriated available funds in the treasury.

FOREST FIRE HOSE.

Article 6. Voted: on motion of Forest Warden Walter J. Stank to raise and appropriate Three Hundred and Fifteen Dollars (\$315.00) for the purchase of hose for the Forest Warden's Department.

FIRE HOSE.

Article 7. Voted: to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) for the purchase of hose for the Fire Department.

MEMORIAL SQUARES.

Article 8. Voted: on motion of John D. Porter, duly seconded, that Articles 8 to 15, inclusive, be included in one motion. It was so voted.

Moderator read the eight articles after which a motion was made and seconded to name the Squares as designated in the respective articles in memory of Upton men who made the Supreme Sacrifice during World War II.

The Squares named are:

Article 8. That the Selectmen are authorized to name the Square formed by the intersection of Mendon and Pleasant Streets as "Howard R. Leland Square" as requested by Pvt. George L. Wood Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Article 9. That the Selectmen are authorized to name the Square formed by the intersection of Glen Avenue, Main, Mechanic and West Main Streets as "George L. Wood Square" as requested by Pvt. George L. Wood Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Article 10. That the Selectmen are authorized to name the Square formed by the intersection of North Street and Westboro Road as "Ovila J. Leclaire Square" as requested by Pvt. George L. Wood Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Article 11. That the Selectmen are authorized to name the Square formed by the intersection of School and Warren Streets as "Herbert Luebbe Square" as requested by Pvt. George L. Wood Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Article 12. That the Selectmen are authorized to name the Square formed by the intersection of Main and Mendon Streets as "Howard G. Butterfield Square" as requested by Pvt. George L. Wood Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Article 13. That the Selectmen are authorized to name the Square formed by the intersection of Church and High Streets as "Joseph A. Paille Square" as requested by Pvt. George L. Wood Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Article 14. That the Selectmen are authorized to name the Square formed by the intersection of Main, Pleasant and School Streets as "David R. Phipps Square" as requested by Pvt. George L. Wood Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Article 15. That the Selectmen are authorized to name the Square formed by the intersection of Hopkinton Road, Westboro Road, High and School Streets as "Carl L. Robertson Square" as requested by Pvt. George L. Wood Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars.

MARKERS FOR MEMORIAL SQUARES.

Article 16. Voted: on motion of John D. Porter, duly seconded, to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) for the erection of a suitable marker at each of the Squares named in memory of Upton men who made the Supreme sacrifice during World War II.

CHAPTER 90 CONSTRUCTION.

Article 17. Voted: on motion of Road Commissioner Harry C. Snow, duly seconded, that the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) be raised and appropriated to meet the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 90 Construction and that, in addition, the sum of \$9,000.00 be transferred from unappropriated funds in the treasury to meet the State's and County's shares of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon their receipt, to unappropriated available funds in the treasury. Mr. Snow stated it was planned to construct a new bridge on Mendon Street, near West River Street.

SURVEY SALARIES.

Article 18. Voted: on motion of Selectman Daniel H. Bates, duly seconded, that the Selectmen be authorized to name three persons to make a survey of salaries of all town officers and to recommend any adjustments at a future town meeting.

SURPLUS REVENUE.

Article 19. Voted: to transfer unexpended balances of the following appropriations: 1945 Civilian Defense Property, \$7.83; 1945 Fisk Mill Bridge, \$68.18; 1945 Warren Street Electric Light, 14 cents; 1946 Piccadilly Street Electric Light, \$1.00; and 1945 World War II Allowance, \$222.00, totaling \$299.15 to surplus revenue in the Town treasury.

Town Treasurer Leo F. Murphy opposed the transfer of 1945 Tax Liens balance of \$327.50 as it may be needed at a future date.

ASSESSORS' EXPENSES.

Article 20. Voted: to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for expenses of the Assessors of Taxes.

MACHINERY ACCOUNT.

Article 21. Voted: on motion of Town Treasurer Leo F. Murphy that the sum of Thirty-three Dollars and Ninety-five Cents (\$33.95) be transferred from Machinery Fund to Machinery Account.

