



ANNUAL TOWN MEETING WARRANT

MARCH 7 and MARCH 12, 1960

Worcester, ss.

To the Constable of the Town of Upton, in the County
of Worcester, Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts,
you are directed to notify the inhabitants of the town of
Upton, qualified to vote in Elections and in Town Affairs,
to meet at the Town Hall, in said Upton, on Monday the
Seventh day of March 1960, punctually, at Seven (7)
o'clock A.M. to cast their vote for the following Town
Officers:

Article 1. To choose necessary officers for the en-
suing year: Moderator, Town Treasurer, five (5) Con-
stables, Tree Warden and Road Commissioner, all for
one year; one member of the Board of Selectmen, one
Collector of Taxes, one member of Assessors of Taxes,
one member of the School Committee, one member of the
Board of Public Welfare, one member of the Sewer and
Water Commission, one member of the Cemetery Commis-
sion, one member of the Park Commission, three Trustees
of the Public Library, and one member of the Board of
Health, all for three years; one member of the Planning
Board and one member of the Housing Authority, each
for five years; one member of the School Committee (to fill
a vacancy) for one year, and one member of the Planning
Board (to fill a vacancy) for four years.

All of the above to be voted for upon one ballot.

The polls shall be closed at Eight (8) o'clock P.M.
on the day of said meeting.

The remaining articles in the Warrant shall be acted
upon at an adjourned meeting of the voters in Town Hall,

Saturday afternoon, March 12, 1960 at Two (2) o'clock P.M.

Article 2. To hear reports of all Town Officers or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 3. To hear the reports of any Committees appointed by the Town or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to fix the salary and compensation of all elective officers of the Town as provided by Section 108, Chapter 41, General Laws, as amended: Moderator, Selectmen, Town Treasurer, Town Clerk, Collector of Taxes, Assessors of Taxes, Board of Public Welfare, School Committee, Cemetery Commission, Constables, Trustees of Public Library, Park Commission, Tree Warden, Road Commissioner, Water and Sewer Commission, Housing Authority, Planning Board and the Board of Health, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 5. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray expenses of Town Departments for the ensuing year, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Four Hundred Dollars, (\$1,400.00) to be used by the Upton District Nursing Association for prenatal, postnatal, and preschool nursing services, crippled children and well-child clinic services, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1960, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred and Four Dollars and Forty-Seven Cents (\$1,504.47) in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 32, Section 22, General Laws, for Pension Fund, Expense Fund, Military Service Fund and Workmen's Compensation Fund of the Worcester County Retirement System, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy-Five Dollars (\$75.00), said sum to be applied to the Inspector of Animals Account to cover an unpaid bill incurred in 1959, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy-Five Dollars and Seventy Cents (\$75.70), said money to pay unpaid bills incurred in 1959 in the Department of Veterans Services, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred and Thirty-Four Dollars (\$134.00), said money to pay unpaid bills under Industrial Accidents incurred in 1959, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to have the Town Treasurer elected for a Three Year (3 YR) term beginning with the 1961 Annual Election, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate from unappropriated available funds in the Town Treasury the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00), said sum to be added to the Stabilization Fund established in 1958, in accordance with the provisions of Section 5B of Chapter 40 of the General Laws, as amended, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty-Five Hundred Dollars (\$4,500.00), for painting and reconditioning the Water Tank, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00), for a water mains (not less than 6 inches) extension account, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the proceeds of the 1959 Dog Tax Refund, the sum of Six Hundred Thirty-Seven Dollars and Thirteen Cents (\$637.13) received from the County, to the School Salary Account, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to have a Committee of three appointed from the floor to obtain estimates on cost and all other data pertaining to the erection of a World War II Memorial on the Town Common this being requested by the Marshall-Leland Post No. 173, American Legion, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Five Hundred Seventy-Five Dollars (\$4,575.00), for Chapter 81 Highway Work, said money to be used in conjunction with any money allotted by the State for this purpose, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00), for Chapter 90 Maintenance Highway Work, said money to be used in conjunction with any money allotted by the State or County, or both, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00), for Chapter 90 Highway Construction on Pleasant Street, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00), for General Highway Maintenance and Bet-

terments on Chapter 81 Roads, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to dispose of, to add to, and/or alter the present Street Lighting System to conform to the report submitted to the voters at the last Annual Town Meeting by the Planning Board, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Dollars, (\$600.00), said money to be used for culvert work on Warren Road, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00), said money to be used for raising and re-building the burn on North Main Street, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00), said money to be used on the installation of a culvert on Plain Street, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) to have the valuation of taxable property and the owners of such property published and to have such publications sold to any person who desires to purchase one, the purchase price not to exceed one dollar (\$1.00), as petitioned by Robert R. Mainville and others, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to change Chapter 2, Section 3 of the Town of Upton By-Laws to read that "a number of Fifty (50) registered voters shall constitute a quorum", as petitioned by David J. LeClaire and others, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to have a Committee of Five, (appointed by the Moderator), to work with the Planning Board regarding the amending or

abolition of the present zoning laws, the Committee to report back not later than the Annual Town Meeting in 1961, as petitioned by Gerard J. Matthews and others, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to abolish the Zoning Laws as adopted by vote on October 1, 1958, as petitioned by Raymond E. Griffin and others, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into and execute an agreement or agreements with the United States of America for the relocation, rearrangement and/or alteration of Town roads as may be necessary as a result of the West Hill Dam and Reservoir Project, or take any other action pertaining thereto.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to accept a layout, relocation or alteration of South Street made by the Board of Selectmen, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for the Industrial Accident Fund, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from the Excess and Deficiency Account, a sum not to exceed Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) to be used by the Board of Assessors of Taxes in establishing the 1960 Tax Rate, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

And you are directed to serve this Warrant, by posting attested copies thereof at each of the following places in said Town, seven days at least before the time of holding said meeting: — At each of the Post-offices and on the Town House in said Town.

Hereof fail not, and make due return of this Warrant with your doings thereon, to the Town Clerk, before the time and place of meeting aforesaid.

