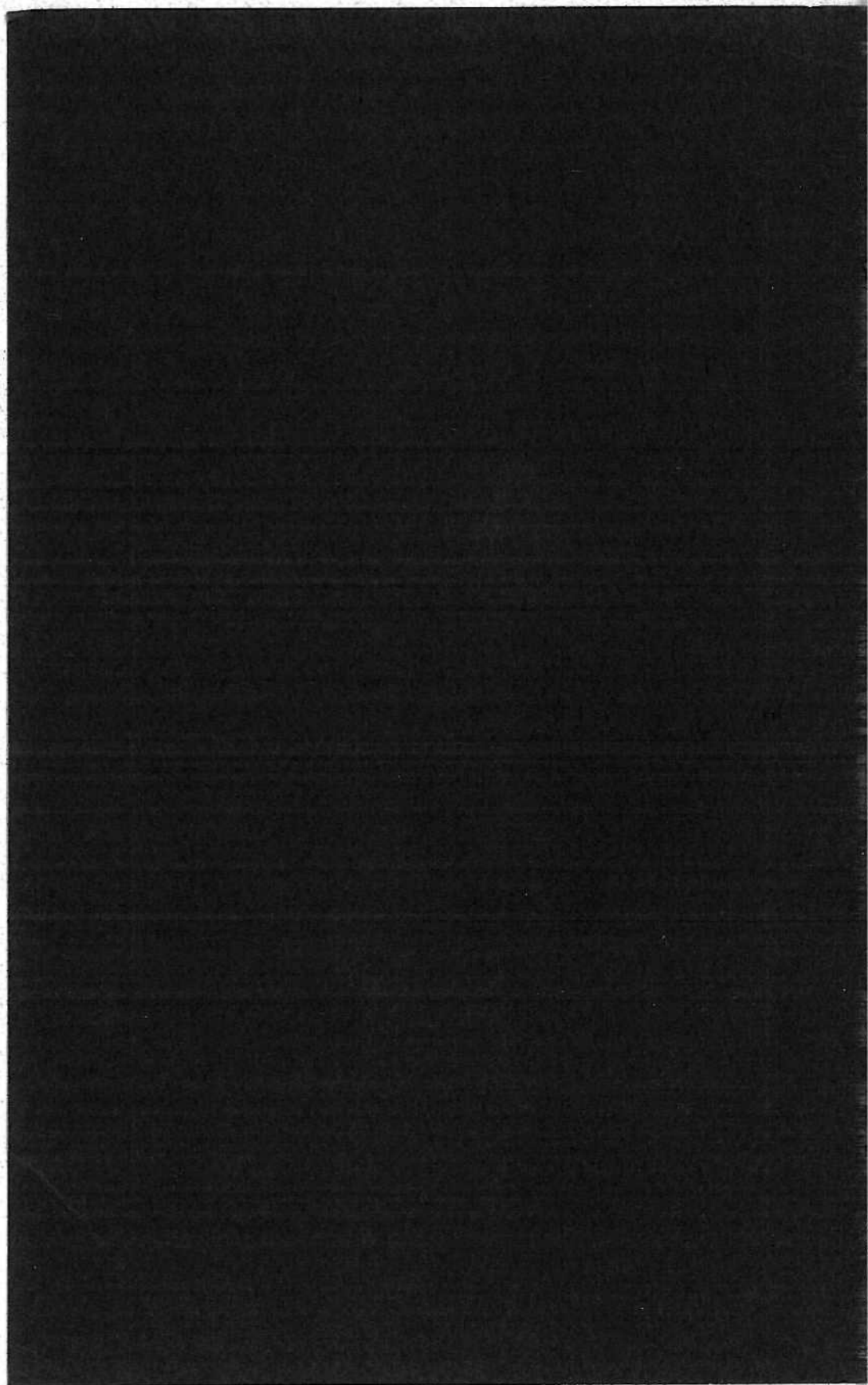

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING WARRANT

MARCH 5, 1956

Worcester, ss

To the Constable of the Town of Upton, in the County of
Worcester, Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are directed to notify the inhabitants of the town of Upton, qualified to vote in Elections and in Town Affairs, to meet at the Town Hall, in said Upton, on Monday, the Fifth day of March, 1956, punctually, at seven (7) o'clock A.M. to cast their vote for the following town officers:

Article 1. To choose necessary officers for the ensuing year: Moderator, Town Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, five Constables, Road-Commissioner and Tree Warden, all for one year; one member of the Board of Selectmen, one member of Assessor of Taxes, one member of Board of Public Welfare, one member of School Committee, one member of Cemetery Commission, one member of Sewer and Water Commission, three Trustees of Public Library, one member of Park Commission and Town Clerk, all for three years; one member of Housing Authority for five years, one member of Planning Board for one year, one member of Planning Board for two years, one member of Planning Board for three years, one member of Planning Board for four years, and one member of Planning Board for five years.

All of the above to be voted for upon one ballot.

The polls shall be closed at Eight (8) o'clock P.M. on the day of said meeting.

The remaining articles in the Warrant to be acted upon at an adjourned meeting of the voters in Town Hall, Saturday afternoon, March 10, 1956 at Two (2) o'clock P.M.

Article 2. To hear the reports of all town officers, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 3. To hear reports of any committees appointed by the Town, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 4. To see if the Town will fix the salary and compensation of all elective town officers of the Town as provided by Section 108 of Chapter 41, General Laws, as amended: Moderator, Selectmen, Town Treasurer, Town Clerk, Collector of Taxes, Assessors of Taxes, Board of Public Welfare, School Committee, Cemetery Commissioners, Constables, Trustees of Public Library, Road Commissioner, Sewer and Water Commissioners, and Tree Warden, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 5. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray expenses of Town Departments for the ensuing year, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1956, and to issue a note or notes therefore, payable within one year and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.00) to be used by the Upton District Nursing Association for pre-natal care and pre-school nursing services, crippled children and well-child clinic services, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4000.00) to meet the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 90 Highway Work on Pleasant Street, and that in addition, the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, be authorized to borrow the sum of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00) in anticipation of the reimbursements from the State or County, or both, as their share of the cost of the work.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty-Five Hundred Dollars (\$4500.00) to meet the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 81 Highway Work, and that, in addition, the Town Treasurer, with approval of the Selectmen, be authorized to borrow the sum of Sixteen Thousand Five

Hundred Dollars (\$16,500.00) in anticipation of reimbursement from the State as its share of the cost of the Work.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2000.00) to meet the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 90 Maintenance Highway Work, and that, in addition, the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, be authorized to borrow the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4000.00) in anticipation of reimbursements from the State or County, or both, as their share of the work.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) as a Highway Fund, General, to be used for highway purposes, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Ninety-Eight Dollars and Eight Cents (\$698.08) in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 32, Section 22, General Laws, for the Pension, Expense, Military Service and Workmen's Compensation Funds of the Worcester County Retirement System for 1956, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred Dollars (800.00) to meet the Town's share of a special Chapter 90 Maintenance project to repair and improve drainage on Hartford Avenue, near the DeMarco property, and in addition, that the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, be authorized to borrow Sixteen Hundred Dollars (\$1600.00) in anticipation of reimbursements from the State or County, or both, as their share of the work, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.00) for oiling of improvement of Crockett Road, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for oiling of South Street, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.00) for widening

and changing grade on West River Street, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the proceeds of the 1955 Dog Tax Refund, the sum of Seven Hundred Forty-Three Dollars and Fifty-Eight Cents (\$743.58) received from the County, to the School Account, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighteen Dollars (\$18.00) to install one electric light on pole # 2, located on Cross Street, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighteen Dollars (\$18.00) to install one electric light on pole 23 on Pleasant Street, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighteen Dollars (\$18.00) to install one electric light on Wildwood Avenue, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five Hundred Dollars (\$2500.00) for the purchase of a fully equipped automobile for the Police Department, as petitioned for by more than 10 voters, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to increase the numbers of the School Committee from Three (3) to Five (5) Members as of the 1957 annual town election, such increase to be made by then adding one (1) member whose term of office shall expire at the annual meeting in 1958 and by adding one (1) member whose term of office shall expire at the annual meeting in 1959, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to change the term of office of the Collector of Taxes from one to three years, beginning at the annual Town Election in 1957, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Four Hundred Fifty-Two Dollars