ESTABLISHING 1947 TAX RATE.

Article 22. Voted: on motion of Selectman Daniel H. Bates that the Assessors of Taxes be instructed to use Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) from unappropriated available funds in the Town Treasury in establishing the 1947 Tax rate.

USE OF CENTRAL SQUARE COMMON.

Article 23. Voted: on motion of George A. Whittemore, duly seconded, that the Selectmen be authorized to limit or prevent in their discretion the use of the Common at Central Square for purposes of fairs, lawn parties, band concerts and other outdoor activities in 1947. During a discussion it was stated that the Selectmen planned to improve appearance of the Common.

TRUST UNDER WILL OF ELLA W. RISTEEN.

Article 24. Voted: on motion of Malcolm C. Temple, duly seconded, that the Town authorize the Selectmen, Town Counsel and Town Treasurer, to appoint a Bank or Trust

Company to act as Depository and Advisor in the handling and investing of the principal and disbursing of income under the Trust established by the Will of the late Ella W. Risteen.

LEGAL SERVICES AND EXPENSES.

Article 25. Voted: on motion of Malcolm C. Temple, duly seconded, that the Town raise and appropriate One Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$150.00) for legal services and expenses for the purpose of terminating the Technical Trust in the Probate Court at Hartford, Conn., and establishing a Gift On Condition in accordance with the terms outlined under the Will of the late Ella W. Risteen.

1946 DOG TAX REFUND.

Article 26. Voted: That the Town vote to appropriate the proceeds of the 1946 Dog Tax Refund, the sum of Five Hundred and Eighty-three Dollars and Eighty-nine Cents (\$583.89) to the School Account.

APPOINT CONSTABLES.

Article 27. Voted: on motion of Selectman Daniel H. Bates to pass over Article which called for the Selectmen to be authorized to appoint one or more Constables, thereby eliminating the annual election of Constables. Motion duly seconded.

Town Treasurer Leo F. Murphy moved that all appropriations voted during the session, unless otherwise stipulated in their respective motion, be raised by taxation. It was so voted.

Motion to dissolve the warrant and adjourn voted.

During the meeting a total sum of \$127,407.58 was appropriated to be raised by taxation with \$10,000.00 appropriated to be used in establishing the 1947 tax rate from unap-

propriated available money in the Town treasury, reducing sum to \$117,407.58.

In addition, \$23,175.00 voted to be transferred from unappropriated funds in the Town treasury to meet the State and County shares of certain highway work, the reimbursement from the State and County to be restored, upon receipt, to unappropriated available funds in the treasury.

The voting list returned to the Town Clerk showed 331 names checked: 225 men, 106 women.

PROCEEDINGS OF SPECIAL TOWN MEETING,
MAY 6, 1947.

Worcester, SS.

Pursuant to the foregoing warrant, a special town meeting took place in Town Hall with the required quorum present according to a count by Moderator George C. Messenger. The call of the meeting and constable's return were read. Prayer was offered at the opening of the session by Moderator Messenger.

JAMES ROAD.

Article 1. Voted: on motion of Chairman of Selectmen Daniel H. Bates, seconded by Selectman Ernest B. Porter, that the street sign now bearing the name of Bliss Road be changed to read James Road, and said street be recorded from this date as James Road.

RELOCATE FIRE ALARM SIREN.

Article 2. Voted: on motion of Selectman Ernest B. Porter, seconded by Alexander Kennedy, that the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) be appropriated from available unappropriated funds in the Town treasury for relocating the Fire Alarm Siren from the present tower to the main roof of the G. A. R. Building.

WEST RIVER STREET BRIDGE.

Article 3. Voted: on motion of Road Commissioner Harry C. Snow, duly seconded, that the Town appropriate Four Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$450.00) from available unappropriated funds in the Town Treasury to meet the Town's share of the cost of repairing West River Street Bridge, and that, in addition the sum of One Thousand Three Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$1,350.00) be transferred from unappropriated available funds to meet the State and County shares of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored upon their receipt to available unappropriated funds in the treasury.

