

## WARRANT FOR SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

FEBRUARY 21, 1955

Worcester, ss.

To the Constable of the town of Upton, in the County of Worcester,

Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are directed to notify the inhabitants of the town of Upton, qualified to vote in Elections and in Town Affairs, to meet at the Town Hall, in said Upton, on Monday, the Twenty-first day of February, 1955, punctually, at Eight o'clock P.M. to act on the following articles:

Article 1. To hear a report of the Committee that was authorized by the voters, March 7, 1953, to investigate matters pertaining to a Regional School, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 2. Shall the Town accept the provisions of sections 16 to 16 I, inclusive, of Chapter 71 of the General Laws, providing for the establishment of a Regional School District, together with the Towns of Bellingham and Mendon, and the construction, maintenance and operation of a Regional School by said district in accordance with the provisions of a proposed agreement filed with the Selectmen?

And you are directed to serve this Warrant, by posting attested copies thereof at each of the following places in said Town, seven days at least before the time of holding said meeting:—At each of the Post-offices and on the Town House in said Town.

Hereof fail not, and make due return of this Warrant with you doings thereon, to the Town Clerk, before the time and place of meeting aforesaid.

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## PROCEEDINGS OF SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

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February 21, 1955

### Regional School District

The meeting was called to order at 8.20 P.M. by Moderator Halbert K. Struthers after upwards of 400 voters had been seated on the main floor and in the balcony. It was the largest attended special town meeting in Upton in years.

Ernest J. Henchey (R) and Eugene J. Bissonnette (D) checked the names of voters as they entered the hall.

Following the reading of the Warrant by Moderator Struthers, Donald B. Johnson, a member of the special committee authorized by the town in 1953 to investigate the advisability of joining a Regional School District, made a report for the committee. (Other committee members representing Upton are Mrs. Ruth L. Nichols, R.N., school nurse, and Laurence H. Atwood.) The report is on file in the Town Clerk's office.

The report: "At the annual town meeting March 7, 1953 it was voted to have the moderator choose three persons to investigate regional schools as set up under Chapter 71 of the General Laws, sections 14 to 16-I. The moderator chose Mrs. Ruth Nichols, Laurence Atwood and Donald Johnson.

"This regional school law was set up to take care of communities which are too small to pay for adequate school facilities in their own towns.

"The law has two effects. It broadens the tax base to two or more communities so the burden on the individual taxpayers is lessened. It also provides for the most efficient school by bringing together enough pupils to keep classes at the optimum size for effective teaching.

"It was interesting in this regard to discover that it cost the town of Upton \$214.49 per high school pupil in 1945, the last year the town operated a high school. This was in a period when the average salary was \$1100, and before the post-war inflation more than doubled school costs.

"We found out from the School Building Assistance Commission in Boston that they would not justify or recommend the construction and operation of a high school with fewer than 600 pupils, whether by the individual town or by a region.

"According to Simeon J. Domas, specialist in school district organization, a population tax base of approximately eight thousand persons is necessary to bring construction costs down to a reasonable figure and to insure the sale of bonds by a bonding house.

"The committee was first in contact with Hopkinton, which had also appointed a duly-authorized committee and was in a legal position to talk about regional schools with Upton. Hopkinton, however, voted to build their own high school at a cost of \$1,380,000. This is to be a 600-pupil school, and was deemed a borderline case by the state. Of this sum the state agreed to pay 50 per cent of the cost. The impact of this school on the Hopkinton tax rate the first year is set by the state at \$14.50 per thousand.

"At the town meeting in Mendon last year, a regional school committee was authorized. Of all the towns that adjoin Upton, this was the only one besides Hopkinton that had taken this step. Our committee thereupon entered into talks with Mendon. In the meanwhile Bellingham, which adjoins Mendon, had been in contact with state officials and had also formed a committee. They were interested in Mendon, and Upton was interested in Mendon. Thus it was that the three committees set down together with Mr. Domas of the School Building Assistance Commission and formed what we tentatively called the Nipmuc Regional District

School Planning Board. The date was Sept. 20, 1954, and this planning board held eleven meetings, working out an agreement they hoped would be satisfactory to the voters of the three towns.

"The state by a consideration of the needs of the district established a figure of approximately \$1,913,456 as construction

and equipment cost. Of this the Commonwealth agreed to pay 65 per cent or \$1,178,450. This amount would be a direct grant and would never have to be appropriated by the three towns. In addition, the Commonwealth agreed to pay all planning costs of the building, estimated at \$100,456. Also, under a new act, there is an annual reimbursement of an additional fifteen per cent which is only for towns in a regional school district, of the aid which is already granted under the General Laws. The Commonwealth also will pay all regional transportation charges of the district for pupils who live more than one and one-half miles from the school.

"Of the region's share of the cost, which is \$634,550 plus interest at two and one-quarter per cent for 20 years or \$428,-521.30, Upton would be asked to pay 32 per cent during the first 10 years, which is slightly less than the percentage of Upton pupils who would attend the school. This would have an impact of \$6.03 on the Upton tax rate the first year, and would decrease each succeeding year. Because of the possibility that one town might grow at a faster rate than another it was decided to reopen the question of capital costs after 10 years and reapportion the costs on the basis of the average per-pupil ratio during that 10-year period.

"The committee feels certain that Upton pupils can be accommodated in Northbridge for as long a period as they have room in their school system. Estimates as to how long that could be, can only be conjecture. Grafton High School, opened in 1950, was crowded before a guaranteed five-year period was up. Northbridge has offered to guarantee to take our pupils for a five-year period at a charge of \$200 in Junior High and \$230 in Senior High.

"In this connection it might be well to point out that both Northbridge Junior High and Grafton Junior High have afforded bargain rates for tuition. In Northbridge, it was \$117 per pupil in 1947 and \$180 per pupil in 1954. In Grafton it was \$130 per pupil in 1947 and \$208 in 1954, reflecting a steady increase.

"The Upton committee was not chosen to sell the voters anything. They feel that the regional school is the only long-term solution to our school problem."

On motion of Selectman Malcolm C. Temple, seconded by Forrest P. Salisbury, it was voted to accept the report and open it for discussion.

Selectman Temple asked for information from the committee to which Mr. Johnson responded. Mr. Temple then spoke in

opposition to the proposed agreement established a Regional School District with the towns of Bellingham and Mendon. His objection to the agreement was mostly from a business view; not educational. He termed the agreement as submitted was "dictatorial" in his opinion.

Robert E. Maynard advocated deferring action on joining a regional school district at this time until further study could be made of such an important question and involving a large sum of money. He suggested that an Upton-Mendon agreement might be more equitable because of the current growth of the population in Bellingham. He added that Northbridge school officials have conservatively said that Upton pupils could be cared for in their school system for at least five years. Also, that some arrangement might be made at a future time with Grafton where he understood school housing was to be reopened.

Other voters speaking included Harrison E. Bates, Edward L. Prentise and Mrs. Elsie J. Craib, a member of the School Committee.

After Moderator Struthers inquired if there was any other voter who desired to be heard with no reply, Forrest P. Salisbury moved that voting take place under Article 2. Motion seconded. Voted, there being no dissenting voice.

Edward L. Prentiss (R), Edward J. Furphy (D), Mrs. Helen I. Donham (R) and Mrs. Rita C. Cutler (D), named checkers of voting list and as tellers, took oath to perform their duties. Police Chief-Selectman Daniel H. Bates was in charge of the ballot box. Officer Alfred J. Leclaire was on duty. Voting booths had been set up and a special ballot printed.

Kenneth L. Wood motioned a rising vote of thanks to the local special committee that had made a study pertaining to establishing a regional school district. Seconded. Voted.

Voting started at 9:15 P.M. At 10 P.M. Town Clerk George G. Newton motioned that balloting cease at 10:10 P.M. Motion seconded. Voted. There was no ballot cast during the last minutes that ballot box was open.

At close of voting, ballots were counted. Result on the following question directed by state law:

"Establishment of a Regional School District, together with the Towns of Bellingham and Mendon, and the construction, maintenance and operation of a Regional School by said district

in accordance with the provisions of a proposed agreement filed with the Selectmen?"

Yes — 82

No — 295

Voted announced by the Town Clerk. Ballots sealed and placed in vault.

At 10.30 P.M. motion to dissolve the Warrant was made by Town Treasurer Leo F. Murphy, seconded, and voted.

(Note: Special Town Meetings took place the same night at Bellingham and Mendon on like question, printed ballot.)

## ANNUAL TOWN MEETING WARRANT

MARCH 7, 1955

Worcester, ss.

To the Constable of the Town of Upton, in the County of Worcester,

Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are directed to notify the inhabitants of the town of Upton, qualified to vote in Elections and in Town Affairs, to meet at the Town Hall, in said Upton, on Monday, the Seventh day of March, punctually, at Seven (7) o'clock A.M. to cast their votes for the following Town officers:

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers as follows: Moderator, Town Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Road Commissioner, Tree Warden and five Constables, all for one year; one Assessor of Taxes, one member of the Board of Public Welfare, one member of the School Committee, one Cemetery Commissioner, one member of the Water and Sewer Commission, one Park Commissioner and three Trustees of the Public Library, all for three years; three Selectmen, one for one year, one for two years and one for three years; one member of the Housing Authority for five years; one Assessor of Taxes for one year to fill a vacancy; one member of the Board of Public Welfare for two years to fill a vacancy; one member of the Water and Sewer Commission for two years to fill a vacancy, and a Trustee of the Public Library for two years to fill a vacancy.