and Ninety-Two Cents (\$1452.92) to pay unpaid bills of the Board of the Water-Sewer Commissioners, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventeen Hundred Dollars (\$1700.00) for the purchase of a Two-Way Radio Communication System, said amount to be added to the Civil Defense Appropriation, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Ninety Seven Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$197.50) for the purchase of a portable forest fire pump, said amount to be added to the Civil Defense Appropriation, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand One Hundred Eighty-One Dollars and Forty-Nine Cents (\$1,181.49) to pay 1955 unpaid bills of the School Department, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700.00) for the construction of a sidewalk on Pleasant Street, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to accept the gift of a 1947 Chevrolet Panel Truck from the Upton Fire Company, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell a 1929 Model A Ford Truck, surplus apparatus in the Fire Department, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from the Excess and Deficiency Account, a sum of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) said money to be used by the Board of Assessors of Taxes in establishing the 1956 Tax Rate, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

And you are directed to serve this Warrant, by posting attested copies thereof at each of the following places in said Town,

seven days at least before the time of holding said meeting: At each of the Post-offices and on the Town House in said Town.

Hereof fail not, and make due return of this Warrant with your doings thereon, to the Town Clerk, before the time and place of meeting aforesaid.

PROCEEDINGS OF ANNUAL TOWN ELECTION

March 5, 1956

Pursuant to the Warrant, Moderator Halbert K. Struthers called the meeting to order at 7 A.M.

After reading the call of the meeting and Article 1 for the choosing of all necessary officers, Daniel H. Bates moved that *reading of the remainder of the articles be waived at this time as they would be acted upon at the adjourned town meeting, March 10, 1956 at 2 P.M.* Motion was seconded and voted. Moderator Struthers then continued to read the remainder of the Warrant and the Constables return.

Moderator Struthers invited any voter to inspect the ballot box. The box's indicator was set at 0000. The open ballot box was inspected by voters and election officials before the reading of the Warrant. Police Officer Edward C. Rock was on duty at the ballot box.

A sealed box purporting to contain 1900 ballots was turned over by the Town Clerk to Moderator Struthers, who in turn delivered the box to the ballot clerks. Mrs. Rita C. Cutler (D) and LeRoy W. Prentiss (R) served at the check-in table; Mrs. Adelaide E. Bartlett (R) and Edward D. O'Connell (D) at the check-out table at the ballot box.

Daniel H. Bates was the first voter to cast a ballot. Mrs. Ruth M. Fiske was the second voter and first woman to cast her ballot.

Indicator on ballot box at hourly intervals read as follows: 8 A.M. 20 ballots cast; 9 A.M., 40; 10 A.M., 71; 11 A.M., 111; 12 noon, 133; 1 P.M., 166; 2 P.M., 197; 3 P.M., 257; 4 P.M., 283; 5 P.M., 367; 6 P.M., 502; 7 P.M., 617; and 8 P.M., 711. There were 711 ballots cast and counted. Voting lists were checked. They corresponded. The count was 383 men and 328 women voting; total, 711, out of 1530 registered voters: (745 men and 785 women.) Nearly 47% of the vote was cast.

First removal of ballots was at 2.10 P.M. when 200 ballots were counted and placed in envelopes in the presence of election officials. At 2.30 P.M., Police Chief Daniel H. Bates relieved Officer Rock at the ballot box for awhile. At 5.30 P.M., 100 more ballots were removed and at 6 P.M., another 150 ballots.

After the polls closed at 8 P.M., 261 more ballots were removed from the ballot box for counting, making a total of 711.

Tellers reporting at 4 P.M. to canvass the votes were: Mrs. Helen I. Donham (R), Mrs. Elizabeth Victor (D), Mrs. Joanne H. McClure (D) and Ernest J. Henchey (R).

Tellers reporting at 6 P.M. were: Mrs. Ada W. White (R), Mrs. Ruth A. Sweet (R), Eugene J. Bissonnette (D), Richard S. Kelly (D), Mrs. Yvonne M. Bissonnette (D), Mrs. Norma L. Taft (R), Miss Helen A. Fay (R) and Mrs. Shirley E. Kirby (D).

Edward J. Furphy (D) and Edward L. Prentiss (R) reported at 6 P.M. to tabulate the vote and assist at ballot clerks' tables.

The Town Clerk administered the oath to above election officials before they assumed their duties.

Used and unused ballots were sealed and deposited in containers, sealed and placed in town vault.

Public declaration of the voting was read by the Moderator at 10.15 a.m.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE ADJOURNED ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

March 10, 1956

Moderator George W. Grebenstein called adjourned annual town meeting to order with more than a quorum (20 voters) present. The voting list was used at main entrance with Edward L. Orff (R) and Walter J. Stank (D) serving as checkers.

Motion of Chairman of Selectmen George N. Blakeslee, seconded by Daniel H. Bates, that the Town Counsel (J. Laurence Doyle) be allowed to sit on main floor.

Moderator Grebenstein requested all non-voters on main floor, if any, to move to the balcony.

On motion of Chairman of Selectmen George N. Blakeslee, seconded by Daniel H. Bates, assembly adopt Resolutions on

death of Malcolm C. Temple (February 12, 1956 at a Worcester hospital). Voters stand in one-minute tribute to late Mr. Temple. Copy sent to his family. Mr. Temple was Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, serving his second year on the Board. Also, presided as moderator for many years and served on other town committees.

Resolution:

"Whereas, this meeting has learned with deep regret of the untimely passing of our chairman of the Board of Selectmen, Malcolm C. Temple, an active town meeting participant since 1921, a former moderator, former Civil Defense administrator, member of many appointed committees, and an active participant in many activities that were for the betterment of our Town and its inhabitants, and

"Whereas, his passing is mourned by all of the community because of his generous, unselfish giving of time and himself to the Town, Grange, citizens and friends.

"Therefore, be it resolved, that the business of this meeting be suspended and that the members stand with bowed heads for one minute as a tribute to his memory, and be it resolved further that the clerk be directed to send a copy of these resolutions to Mrs. Malcolm C. Temple, wife of the deceased, and family, and that these resolutions be printed in the next annual town report."

Moderator Grebenstein addressed the assembly concerning assuming the office of town moderator and asked their cooperation.

Report of Committees

Knowlton School

Article 3. Voted: to accept report and dissolve the special committee's report concerning Knowlton School Building study, given by Arthur M. Bartlett. (Committee was appointed by Moderator at second adjourned annual Town Meeting, March 14, 1955.)

Chairman Bartlett of the special committee read in part: that the School Committee stated that it would cost too much to repair and remodel the building for school use. The special com-

mittee believe that for \$30,000 to \$40,000 (estimate to improve the Knowlton School structure) two or three rooms could be added to Memorial School Building.

Chairman Bartlett said the special committee recommends that the Town Counsel get a ruling to see if the Town can sell the building as it was not an outright gift but an exchange of a building.

(Land and old schoolhouse opposite the George W. Knowlton residence—now Knowlton Manor Nursing Home, Main St., was deeded by Town to Knowlton interests with members of the Knowlton family erecting the Knowlton School.)

1955 Town Report

Article 2. Voted: on motion of Norman E. Walker, seconded, to accept the 1955 town report as printed, subject to typographical corrections.

Halbert K. Struthers moved to amend the original motion, "subject to typographical corrections" which was accepted by Mr. Walker.

Establish Salaries and Expense

Article 4. In taking up Article 4, Moderator Grebenstein stated that each department designated would be taken up separately. If a voter wished to speak on any amount other than as printed in the Finance Committee report, that the item be "passed" for later action while article was under consideration. Items recommended by the Finance Committee and not "passed" would be first acted upon. No objection was voiced to this procedure.