Walter H. Allen of West River Street moved to amend the motion to extend the piers of the present bridge down stream (easterly direction) approximately eight feet to reduce the curve of the bridge's approaches. He said his proposed change would be a safety measure. Mr. Allen's motion to amend was not seconded.

George E. Nydam, John L. Moroney and Mr. Snow were among the voters to speak on the subject.

Mr. Snow asserted that with \$900.00 allotted by the State and \$450.00 by the County, if the Town would appropriate \$450.00, there would be \$1,800.00 available for the job, an insufficient amount to change the site of the bridge according to the planned work.

PRINTING PROPOSED BY-LAWS.

Article 4. Voted: on motion of Chairman of Selectman Daniel H. Bates, duly seconded, to appropriate One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) from available unappropriated funds in the Town Treasury for mimeographing and printing expenses of proposed new By-Laws for the Town of Upton.

PROSPECT STREET LIGHT.

Article 5. Voted: on motion of Selectman Harold S. Hopkins, duly seconded, to appropriate Twelve Dollars (\$12.00) from available unappropriated funds in the Town Treasury to the Street Lighting Appropriation for the installation of One Electric Street Light on Prospect Street, near the home of Joseph Campbell.

Voted to adjourn at 8.20 p. m.

PROCEEDINGS OF SPECIAL TOWN MEETING
OCTOBER 14, 1947.

Worcester, SS

Pursuant to the foregoing warrant, approximately 60 voters of the Town of Upton assembled in Town Hall on Tuesday, the Fourteenth day of October, 1947. The meeting was called to order by Moderator George C. Messenger. Call of the meeting and Constable's return were read.

OLD AGE ASSISTANCE.

Article 1. Voted: on motion of Ernest I. Bentley, duly seconded, that the sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00)

be appropriated from unappropriated available funds in the Town Treasury to the Old Age Assistance Account. Finance Committee recommended favorable action.

GENERAL WELFARE.

Article 2. Voted: on motion of Charles A. Davis of Public Welfare Board, duly seconded, that the sum of Eight Hundred Dollars (\$800.00) be appropriated from unappropriated available funds in the town treasury to the General Welfare Account. Finance Committee recommended favorable action.

AID TO DEPENDENT CHILDREN.

Article 3. Voted: on motion of Ernest I. Bentley, Clerk of Public Welfare Board, duly seconded, that the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) be appropriated from unappropriated available funds in the Town Treasury to the Aid to Dependent Children Account. Finance Committee recommended favorable action.

CHANGE PLANS OF MEMORIAL HIGH SCHOOL.

Article 4. Voted: on motion of Charles R. Stuart, seconded by Alexander Kennedy, to accept revised plans for the Upton Memorial High School as recommended by the Upton Memorial High School Building Committee and authorize the Committee to make such changes from time to time in the plans, as in their judgment, will be in the best interest of the Town.

Before the vote was taken, Samuel B. Young, chairman of said Building Committee, stated that such a vote was necessary if a change was to be made in the working plans from sketches submitted at a previous town meeting. He added that the architect's present plans have reduced the length of the building about nine feet, representing approximately

15,000 cubic feet, and added two feet to the proposed typewriting room.

BURIAL OF OVERSEAS WORLD WAR II SERVICEMEN.

Article 5. Motion by Selectman Ernest B. Porter to appropriate Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) from unappropriated available funds in the Town Treasury for burial of World War II Overseas Servicemen, who made the Supreme Sacrifice, was lost by a voice vote after discussion.

When the article was presented to the voters by Moderator Messenger for action, Harrison E. Bates motioned to pass over the article and was seconded by Joseph J. Driscoll. Because of closeness of voice vote, Moderator Messenger directed a standing vote to be taken. Result: To pass over, Yes, 11; No, 13.

Selectman Porter then motioned that the sum of \$50.00 be appropriated, (article asked for \$200.00), which was seconded by Allan S. Donham. Mr. Porter explained that the 1947 Legislature enacted Chapter 624 permitting cities and towns to provide financial assistance to certain veterans' organizations in defraying expenses incurred by them in conducting military funerals or burials of persons who died in overseas service in World War II.