To see if the Town will authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the costs of land takings resulting or to result from the West Hill Dam and Reservoir Project, such monies to be reimbursed by the Federal Government, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

And you are directed to serve this Warrant, by posting attested copies thereof at each of the following places in said Town, seven days at least before the time of holding said meeting: — At each of the Post-offices and on the Town House in said Town.

PROCEEDINGS OF ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

MARCH 7, 1960

Pursuant to the Warrant, Moderator Halbert K. Struthers called the meeting to order at 7 A.M.

After the reading of the call of the meeting and Article 1 for the choosing of all necessary officers and that action on remaining articles would be taken up at adjourned Annual Town Meeting, Saturday, March 12, 1960 at 2 P.M., Chairman of Selectmen Ernest B. Porter moved that reading of other articles be waived. Motion was seconded and voted. Moderator Struthers then read the remainder of the Warrant and the Constable's return.

Preceding the opening of the meeting, Moderator Struthers invited voters in the hall to inspect the ballot box which was open. The box indicator was set at 0000. Police Officer Edward C. Rock was on duty at the ballot box. After inspection by the voters the ballot box door was locked with the keys in custody of Officer Rock.

A sealed box containing the ballots was turned over by the Town Clerk to Moderator Struthers. The latter in turn delivered the box to the ballot clerks.

Checkers at the in-coming table were Mrs. Rita C. Cutler and George W. Grebenstein and at the out-going table at the ballot box, Mrs. Catherine M. Saucier and LeRoy W. Prentiss. They were sworn to perform said duties before the polls opened.

Allan V. Rawson was the first male voter. Mrs. Charlotte H. Blodgett was the first voter to cast a ballot.

Indicator at the ballot box at hourly intervals read as follows: 8 A.M., 33; 9 A.M., 51; 10 A.M., 80; 11 A.M., 136; 12 Noon, 177; 1 P.M., 230; 2 P.M., 292; 3 P.M., 339;

4 P.M., 458; 5 P.M., 571; 6 P.M., 772; 7 P.M., 955, and 8 P.M., 1102. During the casting of ballots, one became caught in the mechanism. In the presence of Officer Rock and election officials, the ballot was freed, the indicator recording twice in the operation. There were 1101 ballots cast.

Tellers to canvass the votes were: Reporting at 2 P.M., Mrs. Ada W. White (R), Mrs. Claire B. Praskiewicz (D), Ernest J. Henchey (R) and Mrs. Helen T. Jonis (D). Other tellers reporting later were: Mrs. Helen I. Donham (R), Mrs. Joanne H. McClure (D), Mrs. Helene D. Robinson (R), Mrs. Elizabeth Saucier (D), Mrs. Adelaide E. Bartlett (R), Mrs. Yvonne M. Bissonnette (D), Mrs. Muriel I. Mitchell (R), Mrs. Rose E. Davis (R), Mrs. Elizabeth Victor (D), Mrs. Virginia F. Craib (R), Mrs. Shirley E. Kirby (D), Mrs. Marion Mainville (D), Charles H. Young (R), Mrs. Emma M. Tornwall (R), Mrs. Bertha M. Felton (D) and Mrs. Ann E. Bingel (D).

Edward J. Furphy (D) and Edward L. Prentiss (R) assisted at checkers' tables and subsequently tabulated the vote.

All election officials took oath before the Town Clerk before assuming their respective duties.

Voting lists were checked. During the voting hours, 561 Men and 540 Women cast ballots, approximately 70 per cent of the number of voters.

Used and unused ballots were sealed in containers and placed in the Town Hall vault.

PROCEEDINGS OF ADJOURNED ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

MARCH 12, 1960

Moderator Halbert K. Struthers called the adjourned annual town meeting to order at the designated hour with more than a quorum present.

The voting list was used at the main entrance to the hall with Mrs. Rita C. Cutler (D) and LeRoy W. Prentiss (R) serving as checkers.

Moderator Struthers stated he would defer action for a few minutes as there was a line of voters at the check list table in the corridor.

Moderator Struthers read the Warrant for the Special Town Meeting also called for this afternoon containing two articles. Chairman of Selectmen Ernest B. Porter motioned to take action on these articles after disposition of the annual Town Meeting Warrant. Motion was seconded by Police Chief Daniel H. Bates and voted with no dissenting voice.

Chairman of Selectmen Porter moved that the Town Counsel be permitted to remain on the main floor of the assembly. Motion seconded and so voted. No dissenting voice.

Gerard Matthews motioned to adjourn the meeting at 5 P.M. to the following Wednesday at 8 P.M. as several voters in attendance, he said, had an event to attend early tonight. Chairman Porter suggested that such action be deferred until later in the meeting, according to progress of action on the articles. On voice vote the motion to set an adjournment hour at this time was declared not carried by the Moderator.

1959 TOWN REPORT

Article 2. Voted: on motion of Chairman of Selectmen Ernest B. Porter, duly seconded, to accept the 1959 Town Report as printed.

REPORTS OF SPECIAL COMMITTEES

Library Building

Article 3. At the request of Chester W. Walker, chairman, who was unable to be present, Chairman of Selectmen Ernest B. Porter read a report of the Special Library Building Committee signed by Mr. Walker, Mrs. Ruth Crooker, secretary; Miss Helen A. Fay, Roy R. Johnson, Edward J. Furphy, Robert B. Paine and Robert E. Maynard.

Report was as follows: "This Committee was directed by the town meeting to secure plans and estimates for a Town Library. The Committee has met with three architects and has had six meetings during the year.

"The basic requirements of a library building, suitable for Upton, have been determined. If and when the town is prepared to erect a library, Miss Helen A. Fay and Miss Charlotte M. Fay stand ready to give the town an ideal site on Main Street, midway between the two villages.

"The Committee would like to enquire further into the use of certain building materials before making a definite decision. Also, in view of the present heavy financial burden of the town, the Committee feels the voters should not be asked this year for funds to build the library.

"For these reasons the Committee asks that the date for a full report be extended for another year.

"So far, the Committee has incurred no expense and returns the \$500, appropriated for its use, to the town treasury."

Voted: on motion of Norman E. Walker, duly seconded, that the report be accepted as one of progress. Unanimous action.

