




WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

March 6 and 11, 1972

Worcester, ss

To the Constable of the Town of Upton, in the County of Worcester, GREETINGS:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are directed to notify the inhabitants of the town of Upton, qualified to vote in Elections and in Town Affairs, to meet at the Town Hall, in said Upton, on Monday the sixth day of March 1972, punctually, at seven (7) o'clock A.M. for the following purposes:

Article 1: To choose necessary officers for the ensuing year. All to be voted for upon one ballot. The polls wil be closed at eight (8) o'clock on the day of said meeting. The remaining articles in the warrant will be acted on at an adjourned meeting in Town Hall, Saturday, March 11, 1972 at two (2) o'clock P.M.

Article 2: To hear reports of all town officers and appointed committees, or take any action thereon.

Article 3: To see if the town will fix the salaries and compensation of all officers of the town as provided by section 108, General Laws as amended, and raise and appropriate such sums as may be necessary to defray expenses of Town Departments for the ensuing year, or take any action thereon.

Article 4: To see if the town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of revenue of the financial year

beginning on January 1, 1973 and to issue a note or notes therefor payable within a year and to renew any note or notes that may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with the General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17, or take any action thereon.

Article 5: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money under provisions of Chapter III, Section 85 of the General Laws, as an estimated amount for the Town's assessment for the care and treatment of persons suffering from tuberculosis and for the care, maintenance, and repair of the Worcester County Sanitorium, or take any action thereon.

Article 6: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 32, Section 22, General Laws, for Pension Fund, military service fund and Workmen's Compensation Fund of the Worcester County Retirement System, or take any action thereon.

Article 7: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds in the treasury a sum of money received from the sale of lots and graves during the year 1971, in accordance with General Laws, Chapter 114, Section 15, or take any action thereon.

Article 8: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds in the treasury a sum of money for Chapter 81 Highways, or take any action thereon.

Article 9: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds in the treasury a sum of money for Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance, or take any action thereon.

Article 10: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds in the treasury a sum of money for Chapter 90 Highway Construction work on East Street, Fisk Road and Glen View Street, or take any action thereon.

Article 11: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds in the treasury a sum of money for a sidewalk on the westerly side of School Street from Church Street to Stoddard Street, or take any action thereon.

Article 12: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds in the Treasury a sum of

money to the Conservation Fund set up under Article 24 of the 1966 Annual Town Meeting, or take any action thereon.

Article 13: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds in the Treasury a sum of money for the Town Water System Engineering study, or take any action thereon.

Article 14: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds in the treasury a sum of money to be used by the Council for Aging for operating costs, such as transportation, a program of "Meals on Wheels" and a drop-in center, or take any action thereon.

Article 15: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds in the Treasury a sum of money to be added to the \$1,500.00 previously voted at the 1970 annual Town Meeting to be used for the construction of a new garage at Lakeview Cemetery, or take any action thereon.

Article 16: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the cemetery commissioners to perform manual labor in Town Cemeteries and to receive monetary remuneration for their services, or take any action thereon.

Article 17: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds in the Treasury, or raise by borrowing and issuing its note or bond, a sum of money for the purpose of renovating the Town Library Building and the complete roofing of the Town Hall, or take any action thereon.

Article 18: To see if the Town will vote to approve any and all pay raises for Town Employees in excess of 5½%, said pay raises to be retroactive from January 1, 1972 or take any action thereon.

Article 19: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds in the Treasury a sum of money for the Street Light Account for the purpose of installing street lights, or take any action thereon.

Article 20: To see if the Town will vote to abandon a portion of South Street described as follows: Beginning at the Upton-Northbridge Town line, running in a general northeasterly

direction about 200 feet to the centerline of West River and thence continuing in a general northeasterly and easterly direction about 500 feet to a point opposite the division line between land of United States of America (Formerly land of Vera Mullen) and land of Douwe Nydam, or take any action thereon.

Article 21: To see if the Town will vote that in consideration of one dollar (\$1.00) and other valuable considerations paid by the United States of America, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, does hereby subordinate its right to maintain those portions of Glen Avenue, Maple Avenue, South Street and to the side slopes of Glen Avenue, West River Street, and relocated South Street, all within the West Hill dam and Reservoir project, Massachusetts, to the rights of the United States of America to flood and overflow up to elevation 269 feet above mean sea level as may be necessary by reason of the construction, maintenance and operation of said flood control project by the Government. The area of the said roads or slopes to be flooded are described as follows:

FLOWAGE RIGHTS

SOUTH STREET — Beginning at a point opposite the division line between land of United States (formerly land of Vera Mullen) and land of Douwe Nydam, said point being about 500 feet northeasterly of the center line of West River and thence running in a general easterly and northeasterly direction about 1500 feet to the top guide contour elevation of 269 feet, mean sea level, established for the West Hill Dam and Reservoir Project.

GLEN AVENUE — Beginning at a point where the top guide contour elevation of 269 feet, mean sea level, established for the West Hill Dam and Reservoir Project crosses Glen Avenue about 50 feet northerly of the northerly location line of Grafton and Upton Railroad and thence running northerly about 460 feet to the point where the aforesaid 269 foot contour recrosses Glen Avenue.

MAPLE AVENUE — Beginning at a point where the top guide contour elevation of 269 feet, mean sea level, established for the West Hill Dam and Reservoir Project crosses Maple Avenue about 175 feet northwesterly from the center line of Pleasant Street and thence running northwesterly about 370 feet to the point where the aforesaid 269 foot contour recrosses Glen Avenue.

FLOWAGE RIGHTS (SLOPES ONLY)

GLEN AVENUE – Beginning at a point about 185 feet southeasterly from centerline of Hartford Avenue and thence running southeasterly about 400 feet.

WEST RIVER STREET – Beginning at station 17 – 95.49 which is the end of 1959 county layout and also end of county layout dated October 10, 1941 and running southerly about 1450 feet.

SOUTH STREET (RELOCATED) – Beginning at the Upton-Northbridge town line and running northeasterly about 400 feet or take any action thereon.

Article 22: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds in the treasury a sum of money to be used to install lights at the Tennis Courts at Howard Leland Field, or take any action thereon.

Article 23: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds in the treasury a sum of money to be used for the purchase of the so-called "Allen Property", located on frontage of Pratt Pond and extending to wooded area to rear of pond, approximately twenty-four (24) acres, said monies to be at the disposal of the Conservation Commission for said purchase, and further, the Conservation Commission shall have the authority to apply to the Department of Natural Resources, Conservation Services, for matching funds for this project, or take any action thereon.