### QUESTION

To Ascertain The Will Of The Voters Of The Town Of Upton With Reference To The Question Of Demolishing The Building Known As The "Grand Army Hall."

"Shall the building known as the Grand Army Hall in the Town of Upton be demolished?"

The polls shall close at Eight (8) o'clock P.M. on day of said meeting.

All of the above to be voted for upon one ballot.

The remaining articles contained in the Warrent will be acted upon at an adjourned meeting of the voters in Town Hall on Saturday afternoon, March 12, 1955 at 2 o'clock P.M.

Article 2. To hear the reports of all town officers, and do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 3. To hear reports of any committees appointed by the Town, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to fix the salary and compensation of all elective officers of the Town as provided by Section 108 of Chapter 41, General Laws, as amended; Moderator, Selectmen, Town Treasurer, Town Clerk, Collector of Taxes, Assessors of Taxes, Board of Public Welfare, School Committee, Cemetery Commissioners, Constables, Trustees of Public Library, Park Commissioners, Tree Warden, Road Commissioner, Water and Sewer Commissioners, and Town Accountant, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 5. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray expenses of Town Departments for the ensuing year, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.00) to be used by the Upton District Nursing Association for pre-natal, post-natal and pre-school nursing services, crippled children and well-child clinic services, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1955 and to issue a note or notes therefore, payable within one year and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 4, General Laws.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty-five Hundred Dollars (\$4500.00) to meet the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 81 Highway work, and that, in addition, the Town Treasurer, with approval of the Selectmen, be authorized to borrow the sum of Sixteen Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$16,500.00) in anticipation of reimbursement from the State as its share of the cost of the work.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4000.00) to meet the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 90 Highway work on Pleasant Street, and that in addition the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, be authorized to borrow the sum of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00) in anticipation of reimbursements from the State or County, or both, as their share of the cost of the work.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Two Thousand Dollars (\$2000.00) to meet the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 90 Maintenance Highway work, and that, in addition, the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, be authorized to borrow the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4000.00) in anticipation of reimbursements from the State or County, or both, as their share of the cost of the work.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4000.00) for construction of new Fire Alarm System, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1500.00) to continue improvements of so-called Reservoir Street Extension, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to change the name of so-called Reservoir Street Extension to "Dr. Crockett Road" in memory of the late Dr. Earl G. Crockett, as petitioned for by William A. Bellofatto and others, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Fifty-four Dollars (\$54.00) for installation of three electric street lights on Maple Avenue between the Grafton & Upton Railroad Co. grade crossing and Maplewood Cemetery, the said money to be taken from the Street Lights Account, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 15. To see if the Town will authorize the Cemetery Commissioners to appoint one of its members as Supervisor of Lakeview Cemetery and other town cemeteries, and to establish the rate of pay for such appointee to be taken from the Cemetery Account, in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 41, Section 4A, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 16. To see if the Town will authorize the Park Commissioners to employ one of its members and to establish the rate of pay for such appointee to be taken from the Parks and Playgrounds Account, in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 41, Section 4A, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the sum of Twelve Dollars and Eighty Cents (\$12.80) from the Machinery Fund to the Machinery Account for Highway Department use, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) to renovate the Knowlton School Building in accordance with State requirements, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Eighteen Dollars (\$18.00) for installation of an electric street light for the parking area opposite the main entrance to Memorial School Building, the said money to be taken from the Street Lights Account, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the proceeds of the 1954 Dog Tax Refund, the sum of Seven Hundred Eleven Dollars and Thirty Cents (\$711.30) received from the County, to the School Account, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Eighteen Dollars and Fifty-nine Cents (\$618.59), in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 32, Section 22, General Laws for Pension Fund, Expense Fund, and Military Services Fund of the Worcester County Retirement System, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred Eighty-five Dollars (\$885.00) for oiling Fiske Avenue, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$750.00) for oiling Church Street between High and School Streets, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Six Hundred and Eight Dollars (\$1,608.00) for oiling Christian Hill Road, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) for a new guard rail on Church Street, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) as a Highway Fund, General, to be used for highway purposes, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Fifty-eight Dollars (\$258.00) for oiling of Warren Road, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 29. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to name the Square formed by the intersection of School and Church Streets as "Joseph P. Benoit Square" in memory of Joseph P. Benoit, who died in Korea in December 1950 while serving in the armed forces of the United States, as petitioned for by more than ten registered voters, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ninety Dollars (\$90.00) for the erection of a suitable marker in memory of Joseph P. Benoit at the intersection of School and Church Streets, as petitioned for by more than ten registered voters, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to amend its By-Laws by adding a new section thereto to read: "A new road taking shall be not less than forty feet in width, and the roadway itself shall be not less than twenty feet in width with a one-foot depth of good gravel," said section to be known as Section 8 of Chapter 7 of said By-Laws, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Eighteen Dollars (\$18.00) to install one electric street light on pole 23, located on Warren Street, as petitioned for by Joanne H. McClure and others, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the balances of the School Milk Program Account, Two Dollars and Eighty-Eight Cents (\$2.88) and School Sale of Ice Cream Account, Four Hundred Thirty-Nine Dollars and Fifteen Cents (\$439.15) to the School Cafeteria Account, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the following balances to the Excess and Deficiency Account: New Town Ambulance, One Hundred Forty-One Dollars (\$141.00); Sewer

and Water Equipment Account, Forty-two Cents (\$0.42), and Fire Station Construction Account, One Dollar (\$1.00), or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 35. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the Premiums on Water Loans totaling Two Hundred Forty-Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$242.50) to Notes and Interest Account, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 36. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from the Excess and Deficiency Account, a sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00), said money to be used by the Board of Assessors of Taxes in establishing the 1955 Tax Rate, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

## PROCEEDINGS OF ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

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March 7, 1955

Pursuant to the Warrant, Moderator Halbert K. Struthers called the meeting to order at 7 o'clock A.M.

After reading the call of the meeting and Article 1 for choosing of all necessary officers, Selectman Daniel H. Bates moved that reading of the remainder of the articles be waived at this time as they were to be acted upon at the adjourned town meeting, March 12, 1955 at 2 P.M. Motion was seconded and voted. Moderator Struthers then continued to read the remainder of the Warrant and Constable's return.

Moderator Struthers invited any voter to inspect the ballot box. The box's indicator was set at 0000. The open ballot box was inspected by several voters in the hall before the reading of Warrant. Selectman-Police Chief Daniel H. Bates was on duty at the ballot box at opening of the polls, being relieved at 8 A.M. by Officer Edward J. Morrison. Officer Alfred H. Aldrich served at the ballot box later in the day.

A sealed box purporting to contain 1850 ballots was turned over by the Town Clerk to Moderator Struthers, who delivered the box to Raymond F. Lyford (R) and Mrs. Rita C. Cutler (D), ballot clerks. At the check-out table at the ballot box were Mrs. Adelaide E. Bartlett (R) and William H. Noe Jr. (D). The checkers were sworn to perform their duty before the polls opened.

Mrs. Ruth M. Fiske was the first voter to cast a ballot. Arthur M. Bartlett was second voter.

Indicator on ballot box read at hourly intervals as follows: 8 A.M., 49 ballots cast; 9 A.M., 77; 10 A.M., 113; 11 A.M., 169; 12 noon, 224; 1 P.M. 258; 2 P.M., 321; 3 P.M., 385; 4 P.M., 461; 5 P.M., 654; 6 P.M. 824; 7 P.M., 1050, and 8 P.M., 1175. There were 1175 ballots cast and counted. The voting lists were checked and number voting counted. They corresponded. Total, 594 men and 581 women, total 1175. Approximately 76 percent of Upton's total registered voters cast their ballot at this election.

First removal of ballots was at 4:10 P.M. when 450 ballots were counted and placed in envelopes in presence of election officials. At 5:02 P.M., 200 more ballots were removed. After the polls

were closed by the Moderator at 8 P.M., 525 more ballots were removed, making a total of 1175 ballots.

Tellers reporting at 4 P.M. to canvass the vote were: Mrs. Helen I. Donham (R), Mrs. Elizabeth Victor (D), Mrs. Claire B. Praskiewicz (D), Ernest J. Henchey (R), James C. Kelly Jr. (D), Mrs. Norma L. Taft (R), Mrs. Joanne H. McClure (D) and Mrs. Ruth A. Sweet (R).

Tellers reporting at 6 P.M. were: Mrs. Ada W. White (R), Mrs. Yvonne M. Bissonnette (D), Mrs. Shirley E. Kirby (D), Mrs. Muriel J. Mitchell (R), LeRoy W. Prentiss (R), Eugene Bissonnette (D), Mrs. Helen Handfield (D) and Samuel B. Young (R).