Voted: To establish salaries and expenses as printed in Finance Committee report except those items which were "passed."

(a) Town Treasurer—Expense Account voted to be \$800.00; \$600.00 of which will be used for Tax Title items. Original recommendation for "Expense" was set at \$200.00.

(b) Tax Collector—No Voter spoke on this Dept. after item was passed. Motion of Daniel H. Bates, seconded, to set Salary at \$1100.00 and Expense, \$500.00 as recommended.

(c) Assessors—Norman E. Walker, Chairman of Assessors, moved that "Salaries" for Assessors total \$1260.00 in order to provide an increase of \$70 for each member. Lost on standing vote; Yes-38; No-50. Constable Alfred H. Nichols and Alvin P. Nichols made count. Motion then made by chairman of Selectmen George N. Blakeslee that "Salaries" for Assessors be set at \$350 each, total \$1050, and "Expenses," \$950.00, as originally recommended by Finance Committee. Voted on voice vote. Assessor Donald L. Varney stated he desired to be recorded as opposed to the Blakeslee motion.

(d) Town Accountant—Chairman of Selectmen George N.

Blakeslee moved that the "Salary" of the Town Accountant be established at \$750.00 and "Expenses" at \$125. (Finance Committee's recommendation-Salary \$600, and Expenses, \$125.) Motion lost on standing vote: Yes-15; No-41. Constables Nichols were counters. Ernest B. Porter then motioned that the "Salary" be established at \$600.00 and Expense, \$125.00. Voted

(e) Town Counsel—Chairman of Selectmen George N. Blakeslee moved that the "Salary" be set at \$50.00 (same as recommended) and "Expenses", \$300.00. Voted. Original recommendation was \$50.00 for "Expenses."

(f) Water-Sewer Commissioners—"Salaries." Thomas L. Francis, a commissioner, moved that salaries be increased \$25.00 each—two to receive \$100.00 and clerk member, \$125.00, total \$325.00 and "Expenses", \$100.00, as recommended. Lost on standing vote: Yes-36; No-43. Chairman of Selectmen George N. Blakeslee then moved that the commissioners' salaries be set at \$75.00 each for two members and \$100.00 for clerk member, total \$250.00 and \$100.00 for expenses. Voted.

(g) Water Dept. Superintendent—Salary. Walter E. Hopkins, chairman moved that the "salary" be set at \$600.00. Motion lost. Chairman of Selectmen George N. Blakeslee then moved "Salary" be established at \$500.00. Voted.

General Appropriations

Article 5. Moderator Grebenstein stated that if there was no objection, each item of the Finance Committee's report under this article would be considered separately. He further said that if a voter wished to be heard on an appropriation, the voter should say "Pass" when the item was called. After calling of the list was completed, Moderator Grebenstein said he would accept a motion to raise and appropriate money for items which had not been passed. Then, he said, the "passed" items would be considered separately and acted upon. No objection was voted.

"Passed" Appropriations then taken up for consideration:

(1) Ambulance: Voted, \$600.00 as requested.

(2) Fire Dept.: Voted, \$4,300. Fire Chief George N. O. Poirier moved the following breakdown as requested and recommended: General maintenance, \$3500.00; new hose, \$300.00; maintenance of alarm system, \$500.00.

(3) Forest Fire Dept.: Voted, motion by Selectman Gladys G. Crockett that \$1000.00 be appropriated: \$700.00 for general expenses, and \$300.00, new hose.

(4) Passed over Chapter 81, Chapter 90 Maintenance, Chapter 90 Pleasant St. Construction and Crockett Rd. under "General Appropriations" as there are special articles for each of these items.

(a) Sidewalks: Voted, \$600.00, motion of Road Commissioner Henry J. Poirier

(b) Signs: Voted, \$50.00, motion of Chairman of Selectmen George N. Blakeslee.

(c) Snow Removal: Voted, \$9000.00, motion of Road Commissioner Henry J. Poirier. He stated that to date (March 10, 1956) there had been \$7,850.00 expended since Jan. 1, 1956 in this account. (Three heavy snowstorms after above appropriation was made.)

(5) Insurance: Voted, \$1600.00 as requested and recommended.

(6) Library: Voted, \$1430.00.

(7) Memorial Day: Voted, \$400.00. Before final action, Daniel F. Bates moved for an appropriation of \$500.00. He subsequently withdrew his motion.

(8) Notes and Interest: Voted, on motion of Town Accountant Harvey L. Martindale "that the sum of \$27,000.00 be raised and appropriated to the Notes and Interest Account, and that the sum of \$10,000.00 be transferred from available funds in the town treasury to the Notes and Interest Account, making a total of \$37,000.00." No dissenting voice to vote, Moderator declared.

(9) Public Welfare-Adm., Social Worker and Clerk: Voted, \$2800.00, as requested, on motion of Clement J. Lambert. Finance Committee recommended \$2500.00. Donald L. Varney asked for

explanation of increase requested. Mr. Lambert said the increase was not entirely for salary account.

(10) Police: Voted, \$5,500 after lengthy discussion, sum to provide for a full-time officer.

Donald A. Wellman moved for an appropriation of \$3000.00 Chairman of Selectmen George N. Blakeslee moved to amend motion to \$5,500.00 which was favored by a standing vote, 55-Yes; 50-No. Counting were Constables Alfred H. Nichols and Alvin P. Nichols.

Selectman Blakeslee read the following statement before voting:

"The Police Department this year is asking \$5500.00
\$3500 is for a full-time policeman
\$2000 is for running the Police Department

"Our present Police Department is not adequately manned to perform its function in meeting present conditions and protecting a substantial investment.

"Our town has personal property valued at \$300,000 and real estate in excess of \$3,150,000. This investment accounts for roughly 50% of our income

"The businesses in town account for additional \$10,000 yearly income which is returned to the town from the State as our share of the state corporation tax.

"Every working person in town paying a state income tax contributes to a refund to the town of approximately \$25,000 annually.

"All residents of the town owning motor vehicles of various types are responsible for approximately \$16,000 which is returned to the town as our share of the excise tax on such equipment.

"The above statements account for 68% of the town's income and steps to protect it should be taken now.

"The businesses in town provide employment for many of our townspeople. They provide local necessary conveniences, and

have responded unselfishly to local needy and worthy situations.

"They deserve every consideration and additional protection of their investments that they may serve us better.

"You have a substantial investment in town property. Your Assessors value this property at \$256,590, real estate, and \$59,200, personal property but its replacement would cost a great deal more. To name specifically part of this investment, our schools, town hall, fire house and equipment, pumping station, water and sewerage system.

"Private industry with an investment much smaller than this protects their equity by hiring personal protection.

"Why shouldn't the town?

"The town should proceed with caution in this direction. Not whole 'hog' but by starting with one full-time police officer.

"This full-time officer should be our police chief who is appointed by your Board of Selectmen,

"The full-time police chief's duties would be as follows:

1. Perform all functions of this office as in the past for which he received a salary of \$600.
2. Four hours outside day duty, 6 days a week.
3. Four hours outside night duty, 6 days a week.
4. Responsible for daily report.
5. On call 24 hours a day, 6 days a week.
6. Check business, civic and religious property when on night duty at the beginning and end of this duty.
7. Check all town property at the beginning and end of his night duty.
8. Perform all the functions of a police officer when on outside duty to protect life, property and maintain the peace.

"Your vote for a full-time police officer, understanding the above to be his duties, makes it mandatory that your Board of Selectmen carry out your wishes.

"Your police chief will be on active duty 48 hours each week. Based on a 48-hour week and salary of \$3500 yearly this amounts

to \$1.40 per hour. In addition your police chief will be on 24-hours each day 6 days per week; will supervise his department and perform all necessary paper work required of the department. All of this for \$3500 per year.

"The town needs a full-time police officer and now is the time to act."

Others speaking included Donald A. Wellman, Kendall W. Wood, Raymond Whiting, Fire Chief George N. O. Poirier, Ernest B. Porter and Eugene Whiting, chairman of Finance Committee, who stated the committee favored deferment of a full-time officer at this time.