Article 24: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission to apply to the proper governmental agency for the purpose of securing any matching funds that may be available for the purchase of land or lands that will be used for recreational or conservation purposes, or take any action thereon.

Article 25: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds in the Treasury a sum of money for the purchase and installation of a new base station for the Town Radio System, or take any action thereon.

Article 26: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds in the Treasury a sum of

money for unpaid bills incurred during the year 1971, or take any action thereon.

Article 27: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds in the Treasury a sum of money sufficient to grade and resurface the remaining dirt section of Warren Street, thus making its condition commensurate with the already tarred portions of Warren Street, under petition of John S. Heald and others, or take any action thereon.

Article 28: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds in the Treasury a sum of money to be under the supervision of the Conservation Commission for the purpose of weed control in water located in the Town of Upton, or take any action thereon.

Article 29: To see if the Town will vote to accept a gift of money, said sum to be in the custody of the Town Treasurer, and to be designated the "Gary Bates Scholarship Fund", and to be administered by the Board of Selectmen and four registered voters, namely Charles John Mistretta, Elizabeth Francis, George McDonnell and Ormand Bates, Jr., said scholarship not to exceed \$200.00 each year, to be awarded to a deserving student of Upton who will be furthering their education, or take any action thereon.

Article 30: To see if the Town will vote to take a sum of money from available unappropriated funds in the Town Treasury to reduce the tax rate for the year 1972, or take any action thereon.

Article 31: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds in the Treasury a sum of money to the Finance Committee Reserve Account, said amount to be expended in accordance with Chapter 59, Section 25, of the General Laws, or take any action thereon.

And you are directed to serve this Warrant, by posting attested copies thereof at each of the following places in said Town, seven days at least before the time of holding said meeting: — At each of the Post Offices and on the Town House in said Town.

Hereof fail not, and make due return of this Warrant with your doings thereon, to the Town Clerk, before the time and place of meeting aforesaid.

**PROCEEDINGS OF
ANNUAL TOWN ELECTION**

March 6, 1972

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 A.M. Samuel Nahra, Jr. read Article 1 and notice of adjourned meeting to be held Saturday, March 11, 1972 at 2:00 P.M. A motion was made by Ernest B. Porter, Chairman of Selectmen to dispense with the reading of the Articles in the Warrant until the Town Meeting, Saturday, March 11 at 2:00 P.M. Motion was seconded by Bruno Ragagini. So voted. The remainder of the Warrant and constable's return was read. Samuel E. Aldrich was the first male voter and Shirley E. Kirby the first woman.

A box purporting to contain 2,000 ballots was turned over by the Town Clerk to George W. Grebenstein. Clerks at the check-in table were Kenneth W. Wood (R) and Rita C. Cutler (D). Mrs. Claire E. Praskiewicz (D) and Nancy E. Kennedy (R) were at the check-out table. Samuel Nahra, Jr., Clerk (D) was at the ballot box.

Motion carried.

Article 5: Voted: Unanimously that the Town vote to raise and appropriate \$218.21 under provisions of Chapter III, Section 85 of the General Laws, as an estimated amount for the town's assessment for the care and treatment of persons suffering from tuberculosis and for the care, maintenance and repair of the Worcester County Sanitorium.

Article 6: Moved that the Town Vote to raise and appropriate \$3,212.42 in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 32, Section 22, General Laws, for pension fund, expense fund, military service fund and workmen's compensation fund of the Worcester County Retirement system. Voted unanimously.

Article 7: Voted: Unanimously that the Town vote to transfer \$300 from the sale of lots and graves account during the year 1971 to the Oiling and Grading Account, in accordance with General Laws, Chapter 114, section 15.

Article 8: Voted: Unanimously that the Town vote to raise and appropriate \$4,650 for Chapter 81 Highway work, said monies to be used in conjunction with monies available from the State and County or both.

Article 9: Voted: Unanimously that the Town raise and appropriate \$3,800 to be used in conjunction with monies available from the State and County or both, for Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance.

Article 10: Voted: Unanimously that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,500 to be used in conjunction with monies available from the State and County or both, for Chapter 90 Highway construction work on East Street, Fisk Road and Glenview Street.

Article 11: Motion by Alanson Varney to pass over this Article. Motion carried.

Article 12: Voted: Unanimously that the Town raise and appropriate \$1,000 for the Conservation Fund set up under Article 24 of the 1966 Annual Town Meeting.

Article 13: Voted: Unanimously that the Town transfer from available funds, \$5,000 for the Town Water System Engineering Study.

Article 14: Moved that the Town vote to raise and appropriate \$2,000 to be used by the Council For Aging for operating costs, such as transportation, a program of "Meals on Wheels" and a Drop-In Center. A standing count was taken, 87 in favor and 36 opposed. Motion carried.

Article 15: Voted: Unanimously that the Town transfer from available funds in the Treasury, \$2,000 to be added to the \$1,500 previously voted at the 1970 Annual Town Meeting to be used for construction of a new garage at Lakeview Cemetery.

Article 16: Moved that the Town vote to authorize the Cemetery Commissioners to perform manual labor in Town Cemeteries and to receive monetary remuneration for their services. Motion carried.

Article 17: Voted: Unanimously that the Town vote to transfer from available funds \$35,000 to be used for renovations and repairs to town buildings, roof of Town Hall, and renovations of Library and Historical Society Building

Article 18: Voted: Unanimously that the Town approve any and all pay raises for town employees in excess of 5½%, subject to the approval of the Wage Stabilization Board, said pay raises to be retroactive from January 1, 1972.

Article 19: Voted: Unanimously that the Town raise and appropriate \$300 for the purpose of installing street lights on Fiske Avenue, Station & Plain Street, Pleasant Street, Prospect Street, Glenview Street, West Main at Williams Street and West River Street, Pole 41 and 47.

Article 20: Voted: Unanimously to pass over this Article.

Article 21: Voted: Unanimously to pass over this Article.

Article 22: Moved that the Town vote to raise and appropriate \$2,000 to be used to install lights at the tennis courts at Howard Leland Field. Motion carried.

Article 23: Voted: Unanimously that the Town authorize the Board of Selectmen to purchase the so-called "Allen property" located on frontage of Pratt Pond and extending to the wooded area to rear of the pond, approximately 24 acres, said property to be used for parks and recreation purposes, and that the sum of \$30,000 be raised and appropriated to defray the expense of this purchase.

Article 24: Voted: Unanimously to pass over this Article.

Article 25: Moved that the Town vote to raise and appropriate \$1,450.00 for the purchase and installation of a new base station for the Town Radio System.

