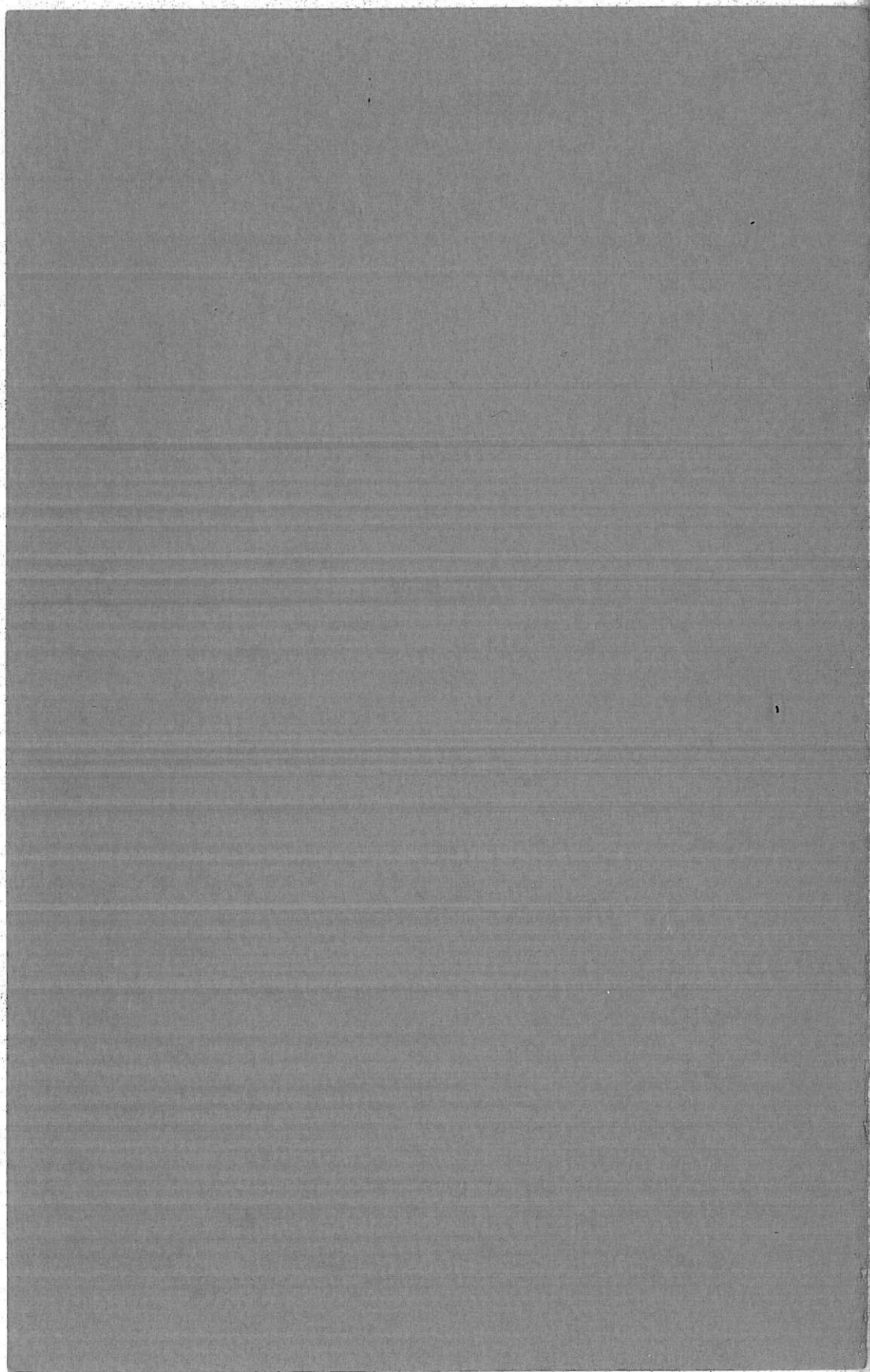


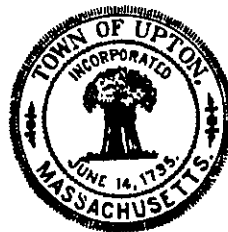

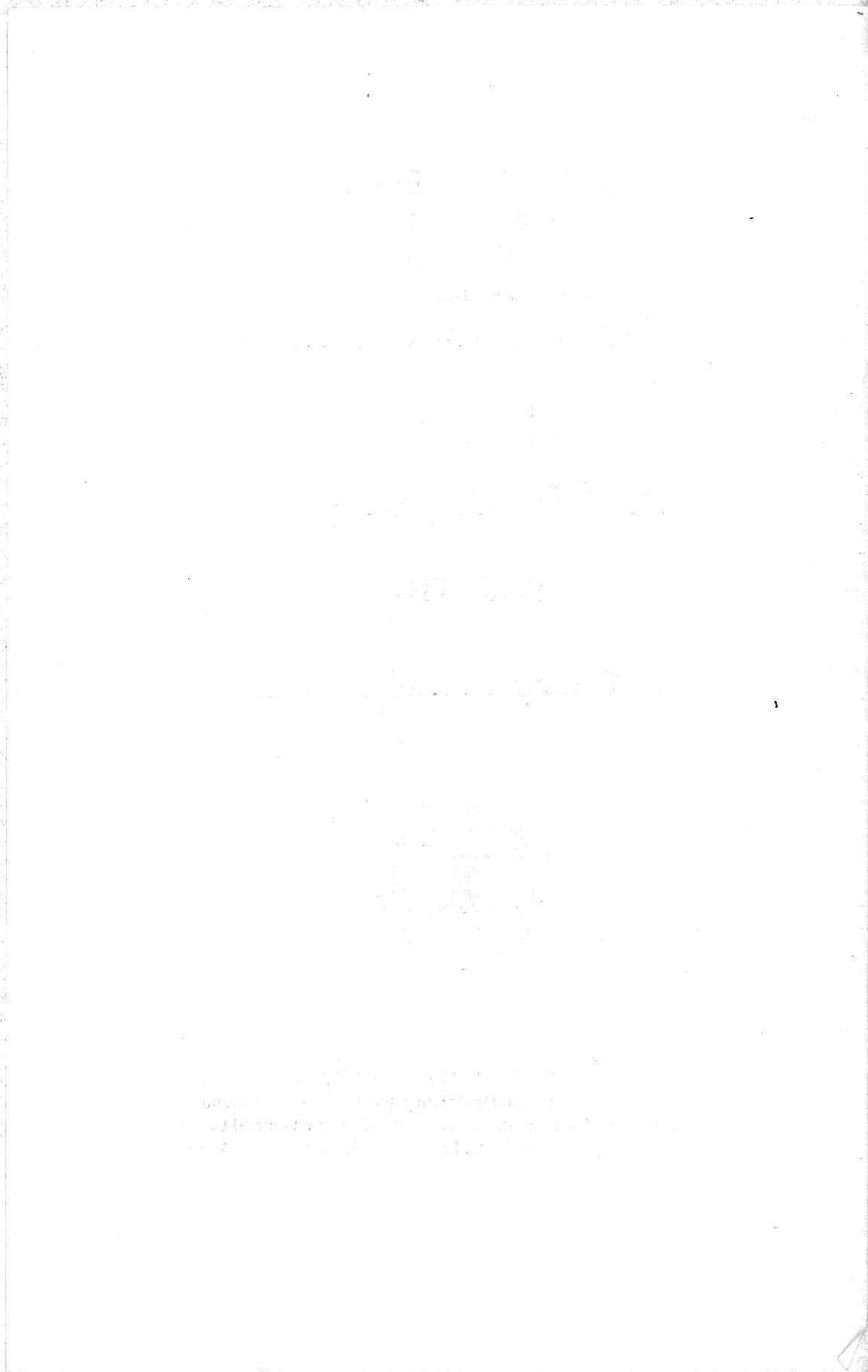

The Board of Health met regularly on the third Wednesday of each month during 1970 with the exception of July. There were also two special meetings held.