(11) Schools: Voted, \$145,973.07 as recommended by Finance Committee, on motion of Donald B. Johnson, retiring School Committeeman, with breakdown of money as recommended by School Committee: Salaries, \$55,635; general control, \$3,526; plant operations and maintenance, \$5,300; tuition, \$57,047.82, transportation, \$21,414.25 and general expenses, \$3,050. (See action under Article 17.)

(12) Street Lights: Voted, \$5,523.00, motion by Selectman George N. Blakeslee. (It was explained the appropriation would include cost of installing three street lights asked in Articles 17, 18 and 19, recommended by Finance Committee, if favorably acted upon.)

(13) Town Officers and Expenses; Voted, \$11,940.00, motion of Town Accountant Harvey L. Martindale.

(14) Tree Warden; Voted, \$1000.00, on motion of Donald R. Keniston. Sum of \$1550 originally asked; recommended by Finance Committee, \$350.00.

(15) Veterans' Services; Voted, \$4000.00, motion of Ernest B. Porter.

** (16) Reserve Fund; Voted, \$2500.00, transferred from Overlay Surplus Account, on motion of Town Accountant Harvey L. Martindale.

(17) Elm Beetle and Trees; Voted, \$1000.00. Arthur M. Bartlett moved to appropriate \$600; amended by Donald R. Keniston to \$1000.00.

(18) Vacation Fund, Highway Dept.; Voted, \$400.00, motion of Road Commissioner Henry J. Poirier.

(19) Civil Defense; Voted, \$200.00.

(20) Damage to Persons and Property; Voted, \$10.00.

(21) Hydrant Rental; Voted, \$2750.00.

(22) Water and Sewer Dept.; Voted, \$5250.00, motion of Commissioner Thomas L. Francis

(23) Water and Sewer, Maintenance, clerk and clerical supplies; Voted, \$400.00,

Authorization To Borrow Money

Article 6. Voted: on motion of Town Accountant Harvey L. Martindale, "that the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, be and hereby is authorized to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1956, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws. Unanimous vote declared by Moderator Grebenstein.

District Nursing Association

Article 7. Voted: on motion of Selectmen Gladys G. Crockett to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.00) to be used by the Upton District Nursing Association for pre-natal and pre-school nursing services, cripple children and well-child clinic services.

Pleasant Street

Chapter 90

Article 8. Voted on motion of Road Commissioner Henry J. Poirier to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dol-

lars (\$4000.00) to meet the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 90 Highway Work on Pleasant Street, and that the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, be authorized to borrow the sum of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00) on anticipation of the reimbursement from the State or County, or both, as their share of the cost of the work and to issue notes therefor for a period not exceeding one year from their dates.

Highways-Chapter 81

9. Voted: on motion of Road Commissioner Henry J. Poirier to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty-five Hundred Dollars (\$4500.00) to meet the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 81 Highway Work and that the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, be authorized to borrow the sum of Sixteen Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$16,500.00) in anticipation of reimbursements from the State as its share of the cost of the work, and to issue notes therefor for a period not exceeding one year from their date.

Highways-Chapter 90 Maintenance Work

Article 10. Voted: on motion of Road Commissioner Henry J. Poirier to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2000.00) to meet the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 90 Maintenance Highway Work, and that the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, be authorized to borrow the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4000.00) in anticipation of reimbursements from the State or County, or both, as their share of the cost of the work, and to issue notes therefor for a period not exceeding one year from their date.

Special Highway Purposes

Article 11. Road Commissioner Henry J. Poirier moved to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) as a Highway Fund, General, to be used for highway purposes. Lost by a standing vote: Yes-19; No-34.

County Retirement Commitment

Article 12. Voted: on motion of Town Accountant Harvey L. Martindale to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred

Ninety-Eight Dollars and Eight Cents (\$698.08) in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 32, Section 22, for Pension, Expense, Military Service and Workmen's Compensation Funds for the Worcester County Retirement System for 1956.

Hartford Avenue Drainage

Article 13. Voted: on motion of Road Commissioner Henry J. Poirier to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred Dollars (\$800.00) to meet the Town's share of a special Chapter 90 Maintenance project to repair and improve drainage on Hartford Avenue, near the DeMarco property, and that the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, be authorized to borrow Sixteen Hundred Dollars (\$1600.00) in anticipation of reimbursements from the State or County, or both, as their share of the work, and to issue notes therefor for a period not exceeding one year from their date.

Mrs. Gladys G. Crockett, a Selectman, declared she wished to be recorded as opposed to the motion.

Crockett Road

Article 14. Voted: on motion of Road Commissioner Henry J. Poirier to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.00) to continue improvement of Crockett Road.

Oiling South Street

Article 15. Voted: on motion of Road Commissioner Henry J. Poirier to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.00) for oiling South Street.

Improving West River Street

Article 16. Voted: on motion of Road Commissioner Henry J. Poirier to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.00) for widening and changing grade on West River Street.

Walter H. Allen and Eugene I. Whiting spoke on the article. It was explained by Road Commissioner Poirier that the article called for money to improve a section of the street where there had been some near-motor vehicle accidents.

1955 Dog Tax Refund to School Account

Article 17. Voted: on motion of Richard D. Stockwell, member of the School Committee, to appropriate the proceeds of the 1955 Dog Tax Refund, the sum of Seven Hundred Forty-Three Dollars and Fifty Eight Cents (\$743.58) received from the County to School Account, General Expenses.

Motions to adjourn meeting to Saturday (March 17) and then to Monday (March 12) lost.

Cross Street-Electric Light

Article 18. Voted: on motion of Selectman Gladys G. Crockett to appropriate Eighteen Dollars (\$18.00) from Street Light Appropriation for installation of one electric light on pole #2 on Cross Street.

Pleasant Street-Electric Light

Article 19. Voted: on motion of Selectman Gladys G. Crockett to appropriate Eighteen Dollars (\$18.00) from Street Light Appropriation for installation of one electric light on pole #23 on Pleasant Street.

Wildwood Avenue-Electric Light

Article 20. Voted: on motion of Selectman Gladys G. Crockett to appropriate Eighteen Dollars (\$18.00) from the Street Light Appropriation for installation of one electric light on Wildwood Avenue.

Automobile for Police Dept.

Article 21. Police Chief Daniel H. Bates motioned to appropriate the sum of Twenty-Five Hundred Dollars (\$2500.00) from unappropriated available money in the Town Treasury for purchase of a fully equipped automobile for the Police Department. Moderator declared motion lost on voice vote.

Increase School Committee
Three to Five Members

Article 22. Voted: on motion of Eugene I. Whiting, chairman of Finance Committee, to increase the number of members of the School Committee from three (3) to five (5) members as of the 1957 annual meeting, such increase to be made by then adding one (1) member whose term shall expire at the annual meeting in 1958 and by adding one (1) member whose term of office shall

expire at the annual meeting in 1959. Standing vote: Yes-51; No-32.

Fiske Avenue—Hartford Avenue

Article 1. Voted: on motion of Raymond K. Smith, seconded, move that the Town appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00) for the laying of water mains of not less than six (6) inches in diameter for a distance of not in excess of fifteen hundred and fifty (1550) feet in Fiske Avenue and Hartford Avenue, said sum to be raised by borrowing the same; and to authorize the Treasurer, pursuant to G. L. (ter. ed.) Chapter 44, Section 8, Clause 5, to borrow the said sum of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00) for the purpose and to issue and sell serial, coupon bonds or notes of the Town, each issue of said bonds or notes to bear such date, such rate of interest, to mature at such time, not to exceed fifteen (15) years from the date of the first issue, and to be in such form and to be sold in such manner as shall be determined by the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen. Vote: Yes-46; No-15.

Eugene I. Whiting, chairman of the Finance Committee, stated that in the opinion of the Committee this article held the most merit of any of the four articles and so recommended it. He further said that this extension would provide another main to pump water from the well field to the storage tank on Pratt Hill.