Article 26: Voted: Unanimously that the Town transfer from available funds in the Treasury \$262.01 for unpaid bills incurred during the year 1971.

Article 27: Moved that the Town vote to raise and appropriate \$10,180 to be used to grade and resurface the remaining dirt section of Warren Street, thus making its condition commensurate with the already tarred portions of Warren Street (requested by John S. Heald and others). Motion defeated.

Article 28: Voted: Unanimously that the Town vote to raise and appropriate \$2,000 to be under the supervision of the Conservation Commission for the purpose of weed control in water located in the Town of Upton.

Article 29: Voted: Unanimously that the Town accept a gift of money with thanks and commendation, said sum to be in the custody of the Town Treasurer, and to be designated the "Gary Bates Scholarship Fund" and to be administered by the Board of Selectmen and four registered voters namely Charles John Mistretta, Elizabeth Francis, George McDonnell and Ormand Bates, Jr., said scholarship not to exceed \$200 each year, to be awarded to a deserving student of Upton who will be furthering their education.

Article 30: Voted: Unanimously that the Town take \$35,000 from available unappropriated funds in the Town Treasury to reduce the tax rate for the year 1972.

Article 31: Voted: Unanimously that the Town transfer from available funds in the Treasury, \$5,000 to the Finance Committee Reserve Account, said amount to be expended in accordance with Chapter 59, Section 25 of the General Laws.

It was moved, seconded and voted that all monies appropriated during this meeting, unless otherwise provided in the motion, be raised by taxation.

Selectman James J. Gallagher publicly commended the Finance Committee for the fine job they have done this year.

On motion of Chairman of Selectmen, Ernest B. Porter, it was voted to dissolve the warrant at 4:30 P.M.

QUESTION NO. 1**PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION**

Do you approve of the adoption of an amendment to the constitution summarized below, which was approved by the General Court in a joint session of the two branches held June 18, 1969, received 221 votes in the affirmative and 22 in the negative, and in a joint session of the two branches held May 12, 1971, received 238 votes in the affirmative and 14 in the negative?

SUMMARY: The proposed amendment would authoize the Legislature to enact a law that agricultural and horticultural lands shall be valued, for taxation purposes, according to their agricultural or horticultural uses. No parcel of land less than five acres which has not been actively devoted to such uses for two years preceding the tax year could be valued at less than fair market value.

QUESTION NO. 2**PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION**

SUMMARY: The proposed amendment would remove the prohibition against paupers from voting.

QUESTION NO. 4
PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION

Do you approve of the adoption of an amendment to the constitution summarized below which was approved by the General Court in a joint session of the two branches held June 18, 1969, received 264 votes in the affirmative and 1 in the negative, and in a joint session of the two branches held May 12, 1971, received 264 votes in the affirmative and 0 in the negative?

SUMMARY: The proposed amendment would authorize the Legislature to enact a law to permit the Commonwealth to make loans for tuition and board at any college, university or institution of higher learning to students who are residents of the Commonwealth.

QUESTION NO. 5
PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION

Do you approve of the adoption of an amendment to the constitution summarized below which was approved by the General Court in a joint session of the two branches held August 5, 1969, received 239 votes in the affirmative and 0 in the negative, and in a joint session of the two branches held May 12, 1971, received 266 votes in the affirmative and 0 in the negative?

SUMMARY: The proposed amendment would annul Article 49 of the Articles of Amendment to the Constitution and substitute a new amendment which declares that the people have the right to clean air and water, freedom from excessive and unnecessary noise, and the natural, scenic, historic and esthetic qualities of their environment.

It further declares that the protection of the right to the conservation, development and utilization of the agricultural, mineral, forest, water, air and other natural resources is a public purpose.

The Legislature is authorized to adopt necessary legislation and to provide for eminent domain takings where required for the purposes of the amendment. Any property so taken may only be used for other purposes or disposed of upon a two-thirds vote of the Legislature.

QUESTION NO. 6

PROPOSED AMENDMENT FOR THE CONSTITUTION

Do you approve of the adoption of an amendment to the constitution summarized below, which was approved by the General Court in a joint session of the two branches held July 2, 1969, received 204 votes in the affirmative and 49 in the negative, and in a joint session of the two branches held May 12, 1971, received 245 votes in the affirmative and 20 in the negative?

SUMMARY: The proposed amendment would authorize, but not require, the Legislature to modify the Massachusetts income tax laws by the use of graduated rates instead of the present flat or uniform rates. The Legislature could do this in any one of three ways:

1. Apply a uniform rate or percentage to an individual's federal income tax liability; or
2. Apply graduated rates to an individual's federal taxable income; or
3. Apply graduated rates to income determined to be taxable under Massachusetts laws. The Legislature would be authorized to provide for reasonable exemptions, deductions and abatements and make the definition of any term used in the state tax law automatically the same as it is under Federal law.

QUESTION NO. 7

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION

Do you approve of the adoption of an amendment to the constitution summarized below, which was approved by the General Court in a joint session of the two branches held June 18, 1969, received 198 votes in the affirmative and 63 in the negative, and in a joint session of the two branches held May 12, 1971, received 231 votes in the affirmative and 31 in the negative?

SUMMARY: The proposed amendment would require that all judges must retire upon reaching seventy years of age.

WARRANT FOR SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

December 28, 1972

To the Constable of the Town of Upton, in the County of Worcester,

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are directed to notify the inhabitants of the town of Upton, qualified to vote in Elections and in Town Affairs, to meet at the Town Hall in said Upton, on Thursday the twenty-eighth day of December, punctually at 7:30 P.M. o'clock for the following purposes:

Article 1: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from available unappropriated funds in the town treasury, the sum of seven hundred and twenty-five (\$725.00) dollars, said monies to be used by the Board of Health Department for nurses salaries, clerks salary, and expenses due to the increased number of visits by the public health nurse and moving expenses, or take any action thereon.

Article 2: To see if the Town will vote to transfer the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) from the Water Maintenance Account, and the sum of eighteen hundred dollars (\$1,800.00) from the Treatment Plant Maintenance Account to the Sewer Plant Expense Account for the purpose of erecting a building for the storage of treatment plant equipment, or take any action thereon.

Article 3: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from available unappropriated funds in the Town Treasury, the sum of three thousand dollars, (\$3,000.00) to be used by the Board of Water and Sewer Commissioners for the purpose of sealing approximately 820 feet of sewer line in the rear of Main Street, West Upton, or take any action thereon.

Article 4: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from available unappropriated funds in the town treasury, the sum of thirty-six hundred dollars (\$3,600), said sum to be used for the purchase of a new police cruiser station wagon, including trade-in of 1969 Pontiac Station Wagon, or take any action thereon.

Article 5: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from available unappropriated funds in the Town Treasury, a sum of money for the purchase of a two-way radio to be installed in the new police cruiser, or take any action thereon.

Article 6: To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the Police Training Account, the sum of five hundred fifty dollars (\$550.00) to the Cruiser No. 1 Gas and Maintenance Account, for

the purpose of purchasing a 1972 Ford Engine and transmission to be installed in Cruiser No. 1, or take any action thereon.

Article 7: To see if the Town will vote to transfer a sum of money from the State Aid to Libraries, Anticipation of Appropriation Account, to the Library Account, or take any action thereon.

Article 9: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from available unappropriated funds in the Town Treasury, the sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000.00) and in addition, the Treasurer, with the approval of the selectmen, be authorized to borrow the sum of thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000.00) for a period not to exceed one (1) year, under the provisions of Chapter 44, Section 8-(15), for the purpose of test well work, engineering, tank site acquisition, and all necessary work in connection with improvements in the town water system, or take any action thereon.

Article 10: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into agreements or take options for the purchase of land, determined necessary for the improvements in the town water system, or take any action thereon.

Article 11: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Sewer and Water Commissioners to adopt rules and regulations or ordinances to conform to the laws of Massachusetts, as defined in Chapter 83, Section 10 of the General Laws, pertinent to the operation of the town sewer system, or take any action thereon.

December 28, 1972

The meeting was called to order by Moderator George W. Burnham at 7:30 P.M. with more than a quorum of voters in the hall. Mrs. Nancy E. Kennedy (R) and Mrs. Rita C. Cutler (D) checked names at the main entrance of the hall. A total of 94 voters were checked before the close of the meeting.

The call to the meeting was read by the Moderator.

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DAY PROGRAM**A. January – June 1972****1. Enrollment**

At the beginning of 1972, 85 boys were in the senior class, 112 in the junior class, 140 in the sophomore class and 150 in the freshman class, making a total of 487 boys enrolled at the Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical High School.

2. Pupil Selection for the Fall of 1972

During the months of January and February all the schools in the member towns were visited by the Director of Pupil Personnel Services in order to give information to the boys in the eighth grade about the courses that are offered at the Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical High School. Applications were distributed and the students were requested to indicate their first, second, and third choices among the courses offered. Specially designed information forms were given to each school administrator, to be completed for each boy who planned to make application for admission to the Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical High School.

At a later date, applicant groups from the various towns were brought to the school so that they could visit each of the departments and actually see the program in operation. During the day they were given a series of aptitude tests involving verbal reasoning, numerical ability, mechanical reasoning, abstract reasoning, and spatial relations. The scores on the above tests and the information sheet provided by the sending school were evaluated in order to produce a profile of each applicant's characteristics. Each

applicant's profile was recorded on a compilation sheet which served to identify the most qualified students in each town. Every effort was made to admit the best qualified boys in each town, to give them their course preferences, to distribute the courses as equally as possible among the towns, and to select each boy for the course in which he appeared to have the best chance of success. This year we admitted 148 boys out of the 406 who applied for admission. That means that over 250 young men who wanted to attend this school could not due to lack of space.

3. Third Graduation

The third graduation of the Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical High School was held on Sunday, June 11, 1972. 82 seniors received both their high school diplomas and their occupational certificates from the chairman of our school committee, Kelton Johnson.

In spite of the fact that this area had one of the highest unemployment rates in the entire state we were very successful in finding jobs for all of our seniors who were available for employment. Approximately 22 percent of the graduates decided to continue their education at institutions of higher learning.

B. September – December 1972

1. Enrollment

In September we started our seventh year of operation with 108 seniors, 134 juniors, 130 sophomores, and 148 freshmen for a total of 529 pupils. The number of boys from each of the towns was as follows: 46 from Bellingham, 32 from Blackstone, 18 from Douglas, 65 from Grafton, 24 from Hopedale, 17 from Mendon, 72 from Milford, 61 from Millbury, 7 from Millville, 75 from Northbridge, 33 from Sutton, 27 from Upton, and 52 from Uxbridge.

2. Exploratory Program

This year, based upon the experience of the previous years, we again decided to have all freshmen spend the entire first semester in their assigned department, with the understanding that all students who were not sure that they were in the right department could be given the opportunity to explore other departments of their choice

during the second semester. Less than 10% of the freshmen asked to go into the exploratory program, which clearly indicates that the vast majority of them were satisfied with their original choice.

3. Cafeteria

Our cafeteria staff continues to do an outstanding job for the students of our school. Once again our cafeteria was rated in the top ten in Massachusetts by the Massachusetts Bureau of Nutrition Education and School Food Services. The most meaningful rating is the extent of pupil participation. Our students participated to the extent of 133% while the average participation throughout the state was 67%. To paraphrase an old saying - "the proof of the rating is in the eating."

4. Lincoln Arc Welding Foundation Awards

For the fifth successive year Blackstone Valley Tech has finished first in the entire United States in awards won by its students in the annual Lincoln Arc Welding Foundation contest.

Competing with hundreds of high schools throughout the country, 15 Valley Tech students won a total of \$2000 in prize money for themselves and the school. They won a First National Grand Award, a Second National Grand Award, and seven Regional Awards.

The Lincoln Electric Company created the James F. Lincoln Arc Welding Foundation in 1936 to encourage interest and study in arc welding. The Foundation sponsors the Arc Welding Awards annually for full-time high school, technical or vocational school students in the United States 19 years old or younger. This award program offers an opportunity to compete for \$15,000 in regional and national cash awards. These awards are made for the best written reports describing arc welded school shop projects. The entry must not be more than 25 pages in length and should contain detailed descriptions of the operations, all necessary calculations, photographs, sketches and drawings.

5. Cooperative Training Program for Seniors

The Cooperative Training Program is for seniors who have been certified by their instructors as being qualified to perform the work of their specialty in a highly satisfactory manner. This program involves on-the-job training during the week that the student would ordinarily be in his school shop. On the alternate week the boy will return to school for his academic and related work. Cooperative pupils must be paid wages during the work week at the cooperating establishment reasonably comparable to those paid to other persons doing similar work in the same company. While the students work the same hours and under the same conditions as other employees, they are legally considered as members of our student body rather than employees in the usual sense of the word.

Over one half of the seniors are in the Cooperative Training Program and we have many more placement opportunities than we can fill at the present time. We feel that this program has been very successful because it gave our seniors an opportunity to get on-the-job training while they were still in school and at the same time it provided the employer an opportunity to have the services of a young man who has both skill and technical knowledge. The majority of the seniors became full-time employees of the cooperating companies upon graduation.

ADULT TRAINING PROGRAMS

1. Evening Trade Extension Courses

The evening trade extension courses for adults started Monday, October 2, 1972. These classes are open to persons over 16 years of age who are not attending school and who can show evidence of trade contact with the specific training desired. The following courses were offered: Auto Body Repair, Auto Mechanics, Mill and House Carpentry, Electronics, Electrical, Machine Shop, Metal Fabrication, Plant Maintenance, Drafting, Graphic Arts, Plumbing, and Blueprint Reading. A total of 461 adults were enrolled in these courses. The number of students from each of the towns was as follows: 18 from Bellingham, 24 from Blackstone, 16 from Douglas, 38 from Grafton, 10 from Hopedale, 20 from Mendon, 73 from Milford, 22 from Millbury, 4 from Millville, 86 from Northbridge, 18 from Sutton, 42 from Upton, and 53 from Uxbridge. We enrolled an additional 37 students from towns that are not members of our regional school district. The tuition for these students was paid for by their towns.

CONCLUSION

Midway through our seventh school year we feel that the Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical High School is operating efficiently and serving the people of the area effectively in several divergent capacities, as shown in the number of students who enrolled in the regular day program and in the adult training program:

1. 529 freshman, sophomore, junior and senior boys in the day program.
2. 461 men and women in the Evening Trade Extension program.

Thus we have offered about 1000 people the opportunity to further their education and to increase their vocational skills. In addition, our school is in operation from 8:00 A.M. to 9:30 P.M. every day except Friday when we close at 3:00 P.M.

1972 has been a good year for us, and the reason lies in great measure in the cooperation between the staff, students, and the communities we serve. We have come to expect this loyalty and support, but we hope we will never take it for granted; therefore, it is fitting that each year when we report on our school's progress, we close with a sincere expression of gratitude to all who make it possible.

REPORT OF THE MENDON-UPTON REGIONAL SCHOOL COMMITTEE

To the Citizens of the Towns of Mendon and Upton:

The year 1972 could best be reported as one of change, demand, frustration, and promise.

Change came early as three seats became vacant for the March election. Mr. Richard Childs of Mendon, a devoted, concerned and knowledgeable school committee member for the past six years chose not to seek re-election. Also Mrs. Margaret Stanton of Upton and Mr. Dwight Davenport of Mendon, both appointed to fill unexpired terms, decided not to seek election. To these members we express our sincere gratitude for their service.

With the re-organization of the committee in April, several necessary steps were taken in order to start afresh towards a solution of new and old problems facing the board. The first action of the board was to establish new leadership in the school community. Mr. Gordon B. Allan, Superintendent of Schools since August 1969, was not issued a tenure contract and relinquished his duties in August 1972. The committee received and carefully reviewed sixty-five applications for this position. A number of them were personally interviewed, some more than once, before Dr. Charles R. Hand was appointed to fill the vacancy on September 11, 1972, effective October 16, 1972.

At the request of Richard T. Moore, Chairman of the Sub-Committee on Community Problems, Blackstone Valley Economic Study Commission, a meeting was held on April 27 with representatives of the State Division of Water Pollution Control, State Department of Public Health, School Building Assistance and Selectmen. This meeting aired the problems and possible corrections of this district. Among these were an addition to present facilities, new construction on a new site, and expansion of the district complying with the State mandate on a minimum 2,000 pupil enrollment K-12.

Furthering the quest to resolve the feasibility of construction of an addition to the present Junior-Senior High School; this committee solicited the aid of the boards of selectmen to continue and to bring to conclusion the work undertaken in 1967. These boards were asked to have evaluated this property or one on an adjoining site for the purpose of establishing if proper sewerage and

drainage conditions existed. On October 13 tests were carried out in the presence of interested parties and the year has ended without any firm commitment by the Regional Board of Health in Rutland as to their disposition in this regard.

We are still in the process of negotiations with the State Department of Natural Resources for the purpose of acquiring a site for possible new construction. At the same time, talks have been resumed with Hopedale in order to study the possibility of expanding the district to a three member town in order to comply with State mandate.

Finances continue to be a major portion of the business of the committee. Actual budget preparation began in September and lasted to our financial hearing in November. After which review and possible reductions were investigated until the end of the year. The advent this year of the eighteen-month budget caused much confusion both in preparation and in percent increases in some categories, as it becomes necessary to budget funds, particularly salaries for the entire contract year which extends beyond the budget year. In addition to the above time, much time was spent annually in the lengthy contract negotiations and in review of purchasing. Insurance was added this year to the list of items competitively bid resulting in some savings and the future holds promise of more of this type action.

This year after five years of over-lapping conditions on double sessions and no firm action taken to resolve this situation, the State Board of Education refused to continue the double session waiver beyond January 1973. Much credit is due to Dr. Hand for his ingenuity in presenting a workable and concrete plan to return to single sessions early next year, and this committee urges the townspeople to read his report for more detailed information.

At best with such short notice, any plan is not much more than a stop-gap measure and is not offered as a full remedy to the situation. Procrastination over school building and the cost of educating our children must cease. Action must be taken and in order to generate a feeling of community acceptance for any solution, cooperation must exist between our committee, staff, and all other responsible boards within the communities.

As cited above, three major plans are being investigated. An addition to the existing facilities, a new facility on a new site, and expansion of the district. One or more of these will most probably be submitted for your consideration next year.

Each year brings certain personal milestones, two of which occurred this year. With deep regret, the committee accepted the resignations of Mrs. Grace Hutchinson and Mrs. Pearl Kimball, two of our most outstanding and dedicated elementary teachers for a good number of years. We wish them a happy, long, and healthy retirement.

The committee wishes to extend their gratitude to the administrators, staff, members of various sub-committees, and all other town boards and departments that have contributed to our efforts during the past year.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Mendon-Upton Regional School Committee
and the Citizens of Mendon and Upton:

I submit herewith my first annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

I came to the district in October very favorably impressed with the caliber of your School Committee and administrators. I have not been disappointed. In fact, the spirit and tone of the entire school system is most commendable.

The district is to be congratulated for being one of nine in the entire Commonwealth to have regionalized kindergarten through grade 12. The kindergarten program will start in the Fall of 1973. We eagerly look forward to its implementation. Complete details will be available at a later date.

Your School Committee voted to abolish double sessions several days before the state disapproved our former abbreviated double sessions program. We are able to return to a single session as a result of the cooperation of many. My office will be moved to the Upton Town Hall, using the offices of the selectmen and assessors on a temporary basis. Office space will be available in the new Upton town office building at a later date. The present offices will become classrooms.

Seventh grade pupils will be housed in the Henry P. Clough School and the fourth grade students there will occupy the multi-purpose room. Grades 8 to 12 will be on a single session at Nipmuc. The High School Principal's report points out the shortcomings of this plan, and I concur with his comments. Your attention is directed to his report. The Elementary Supervisor views this shift of seventh graders as having educational value in terms of future planning. You are referred to his report for further details.

My efforts during the next few months will be directed toward alleviating our space problems at a minimum cost. I am hopeful that proposals will be made to the district in the Spring and that a satisfactory plan will be voted. The 1400 plus students are the reason for the existence of the Regional School District. We cannot let them down.

In conclusion, I wish to express my sincere appreciation to the School Committee members, administrators, faculty and other staff members, and the town officials and townspeople of both communities for their cooperation and support during my brief period of time here.

REPORT OF THE HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

At the time of the writing of this report, plans were being made to eliminate double sessions at the Nipmuc Regional High School.

I would like to emphasize that the changes made to eliminate double sessions must be understood to be but a temporary solution of our lack of space to provide the quality education deserved by the young people in our school system. In addition to the inclusion of the seventh grade pupils restricting the program at the Clough School, the eighth grade pupils still will not have the program they should have at the high school. Because of the high school programs now in existence in the areas of art, home economics and industrial arts, these areas will not be available to eighth-graders without a serious curtailment of the high school programs. Only a limited program of physical education will be available to the eighth grade. Also, the already cramped library space will be further strained, to the detriment of its vital purpose in the educational program.

In April of 1973 Nipmuc Regional High School will be evaluated by a committee of educators representing the New England Association of Schools and Colleges. During a three-day visit, this committee will carefully analyze a self-evaluation report which is being prepared by the school staff prior to the committee visitation. On the basis of this thorough analysis, the quality of education provided in our school will be evaluated to determine if we meet the necessary standards for continued membership in the Association. Staff members are to be commended for their co-operative effort in the self-evaluation process, which has taken place since the opening of school last September.

A significant change was made in our curriculum when last September we began a program of elective mini-courses (nine weeks in length) in our senior English classes. Instead of traditional courses, seniors were allowed to elect a minimum of four courses from a list of thirty which were offered. The following courses were then included in the curriculum because of greatest indicated interest:

1. The Bible as Literature
2. Satire: Theory and Practice
3. The Rewriting of Fiction
4. Poetry: A Closer Look
5. Heroes of the American West
6. The Comic Spirit in America
7. The Jazz Age
8. American Plays from 1920 to 1960
9. College Entrance Review in English

10. Greek Realities
11. Advanced Composition
12. Basic English Skills
13. Business English
14. The Mass Media
15. The American Short Story

A course in Environmental Science was also added to our curriculum this year.

To allow an expansion of the industrial arts program and thus make shop activities available to more pupils, a third teacher has been added to that department.

It is also gratifying to report that a high school student paper entitled the "Free Spirit" has made its appearance in our school, filling a void of many years standing. This endeavor merits the appreciation of all pupils and teachers.

Many thanks are extended to all persons and organizations who in any way helped in the operation of the high school during the past year.

REPORT OF THE SUPERVISOR OF ELEMENTARY EDUCATION

The shift of the seventh graders to the Henry P. Clough School and the placement of the fourth grade in the multi-purpose room will give us an opportunity to further explore some of the latest educational thinking.

The teachers in the fourth grade will have more space in which to work and will be able to incorporate some of the concepts of the open classrooms, one of the latest educational innovations.

The seventh grade teachers will be meeting with the administration and fifth and sixth grade teachers to discuss middle school concepts, thus preparing for a reorganizational, structural and curricula change for students in grades five through seven or eight, which hopefully will be more responsive to student needs. The middle school concept does not necessarily require a specific type of building in which to operate.

All first grade classes are in a new reading program prepared by the Open Court Publishing Company of Illinois. The program began in September after careful study by the staff. A series of workshops were held to prepare the staff in the teaching procedures. The first grade teachers are excited and have noted greater progress on the part of the pupils. Open Court utilizes a multi-sensory approach to reading with a strong emphasis in phonics. The public has an open invitation to visit our first grade classes and observe pupils reading legends, fables, fairy tales, taking dictation, writing stories and spelling words with good accuracy. In essence the program stresses a correlated approach in the language arts. The teachers involved report that they could not go back to the old system.

The Mendon-Upton Regional School District again received a Federal Grant of \$16,000.00 under Title I ESEA (Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965) to conduct a reading program for primary school pupils. The program places much emphasis on primary school age pupils and the director, Gordon Merten, feels that these pupils are highly motivated and responsive. The Title I people in Boston have praised our program.

Our Learning Disability Program has made great strides this year. Miss Deborah Wellman, Learning Consultant, utilized a volunteer aide program of parents and high school students. The volunteers are spirited and have significantly enhanced the program. Our Speech Therapist, Miss Myrna Feldman, reports progress with many of the children in her program. The members of the Pupil Personnel department and staff work as a team to assist pupils with special needs.

Our Library Program under the direction of Mrs. Barbara Burke, with supportive aid from volunteers supplements our regular school program. Without volunteer help our library program would operate at a minimum. The program is supported with local, federal and in Upton with Risteen Funds.

I would like to give special thanks to Mrs. Grace Hutchinson and Mrs. Pearl Kimball two dedicated teachers who have given to

pupils their love, patience, understanding, guidance and expertise. Mrs. Hutchinson and Mrs. Kimball retired this year after many years of rewarding contributions to our children, schools and community. May their future endeavors be blessed with happiness.

I wish to express my sincerest thanks to the School Committee, Superintendent, Staff, P.T.A., Volunteers and Townspeople for their support and understanding to provide the best possible education for our children.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

To Board of Selectmen
Upton, Mass.

The Annual Report of the Upton Planning Board is respectfully submitted.

In the year 1972 Upton felt more of the growth pressure that neighboring communities such as Milford, Hopkinton, Westboro and Grafton have been sustaining for years.

Upton saw approval of its first subdivision, a 39 lot development in Zone A, located off Fiske Avenue near the Memorial School, owned by Sarkisian Realty Trust. The Planning Board approved it because it conforms to all legal requirements. It is subject to our new and improved Subdivision Control Law, which law was formulated a year ago by the Planning Board and professional consultants (Thomas Associates of Universal Engineering). Note: Universal Engineering has designed many highways, including part of Route 495. The subdivision is subject to standard covenants and performance bonds, and to regulations of the Board of Health and others.

Another subdivision was submitted informally but withdrawn. In addition, as an indication of the demand for housing land, 39 plans, some of which included several lots, were submitted to the Board. These were not subdivisions. A subdivision consists of two or more lots, the creation of which requires a new road or roads. These come under the jurisdiction of the Planning Board.

As an indication of "growth pressure", asking prices for houses and land are greatly inflated, those for houses having increased in many cases 100% in the last five years, and as for land - we know of lots that are up 400 per cent. When lots become worth \$8000 and houses \$30,000 and up: (1) there is demand; (2) new lots are economically sound investments via the subdivision route (whether we like it or not); (3) our young people as well as the old and others with limited funds are priced out of the market; (4) apartment building becomes a growing trend.

Pressure by those seeking to build apartments became quite heavy in 1972. In anticipation of this, and on the advice of Universal Engineering, we created via zoning amendment requiring two-thirds voter approval limited garden apartment and town house allowances in Zones A and B only. However, this Zoning Bylaw has been short-circuited twice by the Zoning Board of Appeals by variance. As we feel this type of action is beyond the authority of that board, and as a variance granted becomes uncontested after twenty days, and also as no town body or citizen took action, we felt we should question it. Thus, on the second variance, the one involving 36 units in the Upton Inn, we took action under Chapter 40A, Section 21, and retained Attorney David Pagnini, who will bring the case to Superior Court. We should like to point out that we are not contesting this because we do not want apartments, but because we feel a bad precedent has been created at this critical time. We feel the Zoning laws are being nullified; our view is that the voters should be consulted, as this is a zoning change.

Proposals for three apartment complexes were presented to the town in 1972: (all on Route 140 in West Upton)

140 units at the so-called Bourassa pit (retracted because of conflict with the Zoning Bylaws). This was quite an attractive town house - garden apartment design.

36 units at the Upton Inn (granted by the Appeals Board).

100 units at the former Kartiganer factory, to be shown to the Planning Board shortly.

In other business, the Planning Board is backing immediate adoption of the state-sponsored BOCA building code and hopes to do so in conjunction with the selectmen.

Several zoning change proposals are on the agenda for 1973, including one for trailers, zoning changes in the Lake Wildwood area, in West Upton along Route 140, in other commercial-industrial-business areas, consideration of Planned Unit Development (cluster zoning), several technical rewordings, and gravel removal regulations. Any zoning change requires public hearings and two-thirds approval at town meeting.

We have had excellent consultant help since 1966 and would like to continue to retain this help, as planning is a complex procedure beyond the skills we possess. Good planning, if properly followed, will result in orderly, not chaotic, growth.

In closing, we would like to congratulate the Conservation Commission, the selectmen, and above all the voters for their farsightedness in acquiring the two large parcels of land on the north end of Pratt Pond.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE UPTON CONSERVATION COMMISSION

1972 was a year of increased activity for the Conservation commission. Through its efforts, the Town was able to purchase a key piece of property. This property is a 24 acre tract of land containing the so-called "Kiwanis Beach" area. It was a top priority item for the Commission for 1972.

The Commission co-ordinated the highly successful town-wide clean up in the spring. Numerous truck loads of trash were taken to the town dump.

Another important purchase of land by the Commission was the so-called Bryer property, a 10.3 acre tract of land located off of the Hopkinton Road. The land has acreage on Pratt Pond.

The Weed Control Project was carried out by the Commission on the Town ponds. It was a successful effort.

The Commission continued to have brush cleared on their property behind the Coach Road Apartments. They also had brush cleared, maintained the road, and maintained the beach area on their Lake Wildwood property.

The Commission has put into motion plans for the recycling of glass. This project will start in the Spring.

The first hearing under the new Wetlands Protection Act was held by the Commission. The permit to build a Farm Pond off of Grove Street was granted, with several restrictions.

The Commission followed up on various complaints of possible pollution of Town waters. These complaints were all investigated and resolved to the satisfaction of the Commission.

The Commission continued its policy of purchasing wildlife and Conservation magazines for the Town and school libraries.

Changes in the make up of the Conservation Commission included the resignation of Mrs. Janet Cooper from the Commission. She was replaced by Philip Palermo. Mr. Palermo was subsequently named chairman. New associate members are: Mrs. Gail Palermo and Miss Helene Foulke.

The Board of Selectmen, following the annual adjourned town meeting, organized officially for the year 1972 with Ernest B. Porter being elected Chairman of the Board; Mrs. Martha R. Williams, Clerk; Robert J. Gallagher, Town Counsel; and Rodney B. Mar-chand, Chief of Police and Building Inspector.

This past year has brought our Sewerage Treatment Plant construction to a conclusion, final inspection by the federal and state agencies having taken place on December 29, 1972. With final grant payments forthcoming within a few weeks, this account should reach a conclusion. Work on the former Methodist Church is progressing according to plan. With the exception of carpeting, the Board of Health are moved into their quarters. New library quarters are taking shape and work is continuing on the second floor area.

Several meetings have been held with the Capital Budget and Finance Committees, Water/Sewer Board and engineers relating to future work on our water and sewer systems. Townspeople should take particular note of the report of the Capital Budget Committee, a most important committee in dealing with the orderly capital expenditures in the future that should stabilize our tax rate.

We must make note of the fact that relative to the many criticisms that have been leveled at this Board, the Building Inspector and the Appeals Board, we are still awaiting hearings to make changes in our Zoning regulations, and it appears we are entering our eighth year awaiting a town building code, which now becomes a necessity, with the prospect of much building and renovation in our immediate future.

In conclusion, may we express our appreciation to the Finance Committee for their untiring efforts towards the financial structure of our town, and especially to their clerk, William C. Young for the many hours worked in our behalf. To the many other town officers and to our fellow citizens our thanks for the support and cooperation extended to us during the year 1972.

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING REPORT

It is with pleasure I submit my sixth annual report. There were 1894 visits made on 348 days to 206 patients in 1972. This represents a 25% increase over 1971. Visits were in the following categories.

Sixty three percent of all visits were made to our Senior Citizens. In addition to these visits, monthly Health Hours were held at Coach Road Apartments to assist residents with health needs.

In May the nursing service was recertified as a Home Health Agency under Medicare. At this time also the Massachusetts Department of Public Welfare initiated new guidelines for care given to all Medicaid recipients. Documentation has greatly increased and new policies established on each patient.

The Greater Blackstone Valley Mental Health Association of which Upton is a part continues to assist in the care of crisis situations and mental health needs for residents 18 years and older. New offices are now located at Linwood House, 154 Linwood Avenue, Linwood. Telephone 234-6301.

It is recommended that all Boards and Commissions having capital improvements that are permanent in character establish policies for financing said projects in whole or in part by betterment (special assessments). This Committee will be pleased to assist any Committee in its efforts to establish said policy.

The Committee takes this opportunity to express its appreciation to those who provided assistance and cooperation in the assembly of data to prepare the schedule.

**CAPITAL EXPENDITURES
FOR THE YEARS 1973 to 1978 INCLUSIVE**

We have attached our recommendations for expenditures for the Capital Improvements requested by the Town's Boards, Commissions, and Committees. The items in the order they appear on the schedule are:

FIRE DEPARTMENT

1. Addition to the Church Street Fire Station

It is recommended that an expenditure of \$25,000 for this improvement be made in 1973. This addition, approximately 30' x 58', will provide space which has been sorely needed for several years. The additional space will provide a more efficient method of storing vehicles, immediate access to all vehicles, and an area for drying hose.

2. Fire Truck

One of the existing pumper will be 25 years old in 1978, and it is recommended that a new truck be purchased in 1978. The normal acceptable life of a fire truck, as established by the Fire Underwriters, is 25 years. To minimize the affect upon the tax rate it is further recommended that \$10,000 be set aside for this purpose commencing in 1976.

BOARD OF HEALTH

Acquisition & Development of Refuse Disposal Site

The rapid filling of the existing dump will necessitate action by the Board of Health to acquire another site. Proposed expenditures are based upon estimates to acquire and develop land. However, anticipating availability of alternate methods, we encourage the Board of Health to investigate all possible means of refuse disposal.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

Road Construction

The Town receives grants from the County and State (Chapter 90) annually for highway construction which must be matched by the Town. Last year, and for several years, the Town has appropriated \$5,500 for this purpose. It is felt that highway construction, being permanent in character, is a Capital Expenditure and thus it is included.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

New Police Station

The Police Department has requested a new police station attached to the existing fire station. This would provide a centralized dispatching office for fire emergency vehicles and much needed additional space, resulting in a more efficient departmental operation.

REGIONAL VOCATIONAL SCHOOL COMMITTEE

Regional Vocational School Addition

The Regional Vocational School Committee has agreed to provide an addition to the existing school of sufficient size to permit the admission of 280 more students. This expenditure is recommended by this Committee.

MENDON — UPTON REGIONAL SCHOOL COMMITTEE

The Mendon — Upton Regional School Committee is included on the schedule because of the general knowledge of their problem. The critical need for additional classrooms for the kindergarten and the grade schools in Upton, and to alleviate the double schedules in the high school is of major importance. However, we have not received sufficient information pertaining to the proposed program to formulate our recommendations.

BOARD OF WATER & SEWER COMMISSIONERS

1. Sewer System Improvement

The Committee recommends the Town authorize the preparation of plans and specifications for the expansion of the sewer system to the Upton center area. The preparation of the plans will help reserve our grant eligibility with the Federal government and should expedite the application for any further financial aid from higher levels of government. The first stage of the plans would include the interceptor in Pleasant Street, the force main from the Center Brook Pumping Station to the interceptor, and the Center Brook interceptor. It is recommended that \$50,000 be appropriated in 1973 for preparation of plans and specifications for the above and acquisition of land and easements, and \$25,000 in 1974 for preparation of plans and specifications for street sewer improvements as necessary to comply with the Federal and state requirements for financial assistance.

2. Water System Improvement

At the annual Town meeting in March of 1972, the Town authorized an engineering study of the existing Town water system. The study was completed last fall and the results indicate that the Town's water supply may not be adequate as early as 1975. The study recommends that a new well supply be determined and an additional standpipe constructed. For this reason the Committee recommends that \$45,000 be appropriated to commence the initial phases of improving the Town's water system in 1973, with an additional \$20,000 in 1974. These initial appropriations would provide funds for the following: find a new well supply, purchase options on the land, prepare plans and specifications for the construction of wells, pumping station, and a new standpipe.

Your attention is called to the omission of recommended funding for construction of sewerage system improvements. The Committee concluded that sufficient information about the Federal grant assistance program of the Environmental Protection Agency was not available to enable the formulation of a recommendation.

TREASURER'S REPORT

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank, a balance of \$22.51, known as the Knowlton School Fund, with the Town Treasurer as Trustee, to be used by the School Committee to defray extraordinary expenses at the Knowlton School. \$1.13 interest was received this year.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Banks, One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) known as the Ella (Whitney) Risteen Fund, in Trust with the Town Treasurer and School Committee as Trustees. The income is to be divided between two pupils in our High School who make the most progress during the year. Interest of \$67.35 was received this year and \$50.00 was expended.

There is deposited in the Worcester County Institution for Savings, One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) known as the Dr. Carpenter Library Fund. The income is to be used for the Public Library. \$52.98 interest was received this year.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank, Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) known as the Charlotte A. Batchelor Library Fund, in Trust with the Town Treasurer as Trustees. The income is to be used for the Public Library. Interest of \$264.81 was received this year.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank, Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) known as the George W. Knowlton Fund. The income is subject to withdrawal by the Town Treasurer on order from the Selectmen and is to be used to help Townspeople who are in distress. Dear Sirs:

The Town of Upton once again has benefited from a Federal Grant which has funded a full-time patrolman and a full-time Town dispatcher located in the Central Square Police Station. These two full-time positions have upgraded the services to the citizens of Upton and have also been a tremendous asset to the Police Department. During the past year, two full-time Police Officers have successfully completed a two-week course in Crime Scene Search instructions held at the Mass. State Police Academy in Framingham. Also, a one-week course in Police Management and Problems held at the Command Training Institute, Babson College, Wellesley, Mass., was successfully completed by the Chief of Police. The Department has received a safety lecture in the use of firearms and related equipment, and several Department members have attended Law Enforcement related training courses throughout the past year. The administrative work has been completed on the posting of speed zones on several streets in the Town, and upon allocation of funds to purchase the necessary signs, this project will be completed in the spring of 1973.

I would like to express my appreciation for the cooperation given by the citizens of the community, the Board of Selectmen, and various other Town departments. I would also like to express my appreciation to the Auxiliary Police force for the donation of their own time to be of assistance to this Department, and to the citizens for appropriating the funds for purchasing equipment for our Auxiliary force.