All complaints received by the Board were honored. Complaints must be in writing or made by an appearance at the Board of Health meeting.

The Town Dump is continuing operation using a landfill operation. This is more expensive, but mandatory in order to comply with directives from the Massachusetts Department of Public

Health. Effective July 1, 1971 more stringent supervision will become necessary and no burning will be allowed. The Board would like to express their appreciation to the townspeople, all Town Departments and the Massachusetts Department of Public Health for their cooperation and assistance in maintaining the rules and regulations being enforced at the Town Dump.

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING REPORT

It is with pleasure that I submit my fourth annual Public Health Nursing Department report. There were 1099 visits made on 269 days to 175 patients in 1970. Visits are in the following categories:

Maternity	81
Health Promotion	153
Disease Control	865

Regionalization is definitely a part of the future of Public Health Nursing in the Blackstone Valley area towns. Numerous meetings have been attended throughout the year with the Comprehensive Health Planning Office, Southeast Task Force and Massachusetts Department of Public Health advisors relative to what is the best direction and type of regionalization for Upton.

Thirteen Immunization Clinics were held both for preschool and school children at no cost to the families. Our children in Upton, through the cooperation of School Nurse, Mrs. Janet Stockwell, R.N., are among the best immunized in the state.

Major changes have taken place this year in the Medicare Program nationally as a direct result of Utilization Review enforcement.

As a result of these limitations plans are being presently implemented for a Health Program, for all of our Senior Citizens, at the Coach Road Apartments. Of all visits made in 1969 and 1970, 58% were made to our over 65 population.

I would express my appreciation for the cooperation and assistance shown this service by all Town Departments, the Advisors of the Massachusetts Department of Public Health, Miss Ann McGrath of Comprehensive Health Planning Office, and relief nurses

REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH AGENT

I hereby submit my report as Board of Health Agent for the year ending December 31, 1970.

I issued (36) thirty-six sewage permits, (35) thirty-five inspections, (2) two complaints, and collected water from (3) three wells and sent to Rutland for tests.

Bath area water samples were picked up twice a month from June 9, through August 18, at Pratt Pond, Lake Wildwood and Taft Pond and then were brought to Rutland. All samples during the year were satisfactory.

Hopedale Board of Health Agent and Mendon Board of Health shared the transportation responsibilities of the water samples to Rutland.

Deposited (\$180.00) one hundred eighty dollars to the Town Treasurer for Sewage Permits.

**WARRANT FOR
ANNUAL TOWN MEETING**

March 2 and 7, 1970

Worcester, ss

To the Constable of the Town of Upton, in the County of Worcester, **GREETINGS:**

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are directed to notify the inhabitants of the town of Upton, qualified to vote in Elections and in Town Affairs, to meet at the Town Hall, in said Upton, on Monday, the Second day of March, 1970, punctually, at Seven (7) o'clock A.M. for the following purposes:

Article 1. To choose necessary officers.

All to be voted for upon one ballot.

The polls will be closed at eight (8) o'clock on the day of said meeting.

The remaining articles in the Warrant will be acted on at adjourned meeting in Town Hall, Saturday, March 7, 1970 at two (2 P.M.)

Article 2. To hear reports of the several Town Officers and appointed Committees, or take any action thereon.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to fix the salary and compensation of all elective officers of the Town as provided by Section 108, Chapter 41, General Laws, as amended, or take any action thereon.

Article 4. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray expenses of Town Departments for the ensuing year, or take any action thereon.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of revenue of the financial year beginning on January 1, 1971, and to issue a note or notes therefor

payable within a year and to renew any note or notes that may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with the General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17, or take any action thereon.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money under provisions of Chapter 111, Section 85 of the General Laws, as an estimated amount for the Town's assessment for the care and treatment of persons suffering from tuberculosis and for the care, maintenance, and repair of the Worcester County Sanatorium, or take any action thereon.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds a sum of money in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 32, Section 22, General Laws, for Pension Fund, Expense Fund, Military Service Fund, and Workmen's Compensation Fund of the Worcester County Retirement System, or take any action thereon.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds a sum of money received from the sale of lots and graves during the year 1969, in accordance with General Laws, Chapter 114, Section 15, or take any action thereon.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Cemetery Commissioners to perform manual labor in Town Cemeteries and to receive monetary remuneration for their services, or take any action thereon.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds a sum of money to reimburse the Tree Warden for supervisory work done during the year 1969, or take any action thereon.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds a sum of money to the Conservation Fund set up under Article 24 of the 1966 Annual Town Meeting, or take any action thereon.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds in the Treasury a sum of

money for Chapter 81 Highways, or take any action thereon.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds in the Treasury a sum of money for Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance, or take any action thereon.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds in the Treasury a sum of money for Chapter 90 Highway Construction work, or take any action thereon.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from proceeds received, or to be received, under Section 5, Chapter 768 of the Acts of 1969, the sum of Eleven Thousand Eight Hundred Four Dollars and Twenty-eight Cents (\$11,804.28), to be expended on Mendon Street, or take any action thereon.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money for Mental Health Service for the year 1970, or take any action thereon.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from available funds in the Treasury, or raise by borrowing or issuing its notes or bond therefor, a sum of money for the purpose of installing a 8" water main on Maple Avenue for the new Sewage Treatment Plant, a distance of approximately 650 feet, or take any action thereon.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 40, Section 8A, authorizing the establishment of a Development and Industrial Commission consisting of five members appointed by the Selectmen for terms not exceeding five years, for the promotion and development of industrial resources of the Town of Upton, or take any action thereon.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to declare that an Industrial Development Financing Authority is needed therein and that (1) unemployment thereof exists in the municipality or (2)

security against future unemployment and lack of business opportunity, is required in the municipality, and that unemployment or the threat thereof can be alleviated or the security against future unemployment and lack of business opportunity can be provided by attracting new industry to the municipality or substantially expending industry existing in the municipality through an Industrial Development Project financed under Chapter 772 of the Acts of 1967, and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a Board of Directors of said Authority pursuant to the provisions of Section 3 of the Chapter 772, or take any action thereon.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the action of the Town Meeting of March 4, 1963, under Article 22, whereby the Town voted to join the State Assessment System as provided in Section 7A through Section 7D of Chapter 58 of the General Laws, as amended, or take any action thereon.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money to remodel the tool shed at Lakeview Cemetery, or take any action thereon.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money for the purchase of a 100 Watt Mobile 2-way Radio to be used by the Communications Department, or take any action thereon.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to transfer a sum of money previously appropriated in 1967 for the preparation of preliminary plans and estimates by the Mendon-Upton Regional School District for the proposed Junior-Senior High School to the same account for 1970, or take any action thereon.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the balance of the 1967 Water Main Extension Account to the Water Main Extension Account of 1970, or take any action thereon.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to purchase or take by eminent domain under General Laws, Chapter 79, or otherwise accept certain easement deeds, fees or other interests in land from

owners of record for the proposed new sewerage interceptor trunk line in Brook Valley area between Maple Avenue and Depot Street as shown on a plan entitled "Upton, Massachusetts Main Street Interceptor Easement Plan" drawn by Alonzo B. Reed Inc. dated January 1970, or take any action thereon.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds a sum of money for Town Clerk Microfilm Account, or take any action thereon.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to amend the vote taken on Article 21 at the Annual Town Meeting held on March 11, 1967, by striking out the words "The Annual Cost to the Town of Operating the District to be an Apportioned Cost Determined by the District Planning Commission on a Per Capita Basis as Provided in Section 7 of Chapter 40B or an Amount Not to Exceed Eight Cents Per Capita, according to the Most Recent Federal Census, whichever Is The Lesser", and by substituting therefor, "The Annual Cost to the Town to be An Apportioned Cost Determined by the District Planning Commission on a Per Capita Basis as Provided in Section 7 of said Chapter 40B, But In No Event Greater than Twelve Cents Per Capita Based Upon the Most Recent Federal Census" or take any action thereon.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds in the Treasury a sum of money for Street Light Account for the purpose of installing street lights, or take any action thereon.

PROCEEDINGS OF ANNUAL TOWN ELECTION

March 2, 1970

Warden Robert K. Sweet (R) called the meeting to order at 7 A.M., the hour designated in the Warrant.

After Mrs. Margaret M. Rodwill (D), election clerk pro tem, read Article 1 and notice of adjourned meeting, Saturday, March 7, 1970 at 2 P.M., Chairman of Selectmen Ernest B. Porter motioned, duly seconded, to waive the reading of the remaining articles as they would be acted on separately at Saturday's meeting. Voted without a dissenting voice. PROCEEDINGS OF ADJOURNED ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

March 7, 1970

Moderator George W. Burnham called the meeting to order at 2 P.M. with more than a quorum (20) of voters in the hall. Mrs. Rose E. Davis (R) and Mrs. Rita C. Cutler (D) checked 120 names on voting list at the main entrance to the hall.

For a half-hour before the meeting there were voters who viewed the almost total eclipse of the sun by the moon on the Town Hall steps. The eclipse was approximately 95.5 per cent in this area, being termed the "Eclipse of the Century" by scientists. It was the first such eclipse since 1923 and the last total to be seen in this part of the world until the year, 2024.

In opening the meeting Moderator Burnham requested permission for Supt. of Schools Gordon B. Allan, Town Counsel Robert J. Gallagher of Westboro and Miss Althea Mungovan, R.N., supervisor of the Community Association of Grafton and nursing supervisor of the Upton Board of Health, to be seated with the assembly on the main floor. No objection voiced.

Town Clerk Newton requested a standing tribute in memory of the late Charles A. Barton, town auditor, 1917 - 1944; Mrs. Lora E. Dearth, a local school teacher for many years, and one time trustee of the Public Library; James F. Gorman, trustee of the Public Library, 1953 - 1969 and member of the Memorial School Addition Committee; Samuel F. Mitchell, wire inspector for 20 years; Henry H. Wood, assessor of taxes, 1930 - 35, and road commissioner, 1935 - 1942, and his son, Russell W. Wood, Zoning Appeal Board member and map technician, 1965 - 1969.

Moderator stated that Article 1 calling for election of certain town officers had been acted upon, Monday March 2, 1970.

ACCEPT 1969 TOWN REPORT

Article 2. Voted: on motion of Chairman of Selectmen Ernest B. Porter, seconded, "to accept the reports of the several town officers and committees as printed in the (1969) Town Report, and that the report of the Finance Committee be acted upon item by item under the various articles in the Warrant."

ESTABLISH SALARIES AND/OR COMPENSATION OF CERTAIN TOWN OFFICERS

Article 3. Moderator Burnham stated he would read the Finance Committee's printed recommendation of proposed salaries and/or compensation of certain town officers for 1970. He said if any voter desired to be heard on an item to request "Hold" and it would be considered after the complete list was read. No objection to this procedure.

On motion of Selectman James J. Gallagher, seconded by Samuel Nahra, Jr., the salaries and/or compensation recommended by the Finance Committee be established except those deferred for further consideration. So voted.

(a) Item 66 - Patrolman's Salary. Voted: on motion of Samuel Nahra, Jr., seconded by Peter P. Shea, to raise and appropriate Six Thousand Nine Hundred Dollars (\$6,900) for salary of patrolman, Police Department. Unanimous vote declared by Moderator. (Finance Committee recommended \$6,600.)

(b) Item 78 - New Hose. Voted: to raise and appropriate Five Hundred Dollars (\$500) for new hose after it was explained by Fire Chief Walter J. Stank that new hose is purchased each year to replace lengths of old hose. Unanimous vote.

(c) Board of Health, Nurse-Salaries. Voted: on motion of Jonas E. Carter, chairman of Finance Committee, to raise and appropriate Seven Thousand Six Hundred Seventy-Four Dollars (\$7,674.00), amended to raise and appropriate Seven Thousand Eight Hundred Seventy-Four Dollars (\$7,874) by Police Chief Rodney B. Marchand, seconded by James H. Smith, for "Nurse-Salaries" under the Board of Health item. Amended motion was declared voted by Moderator.

Previous to the above action there was a lengthy discussion on a motion by Alvin P. Nichols of the Board of Health, seconded, to raise and appropriate \$8,462 as requested for "Nurse-Salaries."

Mrs. Marjorie R. Wilcock R.N., Board of Health nurse, spoke and showed graphs of services rendered by the local department and reimbursements received.

James H. Smith said speaking as a voter, not as a Finance Committee member, he favored the motion.

Harvey L. Martindale, Jr. moved to amend the original motion to raise and appropriate \$6,372 instead of \$8,462. Motion was not seconded.

In presenting original motion by Mr. Nichols, Moderator Burnham announced it appeared it had been favorably acted on. Selectman Norman E. Walker questioned the decision. Moderator Burnham then called for a standing vote on the original motion. Officer Alfred H. Nichols and Auxiliary Police Officer Wilfred Fowler were named by the Moderator to make the count. They reported: Yes - (in favor of \$8,462 appropriation), 39; No - 46.

It was then Mr. Carter moved to raise and appropriate the Finance Committee's original recommendation, \$7,674, which was amended by Police Chief Marchand to increase the sum of \$7,874, seconded, and so voted.

(d) Item 117 - Veterans' Benefits. Voted: on motion of Samuel Nahra, Jr., local Veterans' Service Officer, seconded by Town Accountant Charles H. Ferris, to raise and appropriate Nineteen Thousand Dollars (\$19,000) for veterans' benefits.

(e) Item 129 - Mendon-Upton Regional School, Operating expenses, and Item 131 - Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational School, Operating expenses, were discussed. Harvey L. Martindale, Jr. moved to amend the motion to segregate the items separately. Harvey J. Trask advocated the listing of all salaries of the school personnel in the town report.

Edward S. Henderson, present chairman of the Blackstone Valley Regional High School, spoke on Item 131 and how the budget was determined with other representatives of the regional district.

In reply to a query by Selectman Ernest B. Porter, Town Counsel Robert J. Gallagher stated that hearings on the school budgets had been conducted as prescribed by law and no action on segregating the budget at this time would be valid. Mr. Martindale, Jr. withdrew his motion.

Superintendent of Schools Gordon B. Allan and Donald A. Wellman were among the speakers during the lengthy discussion.

Town Accountant Charles H. Ferris moved in his motion under "Operating Expenses" of the Mendon-Upton Regional School that the appropriation be \$555,758.69 with \$555,256.63 to be raised and appropriated by taxation, plus 1969 Dog Tax Refund, \$302.06 and Interest, Charlotte Batchelor School Trust Fund, \$200.

The motion by Town Accountant Ferris for "operating expenses" of the Mendon-Upton Regional School and by the Finance Committee for "operating expenses" of the Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational School were favorably voted.

AUTHORIZATION TO BORROW MONEY

Article 5. Voted: on motion of Selectman Norman E. Walker, seconded by John Robertson, Jr., "to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of revenue of the financial year beginning on January 1, 1971, and to issue a note or notes therefor payable within one year and to renew any note or notes that may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with the General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17." Moderator declared unanimous vote.

WORCESTER COUNTY HOSPITAL ASSESSMENT

Article 6. Voted: on motion of Selectman Norman E. Walker, seconded, "to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Eight Hundred Forty-Three Dollars and Thirty-Three Cents (\$2,843.33) under provisions of Chapter 111, Section 85-90 inclusive, of the General Laws, as the town's assessment for the care and treatment of persons suffering from tuberculosis, and for the care, maintenance, and repair of the Worcester County Hospital." Unanimous vote.

COUNTY RETIREMENT SYSTEM ASSESSMENT

Article 7. Voted: on motion of Selectman James J. Gallagher, seconded, "to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Nine Hundred Twenty Eight Dollars and Six Cents (\$2,928.06) in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 32, Section 22, General Laws, for Pension Fund, Expense Fund, Military Service Fund, and

Workmen's Compensation Fund of the Worcester County Retirement System." Unanimous vote.

TRANSFER MONEY IN CEMETERY ACCOUNTS

Article 8. Voted: on motion of Selectman Ernest B. Porter, seconded, "to transfer Three Hundred Dollars (\$300) from the sale of Lots and Graves account during the year, 1969, to the Oiling and Grading account, in accordance with General Laws, Chapter 114, Section 15." Unanimous vote.

AUTHORIZE CEMETERY COMMISSIONERS TO WORK IN CEMETERY AT TWO DOLLARS PER HOUR

Article 9. Voted: on motion of Selectman James J. Gallagher, seconded by Harold F. Francis, "to authorize the Cemetery Commissioners to perform manual labor in town cemeteries and to appoint one of its members, superintendent of said cemeteries, and to receive a monetary remuneration for their services at \$2 per hour." Unanimous vote.

REIMBURSE TREE WARDEN

Article 10. Voted: on motion of Selectman Norman E. Walker, seconded, "to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty-Eight Dollars (\$48) to reimburse the Tree Warden for supervisory work done during the year, 1969)." Unanimous vote.

Article 11. Voted: on motion of Selectman James J. Gallagher, seconded, "to raise and appropriate One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) to the Conservation Fund, set up under Article 24 of the 1966 Annual Town Meeting."

Mrs. Marjorie I. McLaughlin and Mrs. Janet W. Cooper of the Conservation Committee spoke.

CHAPTER 81 HIGHWAY

Article 12. Voted: on motion of Road Commissioner Henry J. Poirier, seconded, "to raise and appropriate the sum of Four

Thousand Six Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$4,650) for Chapter 81 Highway Work." Unanimous vote.

CHAPTER 90 HIGHWAY MAINTENANCE

Article 13. Voted: on motion of Road Commissioner Henry J. Poirier, seconded, "to raise and appropriate Thirty-Eight Hundred Dollars (\$3,800) for Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance." Unanimous vote.

CHAPTER 90 HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION

Moderator George W. Burnham called the meeting to order at 8 P.M. with more than a quota (20 voters) in the hall.

Voting list was used at main entrance to the hall with Mrs. Rose E. Davis (R) and Mrs. Rita C. Cutler (D), checkers. At the close of the meeting they gave the Town Clerk the voting list with 72 names checked.

Moderator read the call of the meeting and Constable's return of posting. He stated if there was no objection he would omit reading each article at this time as they would be subsequently read when presented for action. No objection voiced.

Permission was requested for Town Counsel Robert J. Gallagher of Westboro to be permitted to be seated on the main floor with the voters. No objection.

Town Clerk Newton requested a vote of appreciation of a One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) Trust Fund bequest by the late Mrs. Eliza Charlotte (Knowlton) Keith of Worcester, formerly of Upton and Grafton, the interest for use by the trustees of the Public Library. William H. Smith seconded the motion. So voted.

Mrs. Keith died in Worcester, June 24, 1969, at the age of 100 years, three months, and nine days. Her aunt, Mrs. Charlotte A. (Knowlton) Batchelor, a library trustee for several terms, made a bequest of \$5,000 to the town of Upton, interest for library purposes. Mrs. Keith's father, George W. PROCEEDINGS OF STATE PRIMARIES

September 15, 1970

Warden Robert K. Sweet (R) called the meeting to order at noon (12). Mrs. Shirley E. Kirby (D) deputy clerk, read the Warrant and Constable's return.

George W. Bishop was the first male voter and Mrs. Mary V. Powers, first woman voter.

Weather conditions: rain during much of the voting hours, sometimes only a drizzle.

Mrs. Rita C. Cutler (D) and William H. Smith (R) were ballot clerks at check-in table. Mrs. Claire B. Praskiewicz (D) and Mrs. Nancy E. Kennedy (R) at check-out table at ballot box. George W. Grebenstein (R), deputy warden, was at ballot box.

Mrs. Kirby (D), deputy clerk, was on duty from noon to 5 P.M. when she was succeeded by Samuel Nahra, Jr. (D) clerk.

Hourly reading of ballot box indicator: 1 P.M., 32; 2 P.M., 55; 3 P.M., 80; 4 P.M., 114; 5 P.M., 147; 6 P.M., 190; 7 P.M., 250 and 8 P.M., 305, (including four special Republican ballots).

There were 131 Democratic and 170 Republican ballots (regular) cast. In addition, there were the four special Republican ballots, (one ballot being for U.S. Senator and Congressman; other ballot for state-wide offices. Two persons who registered August 15, 1970 under the special provision declared Republican and received two ballots each. There were four such voters registered for this privilege.

Two Federal Court decisions entitled residents of at least six months in the state but not over one year as required by the state law, to vote. The decisions were handed down in recent weeks before the primary. These ballots cast were directed to be impounded (not counted) until after appeals to the court are determined.

Sealed boxes purporting to contain 746 Democratic ballots and 1,215 Republican ballots (regular) were turned over by the town clerk to Earden Sweet prior to opening of the polls. The warden placed them in charge of ballot clerks at check-in table, Mrs. Cutler and Mr. Smith. In addition, there were envelopes with the special ballots.

Tellers reporting at 8 P.M. were: Democrat, Mrs. Helen T. Jonis, Mrs. Mary V. Powers and Mrs. Ethel M. Dias; Republican, Mrs. Helen I. Donham, Mrs. Norma L. Taft and Mrs. Muriel J. Mitchell.

Tabulators: Edward J. Furphy, (D), and Mrs. Celestine I. Mason (D).

Primary workers took oath before entering on their respective duty which was administered by the town clerk.

Democratic results were announced by the town clerk at 9:15 P.M. and Republican results at 9:45 P.M.

Ballots, used and unused, were placed in separate containers, sealed and moved into the town vault. There the containers were locked in a special compartment and keys turned over to the town clerk.

SUMMARY

The proposed amendment to the Constitution amends the existing constitutional provisions which direct the division of the Commonwealth into 240 representative districts and 40 senatorial districts. It provides for a census of the inhabitants of each city and town in the Commonwealth in the year 1971 and in every tenth year thereafter. The census in 1971 is to be the basis for determining the representative and senatorial districts for the ten-year period beginning January 1, 1975. Each subsequent census shall be the basis for determining the districts for each ten-year period beginning the fourth January following each census, so that the census in 1981 will determine the districts as of January 1985, etc.