Knowlton School

Eugene I. Whiting, chairman, made a report for a Special Committee as to recommended use of the Knowlton School.

"No. 1. Proposed alteration to Knowlton School, to meet with Public Safety regulations and also conform with school regulations as follows:

"No. 2. To remove present staircase and replace by added classrooms and teachers' quarters.

"No. 3. To add fireproof section of building to the easterly side of present building which would contain fireproof staircase for both floors and toilet and cloak room space as per the drawing.

"No. 4. Add a fireproof staircase at the westerly side of both upper and lower floors.

"Replace floor, ceiling, new heating, ventilating system, rewiring and installing new fixtures.

"This Committee strongly recommends the ultimate renovation and use of Knowlton School property as part of our School System.

Mr. Whiting commented on recommended changes if the building was to be remodeled from four to six classrooms. He said the estimated cost received by the committee would be within \$65,000 and that drainage improvements have been made in the school's area since one of the flood storms. He said he had been informed that within four years there will be need of the building for school purpose and that the State would financially assist in recommended changes.

Mr. Salisbury, committee member, stated he could not add to remarks already given by Mr. Whiting.

Richard D. Stockwell, member of the School Committee, said he was of the opinion that the State would

not grant financial assistance to alterations of the Knowlton School but that a 50 per cent grant could be obtained by adding rooms to Memorial School.

Edward F. Gorman spoke about basement room having to be used at George S. Ball School because of increased enrollment of pupils.

Gerard Matthews and Selectman Porter spoke.

Voted: on motion of Gerard Matthews, seconded by Edward F. Gorman, that the report be accepted and that the Committee be returned to work further on the project.

Dr. Lee C. Bird of the School Committee said that consideration should be given to add four rooms at Memorial School where the heating would be centralized; that the School Committee believed it more feasible to increase school rooms at Memorial School, and that a 50 per cent reimbursement of cost could be obtained from the State.

ESTABLISH SALARIES AND COMPENSATION OF ELECTIVE OFFICERS

Article 4. In taking up this article, Moderator Struthers said that if there was no objection, recommendations of the Finance Committee would be read. If a voter wished to speak on any item as printed in the Finance Committee's report, the item would be "passed" for later consideration. There was no objection to this procedure.

Article 21. Voted in General Appropriations Budget under Highways.

STREET LIGHTING

Article 22. Chairman of Selectmen Ernest B. Porter moved that the Town vote to authorize the Board

of Selectmen to dispose of, to add to, and/or alter the present Street Lighting System to conform to the report submitted at the last Annual Town Meeting by the Planning Board. Motion seconded. After some discussion, motion to "pass over" was made, seconded, and so voted.

WARREN ROAD CULVERT

Article 23. Voted: on motion of Chairman of Selectmen Ernest B. Porter, duly seconded, to authorize the Road Commissioner to expend the sum of Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00) for culvert work on Warren Road, said amount to be taken from the Highway Chapter 81 Maintenance and Betterment Account.

NORTH MAIN ST. BURM

Article 24. Article to raise and appropriate Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) to improve burm on North Main Street was voted to be "passed over" after it was explained that such work could be done under the Chapter 81 Maintenance and Betterment Account.

PLAIN STREET CULVERT

Article 25. Voted: on motion of Chairman of Selectmen Ernest B. Porter, duly seconded, to authorize the Road Commissioner to expend the sum of Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00) to be used on the installation of a culvert on Plain Street, said money to be taken from the Highway Chapter 81 Maintenance and Betterment Account.

VALUATION LIST

Article 26. JUNE 23, 1960

Moderator Halbert K. Struthers called the meeting to order. He requested any non-voter take a seat in the balcony.

Chairman of Selectmen Ernest B. Porter motioned, seconded by Selectman Gladys G. Crockett, that permis-

sion be granted the Town Counsel to be seated on the main floor. Voted: without dissenting voice.

Moderator Struthers then read the Warrant and Constable's return.

LAYOUT FOR ALTERING AND RELOCATING SOUTH STREET

Article 1. Voted on motion of Chairman of Selectmen Ernest B. Porter, duly seconded, that the Town vote to accept a layout for the altering and relocating of South Street, as made by the Board of Selectmen as filed at the Town Clerk's Office, June 13, 1960. Moderator declared vote was unanimous. (No dissenting voice.)

Before action on the article, Mr. Porter explained that the plan acted upon at the annual town meeting in March called for South Street to be two rods wide. He said the purpose of the motion was to have section to be relocated, $2\frac{1}{2}$ rods wide, complying with South Street layout voted at a town meeting, August 14, 1901.

LAYOUT FOR RELOCATION AND ALTERATION OF SOUTH STREET BY SELECTMEN, TOWN OF UPTON

At a meeting of the Board of Selectmen of the Town of Upton, begun and holden at Upton, within and for said Town on the 13th day of June, A.D. 1960, it being determined that at least 7 days prior to which meeting written notice of the intention of the Selectmen to make a lay-out for the relocation or alteration of South Street in said Upton having been given to the owners of the land to be taken for such purpose and a favorable report having been received from the planning board of said Town, it was VOTED:

"That South Street in Upton, Worcester County, Massachusetts, be and is hereby laid-out for the purpose of relocating or altering said Street as a Town Way as follows:

This lay-out begins at the Northbridge Line as defined by the thread of Miscoe Brook and extends thence in a general Northwesterly direction about six-tenths of a mile on a new location to the old road.

The base line begins at a point on the Northbridge line and extends thence North $5^{\circ} 28' 45''$ East about 1645 feet, thence by a curve to the left of 500.00 feet radius 447.69 feet, thence North $45^{\circ} 49' 20''$ West 219.61 feet, thence by a curve to the left of 500.00 feet radius 288.95 feet, thence North $78^{\circ} 56' 00''$ West 385.13 feet to a point at the end of the base line shown on the plan as station 33+40.41.

The Southwesterly location line begins at a point on the Northbridge Line and extends thence parallel to and 20.625 feet distant from the base line to a point at the end of said location line and on the Easterly location line of the old road as defined by a line bearing South $16^{\circ} 22' 30''$ West through station 33+40.41.