Edward F. Furphy (D) and Edward L. Prentiss (R) reported at 6 P.M. to tabulate the vote and assist at ballot clerks' tables.

The Town Clerk administered the oath to above election officials before they assumed their duties.

Used and unused ballots, including one spoiled ballot in a separate envelope, were sealed and deposited in containers, sealed and placed in town vault.

Public declaration of the voting was read by Town Clerk at 12:20 A.M. (March 8, 1955).

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PROCEEDINGS OF  
ADJOURNED TOWN MEETING

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March 12, 1955

Moderator Halbert K. Struthers called the meeting to order,

more than a quorum (20 voters) being present. He requested all non-voters to move from the main hall to the balcony.

Moderator Struthers announced that he would not entertain a motion to "pass over" any article until the said article had been completely read. Also, that motions pertaining to appropriations and other matters when requested by the moderator be submitted in writing.

#### 1954 Town Report

Article 2. Voted: on motion of Selectman Gladys G. Crockett, seconded, to accept the town report as printed, subject to typographical corrections.

Daniel H. Bates moved to amend the original motion, "subject to typographical corrections," which was accepted by Mrs. Crockett.

#### Reports of Committees G.A.R. Building

Article 3. Voted: To accept the resignation of Walter H. Allen as a member of the special Grand Army Hall Committee. The resignation was read by Selectman Gladys G. Crockett.

Mr. Allen's resignation under date of March 12, 1955 stated: "Resignation from G.A.R. Hall Investigating Committee."

"Having fulfilled the task assigned me and accepting the decision of the voters as final and conclusive I hereby tender my resignation from this Committee. I regret the decision was contrary to my desires, but living in a democracy, we must accept the majority rule. Let us close ranks now and unite our forces in the battle for clean, honorable service for our Town and Nation."

Voted: To accept a written report of Henry C. Walker, chairman of the special Grand Army Hall Committee, made under date of March 11, 1955: "To the Voters: As succeeding Chairman of the G.A.R. Hall Committee, I submit the following report:

"The three citizen members of the Committee, Mr. Joseph Carroll, Mr. Walter Allen and myself, have all submitted letters to the Selectmen, prior to the election of March 7, 1955. At that time I said, and I assume the other two members said what they had to say, and the Selectmen had done what they deemed best in petitioning for a question on the ballot. I do not agree with the manner in which the vote was handled, and feel strongly that the matter was taken from the hands of the Committee. However, regardless of the manner of getting the vote before the people, it is quite evident that the people have spoken. The will of the

people is the backbone of democracy, and whether or not there are or might be certain legal irregularities in getting the question to a vote, appears to me to be quite immaterial. The fact remains the people have voted! I respect that decision, although my feeling in the matter is quite opposite. The legal definition of 'demolition' is: 'To destroy the structural character of, as a building, or a wall.' (Corpus Juris, Vol. 18, page 484)

"Time alone can tell whether this is the vote which is best for the town. I do not know. I only know that the demolition of an old landmark is like the passing of an old friend. We usually miss him! But if he's old and badly beaten, and nobody cares whether he has a much needed operation and some care, perhaps he's better off. So it may be with the G.A.R. Hall. Edwin Markham expresses it in his lines on Lincoln, when he says:

"And when he fell in whirlwind, he went down  
As when a lordly cedar, green with boughs,  
Goes down with a great shout upon the hills,  
And leaves a lonesome place against the sky."

Voted: on motion of Selectman Gladys G. Crockett, seconded, that the special Grand Army Hall Committee members be given a vote of thanks for their time and service.

#### Building and Zoning Committee

Voted: on motion of Daniel H. Bates, seconded, to accept a report of special committee to investigate Building and Zoning laws for the town of Upton after a report was read by Robert B. Paine, committee chairman, and further discussed by Robert E. Maynard, committee secretary.

The report includes a recommendation that the Board of Selectmen include in the warrant of the first special town meeting in

1955 an article to provide for the acceptance by the Town of Chapter 41, Section 81A of the Massachusetts General Laws, to permit the establishment of a Planning Board. The said article to be so worded that if Chapter 41, Section 81A is accepted by the Town, provision for the election of a five-member Planning Board will be made in the ballot for the 1956 Town Election.

Included in the Committee's report is the following: "If the Town finds, as suggested herein, that it will benefit from the services of a Planning Board, it is to be hoped that the selection of the five members will be made with consideration to their ability to look ahead with true interest in the Town's welfare and

from different points of view as for instance: Residential, Real Estate, Farming, Manufacturing and Business. A Planning Board must be capable of dealing with long range statistical information in such a manner as to interest it to best advantage for the Town's welfare and growth. It must be conversant with current economic conditions and quick to bring to the attention of the townpeople the necessity for any changes in policy. It is, in fact, the forecaster of the Town's economic possibilities or the eyes and ears that warn us well in advance of approaching pitfalls."

Another section sets forth "Building and Zoning Laws are practical and desirable for Upton. If properly administered, they afford the assurance that homemakers, farmers, builders and business people alike need when the value and future of property is being considered.

"The next step to be taken in drafting Zoning Laws is, as previously indicated, to secure the advice of as many townspeople as possible to help to arrive at the final form. Proper zoning cannot be achieved by your Committee or Planning Board alone. Zoning affects all of us and must be the results of the best thoughts and efforts of all of us. Your Committee plans to start by soliciting the assistance and advice of representative Town organizations and respectfully requests, via the medium of this report, invitations from any organization who would like to have a zoning discussion in their forthcoming agendas.

"After representative organizations and as many townspeople as possible, at meetings which be advertised in advance, have had an opportunity to discuss, and contribute their ideas to, the present rough draft of Zoning Bylaws, the Final Draft incorporating the best efforts of all of us will be submitted to the Town for acceptance at a Town meeting to be called especially for this purpose.

"Following the completion of Zoning Regulations, there is the matter of minimum building laws if the full intent of the wording of the 1950 Town Warrant is to be carried out. The State has provided a minimum building code. A copy is in the hands of your Committee to be reviewed for its application to the Town of Upton. It is believed that this code will be sufficient for our requirements, but this also is a broad subject of interest to all of us and will be handled in a separate report.

"Building and Zoning regulations will require for their proper administration, the appointment of a Board of Appeals."

(a) Highways—Voted to consider Chapter 81 appropriation under Article 8; Chapter 90 Maintenance under Article 10; Chapter 90 Construction on Pleasant Street under Article 9, and (b) Reservoir Street Extension, (subsequently voted to be named "Crockett Road"), under Article 12.

(c) Notes and Interest—Action deferred until after Article 35 was acted upon. It was then voted to raise and appropriate \$34,000.00 for Notes and Interest on motion of Town Accountant Harvey L. Martindale.

(d) Donald A. Wellman moved that \$2700.00 be appropriated to Police Account. Harold S. Hopkins, chairman of the Finance Committee, stated that \$3000.00 was recommended.

Police Chief Daniel H. Bates stated that \$2700.00 was not sufficient to take care of police work in Upton as it should be done and moved to amend the motion of \$2700.000 appropriation to read \$4200.00 which was seconded.

Lengthy discussion followed during which Chief Bates explained that with the \$4200.00 appropriation there could be a full-time police officer and a part-time officer. He pointed out how a full-time police officer could receive \$65.00 a week if he also had the position of custodian of Town Hall Building which is appointive by the Selectmen.

Among voters speaking were Kenneth W. Wood, who seconded Mr. Bates' motion; Selectman Gladys G. Crockett, Robert E. Maynard, Harold S. Hopkins, Selectman Malcolm C. Temple, Miss Margery P. Brewster, Richard D. Stockwell, Donald L. Varney and Gordon E. Benson.

A standing vote on Mr. Bates' amendment of \$4200.00 appropriation for Police Account was lost on a standing vote: Yes—64, No—74, being so declared by Moderator Struthers. Constables Alfred H. Nichols and Alvin P. Nichols made the count at the request of the Moderator.

Raymond K. Smith then moved to amend Mr. Wellman's motion of \$2700.00 to read to appropriate \$3000.00, as recommended by the Finance Committee. It was so voted.

After Town Accountant Harvey L. Martindale asked what pay was to be recorded for the police chief, Gordon E. Benson moved that the salary be established at \$50.00 a month, said money to be taken from the Police Department appropriation and it was so voted.

(e) Schools—Voted: on motion of Donald B. Johnson, chairman of the School Committee, to raise and appropriate \$118,950.40 after Article 20 was acted upon. Mr. Johnson moved to "pass over" the item when "Schools, including Industrial" was originally read, until Article 20 had been considered by the voters.

(f) Town Officers and Expenses—On motion of Town Treasurer Leo F. Murphy the appropriation for "Town Officers and Expenses" was increased from \$9,933.00 to \$10,058 because of establishing increases of \$75.00 for "Registrars of Voters-Expenses," and \$50.00, "Elections and Town Meetings."

(g) Reserve Fund—Voted: on motion of Town Treasurer Leo F. Murphy that \$2500.00 for Reserve Fund Account be taken

from the Overlay Surplus Fund. (This sum not to be raised by taxation.)