Walter E. Hopkins, chairman of the Water-Sewer Commission, stated there were six potential takers for the above section with the income over a 15-year period approximately \$3930 and the expense, plus interest, \$14,880. He said the plan called for one hydrant.

Other speakers included Mrs. Gladys G. Crockett, member of the Board of Selectmen; Donald A. Wellman, Robert E. Maynard and Mrs Shirley E. Kirby.

Moderator Grebenstein named Police Chief Daniel H. Bates to make the count. Mr. Grebenstein said that a two-thirds vote was required for favorable action as the motion called for borrowing of money.

Main Street-Hartford Avenue

Article 2. Voted: on motion of Miss Helena M. Goodridge, seconded, move that the Town appropriate the sum of Nine Thousand Dollars (\$9000.00) for the laying of the water mains of not less than six (6) inches in diameter for a distance of not in excess of thirteen hundred (1300) feet in Main Street and Hartford Avenue (West Upton), said sum to be raised by borrowing the same; and to authorize the Treasurer, pursuant to G. L. (ter. ed.) Chapter 44, Section 8, Clause 5, to borrow the said sum of Nine Thousand Dollars (\$9000.00) for the purpose and to issue and sell serial, coupon bonds or notes of the Town, each issue of said bonds or notes to bear such date, such rate of interest, to mature at such time, not to exceed fifteen (15) years from the date of the first issue, and to be in such form and to be sold in such manner as shall be determined by the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen. Eugene I. Whiting, chairman of the Finance Committee, stated that the Committee did not recommend the article for an economic reason.

Chairman Hopkins of the Water-Sewer Commission said there were seven potential takers with the estimated income for this proposed extension over a 15-year period, \$5210, and total expense, plus interest, estimated at \$11,160. He said the plan was for two Hydrants.

Hartford Avenue

Article 3. Voted: on motion of Arthur Kleber McCarty, seconded, move that the Town appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8000.00) for the laying of water mains of not less than six (6) inches in diameter for a distance of not in excess of eleven hundred (1100) feet in Hartford Avenue, said sum to be raised by borrowing the same; and to authorize the Treasurer, pursuant to G. L. (ter. ed) Chapter 44, Section 8, Clause 5, to borrow the said sum of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8000.00) for the purpose and to issue and sell serial, coupon bonds or notes of the Town, each issue of said bonds or notes to bear such date, such rate of interest, to mature at such time, not to exceed fifteen (15) years from the date of the first issue, and to be in such form and to be sold in such manner as shall be determined by the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen. Vote: Yes-49; No-16.

Chairman Whiting of the Finance Committee reported that the article was not recommended by the Committee.

Chairman Hopkins of the Water-Sewer Commission said that there was no potential taker at this time in section referred to in the article. He stated that the plan was for one hydrant.

Maple Street

L. (ter. ed.) Chapter 44, Section 8, Clause 5, to borrow the said sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4000.00) for the purpose and to issue and sell serial, coupon bonds or notes of the Town, each issue of said bonds or notes to bear such date, such rate of interest, to mature at such time, not to exceed fifteen (15) years from the date of the first issue, and to be in such form and to be sold in such manner as shall be determined by the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen. Vote: Yes-52; No-8.

Chairman Whiting of the Finance Committee reported that the Committee did not recommend the article for the same reason as two preceding articles.

Chairman Hopkins of the Water-Sewer Commission said that of the four extensions of water mains asked in the Warrant that the Maple Street line would be nearest to being a paying proposition. He said there are five potential takers; that the estimated income during the 15-year period would be \$3930 and cost \$4900. He added that one hydrant is planned for this extension.

Voted to dissolve Warrant and adjourn at 9.10 P.M.

REPORT OF MODERATOR

The *Annual Town Meeting* was held Saturday afternoon at 2 P.M., on March 10, 1956. 31 articles were in the Warrant, and acted upon. Total appropriations were \$323,812.64. For the first time in the 221-year history of Upton, the town is to have a full-time police officer. Police Chief Daniel H. Bates was the appointee of the Board of Selectmen.

At the opening of the meeting, resolutions were passed in memory of Malcolm C. Temple, who died February 12, while chairman of the Board of Selectmen. For many years he served as moderator and also on town committees. Voters stood in one-minute's silence in his memory after Chairman of Selectmen George N. Blakeslee read the resolutions.

A *Special Town Meeting* was held on Tuesday, May 23, 1956, at which time the voters discharged with a vote of thanks the special committee whose appointment to study the advisability of a regional school for Upton which was authorized in March of 1953. Under another article it was voted to have the moderator

name a new committee of three to continue such a study. The new committee is composed of Donald B. Johnson, Lawrence Atwood and Mrs. Elsie J. Craib.

Special Town Meetings were also held on July 31st and October 30th 1956.

I thank the voters and all the officials of the Town of Upton for the courtesy shown me during these four Town Meetings.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF CIVIL DEFENSE

To the Board of Selectmen:

The year 1956 has passed and the Town of Upton is still located in a *Reception Zone* in Area 3, Section 3B with the Sector Headquarters at the Milford High School, and Area Headquarters at the Lyman School in Westboro. *Theodore Apit* is the *Sector C. D. Director* and *Harold F. Rossi* the *Area C. D. Director*.

When a *State of Emergency* is declared, all Upton requests for outside aid and assistance are to be transmitted to the Sector 3B Headquarters via telephone (Milford 851) or over our gonset communicator which has been installed in the Selectmen's Room—the *Control Center*—at the Upton Town Hall. The frequency is 53.50.

Effective in January of 1957 Civil Defense Organizations become eligible to participate in the Surplus Property Program. This provides a reservoir of all types of usable equipment and supplies that can be procured for operational training, and stockpiling at negligible expense.

Considerable emphasis during the coming year will be placed on training. Since the M.C.D.A. Training Center opened at Topsfield last summer, residents of many towns and cities have taken these training courses in Radiac, Rescue and Welfare Services.

The federally financed Massachusetts Survival Planning Project should provide considerable assistance to local communities during the coming months. This is a private survey group making a study of all phases of Civil Defense with the basic purpose of assisting communities in the formulation of adequate local Civil Defense plans. It may be of interest to you to know that on December 14, 1956 the writer completed a two weeks course on Preliminary Operational Survival Planning Program (POSPP) at the M.C.D.A. Training Center, Topsfield, Mass.

Radioactive Fallout. The term "*fallout*" is used to describe radioactive material produced by a *Nuclear Explosion*. The par-

ticles are contaminated by radioactive products of the bomb and fall back to earth over a wide area and are *extremely dangerous* to you. The only way to detect a dangerous fallout area is by radiological monitoring with instruments to measure radiation. During four of the Saturdays in November, your director in conjunction with Eugene I. Whiting attended courses at Holy Cross College from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Father Thomas Smith of the Physics Department conducted the course. *Mr. Whiting* will be the *Upton Radiac Officer*. Much thought has been given to *Your Survival* and he will soon set up Monitoring classes in Upton. Two complete *Radiac Training Kits* have been supplied by the M.C.D. A. *without cost* to Upton for the training of our Service Monitors. *The co-operation of all is solicited.*

Air Raid Instructions. Civil Defense Air Raid Instruction cards (size 8" x 11") revised were delivered to *every household* during the early part of 1956. Those households not receiving these cards should notify your local director. *This is very important*, because we here in Upton being in the Reception Zone have been scheduled to shelter 6000 evacuees from Shrewsbury who would arrive via Routes 122 and 140 in case of an enemy caused disaster.

C. D. Meetings. There have been many meetings that the writer has attended during 1956; some at Milford High School as well as at the Little Theatre, Worcester, such as Police, Fire, Rescue, Welfare, Radiac, Industry, Communications, etc.