The amendment provides that the house of representatives shall consist of two hundred and forty members and the senate of forty members. In its first regular session following each census, the Legislature shall divide the Commonwealth into two hundred and forty representative districts of contiguous territory and forty senatorial districts also of contiguous territory. Each representative district shall contain, as nearly as may be, an equal number of inhabitants according to the census. Each senatorial district shall also contain as nearly as may be an equal number of inhabitants according to the census. A representative district shall not unite two or more counties, towns, or cities, or parts thereof, or a city and a town, or parts thereof, in one district unless the same is unavoidable. Further, no town of less than six thousand inhabitants shall be divided in forming representative districts. It is also provided that the County of Dukes County and Nantucket County shall each be a

representative district, notwithstanding the foregoing. The senatorial districts, each of which shall elect one Senator, shall be formed without uniting two counties or parts of two or more counties, unless the same is unavoidable.

Each representative shall be an inhabitant of the district for which he is chosen at least one year immediately preceding his election, and each senator shall be an inhabitant of the district for which he is chosen at the time of his election and shall have been an inhabitant of the Commonwealth for a least five years immediately preceding his election. Any representative or senator who ceases to be an inhabitant of the Commonwealth shall cease to represent his district.

The amendment also provides that the Legislature (1) may by law limit the time within which judicial proceedings may be instituted calling in question any such division and (2) shall prescribe by law the manner of calling and conducting elections for the choice of representatives and of ascertaining their election.

Finally, the amendment annuls the existing constitutional provisions with respect to apportionment of representative and senatorial districts, although those provisions will remain in effect until January 1, 1975.

PROCEEDINGS OF STATE ELECTION

November 3, 1970

Pursuant to the foregoing Warrant, Robert K. Sweet, (R) warden, called the meeting to order at 7 A.M.

Mrs. Shirley E. Kirby, (D) deputy clerk, read the call of the meeting and constable's return. On motion of Samuel Nahra, Jr., seconded by Alanson J. Varney, it was unanimously voted to dispense with the reading of the seven questions on the ballot.

Mrs. Rita C. Cutler (D) and Chester W. Walker (R) were ballot clerks at the check-in table; Mrs. Claire B. Praskiewicz (D) and Mrs. Nancy E. Kennedy (R) at the ballot box. George W. Grebenstein (R), deputy warden, was in charge of the ballot box. Police Officer Alanson J. Varney was on duty. Town Clerk administered oath to election officers before opening of the polls.

Warden Sweet received from the Town Clerk two sealed boxes purporting to contain a total of 2,062 ballots. Ballot box indicator was set at 0000. Inside of box was inspected by voters and officials and then locked.

Alanson J. Varney was the first male voter. Lois C. Leighton was the first woman voter.

Weather conditions during the morning - sunny and seasonal temperature, partly cloudy in the afternoon, rain at night after the polls closed.

Hourly reading of ballot box indicator: 8 A.M., 63 ballots; 9 A.M., 126; 10 A.M., 214; 11 A.M., 303; Noon, 352; 1 P.M., 390; 2 P.M., 470; 3 P.M., 541; 4 P.M., 670; 5 P.M., 832; 6 P.M., 1,004; 7 P.M., 1,218; and 8 P.M., 1,336.

The total (1,336) included two ballots cast by persons who had resided in Upton more than six months but less than one year. They registered October 3, 1970. These two ballots were marked "Impounded" in red pencil per instructions. When removed from the ballot box they were placed in an envelope by Warden Sweet, sealed, and turned over to the Town Clerk. Not counted, the ballots in envelope were placed in the safe in the vault with ballots impounded at the State Primary under similar instructions.

With the "Impounded" ballots removed, the total number of ballots cast was 1,334. Counting of ballots began at 8 P.M.

Included in the 1,334 ballots were 10 ballots cast by absent voters, including one registered serviceman and one unregistered serviceman. Also, one ballot cast by a registered voter to be in the Maritime Provinces who marked and filed his ballot at the Town Clerk's office. (One ballot of a registered serviceman was received two days after the election and filed.)

At 1 P.M. six envelopes purporting to contain ballots of absent voters were processed in the Selectmen's room, Town Hall. Eighteen voters registered, also two special - Congress and full state ticket.

August 1, Noon to 10 P.M., 22 registered (Between March 11 and August 15, 42 registered at hall; also, 42 regular voters and four Special voters at Town Clerk's Office.)

Tabulation: (list revised by voters moving from town or death, New names added.) Republicans 623; Democrats 314; Independents 714; total 1,691; plus four special for Congress and full State slate.

September 25, Registration for State Election at Town Hall, 7 to 10 P.M. One man - three women registered.

September 30, 1970, Town Hall, 7 to 9 P.M. Seven men - eight women registered.

October 3, 1970, Noon to 10 P.M. (Final date for State Election and registration for Special Town Meeting - 3 days including new registration hours, noon to 7 P.M.) Registered six men and eight women for State Election. (Two of the women who registered after 7 P.M. not eligible to vote at Special Town Meeting.)

Tabulation: for State Election, Republicans 656; Democrats 345; Independents 719; Total 1,720. For Special Town Meeting - Total 1,715 (Special voters for Congress and State candidates ruled not privileged to vote in municipal affairs.)

Noticable progress was made during the year in phases of administration under the responsibility of the Selectmen. Of major importance was the signing of contracts for the construction of the sewerage treatment and disposal plant and the commencement of work in November. The Methodist Church property was acquired and the students of the Blackstone Valley Vocational Technical High School began preliminary work on the renovation of the building into a library for the town, and offices for the Board of Health.

The Selectmen applied for and received Federal funds and participating funds for the purchase of a new ambulance and purchase of Radar and allied equipment.

The most pressing problem that is before the town is school facilities. After many frustrating meetings and delays, agreements were reached to effect an exchange of land between the state Dept. of Natural Resources and Fenwal, Inc.

In preparation of the portion of the Administrative Budget under our control we relied to a great degree on the recommendations of the Wage Study Committee.

The Board extends sincere appreciation to all town departments for their cooperation and to the voters for their support and encouragement.

DAY PROGRAM**A. January - June 1970****1. Enrollment**

At the beginning of 1970, 102 boys were in the senior class, 96 in the junior class, 93 in the sophomore class and 129 in the freshman class, making a total of 420 boys enrolled at the Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical High School.

2. Pupil Selection for the Fall of 1970

During the months of January and February all the schools in the member towns were visited by the Director of Pupil Personnel Services in order to give information to the boys in the eighth grade about the courses that are offered at the Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical High School. Applications were distributed and the students were requested to indicate their first, second, and third choices among the courses offered. Specially designed information forms were given to each school administrator, to be completed for each boy who planned to make application for admission to the Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical High School.

At a later date, applicant groups from the various towns were brought to the school so that they could visit each of the departments and actually see the program in operation. During the day they were given a series of aptitude tests involving verbal reasoning, numerical ability, mechanical reasoning, abstract reasoning, and spatial relations. The scores on the above tests and the information sheet provided by the sending school were evaluated in order to produce a profile of each applicant's characteristics. Each applicant's profile was recorded on a compilation sheet which served

to identify the most qualified students in each town. Every effort was made to admit the best qualified boys in each town, to give them their course preference, to distribute the courses as equally as possible among the towns, and to select each boy for the course in which he appeared to have the best chance of success. Due to the increased space made available by the addition to our school we were able to admit 160 boys into the freshman class. This represents a substantial increase over the number that we were able to admit before the construction of the addition. However, we were only able to admit 160 out of the 389 that applied.

3. New Track and Soccer Field

On June 18, 1970, the School Committee awarded a contract to the DiGregorio Construction Co. of Worcester to build a soccer field and a ¼ mile running track. This project was completed by late fall and will be ready for the outdoor track season in 1971. We now have excellent athletic facilities, both for indoor and outdoor activities.

4. First Graduation

Sunday, June 7, 1970 was the most memorable day of 1970 because on that day the first graduation of the Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical High School was held. 102 seniors received both their high school diplomas and their occupational certificates from the chairman of our school committee, Kelton Johnson.

All of the seniors were placed in jobs before graduation day, and 22 of the graduates decided to continue their education at institutions of higher learning.

This day marked the fulfillment of the dream of many individuals who had worked tirelessly over a period of many years to create a vocational-technical school that would fill a great need for many of the boys in this area.

B. September - December 1970

1. Enrollment

In September we started our fifth year of operation with 83 seniors, 89 juniors, 127 sophomores, and 161 freshmen for a total of 460 pupils. The number of boys from each of the towns was as

follows: 40 from Bellingham, 22 from Blackstone, 15 from Douglas, 53 from Grafton, 24 from Hopedale, 14 from Mendon, 67 from Milford, 62 from Millbury, 7 from Millville, 53 from Northbridge, 30 from Sutton, 25 from Upton, and 48 from Uxbridge.

2. Exploratory Program

This year, based upon the experience of the previous years, we decided to have all freshmen spend the entire first semester in their assigned department, with the understanding that all students who were not sure that they were in the right department would be given the opportunity to explore other departments of their choice during the second semester. Less than 10% of the freshman asked to go into the exploratory program, which clearly indicates that the vast majority of them were satisfied with their original choice.

3. Cafeteria

Our cafeteria staff continues to do an outstanding job for the students of our school. Once again our cafeteria was rated in the top ten in Massachusetts by the Massachusetts Bureau of Nutrition Education and School Food Services. The most meaningful rating is the extent of pupil participation. Our students participated to the extent of 140% while the average participation throughout the state was 67%. To paraphrase an old saying - "the proof of the rating is in the eating."

4. Lincoln Arc Welding Foundation Awards

For the third successive year Blackstone Valley Tech has soared to the top again, leading the entire United States in awards won by its students in the annual Lincoln Arc Welding Foundation contest.

Competing with hundreds of high schools throughout the country, 12 Valley Tech students came through with 3 National Grant Awards, 6 Regional Awards, and 2 merit awards, totaling \$2,625 in prize money for themselves and the school. The closest competitor was far behind, winning a total of only 3 awards.

The Lincoln Electric Company created the James F. Lincoln Arc Welding Foundation in 1936 to encourage interest and study in arc welding. The Foundation sponsors the Arc Welding Awards annually for full-time high school, technical or vocational school students in the United States 19 years old or younger. This Award Program offers an opportunity to compete for \$15,000 in regional

and national cash awards. These awards are made for the best written reports describing arc welded school shop projects. The entry must not be more than 25 pages in length and should contain detailed descriptions of the operations, all necessary calculations, photographs, sketches and drawings.

5. Cooperative Training Program for Seniors

In brief, this program involves on-the-job training during the week that the student would ordinarily be in his school shop. On the alternate week the boy will return to school for his academic and related work. Cooperative pupils must be paid wages during the work week at the cooperating establishment reasonably comparable to those paid to other persons doing similar work in the same company. While the students work the same hours and under the same conditions as other employees, they are legally considered as members of our student body rather than employees in the usual sense of the word.

During the first year of operation we had 82 seniors in the cooperative program. We could have provided placement for all seniors but some of them for personal reasons did not wish to go into the cooperative program. We feel that this program has been very successful because it gave our seniors an opportunity to get on-the-job training while they were still in school and at the same time it provided the employer an opportunity to have the services of a young man who has both skill and technical knowledge. The majority of the seniors became full-time employees of the cooperating companies upon graduation.

ADULT TRAINING PROGRAMS

1. Evening Trade Extension Courses

The evening trade extension courses for adults started Monday, October 5, 1970. These classes are open to persons over 16 years of age who are not attending school and who can show evidence of trade contact with the specific training desired. The following courses were offered: Auto Body Repair, Auto Mechanics, Mill and House Carpentry, Electronics, Electrical, Machine Shop, Metal Fabrication, Plant Maintenance, Drafting, Graphic Arts, Plumbing, and Blueprint Reading. A total of 387 adults were registered and 332 were enrolled in these courses. The number of students from each of the towns was as follows: 12 from Bellingham, 13 from Blackstone, 14 from Douglas, 24 from Grafton, 22 from Hopedale, 12 from Mendon, 75 from Milford, 15 from Millbury, 5 from Millville, 54 from Northbridge, 14 from Sutton, 32 from Upton and 40 from Uxbridge.

2. Automotive Machinist Program

This program was organized for unemployed young men under the provisions of the Manpower Development and Training Act. It was developed with the cooperation of an advisory committee from the Automotive Wholesalers Association of New England and it is the only program of its kind in the United States. The program operates 8 hours per day five days per week and is in session throughout the entire year.

The first section of this program started July 10, 1967 and we are currently operating the fifth section. This present group of young men will graduate on January 29, 1971. During the past three years we have given training to over 75 men and have helped them to become gainfully employed at no cost to the member towns inasmuch as this program is financed entirely with federal funds.

CONCLUSION

Midway through our fifth school year we feel that the Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical High School is operating efficiently and serving the people of the area effectively in several divergent capacities, as shown in the number of students who enrolled in the regular day program and in the adult training programs:

1. 460 freshman, sophomore, junior and senior boys in the day program.
2. 332 men and women in the Evening Trade Extension program.
3. 15 young men in the Automotive Machinist program.

Thus we have offered about 807 people the opportunity to further their education and to increase their vocational skills. In addition our school is in operation from 8:00 A.M. to 9:30 P.M. every day except Friday when we close at 4:30 P.M.

At the close of 1970 we feel satisfied with our year's achievements; our staff and students have all cooperated in help maintain the standards we have set in the previous years; and once again we would like to thank the communities of the region for their support and encouragement.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank \$20.21 known as the Knowlton School Fund, with the Town Treasurer as Trustee, to be used by the School Committee to defray extraordinary expenses at the Knowlton School. \$1.06 interest was received this year.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank, One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) known as the Ella (Whitney) Risteen Fund, in Trust with the Town Treasurer and School Committee as Trustees. The income is to be divided between two pupils in our High School who make the most progress during the year. Interest of \$69.13 was received this year and \$50.00 was expended.

There is deposited in the Worcester County Institution for Savings, One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) known as the Dr. Carpenter Library Fund. The income is to be used for the Public Library. \$51.15 interest was received this year.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank, Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) known as the Charlotte A. Batchelor Library Fund, in Trust with the Town Treasurer as Trustee. The income is to be used for the Public Library. Interest of \$259.15 was received this year.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank, a Fund known as the Library Construction Fund (Vote of Town, May 15, 1958). Interest of \$417.76 was received this year and the balance of the account on December 31, 1970 was \$7,688.76.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank, Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) known as the George W. Knowlton Fund. The income is subject to withdrawal by the Town Treasurer on order from the Selectmen and is to be used to help Townspeople who are in distress. REPORT OF THE MENDON-UPTON REGIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT COMMITTEE

This year marks the tenth year of Nipmuc Regional School and the Mendon-Upton Regional School District. Since the regional school concept was formed, we now have expanded our program from a 7-12 year regional school district to a K-12 organization. (The K stands for a kindergarten program that must begin by 1973.) You have read in previous reports some advantages for this change. The School Committee has been observant of harmonization of people's efforts with the similitudes of teams.

The first team is comprised of the teachers. Your Committee has seen a very dedicated organization with a great desire to help your child adjust to society and environment in which he must compete in his adult life. The Teachers Organization, The Mendon-Upton Regional Teachers' Association has for the past two years contributed more scholarship aid to students than any other teachers association in the Commonwealth. The Organization has awarded more than two thousand dollars this year to aid the seniors at Nipmuc in their attempt to further their education. The Organization's requests for compensation have been reasonable, and the greater portions of their recommendations have been for services to aid your child; such as, in the areas of better library services for the junior high school students and the need to continue the priorities for the second year of implementation of a Master Plan for the pupil personnel services department. Priority items for this year include a speech and hearing teacher, a secondary guidance counsellor, a high school remedial reading teacher, and a health education coordinator. The teachers at Nipmuc, who serve in the capacity of department heads, have recently been involved in visitations to neighboring schools, so that they may assist our building committee in establishing educational specifications for the proposed high school.

The second team includes the many members of the local governmental bodies that have advised us during the budget sessions and who have shown their interest in the progress we have had with the Department of Natural Resources. The members of the Finance Committees from both Towns spent many hours with your Committee as we discussed the proposed budget for the 1971 fiscal year. We also asked the Boards of Selectmen and Finance Committees to advise us as we negotiated several tracts of land that would be suitable for an exchange of land on Pleasant Street that is owned by the Department of Natural Resources.

A third team consists of the non-instructional staff members; the custodians, nurses, secretaries, and cafeteria personnel. The competence and dedication of these people have met the responsibilities required of their specific assignments. Space does not permit us to list all the faults of the buildings, but the Committee is well aware of the boiler in the Clough School, the condition of the roof and the often extreme heat in the kitchen area at the Memorial School, the leaking return heat pipes at Nipmuc.

The fourth team incorporates the members of the administrative council. The men who have served the Towns by supervising the instruction that is available for your children. The men who have been drawing to our attention the needs of the buildings that have served the students from the District and which are now showing their age. The men who have had to devise programs to challenge the pupil's quest for knowledge as we sought a solution to the overcrowded conditions for the hundreds of pupils attending Nipmuc.

These are the teams, but we also wish to express our thanks to the townspeople, for their support during the past decade. We seek your continued support as we strive to establish policy necessary for quality education during the seventies.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Mendon-Upton Regional School Committee and the Citizens of Mendon and Upton:

The year 1970 was a significant year for education in the Mendon-Upton Regional School District. Carrying forward a top administrative team as reorganized in 1969, strongly supported by a school committee with stable membership, the school system can point with pride to many solid accomplishments and a continuing concern for areas and issues of unresolved problems.

Probably the overriding administrative and legislative issue for 1970 was the matter of double sessions at Nipmuc Regional High School. Short sessions in some form had been the order of the day for secondary students in the towns of Mendon and Upton for several years. High school students (grades 9-12) were in school from

7:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. and junior high grades (7 and 8) were present from 12:30 to 5 p.m. These sessions are likely to be in effect for at least two to three more years, the minimum lead time necessary for at least two to three more years, the minimum lead time necessary to plan and construct a new high school.

There were educational compensations and education deficits. Students attending the morning session had a nearly complete academic program including use of library, clubs, sports, lunch program, and other extra-curricular activities. Students coming to Nipmuc in the afternoon were offered a basic academic program (within the four-and-one-half hour school day) and not much else. Classes omitted were industrial arts, home economics, general art and music, physical education, and most extra-curricular activities. A maximum effort has been made to provide as much enrichment as possible: additional class periods for vocal and instrumental music, library services four afternoons a week, art on a rotating two-week cycle, school paper, intramural sports activities at noon for both boys and girls. An "early bus" service now operates to bring junior high students to school at 11 o'clock in the morning three days a week for these activities.

Official permission of the State Department of Education has been granted one year at a time to operate Nipmuc on double sessions. Because of this, negotiators for the School Committee have been working most diligently to arrange a land exchange for an acceptable school site with the Massachusetts Department of Natural Resources. A site was chosen on recommendation of the Site Acquisition Committee in January 1970 - 47 acres on Pleasant Street, Upton, diagonally opposite the vocational school. Eleven months of meetings, conferences, on-site inspections with officials of Natural Resources resulted in an agreed exchange in November. The interest and assistance of town officials from both Mendon and Upton, area legislators, and citizen committees is gratefully acknowledged. As of the date of writing, the School Committee has re-engaged the services of an architect and has begun discussing methods of financing with the finance committees of the towns. All school construction for Mendon-Upton carries total state reimbursement for planning costs and 65 percent reimbursement for construction costs.

Maintenance needs are a "nagging thing". Concern remains for underground steam pipes that leak and for roofs that do not always hold water. Note should be made, however, of boiler and heating system repairs that have had some effect, water drainage line installed behind the senior wing at Nipmuc, the inauguration of a program to replace torn or missing curtains and drapes, the

accomplishments of the second year of a five-year painting program in the school district (for example, all of the exterior of the Ball School, the wooden section of the Clough School, the bus canopy and six classrooms at Nipmuc). and - significantly - the high quality of day-to-day maintenance being provided by a dedicated custodial staff.

Good staff relations are an absolute imperative. In 1970 salary schedules and fringe benefit schedules were established for classifications of employees who did not have them. The contract with cafeteria employees was rewritten for a year and a half to be co-terminus with other such working agreements. Negotiations for a major contract rewrite for the 1970-1971 school year were completed with the Mendon-Upton Regional Teachers Association in early spring. Salary negotiations with teachers for the 1971-1972 school year were completed in December 1970 in an atmosphere of complete understanding and resulted in a modest increase in minimum salary for beginning teachers with a bachelor's degree from \$6,900 to \$7,200.

By agreement, by law, and by good judgment, a public hearing on the proposed school district budget is held annually on or before November 15. The budget as originally developed in public school committee meetings with members of finance committees from both towns present was thus presented at a hearing in Nipmuc Regional High School on November 13, 1970. The operating budget was initially presented in the amount of \$1,296,348.15, an increase of 17.3 percent over fiscal 1970. Questions were asked and - it is hoped - meaningful answers given. Following that hearing the School Committee reviewed every line in the budget, made cuts totalling several thousand dollars, then adopted a budget for fiscal 1970 in the amount of \$1,285,276.15, an increase of 16.3 percent over 1970, comparing favorably to previous annual increases of 16.3% for 1970 over 1969, 14.6% for 1969 over 1968, 16.3% for 1968 over 1967. In December the School Committee examined the status of revenue accounts and voted to return to the towns as a budget credit the sum of \$118,084.39, consisting of \$99,680.00 from state aid for transportation in 1970, \$8,404.39 from N.D.E.A. funds, \$10,000.00 from other surplus.

Mr. Soter and Mr. Frigard have commented on several major program activities. Let us tabulate briefly:

1. Pupil personnel services department established; new staff already at work - elementary guidance counsellor, teacher of children with learning disabilities; new staff contemplated - speech - therapist, health education

- coordinator, junior-high counsellor.
2. Unified school library program in operation with staffing in elementary schools at 25 hours per week moving to 40 in fall of 1971, a clerk available to service Nipmuc four afternoons a week, a book acquisition program in effect leading to stocking 15 books per student in both elementary school libraries within ten years or less.
 3. More time for educational concerns by the elementary supervisor with implementation of the "head teacher" program at all elementary schools and secretarial service available full time in both towns.
 4. Several new course offerings at the high school level made possible through creation of additional positions in math-science-social studies September 1970 and planned in home economics in September 1971.
 5. Additional evidence of concern by School Committee and administration through creation of "transitional class" in grade 7 and additional teaching periods in art and music at elementary and junior-high grades.

I should like to close this report with reference to the graduation exercises at Nipmuc last June. There was genuinely active participation by students in the music -- instrumental and vocal -- and in the speaking. The words were obviously theirs, spoken with understanding, with candor, and with appreciation. You had the feeling they were glad they were there, pleased to be graduating from Nipmuc Regional High School -- and it was an evening when one could take great satisfaction from being superintendent of Mendon-Upton Regional School District.

REPORT OF THE NIPMUC REGIONAL HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

In looking back over the first ten years of existence of the Nipmuc Regional High School, did you know that:

1. The pupil enrollment has increased from 475 to 681 as of October 1, 1970.
2. The professional staff has increased from 26 in 1960 to 45 full-time and 4 part-time personnel in 1970.
3. In ten classes 683 young people have received diplomas.
4. Of these graduates 508 have gone on to further education of some kind (218 to four-year colleges and 290 to two-year colleges, nursing schools, trade and technical schools, etc.)
5. Forty-two have entered the armed forces.
6. The Teachers Association has given out \$18,475 in scholarships to graduates.
7. Five graduates are now teachers in the Mendon-Upton Regional School District.
8. For the second year now the entire school has been on divided and shortened sessions.
9. For every year we have to wait for much-needed additional facilities, more and more young people are being "short-changed" in the secondary phase of their education.

Since my last report a year ago, many changes and additions to the program have been made, among them the following:

1. In the high school the study of United States History has been expanded to a two-year sequence in order to give adequate time for a study of the subject. In the first year history from the colonial days through the Civil War is taken up, while in the second year a study of our country's history from the Civil War to the present is covered.
2. Half-year courses in Psychology, Comparative Russian-American Governments, American Minorities, and General Mathematics have been added.

3. All home economics courses except the ninth-grade general course have become half-year courses.
4. In the junior high school, Civics has replaced United States History for three sections of the eighth grade.
5. An Introductory Physical Science course for the top eighth grade section has been added.
6. A transitional class for seventh grade has been added.
7. Additional time has been scheduled for the junior high school band so that they met three days per week.
8. Extra transportation has been provided for the junior high school so that pupils may come to school early three days per week to use the library, participate in intramural athletics and to receive extra help from teachers.

In a constant effort to improve our staff and program despite the limitation of time and facilities imposed by split sessions, we are looking ahead to the addition of a second home economics teacher, a guidance counselor for grades seven and eight and the services of a coordinator to organize and implement a health education program. Also, we are looking for an expansion of our library program with the addition of a library clerk, both for the clerical work involved and the possibility of scheduling the use of the library, for four afternoons a week for the junior high school pupils.

We are also planning to expand the Introductory Physical Science program to two more sections in the eighth grade next year and to the entire eighth grade in two years.

I wish to extend thanks to all persons and organizations who contributed in any way to the operation of the school and particularly to those organizations who have given scholarships to members of the graduating classes.

REPORT OF THE SUPERVISOR OF ELEMENTARY EDUCATION

The Mendon-Upton Regional School District received a Federal grant of \$17,000.00 under Title I ESEA (Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965) to conduct a reading project for pre-first, first, second, third, seventh and ninth year students. Classes were held at the Memorial School, Upton and the Henry P. Clough School, in Mendon. The services of a speech therapist for diagnostic purposes and an attitudinal evaluator were contracted along with sixteen teachers to carry out a program that was successful, particularly for pre-first year children.

Pupil personnel services have rendered our elementary teachers invaluable aid in terms of back-up support in helping pupils with difficulties. Our elementary counselor has been working with pupils who have minor school adjustment problems and pupils with solvable major problems. A significant aspect of the service allows pupils to see the counselor if a particular problem or situation arises. If a child has a problem he or she can make an appointment to see the counselor without referral.

Pupils with learning disabilities have the services of a teacher trained in the above areas. The teacher is employed three days a week and mainly services the Upton Schools, but if the need arises, is available for children in the Mendon Schools. A seventh primary teacher services pupils at the Henry P. Clough School, primarily to relieve a relatively large second year enrollment. The teacher works full time thereby allowing her to work with other pupils on an individual basis.

Continuous progress or learning in reading and mathematics for pupils in years 1-4 in our district allows pupils to move vertically in the program according to rate of development and achievement. The concept of continuous progress leans toward the development of the individual pupil according to the dictates of his maturation process. As long as the pupil progresses he is experiencing success. To compare pupils within a school or class is unrealistic for each child is unique. Because reading and mathematics are skill subjects we must make the grouping as homogeneous as possible and keep in mind that individual differences still occur while instruction takes place. To carry out a truly effective program transitional teachers are needed to provide instruction of skills on a more individual basis.

We do not group in the social studies, science, music, art, and physical education and other areas. In these areas, children work together, as each child makes contributions at his own level. In the

heterogeneous situation the environment is more conducive for the development of values and attitudes. Emphasis is placed on the personal development of each individual and on self-understanding.

Our library program has been tremendously expanded through local financial effort. Upton has 300 volumes and Mendon has 2200 volumes along with reference books, magazines, encyclopedias, filmstrips and other audio-visual materials. Books were also purchased with Title II ESEA funds. In Upton audio-visual materials were purchased with Risteen funds. Because of the tremendous volunteer participation by parents, pupils have the opportunity to utilize the library for research work and projects.

In order to allow our fifth and sixth year students some freedom of choice, the last period of the day is set aside for special activities. Students participate in such activities as band, glee club, art club, physical education club, homeroom projects, library and study. The students enjoy the flexibility and feel more relaxed. The teaching staff is of the opinion that the flexibility is an outlet and has created better attitudes among the students.

The instrumental and vocal music programs are progressing and worthwhile programs are presented to both the school and public for entertainment. We are particularly delighted by the turnout of parents at our programs.

All pupils were given dental examinations by the state dental hygienist. The hygienist reported a highly favorable rating. Our school nurses give eye and ear examinations and weigh and measure each child. Pupils in year one and four receive a physicians examination. The school nurses also make home visits.

Our Parent-Teacher organizations have been very generous. The organizations donated tape recorders and record players to our schools. We appreciate their generosity and support.

I wish to express my gratitude to the Superintendent of Schools, School Committee, faculty and townspeople for their efforts, patience and continued support to provide the best possible education for our children.

REPORT OF CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Conservation Commission held five meetings during the 1970 season.

The Lake Wildwood Recreation Area has proved to be a popular picnic area now that people can find it. This situation has come about through your Commission erecting a sign at the entrance. The area has been kept free of brush and litter and in general maintained through the Commission's efforts.

An area behind the Coach Road Apartments has been cleared of brush and a picnic table, donated by the Commission, has been installed for use by the tenants.

The Commission hopes to acquire title land bordering Taft Pond to set up a picnic area and to afford access to this body of water.

Your commission was active in the HALT campaign to prevent the location of a jetport in a neighboring community. As of the time of this report the issue is to all appearances dead. Information concerning the above campaign is available from the Conservation Commission files on request.

Christopher Kent was selected and attended the Massachusetts Junior Conservation Camp which is directed by Massachusetts Conservation Incorporated in cooperation with the Massachusetts Departments of Education, Natural Resources and Division of Fisheries and Game. There boys 14 to 17 years of age are taught natural resource conservation and outdoor skills.

Air Pollution Primers printed and distributed were placed in the Town and school libraries.

Mr. Charles McLaughlin, Jr., Mr. Donald Keniston, Mr. Kenneth Fougere, Mr. Daniel F. Bates, and Mrs. John Heald were appointed Associate Members by the Commission. Your Commission looks forward to their enthusiasm and help in promoting further interest and action in conservation within the town.