(h) Elm Beetle and Trees—Voted: on motion of Harold S. Hopkins to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000.00 for care of elm trees and suppressing the elm bettle. Tree Warden Ronald L. Bradford previously stated that at least 30 condemned elm trees were due to be cut down. The Finance Committee's original recommendation for the work was \$500.00.

Voted: on motion of Town Treasurer Leo F. Murphy after the final item in Article 3 had been acted upon (following action on Article 35), that all appropriations of the various town departments and accounts set forth in the article be raised by taxation unless otherwise stated. (One such item—Reserve Fund, \$2500.00, from Overlay Surplus Fund.)

#### District Nursing Association

Article 6. Voted: on motion of Forrest P. Salisbury, seconded, that the Town of Upton raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.00) to be used by the Upton District Nursing Association for pre-natal, post-natal and pre-school nursing services, crippled children and well-child clinic services.

#### Authorization To Borrow Money

Article 7. Voted: on motion of Town Treasurer Leo F. Murphy, duly seconded, that the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, be and hereby is authorized to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1955, and to issue a note or notes therefore, payable within one year and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws. Unanimous vote declared by Moderator Struthers.

#### Highways—Chapter 81

Article 8. Voted: on motion of Road Commissioner Henry J. Poirier, duly seconded, to "raise and appropriate the sum of Forty-five Hundred Dollars (\$4500.00) to meet the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 81 Highway Work, and that in addition, the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, be authorized to borrow the sum of Sixteen Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$16,500.00) in anticipation of reimbursement from the State as its share of the cost of the work.

#### Pleasant Street

Article 9. Voted: Harold S. Hopkins, chairman of the

Finance Committee, moved the following amendment to original motion of Road Commissioner Henry J. Poirier, "that the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2000.00) be raised and appropriated to meet the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 90 Highway Construction on Pleasant Street, and that in addition, the Town Treasurer, with approval of the Selectmen, be authorized to borrow the sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6000.00) to meet the State and County's shares of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon receipt, to unappropriated available funds in the treasury. Seconded. Standing vote:

Yes—100, No—4.

Original motion made by Road Commissioner Henry J. Poirier, which was seconded, was to "raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4000.00) to meet the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 90 Highway Work on Pleasant Street, and that, in addition, the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, be authorized to borrow the sum of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00) in anticipation of reimbursement from the State or County, or both, as their share of the cost of the work."

#### Highways—Chapter 90 Maintenance

Article 10. Voted: Road Commissioner Henry J. Poirier moved the following amendment to the original motion, "that we raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2000.00) to meet the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 90 Maintenance Highway Work, and that, in addition, the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, be authorized to borrow the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4000.00) in anticipation of reimbursements from the State or County, or both, as their share of the cost of the work."

Original motion of Harold S. Hopkins, chairman of the Finance Committee, was "that the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1500.00) be raised and appropriated to meet the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance, and that in addition, the Town Treasurer, with approval of the Selectmen, be authorized to borrow the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3000.00) to meet the State and County's share of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon receipt, to unappropriated available funds in the treasury.

Road Commissioner Poirier explained before the vote was taken that owing to much frost the past winter, the sum of \$2000.00 by the town was much needed.

## Fire Alarm System

Article 11. Voted: on motion of Fire Chief George N. O. Poirier that the Town "raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4000.00) to purchase and construct a Fire Alarm System and install a so-called Red Network of telephones. The above construction, purchases and details of said systems to be left in the hands of the Fire Engineers."

There was no dissenting voice to the motion, Moderator Struthers declared.

Fire Chief Poirier explained that with the inauguration of the dial telephone system scheduled May 19 at 7 A.M. in Upton, it would necessitate another arrangement for sounding of an alarm for a fire as the local telephone exchange office would be closed.

He stated the proposed alarm system would have seven telephones, according to present plans—four in residences and three in business places—from which an alarm for fire can be sounded. Also that it is planned to install two fire alarm boxes—one each at Central Square, Upton Center section, and Post Office Square, West Upton section, he explained.

Continuing Chief Poirier said that it is planned to move the fire alarm siren from atop Grand Army Hall Building to near Memorial School Building. He also stated that officials of Kartiganer Hat Corporation had given permission to have the factory whistle sounded for a fire.

Chief Poirier named the streets over which the proposed special fire alarm system's wires would be strung.

After the vote was announced by the Moderator, a motion was made to adjourn until next Monday, March 14, 1955 at 8 P.M. which was so voted.

County Retirement Commitment Article 22. Voted: on motion of Selectman Gladys G. Crockett, seconded, to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Eighteen Dollars and Fifty-nine Cents (\$618.59) in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 32, Section 22, General Laws, for Pension Fund, Expense Fund and Military Services Fund of the Worcester County Retirement System.

Oiling Fiske Avenue

Article 23. Voted: on motion of Harold S. Hopkins, seconded, to appropriate Eight Hundred Eighty-five Dollars from available unappropriated funds in the town treasury for oiling Fiske Avenue.

Oiling Church Street

Article 24. Voted: on motion of Road Commissioner Henry J. Poirier, amended by Selectman Malcolm C. Temple, seconded, to appropriate One Thousand Six Hundred Eight Dollars (\$885.00) from available unappropriated funds in the town treasury for oiling of Church Street between High and School Streets.

Oiling Christian Hill Road

Article 25. Voted: on motion of Road Commissioner Henry J. Poirier, amended by Selectman Malcolm C. Temple, seconded, to appropriate One Thousand Six Hundred and Eight Dollars (\$1,608.00) from available unappropriated funds in the town treasury for oiling of Christian Hill Road.

Joseph A. Carroll, Fire Chief George N. O. Poirier and Town Treasurer Leo F. Murphy spoke in favor of the motion. The appropriation was not recommended by the Finance Committee. Donald A. Wellman requested voters to support the Finance Committee.

Church St. Guard Rail

Article 26. Voted: on motion of Road Commissioner Henry J. Poirier, amended by Selectman Malcolm C. Temple, seconded, to appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) from available unappropriated funds in the town treasury for a new guard rail on Church Street.

### Highway Fund, General

Article 27. Voted: on motion of Road Commissioner Henry J. Poirier, amended by Selectman Malcolm C. Temple, seconded, to appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) from available unappropriated funds in the town treasury as a "Highway Fund, General," to be used for highway purposes not otherwise provided. Appropriation was not recommended by the Finance Committee.

### Oiling Warren Road

Article 28. Voted: on motion of Road Commissioner Henry J. Poirier, amended by Selectman Malcolm C. Temple, seconded, to appropriate Two Hundred Fifty-eight Dollars (\$258.00) from available unappropriated funds in the town treasury for oiling of Warren Road, or general maintenance in case the new layout is not accepted.

### Naming Square in Memory of *Joseph P. Benoit*

Article 29. Voted: on motion of Donald R. Keniston, that the Town authorize the Selectmen to name the Square formed by the intersection of School and Church Streets, as "*Joseph P. Benoit Square*" in memory of Joseph P. Benoit, who died in Korea in December 1950 while serving in the armed forces of the United States.

### Memorial Marker for *Joseph P. Benoit*

Article 30. Voted: on motion of Donald R. Keniston that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Ninety Dollars (\$90.00) for the erection of a suitable marker in memory of Joseph P. Benoit at the intersection of School and Church Streets.

### New Road Taking Requirements

Article 31. Voted: on motion of Selectman Malcolm C. Temple, duly seconded, to amend Chapter 7 of the By-Laws by adding Section 8 to read as follows: "A new road taking shall not be less than Forty (40) Feet in width and the roadway itself be not less than Twenty (20) feet in width, with at least one (1) foot depth of good gravel on the surface."

Motion to pass over the article was declared lost on a voice vote.

### Warren Street Light

Article 32. Voted: on motion of Selectman Gladys G.

Crockett, seconded, to appropriate the sum of Eighteen Dollars (\$18.00) to install one electric street light on pole 23, located on Warren Street, as petitioned for by Joanne H. McClure and others, said money to be paid from the Street Light Account.

#### Transfer to School Cafeteria Account

Article 33. Voted: on motion of Town Accountant Harvey L. Martindale, duly seconded, that the sum of Two Dollars and Eighty-eight Cents (\$2.88) in the School Milk Program and Four Hundred Thirty-nine Dollars and Fifteen Cents (\$439.15) in the School Sale of Ice Cream Account be transferred to the School Cafeteria Account.

#### Transfer of Monies To Excess and Deficiency Account

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## PROCEEDINGS OF SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

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AUGUST 8, 1955

Moderator Halbert K. Struthers called the meeting to order at the designated hour with more than a quorum (20 voters) present. During the early part of the meeting more voters arrived at the hall until the total was estimated at nearly 100.

Mr. Struthers directed that all persons who were not registered voters retire from the main floor to the balcony.

On motion of Chairman of Selectmen Malcolm C. Temple, duly seconded, unanimous permission was granted to Town Counsel J. Laurence Doyle to remain seated on the main floor and speak when requested.

Mr. Struthers also said he would not accept any motion to "pass over" any article until it had been read.

### TOWN HALL

Article 1. Voted: on motion of Daniel H. Bates, duly sec-

onded, to accept a report of progress made by a special appointed committee concerning a proposed acoustic ceiling and other improvements in the main hall, Town House Building.

The report was read by Malcolm C. Temple, Chairman of Selectmen, who is a member of the committee. The committee was authorized at the annual March town meeting.

#### ESTABLISH PLANNING BOARD

Article 2. Voted: on motion of Robert E. Maynard, duly seconded, that the Town establish a Planning Board under G.L. (ter. ed.), Chapter 41, Section 81A, said Board to consist of five members to be elected at the next annual town meeting, one to serve for a term of five years, one to serve for a term of four years, one to serve for a term of three years, one to serve for a term of two years, and one to serve for a term of one year, and at the expiration of each member's term his successor shall be elected for a term of five years; further, that the Board of Selectmen be and hereby are authorized to act as a Planning Board under said section until next annual meeting.

Before action was taken on the article, Town Counsel J. J. Laurence Doyle read an extract of the General Laws pertaining to a "Planning Board" after a request was made by Daniel H. Bates for more information as to Chapter 41, Section 81A.

#### APPROPRIATION FOR TOWN COUNSEL EXPENSE ACCOUNT

Article 3. Voted: on motion of Chairman of Selectmen Malcolm C. Temple, duly seconded, that the Town appropriate from available funds in the Town Treasury, the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) for the Town Counsel Expense Account. Unanimous vote declared by Moderator.

#### AUTHORIZATION TO SELL

Article 4. Voted: on motion of Chairman Edward L. Orff of the Water Commission, duly seconded, that the Water Commissioners be authorized to sell any obsolete materials, apparatus and equipment owned by the Town and presently controlled by the Water Commissioners.

#### PASS OVER LAND DAMAGE APPROPRIATION

Article 5. Voted: on motion of Chairman of Selectman Malcolm C. Temple, seconded, to pass over. The article called for an appropriation for settlement of any land damage claim for land taking, laying out and re-locating of Warren Road.

#### REJECT A NEW LAYOUT OF WARREN ROAD

Article 6. Rejected. Voters on a voice vote rejected motion of Selectman George N. Blakeslee for the Town to accept a proposed layout, relocation and alteration of Warren Road as agreed

upon by the Selectmen. A lengthy discussion preceded the taking of the vote.

#### WARREN ROAD WATER MAIN

Article 7. Voted: on motion of Water Commissioner Walter E. Hopkins, Jr., duly seconded, that the Town appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3000.00) for the laying of water mains of not less than six (6) inches in diameter in Warren Road, said sum to be raised by borrowing the same; and that the Town authorize the Treasurer, pursuant to G.L. (ter. ed.), Chapter 44, Section 8, Clause 5 to borrow the said sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3000.00) for the purpose and to issue and sell serial, coupon bonds or notes of the Town, each issue of said bonds or notes to bear such rate of interest to mature at such time, not to exceed fifteen (15) years from the date of the first issue, and to be in such form and to be sold in such manner as shall be determined by the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen.

Moderator Struthers declared the vote as unanimous. There was no dissenting voice.

When the article first came before the voters earlier in the meeting, it was "passed over." (This motion was taken after voters had rejected Article 6.)

After Article 8 had been acted upon, Assessor Donald L. Varney moved that Article 7 be reconsidered, which was duly seconded and so voted. This action came about 30 minutes after the article had been "passed over."

The motion of Water Commissioner Hopkins followed, which was voted as above recorded.

#### WATER MAINS ON BROOKS, FARM, PICCADILLY STS., MAPLE AND LOWER HARTFORD AVENUES

Article 8. Voted: on motion of Chairman of Water Commissioners Edward L. Orff, duly seconded, that the Town appropriate the sum of Twenty-Two Thousand Dollars (\$22,000.00) for the laying of water mains of not less than six (6) inches in diameter in Brooks Street, Farm Street, Piccadilly Street, Lower Hartford Avenue and Maple Avenue, said sum to be raised by borrowing the same; and that the Town authorize the Treasurer, pursuant to G.L. (ter. ed.), Chapter 44, Section 8, Clause 5, to borrow the said sum of Twenty-Two Thousand Dollars (\$22,000.00) for the purpose and to issue and sell serial, coupon bonds or notes of the Town, each issue of said bonds or notes to bear such date, such rate of interest, to mature at such time, not to exceed fifteen (15) years from the date of the first issue, and to be in such form and to be in such manners as shall be determined by the Treasurer

with the approval of the Selectmen. Moderator Struthers declared the vote unanimous. There was no dissenting voice.

Town Treasurer Leo F. Murphy moved that the Warrant be dissolved and the meeting adjourned. Motion seconded. Voted at 9:55 P.M.

Standing vote: *Yes*—38; *No*—0.

Count made by Ormand A. Bates and Edward C. Rock, appointed police officers, at request of Moderator Halbert K. Struthers.

Before the vote was taken, there was a discussion on the motion, the speakers including Mr. Temple, Eugene Whiting, chairman of the Finance Committee who said the committee approved the proposed plan to remodel by an unanimous vote; Donald L. Varney, Leo J. Lamanuzzi and Donald A. Wellman.

Voted: on motion of Town Treasurer Leo F. Murphy that the meeting be adjourned and the Warrant dissolved. It was 9:30 P.M.

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### REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF CIVIL DEFENSE

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To the Board of Selectmen:

In 1955 the Commonwealth of Massachusetts Civil Defense Agency designated four areas and twenty two sectors throughout the state. The zone designations are made up of Evacuation Areas, Neutral Areas, and Reception Areas.

The Town of Upton is located in Area 3, Section 3B, in a Reception Area, with our Sector Headquarters at the Milford High School. The *Sector Director* is *Theodore Appt* and the telephone number is *Milford 851*. When a *State of Emergency* is declared in the future all our requests for outside aid and assistance are to be transmitted through Sector 3B Headquarters. *This is very important.*

The Regional Headquarters of Area 3 is being set up at the Lyman School for Boys in Westboro, under Harold F. Rossi, Area 3 CD Director. The move is part of a general plan to get the regional headquarters away from target areas in case of enemy attack. State Headquarters will be in Framingham.

Since the Town of Upton is situated so close to the Worcester Critical Target Area, and our usual communication facilities

would be interrupted, if an attack were made, a *Gonset* Communicator will be placed in our Civil Defense Control Cented located in the Town Hall. It will provide the communications link between Upton and the Sector Headquarters in Milford, and will operate on 53.50 frequency. This is in accord with the State Communication Plan. *It could be our only link to the outside world during a disaster.* The cost to Upton is \$179.50 since an application for matching funds has been filed with our check to the Commonwealth.

On Friday, Aug. 19, after heavy rains for several days many bridges and culverts throughout Upton were washed away. Your Selectmen Chairman Malcolm C. Temple and George N. Blakeslee and Road Commissioner Henry J. Poirier took over in the field along with the Police and Fire Departments. Selectman Gladys G. Crockett and I assisted at Town Hall Headquarters from 2 P.M. until midnight. I was relieved by Edward Prentiss at midnight until 3 A.M.

From my observation I think the Town Officials did a grand job under the circumstances, which were strenuous to say the least, and *since our Civil Defense and Town Organizations are tied in so closely* I believe that I would be negligent in my duties if I didn't recommend the installation of a *Two Way Radio Communication System* for *Fire, Police, Highway and Sewer and Water Departments* because (1) *At this time matching funds are available which means one half usual cost price*; (2) *dollars will be saved daily by the town in internal communications*; (3) *it will increase each departments efficiency, and save them many miles throughout an emergency*; (4) *the Departments will be available to each other at any moment*. *Your protection and mine depends entirely upon a few key individuals who labor many hours for a small compensation in our village, and I believe that this equipment will assist them more than any other one thing*. *Radio Equipment is now available through CD at this time through matching funds*, and our town is growing.

*Meetings.* There have been many CD meetings which I have attended. Henry J. Poirier, William Woodward and I attended the Jan. 22nd meeting at the Little Theatre, Worcester, where the heads of all State CD Departments spoke of their programs in detail. Radio Communication meetings have been held at Milford, both Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Shaughnessy and I were in attendance.

*C. D. Literature.* On Jan. 25 I requested of Mr. Harold Rossi, Area 3 Director that all Upton CD Service Heads be put on their mailing list for CD news material.

*Warden Service.* Mr. Rudolph J. Scholl has been appointed Chief Warden for Upton.

## WATER AND SEWER COMMISSIONERS

For the year ending December 31, 1955

We held our first meeting Tuesday, March 8, 1955 and elected Mr. Edward Orff, Chairman, and Walter E. Hopkins, Clerk, for the coming year. We also appointed Mr. Henry Poirier, Supt. and Mrs. Ashley Perkins, clerk and bookkeeper.

We are at the end of another year, and the Water Commissioners wish to thank all those concerned in bearing with us.

We have completed our well field, adding 12 more wells, making a total of 24 wells that should give us ample water supply now and for a long time to come.