The *First Aid Class* of the American Red Cross concluded a ten (10) weeks course on December 10. The following persons received certificates:

Will any local person holding a Red Cross First Aid certificate, who desires to become an instructor please advise your local C. D. Director, for there is need of additional First Aid Instructors, as well as for persons to take the First Aid Course. *Each local family should be represented.*

Use of Matching Funds. The Forest Fire Department purchased a Hall F. V. Z. Portable Pump 2½", which normally would cost \$395.00 for \$197.50 through C. D. Matching Funds, thus saving a substantial sum of money for the town; so again I wish to call your attention to the advisability of installing a Two Way Radio Communication System for Fire, Police, Highway, Sewer and Water Departments before it is too late. Portable sets may be obtained. Please refer to the writers 1955 C. D. Report.

WATER AND SEWER COMMISSIONERS

For the year ending December 31, 1956

We held our first meeting Tuesday, March 9, 1956 and elected Walter E. Hopkins, chairman, and John J. Fitch, clerk for the coming year. We appointed Henry J. Poirier, Supt., and Mrs. Ashley M. Perkins, clerk and bookkeeper.

This past year we had installed a new metal cover on the settling tank at our sewer beds. This corrects a very bad safety hazard and also enables an easier method of cleaning. We had removed, three non-working hydrants at residence of Henry Smith, at gate of fence back of factory and Maple Avenue. These hydrants were replaced by new ones under new construction. We have left to do on repairs, Depot St. in West Upton that should be replaced with a new water main and hydrants. We painted the windows and repaired the door at our pumping station. We should in the near future install an automatic heating system in Pump House. We intend to seal all meters in near future and replace any out of order.

NEW CONSTRUCTION

We installed a 6-inch main on Lower Brooks Street, approx. 400 feet. We gained five new water customers, and installed a new hydrant giving fire protection to entire street.

We installed an 8-inch main on Hartford Ave. and completed a 6-inch main from Fiske Avenue. This connected three dead ends together, also giving better fire protection to entire Town. This enables us to pump water three different ways in an emergency. We installed on Hartford Ave., 3 new hydrants and 1 on Fiske Avenue. We gained on Hartford Ave. and Fiske Ave., nineteen new customers. We also installed a 10-inch water main on Maple Street and one new hydrant. We gained on customers on Maple St., the sum of six.

We feel that the Town should slow down on new construction in future as we are going the wrong way to ever becoming self-supporting. We feel that a sum of money should be set up to be used each year on new construction and install small extensions each year and grow with our system and income. By small extensions, we mean a street could be laid over a period of four or five years, and installing such extensions where we would receive the most income and future building. The water system is becoming larger and will require more maintenance as we go forward, also will require more money to operate.

Chapter 81 funds, used for maintenance of 81 roads, including graveling, drainage, patching and surface treatments.

Chapter 90 Maintenance was used for oiling and maintenance of Hopkinton, Mendon, and Westboro streets.

Chapter 90 Construction project on Pleasant St. was held up due to late arrival of specifications. Trees and stumps have been removed and now ready for fill.

Due to the severe winter, the \$9,000.00 Snow Removal appropriation was insufficient and additional funds were necessary.

On Crockett Rd. more gravel added, two curves widened, and drainage improved by additional culverts.

Pleasant St. sidewalk completed as planned and Maple Ave. sidewalk resurfaced to the Donald property.

Christian Hill Rd. and South St. were oiled as planned.

On Taft St., just off Elm, twin culverts replaced old stone culverts, damaged in flood thus eliminating a very hazardous condition; a new culvert installed on Stoddard St., and on River St., a large multi-plate arch culvert was installed to take care of of the water flowing from Pratt into Mill Pond.

Bridges damaged in the flood have had the following repairs: abutments, metal I beams, and new deck replacement on West River St.; replanking of large South St. bridge; abutment on west side of Pleasant St. bridge; new wing walls on Mendon St. box culvert; and completion of lower Hartford Ave., Station St., Fiske Mill Rd., and both bridges on Fowler St.

At this time, I wish to thank all the Town Departments, the Department of Public Works, and the townspeople, for their cooperation, in any way, during the year.

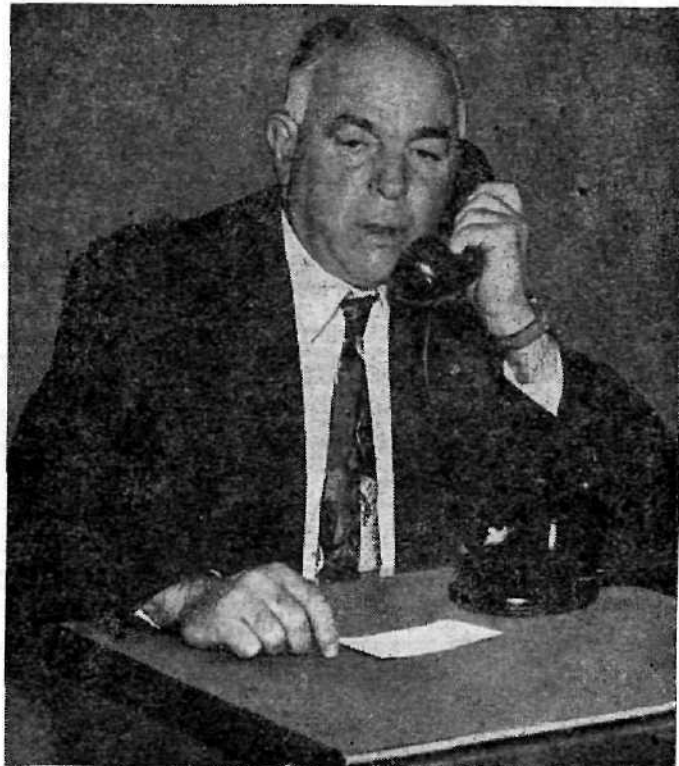

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The Selectmen met the evening of March 6th and organized for the coming year. G. N. Blakeslee was elected chairman of the Board by Ballot. George G. Newton was re-appointed clerk of the Board of Selectmen and Daniel H. Bates was re-appointed Chief of Police.

By vote of the Townspeople at the annual Town Meeting the Selectmen were authorized to appoint a full time police officer. Daniel H. Bates was appointed the Town's first full time police officer.

Your Board declared the Town in a state of emergency twice during the year due to lack of funds in the Snow Removal Account caused by the blizzards occurring between March 19th and April 9th.

Your chairman was appointed by the Board as Liaison Officer to represent the Town in bringing to a conclusion the program of state and federal assistance for the rebuilding of bridges lost in the hurricane of August 19th and 20th, 1955. These agencies built a new culvert under River St., new bridges on Station St., Hartford Ave. and Fowler St. Major repairs to the Mendon St., Fowler St., West River St., and Pleasant St. bridges were paid for by these agencies.

The dam site, flowage rights and title in the former Jourdan's Pond area and also the former Box Mill Pond area have been purchased per the Townspeople's authorization of the Special Town Meeting of Dec. 22, 1955.

Suits against the Town by the City of Worcester for bills owed by the Welfare Department dating from 1947 to April 24th, 1956 and totaling in excess of \$1506.00 were settled for \$628.00.

The petition of Fred Fiske et Alii vs. Town of Upton for assessment of damages resulting from the relocation of Pleasant Street is still pending. This case has been looked into thoroughly during the year with the thought of an out of court settlement. To date, no agreement has been reached.

The year 1956 has been a busy one for this Board. The valued assistance from the various Boards and Town Officers has been instrumental in lightening our load. Our thanks for your generous cooperation.

On December 12, 1956 the purchase of the Jourdan Pond property and the Box Mill Pond property was consummated.

I wish to take this opportunity to express my appreciation to all Town officers for their assistance and co-operation and to thank them and the citizens for their many courtesies extended to me.

REPORT OF STATE AUDIT

I submit herewith my report of an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Upton for the fiscal year 1955, made in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 44, General Laws. This is in the form of a report made to me by Mr. William Schwartz, Assistant Director of Accounts.

Sir:

As directed by you, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Upton for the fiscal year 1955, and report thereon as follows:

The financial transactions as recorded on the books of the several departments receiving or disbursing money for the town were examined and checked in detail.

The accountant's books were examined, checked, and compared with the records of the several departments in which money

is collected or bills are committed for collection and with the records of the town treasurer.