The Northeasterly location line begins at a point on the Northbridge Line and extends parallel to and 20.625 feet distant from the base line to a point opposite station 32+50, thence by a curve to the right of 76.87 feet radius 127.87 feet to a point at the end of said location and on the Easterly location line of the old road as defined by a line bearing North $16^{\circ} 22' 30''$ East through station 33+40.41.

Said Southwesterly location lines shall be further defined by highway bounds to be set at all angle points, at all points of curvature, and at the beginning and at the end of the lay-out.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF CIVIL DEFENSE

To the Board of Selectmen:

The year 1960 has run out and Upton remains in a Non-Reception Zone, which means that many thousands of persons in vehicles will pass through Upton from Shrewsbury and North Grafton on Route 140. However, we must have Aid Check Points and be in a position to house evacuees if there should be a bombing.

Upton is located in Area 3, Sector 3-B with Sector Headquarters at the Milford High School (Tel. GR 3-0851 administrative), Operational GR 3-3911, 3-3912 and 3-3913 and Staff GR 3-3910. In all emergency the Sector Headquarters will be manned. Mr. Theodore Aptt is Sector Director. The Area Headquarters are at the Lyman School in Westboro. Mr. Harold F. Rossi is the Area Director.

The Two-Way Radio Communication System (Motorola) installed in 1958 and licensed by the Federal Communications Commission, has its Main Station at the Central Fire Station on Church Street with the Remote Control at the residence of the Chief of Police, Daniel H. Bates, on Main Street. A Portable Radio Phone is located at the Civil Defense Headquarters in the Town Hall. Mobile Units are installed in the Fire Department Pumper, the Forest Fire Truck, the Chief of Police's Automobile and the Service Truck of the Supt. of Streets. Communication Drills are held on the 1st Monday of each month at 1930 hours, Mr. Shaughnessy and Mr. Deering in charge.

Radioactive Fallout. Upton has two complete sets of equipment for monitoring and testing "fallout." One set is located at the Church Street Fire Station with Francis E. Aldrich in charge. Radiac Officer Eugene I. Whiting has the other set at his home on South Street. Radiological CCX Exercise Drills have been held during the year.

Surplus Property. Through Civil Defense we were able to purchase surplus property equipment from the State Agency at Myles Standish, Taunton, Mass., and the Otis Air Force Base for training purposes. Chief Warden, Rudolph J. Scholl was very cooperative.

National Civil Defense Day was Wednesday Dec. 7—"which was the time to assess our own preparedness." It is our belief that a thorough study should be made of Bomb Proof Shelters for homes, schools and public buildings. We arranged for the following pamphlets to be delivered to every home in Upton: "The Family Fallout Shelter" — "Radioactive Fallout and You" and "Make Preparedness a Part of Your Life." We submit the following report of the activities of the Water and Sewer Department for the year of 1960:

Our Storage Tank is in good shape due to the fact that it has been scraped and painted, both inside and outside. Also, the Pumping Station has been painted inside.

Under the Betterment Act, water assessments on Elm Street, Christian Hill, Milford Street, Dam Road and Mendon Street, were settled to the satisfaction of the customers.

The water line on Breton Road, owned by Frank Lapan, was turned over to the Town free of charge.

We have two new housing developments, one on Hartford Avenue, Mr. Cole of Northboro, the builder. Out of eight new services called for in this development, six have been installed. The development off Plain Street has had one hundred seventy-six feet of six inch pipe with valve installed. The work done in this development has been paid for by the contractor, Interstate Construction Co., at no cost to the Town.

A contract has been signed with the Federal Government for the repair of the Well Fields and Sewer Beds.

During the past year we pumped 59,376,350 gallons of water, with the month of January being the lowest with 3,494,600 gallons and November being the highest with

BOARD OF HEALTH REPORT

For the year ending December 31, 1960

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen

Town of Upton, Massachusetts

Gentlemen:

Herewith we submit a report of the Board of Health for the year 1960:

The 225th Anniversary celebration of the Town of Upton was held during the year 1960. The Second Anniversary of the Board of Health was celebrated during the year 1960. Obviously, it would be presumptive to expect a two-year-old board of health organization to correct the mistakes and omissions of a two-hundred-and-twenty-five year old town organization. However, progress has been made, and many of the outstanding problems contrary to good health climate for the community have been corrected. It is our hope that, in the near future, remaining health problems will be eliminated.

The most outstanding health problems of our community are:

1. Need for proper town dump maintenance.
2. Need for adequate individual sewage disposal facilities.
3. Elimination of dwellings unfit for human habitation.
4. Elimination of home-owned back yard dumps.
5. Improved health-safety standards at bathing beach.

During the year 1960 we have tried to improve the Town Dump area. Temporary regulations were determined, dumping was limited to residents only, caretaker was put on duty, and the Glen Avenue dumping area was closed. Conditions have improved, but further improvements are needed.

All private home-owned back yard dumps must be eliminated. The health menace to owners, their families, their neighbors, and to the community, should be of great concern to everyone.

Owners of dwellings that were determined as unfit for human habitation, after inspection by the State Department of Public Health and our board, were ordered to take corrective measures. Further action is now pending.

Individual sewage disposal facilities necessitate an extensive survey and study. At present, many of these are not only inadequate and harmful to the public health, but because of their proximity to waterways they constitute a water pollution menace.

The Kiwanis Club has been cooperative in effecting betterment of the health-safety standards at Pratt Pond Beach. However, state minimum standards dictate the need for a life-guard on duty at all times during bathing hours. Unsupervised swimming should be discontinued at all other areas.

Members of the Board of Health completed a six week seminar on, "Administration for Local Boards of Health", and Certificates of Award were received by board members from the Commissioner of Public Health of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

Four Polio Clinics were conducted by the Board of Health in conjunction with the Upton District Nursing Association. We would like to thank all who participated in this program.

All personnel of agencies giving day care to children were requested to file with the board a certificate of phy-

sical fitness. We would like to thank these agencies for their cooperation.