We finally got our new pumps installed and the stand pipe filled with a capacity of 500,000 gallons and a pressure of 130 pounds.

Each new pump is capable of delivering a minimum of 275 gallons per minute. One pump is so designed as to be able to run from an auxiliary motor at a future date.

The reason for the delay in getting the pumps, was a ten-week strike at the Fairbanks Morse Plant, which we had no control over. New meters have been installed where old and obsolete meters existed, and almost all meters that read cubic feet have been changed to gallons. It has involved a lot of work for the Commissioners and the Superintendent to find water mains so that we could service the hat factory without disrupting water service to the town. By doing this we discontinued what was once the main feed line in back of the hat factory. In front of the factory we cut the feed line leading into the factory and installed a valve which will safeguard the factory.

There still remains a lot to be done in West Upton. For instance, Depot Street is serviced from Maple Ave. across the land owned by Mr. Henry Poirier, with a three-inch iron pipe which we know is in very bad condition, and the upper end of Depot Street is serviced by a two-inch galvanized pipe installed by the late Mr. Charles Fitts. In the not too distant future this will have to be replaced. We also want to report that all the hydrants have been newly painted this year.

### New Construction

Farm Street has been serviced with a new six-inch transite pipe and two new hydrants, Lower Hartford Avenue serviced with 1½-inch cement-lined pipe with all new services connected, Warren Road serviced with a new six-inch transite pipe with all services connected and one new hydrant, Brook Street serviced with an eight-inch transite pipe and one new hydrant, Piccadilly

Street serviced with a six-inch pipe, services not all connected due to weather conditions, and Maple Avenue serviced with an eight-inch transite pipe and one hydrant, not completed due to cold weather.

The Insurance and Fire Underwriters Association of Boston have been notified and will make tests on the town's water system when the weather permits. All streets under new construction have water turned on for fire protection except Maple Avenue.

## REPORT OF THE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

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Chapter 81 monies took care of maintenance work this year, including graveling, drainage, patching, brush cutting, and surface treatments.

On Hopkinton, Mendon, and Westboro Streets, surface treatment was done and guard rail posts painted, from Chapter 90 Maintenance funds.

Chapter 90 Construction on Pleasant St. has been completed other than fine grading and seeding.

All streets suffered damage, some more severe than others, from the Flood of August 19-20. With the aid of the Flood Relief Agencies, temporary repairs have been made.

At the present time the Dept. of Public Works is drawing plans and specifications for the repairing and construction of the bridges damaged during the flood. For this reason, the amount of \$500.00 from the Bridge Account, was returned to the treasury. We will, however, need an appropriation for repairing and maintenance of other bridges.

The amount of \$6,000.00 was sufficient for Snow Removal in 1955.

\$500.00 partially completed the sidewalk on Pleasant St. Recommend Pleasant St. be finished in 1956; also repair present sidewalk on Maple Ave., now that the new water main is laid.

Fiske Ave. and Church St. were oiled as planned; Christian Hill was held over due to the flood; repairs to Warren Rd. were held over waiting installation of the water main.

Highway General Fund provided monies to remove ledges on Mechanic, Prospect and East Streets, eliminating dangerous hazards. Safety signs were purchased from this account, as the Sign Account was insufficient. More signs are needed.

Guard rail on Church St. has been installed.

Crockett Rd. was graveled, widened, and ledges removed.

At this time, I wish to thank all the Town Departments, the Department of Public Works, and the townspeople, for the cooperation, in any way, during the year.

## SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The Selectmen met and organized on the afternoon of March 12, 1955. Malcolm C. Temple was elected chairman. Town Clerk, George G. Newton was reelected Clerk of the Board. Daniel H. Bates was reappointed Chief of Police.

The Board limited the Police Department to fifteen regular men, and eliminated all political aspects from the appointments by asking the Chief of Police to name his men. The Board then made the appointments that he requested. The appointments to fill vacancies were all made unrequested in the belief that these people could and would make a substantial contribution to the efficiency of Town Government.

This being the first year that the Board had been elected for a longer term than one year, it gave us an opportunity to look toward the future with the knowledge that the Board would have some influence in the development of plans that might not be completed all in one year.

Starting in 1956 a member will be elected for three years, thus influencing the thinking and the planning of the Board for that period of time. This should have a sound economic advantage to the Town.

From March to August the business was mostly routine. This business was largely governed by the action of the voters in the town meeting, your vote being a mandate to all town officers.

The dangerous condition that existed in Pratt Pond Dam was corrected just previous to the August flood. It proved its value during the days of August 19 and 20. This was paid for by the Ella Whitney Risteen Trust Fund. Thus the generosity of those who lived in the past paid dividends to the present and to the future; and you may well thank your benefactors.

The flood of August 19 and 20 brought a great deal of extra work for all town officers. The damage to roads, bridges and other town property was tremendous. The Board of Selectmen had to assume a large part of the responsibility and work of rehabilitation. We wish to extend our sincere thanks to every other town officer for his cooperation during this period, as well as for the entire year.

The Chairman of the Board was elected as Liaison Officer to represent the Town in arranging a program of assistance from State and Federal agencies. This has required many hours of work and much travel. The results have been very gratifying and of great benefit to the town.

The final accounting has not been made, but we can say that up to this time the flood has not cost the Town anything. To date, we have received allotments in excess of \$40,000. Four bridges will be reconstructed and two more repaired by the State at no expense to the Town. This means that we will have permanent structures that will require little or no repairs in the future.

Culverts that were washed out were rebuilt to a greater capacity and a permanent improvement. The culvert under Central Square will be rebuilt in the spring by the State to remove the trouble that caused the washout there.

By your vote at the December town meeting, you have authorized major repairs and improvement on the Town Hall. These will be carried out as soon as arrangements can be made, and will have lasting benefits. Here again our benefactors of the past are giving to you lasting benefits that should be a memorial to their love of the community expressed in permanent and material results.

In conclusion, we thank you for your patience and understanding. Our decisions have been made without fear or favor for the greatest good to the greatest number, in the light of such facts and information as we had in our possession.

The year of 1955 brought its share of joy as well as sorrow; its records show both successes as well as failures. "The year is closed, the record made. The last deed done, the last word said. Now with purpose full and clear, we turn to meet another year."

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank, \$11.40 known as the Knowlton School Fund with the Town Treasurer as Trustee, to be used by the School Committee to defray extraordinary expenses at the Knowlton School Building.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank, one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) known as the Ella (Whitney) Ristein Fund in trust with the Town Treasurer and School Committee as Trustees, the income to be divided between the two pupils in our High School who make the most progress during each year. \$32.21 Interest was received this year. \$50.00 was used this year.

There is deposited in the Worcester County Institution for Savings, five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) known as the Charlotte A. Batchelor School Fund in trust with the Town Treasurer as Trustee, the income to be used for the Public Schools. \$150.00 was received this year.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank, a War Bonus Surplus Fund to be used as a nucleus of a Fund for a Public Library Building as voted by the Town, February 7, 1925. \$199.15 Interest was received, and the amount of this fund on January 1, 1956 was \$4,061.23

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank of Milford, five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) known as the George W. Knowlton Fund. The Income is subject to withdrawal by the Town Treasurer on order from the Board of Selectmen, to be used to help the town people who are in distress. \$153.24 Interest was received and the balance on January 1, 1956 was \$5,105.06. \$175.00 was used this year.

Sir:

In accordance with your instructions, I have made an audit

of the books and accounts of the town of Upton for the fiscal year 1954, and report thereon as follows:

The financial transactions as recorded on the books of the several departments receiving or disbursing money for the town or committing bills for collection were examined and reconciled with the books and reports in the town accountant's office and with the records of the town treasurer.

An analysis was made of the town accountant's ledger, the receipts being checked with the treasurer's books and the payments being compared with the warrants authorizing them and with the treasurer's records of payments. The appropriation accounts were checked with the town clerk's records of town meeting proceedings, and the recorded transfers from the reserve fund were verified by comparison with the records of the finance committee.

The necessary adjusting entries resulting from the audit were made, and a balance sheet, which is appended to this report, was prepared showing the financial condition of the town on December 31, 1954.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked. The receipts, as recorded, were analyzed and checked with the records of the several departments collecting money for the town and with other sources from which money was paid into the treasury, while the payments were compared with the selectmen's warrants authorizing the treasurer to disburse town funds. The cash book additions were verified, and the cash balance on February 16, 1955 was verified by examination of a savings bank book and by reconciliation of the bank balances with statements received from the banks in which town funds are deposited.

The payroll deductions from employees' salaries for Federal taxes and for the county retirement system were examined and checked. The amounts withheld were compared with the treasurer's recorded receipts, and the payments to the Federal depository and the county treasurer were checked with the vouchers on file.

The payments on account of maturing debt and interest were proved with the amounts falling due and with the cancelled securities and coupons on file. The outstanding coupons on February 16, 1955 were listed and reconciled with the balance in the bond and coupon account as shown by a statement furnished by the bank of deposit.

The savings bank books and securities representing the investment of the trust and investment funds in the custody of the treasurer and trustees were examined and listed, the income being proved and the withdrawals verified.

The records of tax titles and tax possessions held by the town were examined and checked in detail, the amounts added to the tax title account being checked with the collector's and the accountant's books.

The books and accounts of the town collector were examined and checked in detail. The taxes and excise outstanding at the time of the previous examination, as well as all subsequent commitment lists, were audited and compared with the assessors' warrants issued for their collection. The cash book additions were proved and the reported payments to the treasurer were compared with the treasurer's recorded receipts. The abatements, as recorded, were compared with the assessors' records of abatements granted, the transfers to the tax title account were verified, and the outstanding accounts were listed and reconciled with the respective ledger accounts.

The records of departmental and water accounts receivable were examined and checked in detail. The commitments were verified, the reported payments to the treasurer were checked with the treasurer's cash book, the abatements were compared with the records of the departments authorized to grant them, and the outstanding accounts were listed and reconciled with the respective ledger accounts.

Verification of the outstanding tax, excise, departmental, and water accounts was obtained by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, and from the replies received it would appear that the accounts, as listed, are correct.

The assessors' computation of the tax rate for the year 1954 was examined and checked. The records of abatements granted by the board of assessors were checked with the books of the collector and the accountant, while the warrants to the collector were listed and compared with the detailed commitments.

The financial accounts of the town clerk pertaining to dog and sporting licenses issued were examined, the payments to the Division of Fisheries and Game being checked with the receipts on file and the payments to the town treasurer being compared with the treasurer's recorded receipts.

The appropriations as voted by the town meetings were listed from the records of the town clerk and compared with the aggregate appropriations raised by the assessors.

The surety bonds of the various town officials required to furnish them were examined and found to be in proper form.

The records of receipts of the board of selectmen, the sealer of weights and measures, and the milk inspector, as well as of the police, health, public welfare, veterans' services, school, library,

and cemetery departments, were examined and checked, the payments to the treasurer being verified.

Appended to this report, in addition to the balance sheet, are tables showing reconciliations of the treasurer's, collector's, and town clerk's cash, summaries of the tax, excise, departmental, and water accounts, as well as schedules showing the condition and transactions of the trust and investment funds.

For the cooperation received from all town officials during the progress of the audit, I wish, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, to express appreciation.

## LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

*To the Trustees of the Upton Library:*

The librarian respectfully submits her annual report with library statistics, list of periodicals, and the catalog of new books.

Books have been added to the Dr. Carpenter Alcove as required and purchased from the George H. Schultz Fund.

Gifts of magazines and books have been received from Mrs. Alice Hall, Mrs. Edith Hill, Mrs. Amy Estes, Mrs. Eleanor Merrill, Mr. Chester Walker, Mr. David Colcord, Kiwanis Club and the Woman's Club.

A check from the Kiwanis Club for \$50 was spent on a series of winter Story Hours, which were held from January 1 to May 1. A large poster was bought for display in the library room and a 2-year subscription to Ideals magazine. This magazine has been enjoyed by both children and adults. Last summer expenses were paid, for the children of the Reading Club to visit three museums. This gift has been greatly appreciated.

In July and August, our regular summer Story Hour was held for the younger children and a Reading Club for the older group. Twelve children received State Honor Certificates for reading twenty books, five of which were non-fiction. Eight children received Certificates for reading five books.

The topic for the Reading Club was Indian life. At the close of the summer the children were taken to Harvard, Massachusetts, where they visited Fruitlands, one time home of the Alcotts; the Indian Museum, and the Shaker Museum. Mrs. Charles Caton and Mrs. Robert Maynard generously assisted with the

transportation.

Mr. Harold Lawrence also gave a talk on Indians to the Reading Group at the home of the librarian. He was dressed in full Indian regalia and showed them many interesting crafts.

A party was held at the library for the Story Hour children. Margaret MacGregor and Harriet Caton presented a Puppet Show.

For Book Week, posters were exhibited at the schools and library with the slogan, "Let's Read." Book marks were distributed. There was a large display of new books. The librarian gave book reviews for each grade in the schools.

In December a Christmas Story Hour was held. Mrs. Eleanor Merrill baked gingerbread men and Christmas cookies for each child.

During the year Mrs. Helen Bentley has sent many lovely bouquets to the library.

I wish to express my sincere appreciation to Mrs. Eleanor Merrill who so ably assists me during the fall and winter months.

I wish to thank the Trustees for their generous support and co-operation in every project, especially in increasing the purchase of children's and young people's books.

We are loaning fifty books for a period of three months to the new Memorial School Library.

In closing I would like to say that the work with the children has made a steady increase in the circulation of children's books. In 1950 the circulation was 3,007 as compared to 6,080 in 1955.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Town of Upton School Committee  
Upton, Massachusetts

Mrs. Elsie Craib and Gentlemen:

The annual report of the Superintendent of Schools for the calendar year 1955 is hereby submitted for your consideration. It is the third such report in the series which has been my responsibility to prepare.

The Superintendent of Schools, in a previous report, emphasized that whatever direction education in Upton takes will be influenced by two factors—the needs of the children and the public desire for education. We need to safeguard and crystallize gains already made.

The School Committee and the citizens of Upton are to be commended in their efforts to provide a modern elementary school plant. The Superintendent of Schools recommends that a continued survey be made in relation to the desirability of participating in a regional school plan with the town of Mendon in order to provide as adequately for pupils grades seven through twelve as we are now providing for pupils one through six. The first phase of this report will deal with the attention that has been directed toward the instruction and program of study in the elementary schools.

*The improvement of teaching takes place to the degree that it is a co-operative undertaking of those concerned with education.* This is a basic principle involved in the supervision and administration of elementary education in Upton. Many problems are involved—some extend over a period of years, others are completed in a shorter time. Some concern only a few, others involve many. *Education is definitely improved* when it is seen as a *related and continuous process* guided by *worthy objectives*. Some of the outstanding work we have accomplished will be described, as well as many of the activities that are emphasized in our program.

The organization of our work around larger programs where pupils use reading as an aid in carrying on research not only makes reading a purposeful activity, but provides vivid concepts that add meaning to reading. This type of procedure, where pupils participate in *research*, provides not only opportunities for the development of good habits, but also attitudes that make the school a vital part of the lives of the children. Those who visited the splendid exhibition of minerals, a project carried on by the youngsters of the fifth grade in the Memorial School, will bear testimony to the above principle.

The teaching of reading is very fundamental, since so much of the pupil's success in school depends upon the ability to read. Thus, reading continues to be one of our greatest concerns throughout the grades. Every one of our teachers is striving to provide an adequate reading program with carefully planned guidance for our pupils at all grade levels. There is a wide range of reading ability and achievement in all grades. For example, in grade five there are some pupils who can read as well as high school students and others who can read only at the third grade level. Definite steps are being taken to improve the reading ability of those pupils who are not up to standard. We have been teaching reading in small groups at most levels. Work is provided for each group on the level of the child's ability and comprehension of reading is checked with teacher-made material, supplementary texts, and reading checks that are found in books. The application of these methods in the teaching of reading has been of great help. Much yet remains to be done to bring the average grade equivalent in reading to exceed the norm for the grade in the elementary schools of Upton. A remedial reading program for those who need it most could be justified. The raising of the entrance age for first grade pupils will tend to reduce to a minimum the number of children in the first and second grades who are too immature to begin formal reading. The program of reading readiness in the first grade increases in importance as the child moves up the educational ladder. The community should move away from the concept that grade one is a nursery school. Our reading program must stress comprehension and interpretation of facts, vocabulary development, speed, organization, and oral reading to improve speech. The practice of buying supplementary books is proving to be a sound one in the schools of the Union and understandably tends to keep informational sources more up to date. Children gain poise by reading widely on each new level of achievement. The best teaching carried on in the Upton schools is in the classrooms of those teachers who guide pupils to do their own thinking, planning, organizing, and evaluating.

The Superintendent of Schools is anxious to improve the library facilities in the schools here at Upton.

The subject of arithmetic is vital in the life situations of children. In this area we stress thoroughness and accuracy of performance by the pupils. They also learn that verifications of answers are important. Teachers in our schools strive to make arithmetic understandable to children.

In the area of English, the effort is made to improve the children's ability to express themselves adequately and correctly, to use good beginning and ending sentences, good sequences of sentences and habits of speaking, to choose interesting details and to create greater vividness through choice of words and the development of wider fields of interest. We are striving to make the for-

mal period and class drill much less in evidence and to make the child's interest and activities the basis of expression. Much effort is being made to improve the quality of written work by concentrating on capitalization, punctuation, and sentence structure. Regardless of their abilities or skills, the children need a thorough study of English from the point of view of writing and reading throughout their entire educational experience.

The problem of writing legibly is an ever present one in every school system. The handwriting under the Rinehart System, we believe, has improved in quality by the definite lessons in written work which the children have in each grade. Many of the difficulties that are to be found are due to lack of co-ordination.

In spelling, our aim is to enable the child to spell correctly all the words he uses in writing. The study of spelling has value to the child just to the extent he uses it in doing the writing involved in carrying on his every day affairs of life.

Our Geography has been a growing realization of man's need of clothing and shelter, and of the industries by which they are exchanged. The physiographical features, such as mountains, plains, hills, deserts, rivers, lakes, and oceans have been included in the study. A knowledge of the world made up of countries and peoples differing in many ways, and of present conditions and happenings, against a background of post-war conditions and events has been gained. We are developing a spirit of inquiry toward existing geographic conditions. Simple dramatization and visual aids of life in distant communities have made these life conditions vivid to the child as few other devices could do.

The Superintendent of Schools believes strongly in the correlation of geograph with art and history, but does not embrace the so-called fusion of these two great social areas in the school program. Geography is a very vital subject to us. It has taken on a new meaning. Aviation and modern transportation have entirely changed our whole geographical conception of time, space and distance. The location and importance of world resources are now more significant than ever.

The study of History throughout the grades has a variety of great appeal with its oral and written stories. In this area, the Superintendent encourages teachers to embrace the unit plan or some modification of it because it makes possible a wider, more inclusive program, and gives latitude in selection and emphasis. In the primary grades, the children have been taught family relationships and civic contacts—father, mother, teacher, fireman, policeman, etc.—and in the stories of how they are fed, clothed and sheltered have learned something of the complex processes of modern life.

In the intermediate grades, wherever local contacts permit, children have been made vitally aware of their own town. In-

cluded in our study of History at this level have been discussions and projects related to the first civilized people, the Greeks and Romans, the work of the Middle Ages, and the early American nation.

We have made great strides in the field of Art. The aim in all creative work is child development. Both the ideals which the children seek to express and the skill with which they express them develop continually. Our recent art exhibition in both schools testifies to this worthy objective. Emphasis is laid on Art as the great integrating factor in the school program and contributes much to the understanding at all grade levels. Children learn that crayons or paints give better results when used in a certain way, that some color combinations are more pleasing than others, and that a certain placement of objects gives a feeling of perspective. The teacher's success in stimulating creative work will be demonstrated by the joy and enthusiasm of her pupils and by their initiative and spontaneity. The Art program has become an opportunity to make use of information gained in social studies, reading, and science periods.

In our elementary grades, the children are provided with experiences which give them a chance to express themselves joyously and whole-heartedly in musical forms. They have opportunities to listen to beautiful music and to enjoy music appreciation. Some mastery of science of music is included in our program. Children listen to many harmonies of lovely songs.

Play-ground activities contribute much to the development of good sportsmanship and fellowship and tend to make responsible leaders as well as followers.

The development of visual aids has done much to facilitate the observational type of learning. There are many such aids. Among those that are in widest use in Upton are the sound motion picture, strip film, slides, ordinary pictures, and museum materials. Equipment for showing sound motion pictures and strip films is available to the schools for classroom and auditorium use. Film is furnished to the school whenever it is desirable for instructional purposes. Visual aids are especially becoming one of the leading tools in the modern educational program.

Our Parent-Teachers Organization has become an instrument of immeasurable good, not only in developing a more friendly spirit between parents and the school, but in interpreting the school program to our community. Parents and teachers must work together in the educational process and have a mutual understanding of the problems and inspirations.

All of us are engaged in studying the child himself in order that we may provide more intelligently for him. We are concerned more and more with how the child learns and with methods of

guiding his learning. We believe that the child must have skill in reading and in interpreting the printed page. He must be able to figure accurately. He must be able to co-operate intelligently in group undertakings and share ideas and materials. If he is a leader we must help him to develop the qualities of leadership which will make him a desirable leader in a democratic society. Some characteristics of democratic leadership are sincerity, loyalty, tolerance of the points of view of other members of the group, and a will to work. As our elementary schools make progress in providing for skills in reading, writing, arithmetic, and in co-operation, in sharing and in taking responsibilities, and as it becomes rich in opportunities to use their skills, it progresses in the direction of realizing the needs of children and helping them to help themselves in meeting their needs.

#### SECOND PHASE

Several phases of school administration need to be brought into focus. First, the problem of securing and retaining qualified teachers. Secondly, the lack of available school buildings to provide suitable rooms and facilities to meet the demands of an adequate secondary school program. Thirdly, the efficient administration of the funds appropriated for the support of school in the face of a sharp acceleration in the number of pupils to be educated and the spiraling inflationary trend resulting in increased costs. Fourth, the cross pressures and dilemmas resulting on the one hand from community demands for more services and a better educational program and, on the other, from the pressures of those who would curtail and cut costs at the expense of the present generation of children to be educated.

The decision of the citizens of Upton not to participate in the Nipmuc Regional School made it imperative for the School Committee to send the seventh and eighth grades to Northbridge—thus making more classroom space available for the ever growing elementary school population. The Committee gave much study and consideration to the rehabilitation of the Knowlton School to meet this problem, but the capital outlay necessary to condition the school to meet minimum state safety and educational standards, plus the cost of operation and maintenance and the resulting inadequate program which such facilities would provide made the plan not educationally or financially feasible.

The following table will indicate to the citizens the progressive per pupil costs in the schools of Upton as contrasted with those communities comparable to Upton.

The work of the special departments has been most commendable. I refer you to their respective reports—cafeteria supervisor, handwriting supervisor, art and music supervisors, and public school health.

In closing, let me express my thanks to the School Com-

mittee, school personnel, and the citizens of Upton as well as the Parent Teachers' Association and allied groups who have so generously supported the administration of the Upton schools during the past year.

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## REPORT OF THE MUSIC SUPERVISOR

Dear Mr. Hilyard:

In planning and carrying out the music program in the Upton schools, we have tried to give our children a true enjoyment and sincere appreciation of good music enhanced by an adequate knowledge of reading it and understanding its fundamentals.

The vocal program starts in the first two grades with the teaching of rote songs stressing good tone, proper posture for singing and accurate rhythm. Particular attention is given to children who have difficulty in carrying a tune. Special devices are employed in the form of vocal games to gradually hold these "non-singers" to hear and sing melodies. Right in these lower grades, a small and casual introduction to the rudiments of music is begun.

In the third and fourth grades, rote singing is continued, combined with actual reading of songs from our music books. In the fifth grade, two-part singing and in the sixth grade, two and three part music are emphasized.

I would like to express my heartfelt gratitude to the superintendent, Mr. Hilyard, and to the School Committee for their help and guidance in the progress of my work. My sincerest thanks also to the teachers for their wonderful cooperation without which nothing could be accomplished.

Dear Mr. Hilyard:

I am pleased to submit the following report on the operation of the handwriting program in the Upton schools for the school year of 1954-1955.

In the initial handwriting tests administered to your pupils in September 1954, 26% received a grade of "A" (Excellent); 26% received a grade of "B" (Good); and 48% were scored less than "B." In the tests administered in June 1955, 90.5% of your pupils received a grade of "A"; 9% received a grade of "B"; and .5% scored less than "B." Handwriting certificates were awarded to 83% of your eighth grade pupils who qualified.

During the school year, we graded approximately 3,800 formal and 11,500 informal handwriting samples for your pupils. A formal test was administered at four teaching-week intervals and a report was furnished each teacher giving a careful diagnosis of the handwriting of each pupil in the room.

We furnished the following instructional materials; teachers' outlines, pupil folder outlines, room motivation certificates, handedness tests, individual handwriting certificates, term envelopes, seals, etc.

My supervisors join me in expressing our appreciation for the splendid co-operation we have received at all times. We are pleased with the results obtained in your schools.

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## REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

I hereby submit the annual report of the School Health Program.

The physical examinations have been completed by Dr. McKernan. Routine health work is carried on throughout the year. Home visits are made to determine the reasons for long or frequent absences. The Massachusetts Vision Test and the Audiometer Hearing Test have been given.

January to May, daily communication was made with Grafton High School and Northbridge Jr. High School to check absentees. Home visits were made and, when necessary, cases were referred to the office of the Superintendent of Schools.

In January, the Worcester County Health Association sponsored the Patch Test Clinic for all pupils in both schools. It was also given to our pupils attending Grafton High School. Pupils with positive reactions were given a chest x-ray. All were reported negative to active disease.

In June, the Massachusetts Department of Health, through the Upton Board of Health sponsored the Polio Vaccine Clinic in grades one and two. One hundred and twelve children were given their first Poliomyelitis Vaccine Injection by Dr. McKernan assisted by Mrs. Natalie Fiske, R.N. and your School Nurse. Two pupils in our schools were stricken with Poliomyelitis. I am happy to report they are both improving and hope to be back to school soon.

I wish to thank everyone for their co-operation with the School Health Program.

## REPORT OF THE CAFETERIA MANAGER

I hereby submit my annual report as cafeteria manager.

From January to December 1955, the Upton Memorial School Cafeteria served an average of 240 meals per day or a total of 41,687 meals. By judicious use of surplus commodities from the U. S. Department of Agriculture and with the aid of partial reimbursement for each Type A lunch sold to a child, we found it possible to reduce the price of meals to \$1.00 per week, thus making the School Lunch Program available to more children. The Special School Milk Program enabled us to sell milk to children for .02 1/2 pint, and at this rate we sold 15,254 bottles in addition to the milk served with each meal.