An analysis was made of the ledger, the appropriations, loan authorizations, and transfers being compared with the town clerk's records of town meeting votes and with the records of the finance committee. A trial balance was drawn off proving the ledger to be in balance, and, after the necessary adjusting entries resulting from the audit were made, a balance sheet showing the financial condition of the town on December 31, 1955 was prepared and is appended to this report.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked in detail. The recorded receipts were analyzed and compared with the accountant's records, with the departmental records of payments to the treasurer, and with other sources from which the treasurer received money, while the disbursements were compared with the accountant's books and with the treasury warrants.

The cash balance on February 29, 1956 was verified by examination of a savings bank book and by reconciliation of the bank balances with statements furnished by the banks in which town funds are deposited.

The records of payroll deductions for Federal taxes and for the county retirement system were examined and checked. The amounts withheld were compared with the treasurer's recorded receipts, and the payments to the Federal depository and the county treasurer were checked with the vouchers on file.

The payments on account of maturing debt and interest were compared with the amounts falling due and with the cancelled securities and coupons on file. The outstanding coupons were listed and reconciled with the balance in the bond and coupon account as shown by a statement furnished by the bank in which such funds are deposited.

The savings bank books and securities representing the investments of the trust and investment funds in the custody of the treasurer and the trustees were examined and listed, the income being proved and the withdrawals being verified.

The records of tax title redemptions and tax titles taken by the town, as well as of tax title foreclosures, were checked in

detail. The outstanding tax titles were listed and all transactions were checked with the collector's and the accountant's books.

The books and accounts of the town collector were examined and checked in detail. The accounts outstanding at the time of the previous examination, as well as all subsequent commitment lists of tax, excise, departmental, and water accounts, were audited and compared with the warrants issued for their collection. The receipts as posted to the commitment books were compared with the cash book record of collections; the payments to the treasurer were verified; the abatements were checked with the assessors' and other departmental records of abatements granted; and the outstanding accounts were listed and proved with the accountant's ledger controls.

The outstanding accounts were further verified by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, the replies received thereto indicating that the accounts, as listed, are correct, with the exception of certain payments made to a deputy collector for which an accounting has not yet been made to the town, and which are in the process of investigation.

The collector's cash balance on February 29, 1956 was verified by actual count of the cash in the office.

The computation of the tax rate for the year 1955 was examined and checked. The records of abatements granted by the board of assessors were checked with the books of the collector and the accountant, while the warrants to the collector were listed and compared with the detailed commitments.

The town clerk's records of dog and sporting licenses issued and of miscellaneous receipts were examined and checked, the payments to the town being checked with the treasurer's cash book, and the payments to the Division of Fisheries and Game being compared with the receipts on file.

The appropriations as voted by the town meetings were listed from the records of the town clerk and compared with the aggregate appropriations raised by the assessors.

The surety bonds of the various town officials required by law to furnish them were examined and found to be in proper form.

The records of receipts of the board of selectmen, the scaler of weights and measures, the wire inspector, and the milk inspector, as well as of the police, fire, health, highway, public welfare, veterans' services, school library, and cemetery departments, were examined and checked, the payments to the treasurer being verified.

In addition to the balance sheet, there are appended to this report tables showing reconciliations of the treasurer's and collector's cash, summaries of the tax, excise, departmental and water accounts, as well as schedules showing the condition and transactions of the trust and investment funds.

During the progress of the audit cooperation was extended by the various town officials, for which, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, I wish to express appreciation.

REPORT OF PLANNING BOARD

December 31, 1956

To the Board of Selectmen of Upton:

The Planning Board submits its first report.

For the past few years many of our residents have considered the need for municipal planning in Upton. These ideas finally found themselves being studied by special committees appointed for that purpose. After consideration, it was recommended that the town elect a five-member planning board which it did in 1956. The 1955 town report contains the report of the committee on planning and zoning and we refer you to that for a history of the matter, and the reason for the birth of a Planning Board in Upton.

The Board organized March 12, 1956. It held fourteen regular meetings, met with representatives of the Department of Commerce, Division of Planning, for advice and guidance. On September 6, 1956 a public hearing was held and Rules and Regulations for Subdivision Control in Upton were adopted and the same became effective as of that date. Qualifications were filed at the Registry of Deeds on September 26, 1956.

The Board is presently working on the matter of obtaining an official map for Upton.

Generally speaking, the effect of rules and regulations for subdivision control in our town means that the voters have placed under the control of the Planning Board the future development and subdivision of land in Upton. The Regulations define "Subdivision" as "the division of a tract of land into two or more lots in such manner as to require provision for one or more new ways, not in existence when the subdivision control law became effective in the Town of Upton, to furnish access for vehicular traffic to one or more of such lots, and shall include re-subdivision, and, when appropriate to the context, shall relate to the process of subdivision or the land or territory subdivided."

Briefly, the regulations prevent the haphazard, catch-as-catch-can build-it-and-worry-after sort of development in Upton.

They provide for the orderly and scientific development of our unbuilt areas into sightly and creditable neighborhoods. The subdivision control law may, in a sense, offend our ancient concept of land ownership. It may appear to some as an abuse of the constitutional police power. The purposes of the regulations however are to protect the safety, convenience and welfare of all the inhabitants of Upton; to insure adequate sanitary conditions, provide for safe and convenient travel, adequate public utilities, *without the forced and unsolicited additional burden that sudden growth places upon the taxpayers.* In other words, the regulations require that the sub-divider must, if he builds a new neighborhood in Upton, provide adequately in his subdivision, the common comforts and necessities which modern society no longer now regards as luxuries.

Of equal, if not of greater importance, and a parallel to sound planning, is the crying need for zoning in Upton. We have under consideration, a tentative set of Zoning Ordinances or By-Laws which will, after further study and presentation to various civic organizations, be presented to the voters for adoption. We cannot over-emphasize our sincere belief that Upton needs Zoning! The 60th Amendment to the Constitution provided that the General Court shall have the power to limit buildings to their use and construction to specified districts of cities and towns. In 1918 Upton had this power, as it has it today. What progress in retrospect could we see today had our citizens then have seen the advantage of zoning. We view today the product of an unplanned, unzoned town. All great improvements and reforms have taken years to final blossom and fruit. It is with serious but optimistic hope that we commend to the voters of Upton, when zoning regulations are presented for adoption, the long-range view of tomorrow, to protect the good we already have, and to build by caring, a better Upton for tomorrow.

From the support and cooperation of our interested citizens and town officials, we take heart.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

To the Trustees of the Upton Library:

The librarian respectfully submits her annual report with library statistics, list of periodicals, and the catalog of new books.

Books have been added to the Dr. Carpenter Alcove as required.

Gifts of magazines and books have been received from Mrs. Eleanor Merrill, Miss Rubelle Keniston, Mrs. Helen Bentley, Mrs. A. A. Bigelow, Mr. Chester Walker, Mr. David Colcord, Mr. Carl Paulson and the Kiwanis Club.

A check for \$100 was given to the librarian by the Kiwanis Club for the children's work. Part of it was spent for new books. Due to the increased circulation of children's books and the wide span that they must cover from pre-school picture books through all the grades up to the High School level a larger expenditure is needed and greatly appreciated. New books bought with this money are designated as gifts in the catalog.

This money was also spent on material for the summer reading clubs. There were two large and active clubs with a total of 45 children. Each member was given a map of the United States with colored cut outs to paste on when a book was read about each state. The children were most enthusiastic and many of the maps were completed, others are still working on them. A reading award was given to each child and a diploma. For the state of Massachusetts we read the life of Clara Barton and at the end of the summer, we visited her birthplace in Oxford. Mrs. Laurie Thompson, Mrs. Robert Griffin and Mrs. Jonas Carter generously helped with the transportation.

The Story Hour for the younger children was well attended with a registration of 55. With the Kiwanis gift, I was able to take this group to The Toy Cupboard Theater in South Lancaster to see the marionette show of Cinderella. Mr. Laurie Thompson generously took us in his bus free of charge. Four mothers accompanied me, Mrs. Jonas Carter, Mrs. Edward Prentiss, Mrs. Dorothy Francis, and Mrs. Donald Johnson.