Board of Health programs for the current year are to be determined on a, "Health education and guidance", basis rather than on a, "Police-action enforcement", basis. We, as citizens, should maintain our own individual dwellings, backyards, cesspools, and wells for health-safety of our families, our neighbors, and for the well-being of the community. Minimum Health Safety Standards are for prevention and protection not for prosecution or regimentation.

Major Items Considered 1960

Lake Wildwood Project:

This Committee, for the past few years, has followed very closely the progress being made towards the construction of the dam at Lake Wildwood. The Division of Waterways, State Department of Public Works, asked for bids on Jan. 31st for the building of the dam and they were opened in Boston on Feb. 14th. Your Committee is hoping that the construction of the dam will take place later this year. It was provided in the authorization given by the legislature in July 1957 that the town would operate and maintain the dam after it was constructed. This Committee anticipates that if the Selectmen and other authorized persons responsible for this project follow it through, it would mean additional revenue for the town.

Other Activities:

Rudolph E. Nelson, Vincent Jonis and Howard Heald, members of this Committee attended a seminar on Town Finance at the Evening College of Clark University which was held last fall for a period of six weeks. Among the subjects covered were School Finance, Financial Planning, Assessing and Revaluation, Finance Committees, and Indebtedness, Borrowing Capacity and Computation of Tax Rate.

The year just past again witnessed many long hours of discussion with the Federal Engineers in connection with the West Hill Project and its effect on Upton, and we now believe that this summer of 1961 will see this project brought to a conclusion. It appears that the Board was a little over-optimistic last year in the construction of the Jourdan's Pond Dam, but are now assured that with the call for bids on construction on January 13, and the return on February 14th, we should see the project completed in the summer of '61.

who spent many untold hours of detailed work for their Community, sincere in their belief to give Upton the best possible, on a Junior-Senior High School level, and we believe, justifiably so, in the present response of all pupils, in their interest, cooperation, and especially their enthusiasm.

In conclusion, may we re-affirm that in this period of increased budgets, it is our hope to use all available means to expend only those funds that are necessary to operate our community on a sound and economic basis. To this end, we feel that our Finance Committee is to be complimented on a sincere and diligent effort in accomplishing this purpose, and sincerely hope we can hold the line to a stable Tax Rate for the year 1961.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

To the Trustees of the Upton Library:

The librarian respectfully submits her annual report with library statistics, list of periodicals, and the catalog of new books.

Books have been added to the Dr. Carpenter alcove as required.

Gifts of magazines and books have been received from Mrs. Edith Hill, Mrs. Everett Newbegin, Mrs. Charles McLaughlin, Mrs. Barrabin, Mr. Ward Robinson, Mr. David Colcord, the Woman's Club and the Kiwanis Club.

In January, your librarian gave a talk to the PTA on "Your Child's Reading Today".

In April, National Library Week was observed with a display of the new spring books, a Story Hour and an Open House for Teen-Agers. Twenty-two attended the Open House. The librarian gave book reviews of the young adult books. The library table was decorated and punch, homemade cookies and brownies were served. Sheila Walker and Barbara Bartlett were hostesses. Mrs. Helen Bentley kindly baked cookies for us. Four books donated by the publishers Little, Brown & Co. and Houghton Mifflin Co., were awarded to Evelyn Robinson, an 8th grade pupil who is an avid reader; to Wayne Garland, grade 7, who has kept a record of every book he has read, 180 in all; Mary Ellen Smith who started reading in the first grade and takes out a book regularly; and to Susan Gagne, Grade 2, a precocious reader and a daily devoted visitor to the Library.

Eighty-seven children attended the Story Hour and had to be moved into the Town Hall because our small library room could not take care of them.

Vacation Reading Clubs were held in the summer for Grades 4 to 7 inclusive. There was a good attendance and a lawn party was held at the librarian's house at the close of the summer. A weekly Story Hour was well attended by the younger children.

In November, National Book Week was observed with a display of the new fall books. All the grades from the Ball School visited the Library and listened to reviews of the new books.

In December a Christmas Story Hour was held. Also in the Christmas vacation, a Puppet Show was presented by Girl Scout Troop 391 sponsored by Mrs. Donald Johnson. The scouts made the puppets and the stage setting and presented an original play, "The Princess and The Clown" under Mrs. Johnson's direction.

The new set of the Encyclopedia Americana is a splendid addition to our Reference Desk and is in constant use.

A shelf in "Adventures in Reading" was again set up for the Woman's Reading Club of the Congregational Church.

During the year 60 new borrowers were registered.

We now have a good collection of "I CAN Read" books written for the first three grades. These books are a great help to children just learning to read or to those who are a little slow in reading. It is a pleasure to see a child come in and pick out his own book with the confidence of knowing he can read it himself. The majority of children in the first three grades are eager to read and a book that is within their reading vocabulary is a great encouragement to them.

I think the most satisfying aspect of this year's work has been; the adult readers' increasing interest in non-fiction; the progress the small children have made in read-

ing, through the easy to read books; and presenting to our High School pupils new tools for reference work in the Encyclopedia Americana.

I wish to thank Miss Helen Fay for substituting for me in the summer, for helping me in the choice of new books and for her devoted interest in the Library.

I appreciate the help of Rebecca Burr.

I thank the Trustees for their generous support and cooperation.

Gentlemen:

It is with pleasure that I submit my first annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

Substantial contributions from the Supervisor of Elementary Schools, the Regional High School Principal, supervisors and staff members are included. Their reports provide summaries, highlights, and future plans for our schools.

In this era when all forward-looking citizens are striving for better educational programs and facilities, the people of Mendon and Upton have shown through their accomplishments that they want at least the same opportunities as are offered elsewhere.

Probably the greatest step forward, facility-wise, was the erection of Nipmuc Regional High School which opened September 23, 1960. My association with those committee members who are directly responsible for the building has proven to me that they have the welfare of the town's children as their primary concern, and that as time passes a strong educational program will be built. The report of Wilho Frigard, principal, will give you an indication of what we are striving to do now and in the future.

It is hoped that we may expand the use of our facilities to include Adult Education and In-Service Educational opportunities for teachers. We are looking forward to making additions to the curriculum and to strengthening it. Additional student activities are being studied. However, maturation takes time; and we as administrators ask that you continue to be patient as your school grows to adulthood.

In the elementary schools, several changes have already been made and more are being planned as the report of John Rogers, Supervisor of Elementary Schools, will indicate. Mr. Rogers is the chief administrator in each of the schools serving grades 1 - 6. Under him, in each building, is a teaching principal who teaches full time and also has some administrative duties. We have strived to coordinate the programs of the two towns in all areas where it was possible. All of our pupils in the first six grades can eventually enter Nipmuc Regional. Efforts are being made to offer equal opportunities to all pupils in their preparation for secondary school life. Mr. Rogers' report will cover many of our attempts and successes in this area.

One of the needs which will have to be given serious consideration is that of Special Class Education. Upton can, through the school year 1961-62, continue to send some pupils to Grafton on a tuition basis. Mendon now has no Special Class. In 1962 there will be an opportunity for the towns to join hands again to fill this need. However, in 1962 all space now available will be in use. Any building plans which either of the towns have should definitely include provision for this necessary part of providing for individual differences.

The cooperation of all teaching and non-teaching personnel has been outstanding. It is a pleasure to work with those on the staffs of all schools. Particular mention is made of the way those students attending Nipmuc Regional work together. School morale and spirit are very high. Parent interest and cooperation is excellent. With continued conditions such as these, our school program will surely continue to grow stronger and more efficient.

In closing, I want to express sincere thanks to each member of the committees with whom I work. If we strengthen the standings of our school systems in any way, it will be because of the interest, concern, and initiative of the committees who make the policies of our schools.

REPORT OF THE SUPERVISOR OF ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

It is with great pleasure that I submit my first annual report as Supervisor of Elementary Schools for School Union No. 59, Mendon and Upton.

Having assumed this position as of September 1, 1960, my report will be concerned primarily with what has been accomplished since that time. The period from September 1, 1960, to the date of this writing has been only a mere four months, but in that period of time much has occurred.

September 1960, saw the opening of the Nipmuc Regional High School. This opening eliminated the necessity of double sessions for the elementary children in the Town of Mendon.

There is an enrollment of 252 children in the Mendon Center School, 300 in the Upton Memorial School, and 118 in the Upton Ball School which is a total of 670 elementary school children between both towns. For Mendon this is a gain of 19 children compared to last year and for Upton a gain of 18. Between now and September 1961 we expect to enroll in the elementary schools an additional 19 children in Mendon and 22 in Upton.

A formal Physical Education Program was started for grades one through six. Miss Joan Bucklin and Mr. Ellerton P. Whitney, Jr., Physical Education Supervisors at the Nipmuc Regional High School, are at the elementary schools every Wednesday to supervise physical education with the assistance of the classroom teachers.

This program consists of body building exercises, relay races, tumbling, various games and practice in the skills needed to play basketball, football, baseball, volleyball, etc. It is hoped that this Spring we will be able to have a Field Day in order for parents to see what the children have and what they have been learning in this

Physical Education Program. We all realize that for this program to be more efficient we need additional gym equipment and facilities in which we can have physical education during the winter months. We are now in the process of administering the Kraus-Webber physical fitness test to the children. This test will be given again at the end of the school year, and at that time the results will be published.

The instrumental music program for grades four through six in both towns is being continued under the direction of Mr. Donald Thatcher, Music Supervisor at the Nipmuc Regional High School. The program this year is organized much differently than it has been in previous years. Mr. Thatcher spends all day on alternate Fridays in each town and gives separate lessons of at least one-half hour for each different type of instrument. As the children become proficient in their particular instrument, it is planned to continue the policy of an elementary school band for each town; and, if possible, to combine both bands for a Mendon-Upton Elementary School Band with uniforms and other necessary equipment for a band of this size.

The children in grades two through six in all three schools are now participating in the "21 inch Classroom" sponsored by Channel 2, Television. The advantage of this program is that the children will have the opportunity to be taught by educational experts in various fields for the nominal cost of twenty-five cents per pupil.

Grades two, will view a program entitled, "Folk Music and Dancing"; grades three, "Reading and Storytelling"; grades four, "French"; grades five, "Natural Science"; grades six, "Physical Science and French". All teachers have been supplied with correlated manuals that are used as guides to do follow up teaching.

Due to the formation of the school union between Mendon and Upton and the building of the Nipmuc Regional High School, we have three different report cards and marking systems at present. To eliminate this confusion, a report card committee comprised of three teachers and two parents from each town has been formed. This

committee has been meeting every other Tuesday and will continue to do so until one report card for the elementary schools, similar to that of the high school, is developed. This committee is comprised of: Mrs. Virginia Cobb, Mrs. Sadie Bliss, and Miss Alice Youngson from the Center School in Mendon; Miss Elizabeth Garrity, Mrs. Joanna Workman and Mrs. Helen Donham from the Memorial School in Upton; Mrs. Ruth Kearsley and Mrs. Beatrice Wood, parents from Mendon; Mrs. Delimar Majeau and Mrs. Roger Bartlett, parents from Upton; Mr. Thomas Cullen, Guidance Counselor at Nipmuc Regional High School; and Mr. John W. Rogers, Elementary Supervisor, Chairman.

A Curriculum Guide Committee comprised of three teachers from each town has also been formed. At the first meeting of this committee, it was decided to begin work on the development of a Reading Curriculum Guide. When this guide is completed, another committee will be formed to develop a guide for another subject. This will continue until we have curriculum guides available for all subject areas. The following are members of the Curriculum Guide Committee: Mrs. Grace Hutchinson, Miss Margaret Duren, and Mrs. Catherine Whelen from the Center School in Mendon; Mrs. Pearl Kimball, Mrs. Mary Greany and Mr. Charles McCabe from the Memorial School in Upton; Mrs. Theresa Trask from the Ball School in Upton; and Mr. John W. Rogers, Elementary Supervisor, Chairman.

American Education Week was observed in both towns this year with scheduled Parent-Teacher conferences as well as an open house evening for visitation. Each conference was approximately ten minutes in length and they were held before school, during recess, after school, and for the first hour of the open house evening. We have an enrollment of 670 children between the two towns and there were about 570 conferences.

Your school administrators and teachers have no doubt as to value of these conferences and believe that they were definitely worthwhile for all concerned. We feel that conferences of this type will lead to even better

cooperation between the home and the school as they tend to clear up misinformation and misconception as to what is going on in the school.

It is hoped that future conferences will be as successful, if not more so, but parents should feel free to make appointments with the teachers or school administrators at any time during the school year.

The Art and Vocal Music Programs in both towns are progressing smoothly. In music, the children in the third grades are learning to play the Symphonettes and a glee club has been established for the intermediate grades. Of course this glee club is only in the beginning stages and a few problems have to be solved before it will function as smoothly as we would like.

The school cafeterias provide excellent meals for the children. Approximately 76% of the children participate in the hot lunch program, 2% go home to lunch and 18% bring their lunch and have milk.

In conclusion, I would like to thank the School Committee, the Superintendent, all of the School Personnel, the Parent-Teacher Associations, and the Townspeople for their cooperation and assistance.

REPORT OF THE MUSIC SUPERVISOR

It is with pleasure that I submit to you my annual report as Music Supervisor in the Schools of Upton.

There are three main reasons for studying music in our public schools:

First, it adds to the enjoyment of school life.

Second, it gives children the opportunity to learn the most beautiful songs written by the most famous composers.

Third, it provides a source of pleasure for others.

In the first grade, great care is given to the child's voice and great emphasis is put upon the quality of tone. We attempt to develop good singing while building a repertory of songs. Rhythmic expression is developed through activity songs, marching, free body movements and listening to records.

In the second grade, elementals of theory are introduced and children become familiar with the staff, scale and note arrangements. This program is continued through the third, fourth, and fifth grades with added drill on note reading and sight singing.

In the fifth and sixth grades, two and three part music is sung.

In closing, I would like to thank Mr. Sharp, the School Committee, and the teachers for their cooperation with me at all times.

REPORT OF THE HANDWRITING SUPERVISOR

Dear Mr. Sharp:

Handwriting is one subject taught in schools that lends itself to the teaching of concomitants such as neatness, accuracy, attention to details, and good work habits. It is not enough to teach technical handwriting with a view to merely achieving the grade norm. If handwriting is to continue to function acceptably in high school and college, each letter must be taught to the point of mastery and should become automatic to the extent that a writer is free to concentrate on the work at hand without being distracted from time to time to stop and think how a particular letter should be made.

A child who has been taught to write well does not lose the ability to write well thereafter. He may become careless if permitted by teachers to do so but he retains the ability to write well when challenged to do so.

Our handwriting program constantly strives to achieve these desirable objectives. Instructional and motivational materials are provided for pupils and teachers. Teachers are instructed at regular intervals in methods to be used in teaching and the handwriting product is checked at the end of each interval with a diagnosis of same given to the teacher in writing for remedial purposes.

At the close of the last school year our records show that 92% of the pupils scored excellent, 7% scored good, 1% were fair and no % were poor on the formal handwriting test. It was found in checking the informal handwriting that there had been excellent transfer in handwriting quality to spelling, arithmetic, English composition, etc.

The cooperation of the administrative staff and teachers was all that could be desired and I take this opportunity to express my appreciation.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

I hereby submit the School Nursing Report for the period from September to December 1960.

Physical health examinations by school physician, Dr. Aussenhimer, have been given to all students in Grades 7 and 11 at the Nipmuc Regional School, plus all students participating in competitive activities. In the Mendon School, Grades 1 and 4 have had physical examinations by Dr. Lukert. In Upton, Grades 1 and 4 have had physical examinations by Dr. McKernan. All examinations were assisted by the school nurse. Notices were sent out to the parents of children who have been found to have physical defects, and home visits were made where necessary.

The Mantoux Test, sponsored by the Worcester County Health Association, was given to all students, with parental consent, at the Nipmuc Regional School and all Grades in Mendon. Pupils having positive reaction will be given a chest x-ray.

Audiometer testing, vision testing, measuring, and weighing are being done in all grades, at all towns.

Pupils taken ill at school when the nurse is in attendance, are transported to their homes, and any home visits requested by a teacher are also made.

This has been the first year of a full school health program carried on in the Upton-Mendon School District. As a full time school nurse, I'm on call at all times to care for any sickness or injury in the schools of both towns.

Cooperation and consideration on the part of the School Committee, Superintendent, Physicians, Teachers and Parents has been deeply appreciated.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

It is with a great deal of pleasure that I submit this first report on the operation of the Nipmuc Regional High School.

Despite the late opening in September and the many difficulties encountered because of delayed use of facilities in some areas, I am very pleased to report that our school has functioned very well. Much of the credit for this fortunate state of affairs should go to a very capable staff and to the student body, both of whom have exhibited excellent cooperation.

At the moment of this writing, the enrollment at the school includes 175 from Mendon, 298 from Upton, and 2 tuition pupils, with individual class enrollment as follows:

Grade 7	— 98
Grade 8	— 99
Grade 9	— 93
Grade 10	— 69
Grade 11	— 60
Grade 12	— 56

In our effort to give all pupils the greatest possible opportunity for learning, as much ability grouping as

conditions permit is in effect. In both the 7th and 8th grades, where all pupils follow a prescribed curriculum, pupils are divided into four ability groups. After our first marking period in November, such pupil changes as were deemed in the best interests of certain pupils were made. In the high school, a fairly good ability grouping has been possible in English, mathematics, and science. A finer and more effective grouping will be possible at this level when sufficient teaching personnel becomes available.

The Guidance Department has been very busy in the testing and counseling of pupils to assist them in making intelligent plans and wise decisions with due regard for individual interests, aptitudes, and abilities. By necessity, the Guidance Director has concentrated a large part of his efforts to the junior and senior classes so that these pupils will be able to take immediate advantage of the services available. In order to effectively accomplish its purposes, the Guidance Department has set up the following:

1. An individual guidance record for each pupil.
2. A testing program.
3. An educational and occupational library.
4. Counseling sessions with individual pupils.

The following tests have been given to students since the opening of school:

Grade 7 — California Diagnostic Reading Test
Otis Mental Ability Test (Beta Form)

Grade 8 — California Diagnostic Reading Test
Differential Aptitude Tests
Kuder Interest Test

Grade 9 — Otis Mental Ability Test (Gamma
Form FM)

Grade 10 — English Cooperative Reading Test
Cooperative English Expression Test
Otis Mental Ability Test

Grade 11 — Same as Grade 10
California Inventory Interest Test

Grade 12 — Same as Grade 11

The above tests are taken by all students. In addition to these, students have the opportunity to take the following:

Grades 9 & 10 — National Educational Development Test

Grades 11 & 12 — National Merit Scholarship Test

Grades 11 & 12 — College Entrance Examination Board Tests

The services of the Guidance Department are available to any persons in the towns of Mendon and Upton, student or adult. Parents are invited to come in and discuss the progress of their children.

Our Art Department has proved to be a very popular one. This phase of our school program is elective and approximately 150 pupils are participating. Some results of our art program are on display at all times in the auditorium lobby trophy case.

Another phase of our program in which a large number of our pupils are taking part is the Music Department. All 7th and 8th grade pupils participate in a general music program. The rest of our music program, glee club and instrumental, is on an elective basis. We have approximately 80 junior high school pupils in choral work and 85 members in our high school glee club. Many of our parents enjoyed the first concert presented by our combined glee clubs on December 17. Forty-two pupils are also partici-

The physical education and athletic programs are now in practically full operation, with all physically able pupils deriving the benefits of the use of our gym facilities and equipment. In this connection, I am happy to report that basketball is available to every interested pupil, with interscholastic and intramural programs in operation. Beginning next spring, the Nipmuc Regional High School will participate in baseball and basketball in the Southern Worcester County Blackstone Valley League.

pating in our instrumental program, receiving individual instruction and rehearsing as a group, preparing for the development of a school band.

Approximately 80% of our student body is taking advantage of the hot lunch program prepared and served in very pleasant surroundings. Our lunch program has been commended by the Massachusetts office of School Lunch Programs and I am sure that *all* of our pupils would benefit greatly through daily participation in this program.

We are very grateful for the excellent facilities and services of our Health Department. In addition to the daily services rendered by the school nurse, we are planning to give complete physical examinations to pupils in grades 7 and 11, and eye and ear tests to all pupils in the school.

An extensive program of extracurricular activities is available to pupils. Included among these activities are the school paper, cheer leading, majorettes, Future Teachers of America, Future Business Leaders of America, Future Nurses of America, and Student Council, all of which are under the supervision of members of the teaching staff.

At this time I should like publicly to extend my thanks to the members of the Student Planning Committee who worked very closely with me since last spring. Among the results of the efforts of this committee were the selection of our school colors, school athletic nickname, and the formulation of a basic policy relative to the selection of school and class rings. The members of this committee were: Bette Anderson, Jesse Cox, Deirdre Giatas, David Smith, Lloyd Johnson, Ramona Temple, Roxie Barrows, and Ernest Porter.

All our high school classes have elected their officers for the school year and are busy planning their respective class programs.

Because of great interest on the part of members of our junior and senior classes to purchase class rings, arrangements were made for this purpose and these class

rings have already been ordered and delivery in January has been promised. Beginning next spring, the policy will be for the Sophomore class to select and order its rings for delivery the following fall.

It may be of interest to note that the present senior class is planning to produce a yearbook. They would certainly appreciate any cooperation which could be extended by individuals and organizations in Mendon, Upton, and surrounding areas.

The social calendar at our school has been limited during the past few months, but we have had three record hops for the benefit of the pupils. These have been held in the school cafeteria. The pupils are grateful to the School Committee for its provision of bus service to these affairs, and also to home basketball games.

In looking to the future and increased efficiency of our program, I should like to suggest the addition of at least two teachers to our staff next year. One of these teachers can be used to allow us to expand our English program so that we may have a more effective ability grouping of pupils in this vital area. The other additional teacher could be a combination shop and mechanical drawing instructor so that we can utilize our shop facilities more completely and expand our mechanical drawing offering.

Also, it would be to the advantage of the pupils and would add to the efficiency of our school program if we could have full time use of our art and music instructors.

In closing, I should like to extend my sincere appreciation to Superintendent Kenneth L. Sharp, the members of the Nipmuc Regional School Committee, all school personnel, and the members of the student body for their excellent cooperation in all matters concerning our school.

REPORT OF THE CAFETERIA MANAGER

To the Mendon-Upton Regional School Committee
and Mr. Kenneth Sharp, Superintendent

I hereby submit the first report of the Nipmuc Regional School Cafeteria.

To meet the requirements of the National School Lunch Program, our cafeteria serves a "Type A" lunch. Thus, each student is served at least $\frac{1}{2}$ pint homogenized milk as a beverage; 2 ounces of cooked or canned lean meat, poultry, fish, or cheese; or 1 egg; or $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of cooked dry beans or peas; or 4 tablespoons of peanut butter; or the equivalent quantity of any combination of these foods. A $\frac{3}{4}$ cup serving consisting of 2 or more vegetables and/or fruits in raw or cooked form. One slice of bread or a serving of corn bread, rolls etc. made of whole grain or enriched flour or meal, 2 teaspoons of butter used as a spread on bread or in the preparation of other foods in the lunch.

Our Senior High School students are served more than the Type A requirement and "second" of bread and butter, or another portion of some part of the lunch is available to all students.

The lunch menus, in addition to being posted throughout the school, are published each week in the local newspaper and are read each morning from the Milford radio station. A lunch ticket is sold to the student on a weekly basis. This encourages him to enjoy the variety of meals prepared and ensures him of a balanced, hot, nourishing lunch each day, at the small price of 25¢ per meal. Homogenized milk is available to all students for 3¢ per $\frac{1}{2}$ pint.

We welcome any parent who wishes, to visit our cafeteria and partake of our lunch.

Our school personnel, cafeteria employees, custodians, and students have been most cooperative in helping to accomplish the aims of the School Lunch Program. We look forward to an even greater participation in our School Lunch Program.