Harrison E. Bates, World War I veteran, asked that the motion be defeated, stating he believed that Upton's veteran organizations would take care of any such funeral or burial without charge.

Robert M. Stuart, World War II veteran and commander of local American Legion Post, stated he desired to be recorded against the motion.

Francis E. Carbonneau, World War II veteran and member of local Veterans of Foreign Wars Post, said the senti-

ment of veterans with whom he had discussed the subject was against such an appropriation as any expense would be cared for by Upton's veterans' organizations.

SURVEY OF TOWN OFFICERS' SALARIES.

Article 6. Voted: To accept report of a Special Committee comprising Charles R. Stuart, Alexander Kennedy and Samuel B. Young (all former Selectmen) concerning survey of salaries of town officers with thanks and discharge said Committee, and to lay on the table any action on adjustments of salaries until next annual February town meeting.

Mr. Stuart made the following printed report to the assembly, copies of which were distributed to voters attending:

To The Honorable Board of Selectmen and Voters of Upton.

The committee to investigate and recommend changes in the salaries of Town Officials which the Selectmen appointed, have held ten meetings, interviewed most of Our Town Officers, obtained and studied salaries paid by eighteen Towns similar to Upton.

The figures showed a great difference between Towns, when compared, probably due to the fact that each Town has its own arrangement as to how its work is to be done. The committee realize the fact that the salary of any Town Officer in this or any other Town does not compensate the office holder for the actual time devoted to his duties. However, it is generally understood that a Town Office, particularly in a small Town like Upton, is not a full time job and that the occupant assumes the position more from a sense of civic rather than from the desire of financial gain. Basing our findings

on the information assembled, we respectfully recommend the following schedule for your approval.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank, \$9.40 known as the Knowlton School Fund with the Town Treasurer as Trustee to be used by the School Committee to defray extraordinary expenses at the Knowlton School Building.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank, one thousand dollars (\$1000.00) known as the Ella (Whitney) Risteen Fund in trust with the Town Treasurer and School Committee as Trustees, the income to be divided between the two pupils in our High school who make the most progress during each year. \$20.70 was received this year. No awards were made.

There is deposited in the Worcester County Institution for Savings, one thousand dollars (\$1000.00) known as the Dr. Carpenter Library Fund, the income of which is to be used for the Public Library. \$30.30 interest was received this year.

Charlotte A. Batchelor and George W. Knowlton established a Trust Deed at the Worcester County Trust Co., with the Bank as trustee, the income to be paid to the Town of Upton for use of Public Schools. \$173.24 was received this year.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank, five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) known as the Charlotte A.

Batchelor Library Fund in trust with the Town Treasurer as trustee, the income to be used for the Public Library. \$100.00 was received this year.

There is deposited in the Worcester County Institution for Savings, five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) known as the Charlotte A. Batchelor School Fund in trust with the Town Treasurer as Trustee, the income to be used for the Public Schools. \$100.00 was received this year.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank a War Bonus Surplus Fund to be used as a nucleus of a Fund for a Public Library Building as voted by the Town, February 7, 1925. \$65.43 Interest was received and the amount of this fund on January 1, 1948 was \$3,321.13.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank of Milford, five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) known as the George W. Knowlton Fund. The income is subject to withdrawal by the Town Treasurer on order from the Board of Selectmen, to be used to help the townspeople who are in distress. \$117.59 Interest was received and the balance on January 1, 1948 was \$5,952.98. \$30.00 was used this year.

REPORT OF TOWN COUNSEL.

DECEMBER 31, 1947.

TO THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN, TOWN OF UPTON:

As Counsel for the Town, I submit my eighth annual report.

Concerning the Town Election of February 3, 1947 I submit for the general information of the town reference to General Laws, Chapter 41, Section 1 "*Every town at its annual meeting shall in every year when the term of office of any incumbent expires, and except when other provision is made by law, choose by ballot from its registered voters the following town officers for the following terms of office—*" (then follows various town officers and terms.) Section 5 of Chapter 41 provides "*The voting list shall be used and the name of every person voting shall be checked thereon, in the election of all town officers whose election is by law required to be by ballot;*"

Where necessary I attended meetings of the Selectmen, and meetings of the town. Requests for written and oral opinions were received from various departments and officials and opinions rendered.

Two deeds of redemption were drawn, executed and delivered.

I represented the Town concerning the purchase of the land adjoining the school site.

Deed was drawn and delivered for the sale for \$100 of the O'Keefe tax title property on Hopkinton Road.

Claim was made for property damage to posts on the Westborough Road, and \$13.30 collected which will show in the receipts for 1948.

Suit was started by the City of Worcester against the town for a city hospital bill but the case was settled before entry by payment of the bill from the estate of the deceased person concerned without cost to the town.

Releases were drawn concerning the cutting of trees along highways.

In accordance with the vote of the town the final details concerning the settlement of the trust estate of Ella W. Risteen was accomplished, and after conferences at Hartford the legal title to the estate is now in the Town of Upton subject to the provisions under the will. The Hartford-Connecticut Trust Company was selected as Custodian of the funds by written agreements. The custodian may be changed by vote of the town at any time the town so votes. The present return is approximately 3.6 per cent. The assets of the trust are the same as reported previously and the values are the same except for those securities which are governed by the market.

I am grateful for the cooperation of town officials.

REPORT OF UPTON MEMORIAL HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING COMMITTEE.

During the year 1947 the Upton Memorial High School Building Committee held eight (8) meetings.

Although the final working drawings for the new high school are not as yet completed, some progress has been made. The architect, Mr. William G. Upham, submitted to the Committee slight changes in the plans of construction, which offer improvement of the lay-out and a saving in cost. After considerable discussion, the changes in the plans were approved by a majority of the Committee, and at a later date, also approved by the voters at a special town meeting.

On February 12, 1947, Chairman Young, with Mr. Temple and Mr. Bates, members of the Upton Memorial High School Building Committee, journeyed to Boston to meet with the House Committee to present figures and reasons why the Town of Upton was petitioning the State for permission to borrow outside the debt limit of the Town.

At a later date the Town of Upton was notified that our petition, Bill No. 1487, was passed by the State Legislature, signed by Robert E. Bradford, Governor of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, on March 14, 1947. Bill No. 1487 authorizes the Town of Upton to borrow within three (3) years

from date of issue, a sum of money not to exceed \$120,000 for the high school project.

During the year 1947 the Upton Memorial High School Building Committee found it necessary to expend certain sums of money as follows:

Sir:

In accordance with your instructions, I have made an audit of the general accounts of the town of Upton for the period from May 21, 1944, the date of the previous audit, to September 23, 1946, and of the tax collector's accounts from September 1, 1944, the date of the last audit of his accounts, to September 23, 1946, and submit the following report thereon:

The financial transactions, as recorded on the books of the several departments receiving or disbursing money for the town or committing bills for collection, were examined and checked, and a balance sheet, which is appended to this report, was prepared showing the financial condition of the town on September 23, 1946.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked. The receipts, as recorded, were compared with the records of the departments collecting money for the town and with the other sources from which money was paid into the town treasury, while the payments were checked with the approved orders of the selectmen. The cash

book additions were verified, and the cash balance on September 23, 1946 was proved by reconciliation of the bank balance with a statement furnished by the bank of deposit, by examination of a savings bank book, and by actual count of the cash in the office.

The securities and savings bank books representing the investment of trust and investment fund in the custody of the treasurer were examined and listed, the income being proved and the withdrawals verified.

The tax title deeds on hand were examined and listed, the amounts transferred from the tax levies to the tax title account being verified and the tax titles as listed being checked at the Registry of Deeds.

The books and accounts of the collector of taxes were examined and checked. The tax accounts outstanding on September 1, 1944 and all subsequent commitment lists were audited and reconciled with the warrants of the assessors committing the taxes for collection. The collector's cash books were footed, the payments to the treasurer by the collector were checked to the treasurer's books, the recorded abatements were compared with the assessors' records of abatements granted, and the outstanding accounts were listed and proved.

The outstanding accounts were verified by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, the replies received thereto indicating that the accounts, as listed, are correct.

The computation of the tax rate for the year 1946 was checked and it was noted that the amount raised by the assessors in 1946 was \$4,500.00 in excess of the amount necessary to meet the requirements for the year 1946.

The town clerk's records of dog and sporting licenses issued were examined and the payments to the State and to the town were verified.

The surety bonds of the officials required by law to furnish them were examined and found to be in proper form.

In addition to the departments mentioned, the books and accounts of the sealer of weights and measures and of the selectmen, as well as of the police, health, highway, public welfare, library and cemetery departments, were examined and checked, and the payments to the treasurer were verified.

Appended to this report, in addition to the balance sheet, are tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash accounts, summaries of the tax and departmental accounts, as well as tables showing the condition and transactions of the trust and investment funds.

During the audit, cooperation was received from all town officials, for which, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, I wish to express appreciation.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE UPTON SCHOOL COMMITTEE:

Gentlemen:

I have the honor to submit my third annual report of the Public Schools of the Town of Upton.

Schools opened in September with the following enrollment:

From the figures above it will be noted that the average enrollment per teacher in the two schools is approximately 34 and 35. An increase in these averages, plus the fact the five out of seven are combination grades, will make effective teaching very difficult, if not impossible.

Word has been received from the Grafton and Whitinsville School Departments that tuition will be increased from approximately \$100.00 a year in Whitinsville and \$130.00 a year in Grafton to \$150.00 a year in both towns beginning January 1948. There is a possibility of an increase.

This will amount to a total estimated yearly increase of from \$6,527.28 in Grafton in 1947 to \$9,340.70 in 1948 and from \$11,596.65 to \$17,443.77 in Whitinsville.

PERSONNEL.

Mrs. Mary E. Greany was appointed to fill the vacancy in the Geo. S. Ball School caused by the resignation of Mrs. Ruth S. Morgan.

Mr. Albert C. Petitto was engaged as Art Supervisor.

Dr. Bernard F. McKernan was appointed School Physician to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Dr. Samuel R. Capen.

TEXTBOOKS AND CURRICULUM.

"One of the chief duties of the school is to stimulate and guide the all-round growth of the pupil. A fundamental aim of an adequate science program is to stimulate and guide the pupil in a constantly growing understanding of the forces, elements, materials, and living things which, together make up his every day world."

"A course in science may be considered successful only if it so affects the pupil that he maintains a true scientific attitude. Such an attitude leads to the development of accuracy in observation, intellectual honesty, openmindedness, suspended judgment, and the ability to see relationship. The simplest way to learn is through direct experience. Learning through studying realistic pictures is a step more difficult. Learning

through reading verbal text is the most difficult, particularly at the stage where reading itself is still a learning problem."

The science books we have introduced in grades one, two, and three use pictures to expand the child's scientific interests and to satisfy his curiosities in Grades one and two. Reading is postponed until Grade three. At this time the pupil has greater reading ability. In this way is avoided presenting material to children which they cannot read, or, on the other hand, presenting material which they can read but is of little value.

These books are the first three books in "Basic Studies in Science", published by Scott, Foresman & Company.

In Grades four, five and six have been adopted the "Wonderworld of Science", published by Chas. Scribner's Sons.

The effectiveness of any text depends upon the manner in which it is used by the teacher.

The Reading System introduced last year continues to be very popular with both pupils and teachers. It is being constantly studied and improved by the authors.

The "Study Arithmetic" was introduced in September to replace the one which had been in use for many years. The series introduces newer and more scientific methods. The topics have been placed at the proper grade level so as to "coincide more nearly with normal stages of child growth". This series contains a definite program for the maintenance of basic skills and provides periodic self-tests to strengthen weaknesses.

BUILDINGS, GROUNDS, EQUIPMENT.

The Knowlton building has been completely equipped with new duo-roll shades. The same type have been ordered for the Geo. S. Ball School.

This year thirty new movable desks and seats were ordered to replace one room of those now in use. This policy should be continued each year until all rooms are refurnished. The present furniture in both the Ball and Knowlton Schools is in very poor condition or is unsuited for classroom use. Twenty reading chairs were purchased for group reading.

The heating and sewer systems in both buildings have given considerable trouble during the past year. In order to bring them up to modern hygienic standards of efficiency, a considerable amount of money will need to be spent.

While it is universally recognized that play activities are among those which contribute the most to the wholesome development of children, neither the Ball nor the Knowlton Schools have play areas which meet any of the requirements recognized as essential for elementary schools.

It would seem that these matters should be of real concern to the citizens of Upton and that careful consideration should be given them when looking to the future. With present buildings now overcrowded and preliminary census reports indicating a larger first grade next year, and undoubtedly for years to come, steps should be taken immediately to provide for an increase in enrollment which present facilities cannot adequately care for.

REPORT OF THE MUSIC SUPERVISOR.

I would like to submit to you my annual report as Supervisor of Music in the Schools of Upton, Massachusetts.

The entire world is praying for a lasting peace. Yet how can we be sure of a lasting peace when we daily see evidence of greed, selfishness and distrust both here at home and abroad?

In my opinion there is no subject in the curriculum that has greater potentialities for broadening men's sympathies and for teaching world unity than music. We can learn a

great deal about the ways of thinking and living of other nations and peoples by studying the kinds of music they have produced. By learning to listen to the World's greatest music we come to realize that it conveys emotions and suggestions that are common to all peoples all over the world. I have tried to include such things in the music program with the hope that the children will gain a better understanding of themselves and their fellowmen and come to realize the necessity of world unity.

In the first three grades we try to build a large repertory of songs, singing games and dances through which the child may find a happy means of self-expression. Music reading is begun in the second grade with the building of a music vocabulary. Beginning with the fourth grade, increasing ability to use the musical score becomes a definite objective. Two-part music is begun in the fifth grade and more advanced two-part in the sixth grade. At the end of the sixth grade the child has gained a wide musical experience and has a foundation for the more advanced work of Junior High School.

Pupils from the fourth, fifth and sixth grades participated in a Christmas play which was given in the basement of the Unitarian Church. This meant a great deal of extra work, but I feel that activities of this kind are very beneficial to the pupils. I would like to thank Mrs. Williams and Mrs. Goodrich for their hard work in helping with the play also to thank the Church Committee for the use of the basement.

I would like to express my appreciation and thanks to the School Committee, the Superintendent of Schools, the teachers, and townspeople for their assistance and co-operation at all times.

REPORT OF THE ART SUPERVISOR.

I hereby submit my first annual report as Supervisor of Art in the Public Schools of Upton.

The aim of Art Education in the public schools is not to make artists of our children or to impose adult standards of technique and skill in their work. Rather, Art Education aims to guide them in using their faculties and bringing out their creative potentialities to a maximum degree. In this way they are encouraged to create within their own expression, with the result controlled by their personal feeling, sensing, visioning and knowledge. Creating, then is not the copying of something else. This is recreating, and a copyist is merely a skilled craftsman (an art in its own right). In the above sense Art Education should offer to children, in the first eight grades of school, creative, emotional experiences which can do more to develop their minds than any tedious imposition of stereotyped skills and techniques.

With that as a foundation, my aim is to give the child confidence in his own feelings and sensing concerning good design and to instill in the pupil an appreciation of the relationships of line, space, color, light, texture, planes and forms. The proper training and guidance for the development of the mind in its understanding of art will prepare the child to pass judgment intelligently on the many and varied art problems which will come up during his life time.

I hereby submit the following report as School Nurse.

We have lost our faithful physician and friend. Dr. Capen died August 21, 1947. He is greatly missed by all.

Eye tests were carefully performed. In a few cases defects were found and these have been corrected or are under treatment.