Mr. and Mrs. Dudley Merrill gave the library a desk, a set of the Encyclopedia Brittanica with a bookcase, and a number of books on gardening, science and fiction. We were very sorry to have them leave Upton. Mrs. Merrill had done so much for the library and was so interested in it. This Christmas she sent lollypops to the Story Hour and a beautiful winter bouquet for the library desk.

In October the Unitarian Ladies' Alliance invited me to talk about the children's work in the library and gave me a gift of \$5.00 to spend on children's books.

I cannot tell how deeply I appreciate these gifts and the interest and cooperation of so many people.

For Book Week, posters were exhibited at the schools and library with the slogan "It's Always Book Time." Book reviews were given for each grade. Book marks were distributed and a large number of new books were on display.

We have loaned 100 books to the Memorial School Library.

For Art Week, paintings by Mrs. Alice Hall and members of the Upton Art Guild were displayed at the library.

During the fall your librarian took a nine week course in Library Reference Work given by the State Division of Education at the Edgewell Library in Framingham on Thursday evenings. It was an interesting and very helpful course.

Five years of the National Geographics have been rebound in Topic form with a Topical Index. These will prove of great help to the school children in looking up subjects.

The hair cloth sofa has been reupholstered in a pretty cherry red and does much to brighten up the interior of the library.

I wish to thank Miss Helen Fay for assisting me in the spring and for taking charge of the library during my vacation.

I also thank the Trustees for their generous support and cooperation.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Upton School Committee
Upton, Massachusetts

Mrs. Elsie Craib and Gentlemen:

It is a pleasure to submit my fourth annual report on the progress of the Public Schools of Upton. This report is designed to interpret to the citizens of Upton through its School Committee, detailed information, together with certain highlights concerning the activities of the Public School System during the year 1956.

Perhaps the outstanding event was the Workshop for Elementary School Teachers at Memorial School, Friday, October the 5th. Participating towns included Hopedale, Upton, Bellingham, Uxbridge, Mendon and Whitinsville. The theme of the Workshop was "Improvement in Written Expression." Panel discussions and group meetings were held by teachers of kindergarten, primary, intermediate and upper grades. This proved to be a stimulating experience for all teachers.

The Superintending School Committee expresses thank you to all who made a contribution to this Workshop.

The Special School of Instruction established at Grafton under Chapter #514 of the General Laws, and attended by nine Upton pupils, has been a tremendous educational experience for these youngsters. It enjoys the services of specially trained personnel including teachers, psychologists, psychiatrists and a guidance counselor. These people are all on call from the Youth Guidance Center. The cost of the program to the Town of Upton is reimbursed on a 50% basis by the Commonwealth.

A new testing program was introduced into the Upton schools for the first time this year. Namely the "Science Research Associates Tests." These tests were administered to grades four, five and six. This achievement battery measures mastery of four basic skills, language perception, language arts, reading and arithmetic. The local norm compares favorably with the national norm in all

areas. It is keyed to the modern elementary curriculum. The results provide the administrator with vital data for new appraisal of student achievement and curriculum effectiveness.

The "Science Research Associates Mental Abilities Tests" were administered to grade one. It purports to measure reasoning, and space perception, and numbers.

The School Committee came to grips this year with the problem of admitting children to school before they were socially, emotionally and physically ready for the first grade. The entrance age was increased to five years, nine months from five years, six months, thus assuring a greater degree of maturity, resulting in a better school adjustment.

The citizens of Upton are to be commended for the continued study of the secondary school housing problem. This year we are sending 222 students to Northbridge and Grafton at a cost of \$50,672.85. Both the number of students and the cost will increase tremendously in the next three years. The Upton School Committee is in receipt, from the Northbridge School Committee, of a letter stating that Upton students cannot be accommodated after 1960. Rising costs and expanding enrollment continue to plague the efforts of school committees to carry out their mandate, which is to furnish adequate training and to provide facilities to carry on the program.

The following tables giving comparative costs will be of interest to the citizens of Upton. May I commend to you a study of the financial report submitted by the School Committee, with the reports from the supervisors of art, music, and the operation of the cafeteria.

For the continued support and counsel given to me by the School Committee and for the helpfulness of all interested in the Public Schools, I am indeed grateful.

I herewith submit my annual report as Supervisor of Music.

The aim of music instruction is to cause children to know, to love, and to understand music in as many forms as possible, and thus to bring added joy into their lives and added culture and refinement into their nature.

Some of the objectives of music education are first, to provide maximum individual growth and development through music activities, resulting in desirable attitudes, interests, relationships, and skills. Second, to provide joyful experiences with beauty, and to promote individual development in music understanding and skills by participating appropriately in all areas of musical experience.

Music assists the child in understanding and appreciating his own culture, and other contemporary cultures, and past cultures. A music education program is a sequence of aesthetic experiences which provide enjoyment, relaxation and personality development.

Several programs have been performed throughout the entire school system in order to give students the benefit of active participation in vital musical experiences.

Rote songs are taught in the first and second grades. Note reading is introduced in the third grade and is enlarged upon in the fourth, fifth and sixth grades, where two and three part music is sung.

In closing, I would like to extend my sincere thanks to the Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Hilyard, to the School Committee, and to the teachers for their assistance and cooperation.

REPORT OF THE HANDWRITING SUPERVISOR

Dear Mr. Hilyard:

Once again I am pleased to report on the operation of the handwriting program for the past year.

Your teachers have continued to give us the splendid co-operation which has become traditional in your schools and for the many courtesies extended to me and my personnel I am most grateful.

Our records show at the conclusion of June 1956 that 100% of the papers scored were Excellent or Good. It is reasonable to conclude, therefore, that 100% of the papers were eminently satisfactory. No papers were rated Fair or Unsatisfactory.

During the past school year we graded and diagnosed approximately 10,800 samples of handwriting for your pupils. A formal test was administered at four teaching-week intervals and a report was furnished each teacher in writing giving a careful diagnosis of the handwriting of each pupil in the room. We supplied the following instructional and motivational materials to your pupils and teachers: teacher outlines and folders, pupil folders, motivation graphs, individual certificates to pupils who qualified, diagnostic charts, handedness tests, envelopes, seals, etc.

Our primary objective is to teach your students to read and write both cursive handwriting and hand lettering in order that they may have these two tools as efficient aids in school, business, and social correspondence. At each grade level we attempt to achieve the standard norm in speed and never lose sight of the fact that the concomitants of neatness, accuracy, and attention to detail in doing work are desirable characteristics that need to be developed along with technical skill.

I hereby submit the annual report of the School Health Program.

Daily report of absentees are given to the nurse by teachers. A conference is held with the principal and teachers as to referrals for care, advise and home visits to be made.

Physical examinations have been completed by Dr. McKernan. Notices of defects found were sent to parents and follow-up work is carried on throughout the year.

The Audiometer Test for hearing has been completed.

The Massachusetts Vision Test is being given.

The Patch Test was given to pupils in grades one and four. All were found negative.

The Salks Poliomyelitis Vaccine, sponsored by The Upton Board of Health, has been given to pupils with their parents consent. Ninety-eight percent have received two injections.

Our five pupils who came down with Polyomyelitis last year are attending classes in school.

Pupils with prolonged illnesses received instructions by teachers in their homes, this helps the pupil to keep up with their classes.

I wish to thank Mr. Hilyard, The School Committee, Teachers and Parents for their cooperation.

I hereby submit the annual report of the Upton School Cafeteria.

Our teachers, cafeteria employees and our janitor, Mr. Bedard, have been most cooperative in helping to accomplish the aims of the School Lunch Program.

The School Lunch Program continues to grow with 74% of our pupils buying hot lunches and 96% consuming milk. We are still striving to have all Upton pupils participate in the School Lunch Program or the Special Milk Program in 1957.

In January we are planning to purchase needed equipment to further improve our cafeteria program.

The financial statement follows:

Receipts:
