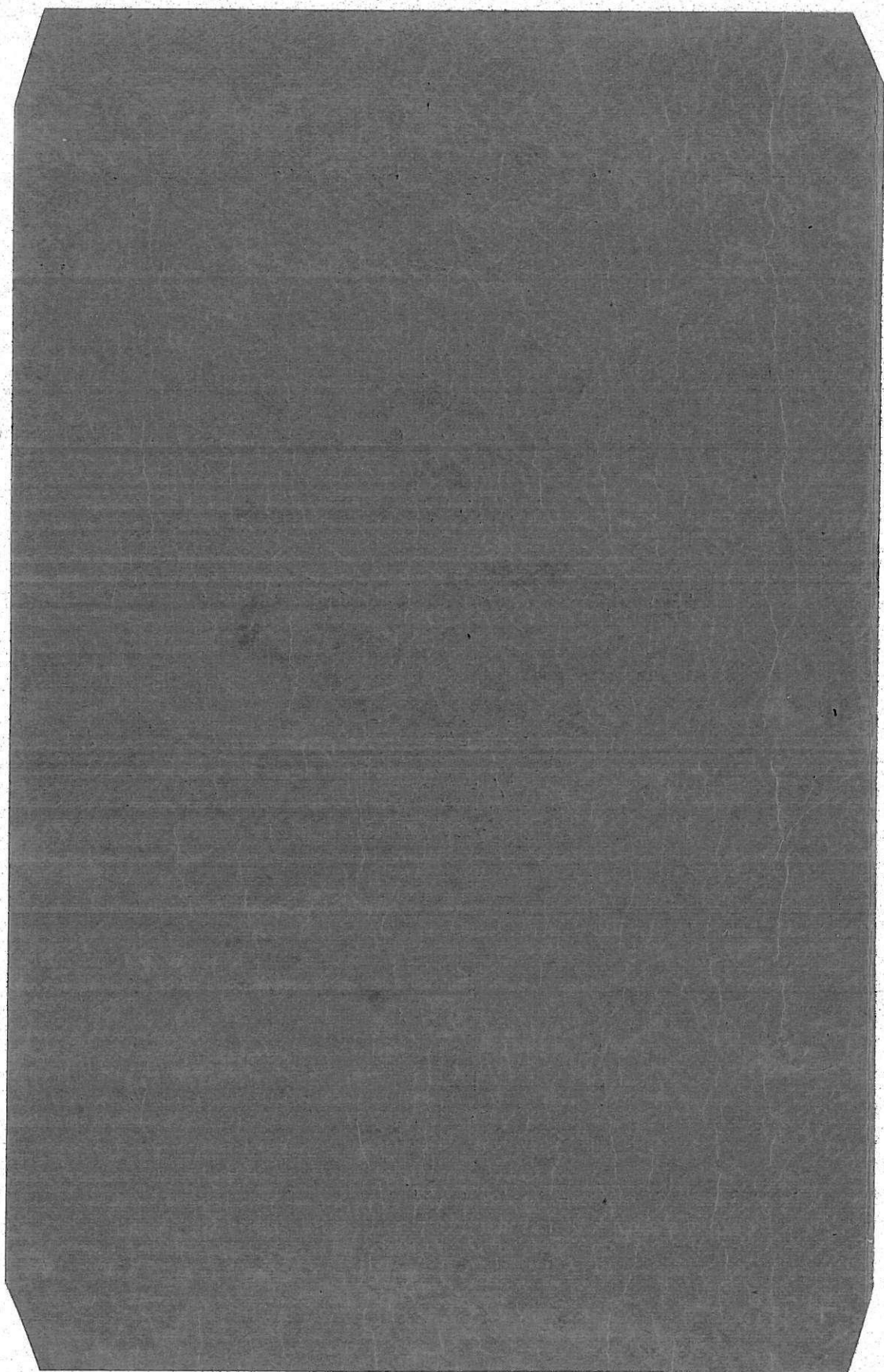


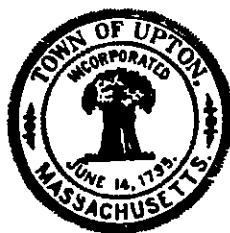

PROCEEDINGS OF SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

March 6, 1974

Moderator George W. Burnham called a five minute recess at 7:30 p.m. to give those in the entry hall a chance to be seated. After another recess the meeting was called to order at 7:50 p.m. by Moderator Burnham. Mrs. Rita Cutler and Mrs. Nancy Kennedy checked 314 names at the main entrance of the hall.

The Moderator read the call to the meeting. The motion was made by Chairman of Selectmen James J. Gallagher that the Town vote to accept an amendment to the Mendon-Upton Regional School District Agreement initiated and proposed by vote of the Mendon-Upton Regional School District Committee adopted on November 12, 1973 and entitled "Amendment No. 4 to the Agreement for a Regional School District for the Towns of Mendon and Upton providing for the admission of the Town of Hopedale as a Member Town," which proposed amendment amends and restates the Regional School District Agreement as previously amended, in its entirety.

The Finance Committee recommended by a 4 to 3 vote, favorable action on the article. Clarence R. Phipps, Chairman of the School Committee and John Robertson, Treasurer of the School Committee answered questions from the voters. After lengthy discussion, Rev. Robert A. Jackman moved that the question be presented for action, seconded and so voted.

A voice vote was called for. Moderator Burnham declared the motion lost on the voice vote. Several voters stood in opposition to the taking of a voice vote. Mrs. Edna Furphy moved for a ballot vote — motion carried.

The results of the paper ballot vote were announced by the Moderator as 171 opposed to the motion and 133 in favor of the motion.

It was moved by William C. Young to dissolve the warrant and to adjourn. So voted. Meeting adjourned at 10:35 p.m.

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are directed to notify the inhabitants of the town of Upton, qualified to vote in Elections and in Town Affairs, to meet at the Town Hall, in said Upton, on Wednesday the twenty-seventh day of March, punctually, at seven-thirty (7:30) o'clock p.m. for the following purposes:

ARTICLE 1. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from available unappropriated funds in the town treasury, a sum of money to supplement the nursing clerk salary account, or take any action thereon.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from available unappropriated funds in the town treasury, a sum of money to be used in the Board of Health Nursing Service Account, or take any action thereon.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, or appropriate from available unappropriated funds in the treasury, a sum of money for Chapter 81 Highways, or take any action thereon.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from available unappropriated funds in the town treasury, a sum of money to be used for furniture for the Town Treasurer-Collector's office, or take any action thereon.

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate, or transfer from funds available in the Sewer Treatment Plant Account, a sum of money for the purchase of a compressor and a reserve tank for use of the Water/Sewer Department and the Fire Department at the Sewerage Treatment Plant, or take any action thereon.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from available unappropriated funds in the Town Treasury, a sum of money to be used for the purchase and installation of an air horn at the Sewerage Treatment Plant, or take any action thereon.

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from available unappropriated funds in the town treasury, a sum of money to be used by the Upton Fire Station Addition Study Committee in the preparation of plans and specifications for an addition to the Church Street Fire Station, or take any action thereon.

PROCEEDINGS OF SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

March 27, 1974

Meeting was called to order at 7:30 by Moderator George W. Burnham. The call and warrant was read by the moderator. John Richards and Mrs. Cynthia McCrum of the Milford Visiting Nurse Association were allowed by the moderator to be seated on the main floor.

ARTICLE 1. Motion to appropriate \$810.00 from available funds was lost.

ARTICLE 2. Voted: Unanimously that the town appropriate from available unappropriated funds in the town treasury, \$1,700.00, to be used in the Eoard of Health Nursing Service Expense Account for the Physiotherapist.

ARTICLE 3. Voted: Unanimously that the town appropriate from available unappropriated funds in the Treasury, \$2,306.00, said monies to be used in conjunction with monies available from the state and county or both, for Chapter 81 Highways.

ARTICLE 4. Voted: Unanimously that the town appropriate from available unappropriated funds in the town treasury, \$530.00, to be used for furniture for the Town Treasurer-Collector's office.

ARTICLE 5. Motion by Selectman Ernest B. Porter that the town authorize the expenditure of \$5188.65 from the balance in the Sewer Treatment Plant Construction Account by the Board of Water/Sewer Commissioners and/or the Board of Selectmen, for the purpose of adding an approximately 18' x 12' x 12'

addition to the control building at the sewerage treatment plant; to purchase and install a Quincy Model F325, two stage, 5 h.p. Air Compressor with a 3'x9' Air Reservoir with legs, and the necessary plumbing of air into base of wet-well. Moderator declared the motion not proper as the Article did not mention a building. Town Counsel concurs with moderator. Article passed over.

ARTICLE 6. Voted: Unanimously to pass over this article.

ARTICLE 7. Voted: Unanimously that the town appropriate from available unappropriated funds in the town treasury, \$3,000.00 for use by the Upton Fire Station Addition Study Committee in the preparation of plans and specifications for an addition to the Church Street Fire Station.

ARTICLE 8. Voted: Unanimously that the town appropriate from available unappropriated funds in the town treasury, \$8,000 to be used by the Library Trustees for the purchase of carpeting, draperies, and other necessary furnishings in the new library quarters, deemed necessary for efficient operation.

ARTICLE 9. Voted: Unanimously that the town appropriate from available unappropriated funds in the town treasury, \$1,400.00 to be used for the completion of the siding at the rear of the new library building.

ARTICLE 10. Voted: Unanimously that the town name the new town building "The Knowlton-Risteen Memorial Building," and that the town appropriate from available funds in the town treasury, \$300.00 for a directory sign to be located on or in said building.

George G. Newton requested that he be recorded in favor of the above motion. A letter was received by the selectmen from Attorney Henry C. Walker also in favor of the forementioned name for the building.

It was voted unanimously to dissolve the warrant and to adjourn. This meeting adjourned at 8:05 p.m.

Checkers at the door to the hall during this meeting were Mrs. Nancy Kennedy (R) and Mrs. Rita Cutler (D). During the meeting 101 voters were checked into the hall.

GREETINGS:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are directed to notify the inhabitants of the town of Upton, qualified to vote in Elections and Town Affairs, to meet at the Town Hall, in said Upton, on Monday the sixth day of May, 1974, punctually at seven o'clock a.m. for the following purposes:

ARTICLE 1. To choose necessary officers for the ensuing year. All to be voted for upon one ballot. The polls will be closed at eight (8) o'clock p.m. on the day of said meeting. The remaining articles in the warrant will be acted on at an adjourned meeting in Town Hall, Saturday, May 11, 1974, punctually at two (2) o'clock p.m.

ARTICLE 2. To hear reports of all town officers and appointed committees, or take any action thereon.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or appropriate from available unappropriated funds in the Treasury, and/or from proceeds received or to be received from Federal Revenue Sharing, (State and Local Fiscal Assistance Act of 1971) a sum of money to be used for infiltration/inflow analysis and evaluation of existing sewers in the town as required by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency as a prerequisite for sewer construction grants, and to authorize the Water and Sewer Commission to apply for, accept, and expend state and federal grants for this purpose, or take any action thereon.

ARTICLE 21. Voted: Unanimously that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$10.00 to supplement the Sewerage Treatment Plant Construction account to purchase an Air Compressor and Air Reserve Tank, and to construct an addition to

house same. This equipment to be used for Treatment Plant Maintenance and Fire Alarm Supply.

ARTICLE 22. Voted: Unanimously that the Town raise and appropriate \$2,200.00 to be used to purchase an air horn, controls, wiring, and to be mounted at the Sewerage Treatment Plant to supplement the present Fire Alarm System.

PROCEEDINGS OF SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

May 11, 1974

The meeting was called to order by Moderator George Burnham at 4:00 p.m. The call to the meeting and constable's return was read by the moderator. Selectman James J. Gallagher requested a five minute recess. Meeting again called to order at 4:05 p.m. As requested, Article 4 was acted upon first.

ARTICLE 4. Voted: Unanimously that the Town of Upton accept the "Building Officials and Code Administrators International Inc." code, as amended, commonly known as "BOCA BASIC BUILDING CODE", as amended.

ARTICLE 1. Moved that the town vote to amend the zoning map of the Town of Upton dated 1958 and revised in 1969, which will change the commercial and industrial business district to single Residence B district, that area in West Upton bounded by Main Street, the flood plain district, the railroad, Maple Avenue and the General Business district. A standing count was taken. Three voted in favor, 125 opposed. Moderator declared motion lost.

ARTICLE 2. A standing count was taken on the motion that the town vote to amend the zoning map of the Town of Upton, dated 1958 and revised in 1964 and 1969, changing from General Business district to Single Residence C district the area bounded by the town line, West Main Street, Glen Avenue, the flood plain district and the railroad. Sixteen voted in favor, 90 opposed. A 2/3 vote required. Motion lost.

ARTICLE 3. Voted: Unanimously that the town vote to amend the zoning map of the Town of Upton, dated 1958 and revised in 1964 and 1969, changing from Single Residence B district to Single Residence C district that area bounded by the town line, Old Grafton Road, and West Main Street.

ARTICLE 5. Voted: Unanimously to pass over this article.

ARTICLE 6. Voted: Unanimously to pass over this article.

It was requested that Article 13 be taken out of order as engineers from New Hampshire were present to answer any questions.

ARTICLE 13. Voted: Unanimously that the town appropriate from available unappropriated funds in the treasury, the sum of \$37,000 to be used by the Water/Sewer Commissioners and with the approval of the Board of Selectmen, to

purchase certain parcels of land on Pearl Street and West River Street for capital improvements to the town water system.

ARTICLE 12. Moved and seconded that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$225,000 for the purpose of acquiring or constructing a new gravel packed well; a pumping station with appurtenant pumps, and automatic system controls and alarms; and an emergency standby engine. Said new well to be connected to the present Town Water System at Plain and Mendon Streets and at Pleasant and Mendon Streets and to determine to raise such sum by borrowing for a period of ten (10) years under the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 7 and/or 8. A standing count was taken. Ninety-three voted in favor, 7 opposed. Motion carried.

ARTICLE 7. Voted: Unanimously that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 to be placed in a special fund as authorized by the provisions of Chapter 773 of the Acts of 1973, inserting Section 53C in Chapter 44 of the General Laws for compensation to employees of the town for off-duty work.

ARTICLE 8. Voted: Unanimously that the town transfer the sum of \$1,306.50 State Aid Grant to Public Libraries to the library expense account.

ARTICLE 9. Voted: Unanimously that the town raise and appropriate \$1,000 to be used by the Highway Department on Cider Mill Lane.

ARTICLE 10. Voted: Unanimously to pass over this article.

ARTICLE 11. Voted: Unanimously that the town amend the Town Bylaws to establish a Personnel Board composed of two members appointed by and from the Finance Committee for one year terms and three members appointed by the Board of Selectmen for four year terms such that one will expire each year. Vacancies shall be filled for the unexpired terms in the manner of the original appointments. Said Personnel Board shall be established pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 41, Section 108C of the General Laws to administer compensation plans and advise the town in all matters pertaining to personnel and personnel compensation.

GREETINGS:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are directed to notify the inhabitants of the town of Upton, qualified to vote in Elections and in Town Affairs, to meet at the Town Hall, in said Upton, on Wednesday the seventh day of August, 1974, punctually at 7:30 p.m. o'clock for the following purposes:

ARTICLE 1. To see if the Town will, pursuant to General Laws, Chapter 82, Section 21, vote to discontinue a section of South Street described as follows, or take any other action relative thereto:

Beginning at the Upton-Northbridge town line running in a generally northeasterly direction about 200 feet to the centerline of West River and thence continuing in a generally northeasterly and easterly direction about 500 feet to a point opposite the division line between land of the United States (formerly land of Vera Mullen) and land of Douwe Nydam.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or appropriate from available unappropriated funds in the Town Treasury, the sum of \$48,600.00 for the purpose of highway improvements, said sum reimburseable by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts under Chapter 1140, Section 22 of the Acts of 1973, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to accept a grant from Henry C. Walker and Olive R. Walker of a perpetual forty foot wide easement over the present way extending from Elm Street to the public beach area at Pratt Pond, or to take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to amend the by-laws of the Town of Upton by adding the following new sections, or take any other action relative thereto:

PUBLIC DRINKING: (a) Whoever shall, within the limits of any public way located within the town, whether that public way be a town way, county highway, state highway, or a private way open to the public, consume intoxicating beverages, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars. This section shall also be construed so as to prohibit the following: The consumption of intoxicating beverages by any person while such person is standing, sitting, walking, running, or otherwise present within such way or is within any vehicle, whether parked or moving, which is within the limits of such public way.

(b) Whoever shall consume any intoxicating beverages in any public building, or on any public property, including parks, cemeteries, school houses and school grounds, and public squares, or in any private way or parking area regulated under the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 90, Section 18 shall be punished by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars.

(c) The foregoing paragraphs (a) and (b) shall not apply to any activity duly licensed by the Board of Selectmen under the applicable provisions of the Massachusetts General Laws.

(d) It shall be the duty of any police officer of the town to arrest any person who violates the provisions of paragraphs (a) or (b) and to cause such person to be brought before a Justice of the Third District Court of Worcester County upon a complaint for violation thereof.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to amend the by-laws of the Town of Upton by striking therefrom the provision adopted under Article 4 of the Special Town Meeting of December 27, 1965, and by substituting therefor the following provisions, or take any other action relative thereto.

LOITERING: (a) Whoever continues to stand, sit or loiter in, on or about any street, sidewalk or any public place so as to obstruct the free passage of travellers or vehicles thereon, after being directed by a police officer to move on or disperse, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty-five dollars.

(b) It shall be the duty of any police officer of the town to order any person, so acting as to obstruct the free passage of travellers or vehicles, to move on and disperse, and if the person so ordered does not forthwith obey, to remove such person, or to arrest and cause such person to be brought before a Justice of the Third District Court of Southern Worcester County, upon a complaint made for violation of the provision of the preceding paragraph (a).

Public Drinking: (a) Whoever shall, within the limits of any public way located within the town, whether that public way be a town way, county highway, state highway, or a private way open to the public, consume intoxicating beverages, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars. This section shall also be construed so as to prohibit the following: The consumption of intoxicating bever-

ages by any person while such person is standing, sitting, walking, running, or otherwise present within such way or is within any vehicle, whether parked or moving, which is within the limits of such public way.

(b) Whoever shall consume any intoxicating beverages in any public building, or on any public property, including parks, cemeteries, school houses and school grounds, and public squares, or in any private way or parking area regulated under the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 90, Section 18 shall be punished by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars.

(c) The foregoing paragraphs (a) and (b) shall not apply to any activity duly licensed by the Board of Selectmen under the applicable provisions of the Massachusetts General Laws.

(d) It shall be the duty of any police officer of the town to arrest any person who violates the provisions of paragraphs (a) or (b) and to cause such person to be brought before a justice of the Third District Court of Worcester County upon a complaint for violation thereof.

ARTICLE 6. Voted: Unanimously that the Town amend the by-laws of the Town of Upton by striking therefrom the provision adopted under Article 4 of the Special Town Meeting of December 27, 1965, and by substituting therefor the following provisions:

LOITERING: (a) Whoever continues to stand, sit or loiter in, on or about any street, sidewalk or any public place so as to obstruct the free passage of travellers or vehicles thereon, after being directed by a police officer to move on or disperse, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty-five dollars.

(b) It shall be the duty of any Police Officer of the Town to order any person, so acting as to obstruct the free passage of travellers or vehicles, to move on and disperse, and if the person so ordered does not forthwith obey, to remove such person, or to arrest and cause such person to be brought before a justice of the Third District Court of Southern Worcester County, upon a complaint made for violation of the provision of the preceding paragraph(s).

ARTICLE 7. Voted: Unanimously that the Town accept the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 90, Section 20C, regarding enforcement of parking regulations.

ARTICLE 8. Motioned that the Selectmen be authorized and directed to appoint a study committee of five members to report to the Selectmen within 45 days from their appointment as to municipal purposes for which the property known as the land and buildings of Kartiganer Hat Factory should be purchased or taken by eminent domain, costs of such acquisition, demolition of structures, construction and all things incidental and pertinent to said acquisition and pur-

chase, and any action which said committee may deem advisable with respect thereto; and to appropriate from available unappropriated funds a sum not to exceed \$1,000 for such appraisal as may be necessary and expedient for such possible taking or purchase. A standing vote was called for. Yes—104; No—50. Moderator declared the motion carried.

ARTICLE 9. Voted: Unanimously that the Town transfer from available unappropriated funds in the Town Treasury the sum of \$1,606 to pay unpaid bills of the fiscal year 1973/1974, in accordance with General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 64 as amended.

ARTICLE 10. Voted: Unanimously that the Town appropriate from available unappropriated funds in the Town Treasury the sum of \$3,500.00, said monies to be used to install a tank, pump and necessary fixtures on the U.S. Army truck now at the fire station, to be used as a tanker by the Upton Fire Department.

ARTICLE 11. Voted: Unanimously that the Town appropriate from available unappropriated funds in the Town Treasury the sum of \$585, said monies to be used for the installation of shelving in the Knowlton-Risteen Building.

ARTICLE 12. Voted: Unanimously that the Town appropriate from available unappropriated funds in the Town Treasury the sum of \$4,500, said monies to be used for plans for a new regional school.

ARTICLE 13. Voted: Unanimously that the Town appropriate from proceeds received or to be received from Federal Revenue Sharing, (State and Local Fiscal Assistance Act of 1972), the sum of \$19,000, said monies to be used for plans and specifications to extend the Town Sewer System to the Upton Center Area.

ARTICLE 14. Motioned that the Town authorize the Selectmen to purchase or lease, together with the Town of Mendon, land and buildings on Washington Street, Mendon, and to appropriate the sum of \$5,000 from available unappropriated funds in the Town Treasury, said purchase or lease to be used for the purpose of establishing, in cooperation with the Town of Mendon, a facility for a youth activity, guidance and educational center for the youth of the Towns of Mendon and Upton, said monies not to be expended if the Town of Mendon fails to appropriate and use a like sum for the same youth activity, guidance and educational center; and that the town authorize and direct the Parks Commission to enter into any agreement with the Town of Mendon and with the party or parties who shall operate said facility that may be necessary to obtain reimbursement to the Town of Upton of said \$5,000 should said facility terminate. A standing vote was taken. There were 160 in favor; 7 opposed. Moderator declared motion carried.

ARTICLE 15. Motioned that the Town amend the Zoning By-Law and Zoning map so as to include in the General Business District a portion of land in the single residence (Zones A & B) Districts, bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point in the southerly line of Route 140 at the intersection of the easterly line on the Zoning Map of the area presently zoned General Business.

Thence southerly along said easterly line of this area zoned General Business, to a point that is 100 feet perpendicular to the southerly side line of Route 140;

Thence easterly along a line parallel to and 100 feet southerly of the southerly line of Route 140, a distance of approximately 900 feet to a point in the intersection of the properties of George E. & Ruby A. Aldrich and Blanche O. and Edward A. Page.

Thence southeasterly along the dividing line between said Aldrich and Page properties to a point that is 300 feet perpendicular to the southerly side line of Route 140;

Thence easterly along a line parallel to and 300 feet southerly of the southerly line of Route 140, a distance of approximately 560 feet to a point in the intersection of the Page property and a small brook that runs southeasterly through a culvert under Route 140 at station 107-10 on the 1929 alteration to State Highway 140;

Thence northerly along the westerly side of said brook to a point to the intersection of said brook and the southerly line of Route 140;

Thence westerly along the southerly line of Route 140 a distance of approximately 1,450 feet to the point and place of beginning. A standing count was taken. There were 10 voting in favor, 93 opposed. Moderator declared the motion lost.

ARTICLE 16. Motioned that the Town amend the Zoning By-Law and the Zoning Map so as to include in the General Business district a portion of land in the single residence (Zone A) District bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point in the northerly line of Route 140 at the intersection of the westerly line of Elm Street;

Thence northerly along said westerly line of Elm Street, a distance of 200 feet to a point;

Thence westerly along a line parallel to and 200 feet northerly at the northerly line of Route 140, a distance of approximately 1,300 feet to a point in the easterly line of Warren Street;

Thence southerly along the easterly line of Warren Street, a distance of 200 feet to a point in said northerly line of Route 140;

Thence easterly along said northerly line of Route 140, a distance of approximately 1,300 feet to the point and place of beginning. A standing count was taken. There were 86 in favor and 18 opposed. Moderator declared the motion carried. (Letter received from Attorney General's office on September 23, 1974 stated that the Attorney General disapproved the above Zoning By-law amendment due to deficiency in the newspaper notice of the Planning Board hearing.)

The motion was made and seconded to dissolve the Warrant. So voted. Motion was made and seconded to adjourn. This meeting adjourned at 9:55 p.m.

QUESTION NO. 1. PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION.

Do you approve of the adoption of an amendment to the constitution summarized below, which was approved by the General Court in a joint session of the two branches held August 25, 1971, received 212 votes in the affirmative and 39 in the negative, and in a joint session of the two branches held June 6, 1973, received 235 votes in the affirmative and 19 in the negative?

SUMMARY. The proposed constitutional amendment, if approved, would replace the present Article 52 of the Articles of Amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth and would empower the General Court, by concurrent vote of the two houses, to take a recess or recesses amounting to not more than thirty days. The present Article 52 permits such recesses but provides that "no such recess shall extend beyond the sixtieth day" from the beginning of the legislative session.

QUESTION NO. 2. PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION.

Do you approve of the adoption of an amendment to the constitution summarized below, which was approved by the General Court in a joint session of the two branches held August 25, 1971, received 177 votes in the affirmative and 65 in the negative, and in a joint session of the two branches held June 6, 1973, received 166 votes in the affirmative and 93 in the negative?

SUMMARY. The proposed constitutional amendment, if approved, would provide for a census in the year 1975 and every tenth year thereafter of the inhabitants of each city and town as a basis for determining the representative, senatorial and councillor districts for the ten year period beginning with the first Wednesday in the fourth January following the taking of the census, provided that the districts as established based on the 1971 census shall terminate on the first Wednesday in January, 1979. The census shall specify the number of inhabitants residing in each precinct of a town and each precinct and ward of a city.

Under the proposed amendment, the House of Representatives would consist of 160 members, in contrast to the present membership of 240, and the Senate of 40 members. The General Court would, at its first regular session after the year in which the census is taken, divide the Commonwealth into 160 representative districts and 40 senatorial districts of contiguous territory so that each representative and each senator will represent an equal number of inhabitants as nearly as may be; and such districts shall be formed, as nearly as may be, without uniting two counties or parts of two or more counties and, with respect to representative districts, without uniting, as nearly as may be, two towns or parts of two or more towns, two cities or parts of two or more cities, or a city and a town, or parts of cities and towns, into one district, and without dividing any town containing less than 2500 inhabitants. The General Court would be permitted to pass laws to limit the time within which judicial proceedings may be instituted calling in question any such division. The proposed amendment further provides that every representative, for one year at least immediately preceding his election, shall have been an inhabitant of the district for which he is chosen, and every senator shall be an inhabitant of this Commonwealth for five years at least preceding his election and at the time of his election shall be an inhabitant of the district for which he is chosen. Every representative and senator shall cease to represent his district when he shall cease to be an inhabitant of the Commonwealth. The manner of calling and conducting the elections for representatives and for senators and councillors, and of ascertaining their election, shall be prescribed by law. The amendment vests original jurisdiction in the Supreme Judicial Court, upon petition of any voter of the Commonwealth, filed with the clerk of said court, for judicial relief relative to the establishment of House of Representatives, councillor and senatorial districts.

QUESTION NO. 3. PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION

Do you approve of the adoption of an amendment to the constitution summarized below, which was approved by the General Court in a joint session of the two branches held June 7, 1972, received 250 votes in the affirmative and 3 in the negative, and in a joint session of the two branches held June 6, 1973, received 253 votes in the affirmative and 0 in the negative?

SUMMARY. The proposed constitutional amendment would repeal section 2 of Article 46 of the Articles of Amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth (the "anti-aid amendment", so-called), and replace it with a new section 2, for the purpose of allowing grants in aid to private higher educational institutions or to students, or parents or guardians of students, attending such institutions.

The proposed amendment would delete the first clause of the present section 2, which requires that all moneys raised by taxation in the towns and cities for the support of public schools, and all moneys appropriated by the Commonwealth for the support of common schools shall be applied to or expended in only those schools conducted according to law under the order and superintendence of the authorities of the town or city in which the money is expended. The effect of the deletion of the first clause of section 2 would be to remove the constitutional prohibition against the use of public moneys, which have been raised by taxation or appropriated for support of public schools, for grants in aid to private higher educational institutions or to students, or parents or guardians of students, attending such institutions.

The proposed amendment would also alter the second clause of the present section 2 by removing the prohibition against a grant, appropriation or use of public money or property or loan of public credit by the Commonwealth or any political subdivision for the purpose of founding, maintaining or aiding any school or institution of learning, whether under public control or otherwise, wherein any denominational doctrine is inculcated, or any other school or any college which is not publicly owned and under the exclusive control, order and superintendence of public officers or public agents. In place of the foregoing, the proposed amendment would prohibit the grant, appropriation or use of public money or property or loan of credit by the Commonwealth or any political subdivision for the purpose of founding, maintaining or aiding any primary or secondary school which is not publicly owned and under the exclusive control, order and superintendence of public officers or public agents.

The proposed amendment would also add to the present section 2 a provision that nothing therein shall be construed to prohibit grants in aid to private higher educational institutions or to students, or parents or guardians of students, attending such institutions.

QUESTION NO. 4 LAW PROPOSED BY AN INITIATIVE PETITION

Do you approve of the adoption of an amendment to the constitution summarized below, which was approved by the General Court in a joint session of the two branches held May 17, 1972, received 131 votes in the affirmative and 121 in the negative, and in a joint session of the two branches held May 8, 1974, received 139 votes in the affirmative and 119 in the negative?

SUMMARY. The proposed constitution amendment would revise Article 78 of the Articles of Amendment to the Constitution to permit the expenditure of money from the highway fund for mass transportation lines and other mass transportation purposes in such manner as the Legislature may direct. The highway fund includes receipts from fees, duties, excises and license taxes relating to registration, operation or use of motor vehicles and taxes from the sale of motor vehicle fuels. The expenditure of money from such fund is presently restricted to highway and bridge construction, reconstruction, maintenance and repair, enforcement of state traffic laws, and administration of the tax statutes which provide highway fund receipts.

QUESTION NO. 5 LAW PROPOSED BY AN INITIATIVE PETITION

Do you approve of a law summarized below which was disapproved in the House of Representatives by a vote of 73 in the affirmative and 150 in the negative and was disapproved in the Senate by a vote of 16 in the affirmative and 22 in the negative?

SUMMARY. Provisions of the act establish an independent Corrupt Practices Commission, with five members to be appointed by the Governor to staggered five year terms. The Commission has subpoena powers and is to investigate, by means of secret hearings, candidates' compliance with all state and federal laws relating to political campaign contributions and expenditures and corrupt practices. If probable cause is shown, the Commission is required to direct the Attorney General to take further action in the proper form and is required to make public a report of such action. In cases involving the campaign practices of the Attorney General himself, a special attorney is to be appointed. If no probable cause is shown, the Commission is to state so publicly.

Further, the proposed act extends the application of the current statute regarding the disclosure of campaign expenditures and contributions, to all candidates for office above the town and city level, with the exception of President and Vice President of the United States. The act requires all such candidates to receive and disburse all amounts greater than \$25 by check, and makes it a crime to knowingly receive cash payment from a candidate or his committee for a service costing more than \$25. The act also requires candidates to designate a single bank as depository of funds and as recordkeeper, with records of receipts and expenditures to be open to public scrutiny.

Provisions of the act extend present campaign spending limits to cover all media expenses and require all media firms (including: television, radio, newspaper, billboard, magazine, advertising, public relations, printing, opinion polling, computer, telephone, telegraph) to report the purchase of media services by candidates. Media expenses of candidates for the offices of district attorney, clerk of court, register of probate and insolvency, register of deeds, county commissioner, county treasurer and sheriff are limited to \$.07 for each resident of the respective electoral dis-

strict. Other provisions of the act require candidates, upon official announcement or filing of nomination papers, to report all political receipts and expenditures since the date of the last general election for the office sought, and count such expenditures toward spending limits. The act also limits candidates to one political committee.

The act establishes a maximum penalty of one year imprisonment and/or \$10,000 fine for individuals engaged in corrupt practices, and a \$50,000 fine for corporations so involved. In addition, the Attorney General is permitted to bring an action for the removal of a candidate whose election was materially aided by corrupt practices on the part of the candidate or one acting in his behalf, where such removal is otherwise authorized by law.

QUESTION NO. 6

Should the General Court enact legislation during the nineteen hundred and seventy-five session reorganizing state government by creating a Department of Health Systems Regulation which shall have the power to administer the medicaid program, control and set rates for nursing homes, hospitals, and other health providers under medicaid, license and inspect health facilities, and regulate private health insurance policies, medical and hospital service plans?

QUESTION NO. 7

- A. Shall the pari-mutuel system of betting on licensed horse races be permitted in this county?
- B. Shall the pari-mutuel system of betting on licensed dog races be permitted in this county?

And you are directed to serve this Warrant, by posting attested copies thereof at each of the following places in said Town, seven days at least before the time of holding said meeting:—At each of the Post Offices and on the Town House in said Town.

REPORT OF CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Early in January the Conservation Commission regretfully accepted the resignation of our chairman, Phil Palermo, as he and his wife, Gail, who was also very active in conservation work, moved to New York. Sheila Porter, who had been an active associate member was appointed to fill this vacancy. Phil Stanton was our interim chairman until elections were held on May 28, 1974, at which time Jeffrey Levitt was elected chairman, Phil Stanton, vice chairman, and Melvin Shahan was re-elected financial secretary.

During the winter twenty-two wood duck boxes were constructed and placed at the former Bryer property on Pratt Pond.

We had one formal wetlands protection act hearing, and that was at the request of Holy Angels Parish concerning their parking lot construction adjacent to Center Brook. An amicable solution was reached and the Conservation Commission appreciates the compliance with its stipulations and the cooperation it received from those involved.

Informally we acted on several problem areas in town. A complaint concerning the Ramsey property on Route 140 was settled without the need of a formal hearing. We also acted on two complaints of contamination in brooks, one in West Upton and one in Upton center. Both turned out to be Board of Health problems and as such were turned over to their agent. The sanitary landfill at the town dump was reversed in its direction so as to avoid contamination of the water flowing into the West River.

We followed closely the hearings on the Wetlands Protection Act and we are presently working on new methods of enforcing the regulations without undue expense or inconvenience to property owners.

Flowers were planted by several commission members at the Coach Road Apartments and we also walked the land behind the Apartments to determine how we could best improve the land owned by the commission there and make it accessible to the tenants at the Coach Road Apartments. At this time we cannot construct an access road but in the future we look forward to having the funds available for this project, as there is no access to this conservation land either from Route 140 or Hartford Avenue.

Our glass recycling project has been continuing at the town dump.

Helene Foulke and Paul Swanson were reappointed to the commission as their terms expired in 1974. Paul Swanson declined reappointment but has agreed to serve the commission in an advisory capacity. This position has not been filled at this time.

At the request of the Bicentennial Commission we have decided to investigate several projects in the interest of beautification of the town, namely, having two roads in town, Taft Street extension and Miscoe Hill road declared scenic roads so that they may be preserved. We will also attempt to construct nature trails and mini-parks throughout our existing properties, i.e., Lake Wildwood, Bryer property near Kiwanis Beach and the lands behind the Coach Road Apartments.

It is our continuing desire to spot possible problems concerning the wetlands protection act before any work is begun in order to avoid the necessity of formal hearings and in order to assist the citizens of Upton with as little inconvenience as possible.

REPORT OF THE CAPITAL BUDGET COMMITTEE

The format of the report of the Capital Budget Committee is slightly changed from those submitted in the past to convey its recommendations to the Town's citizenry and elected and appointed officials with additional pertinent data.

The Committee's recommendations, which are a majority opinion, resulted from analyzing and evaluating each request as to its necessity, service it will provide to the Town, availability of aid from other levels of government, impact upon the tax rate, and effect upon the Town's fiscal policy.

The Committee recommends capital expenditures during FY-76 (July 1, 1975 to June 30, 1976) totalling \$200,000. Included within this amount is \$45,299 to be appropriated to the Stabilization Fund.

The Stabilization Fund can total 10% of the total assessed valuation of the Town and 10% of the amount raised by taxation in the preceding year may be appropriated in any one year. The Committee reiterates its position that the Stabilization Fund should be used to fund major capital improvements.

To equalize the impact upon the tax rate caused by annual capital expenditures the Committee recommends Stabilization Fund appropriations and expenditures to fund some of the future capital projects.

The Committee is concerned over the lack of a policy for financing capital improvements by betterment assessment. The continual funding of assessable projects from the general fund will cause continued increases in the tax rate on real property.

CAPITAL EXPENDITURES FOR FISCAL YEARS '76-'81

The attached schedule includes the tabulated recommendations for Fiscal Year '76 to '81 commencing July 1, 1975 to June 30, 1981 as recommended by the Capital Budget Committee and the present capital indebtedness of the Town.

ASSESSORS

The Assessors repeatedly requested aerial photographs and tax maps to provide more detailed information and enable them to perform more effectively and efficiently. Funds for this purpose were appropriated at the 1974 annual Town Meeting.

The State mandated equalization policy for property assessment has been upheld by the Supreme Court and the Assessors have requested funding to implement the revaluation. The Committee recommends that funds be appropriated for this purpose, however the funds shall not be encumbered until the State has notified the Town to proceed with the revaluation.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Conservation Commission has advised that they will determine the best use of existing lands under their jurisdiction and formulate a long range plan for the development of the lands. Accordingly, they will, at the appropriate time, request funding for the implementation of the long range plan.

FIRE

One of the existing pumpers will be 25 years old in 1978 and will not be recognized by the American Insurance Association when evaluating the effectiveness of the Fire Department equipment. To assure that the insurance rates on property within the Town are not adversely affected the pumper should be replaced.

The Committee recommends that funds for the fire truck be appropriated in FY-77, with the total cost (now estimated at \$60,000) to be spread over three years (FY-77, FY-78, and FY-79).

BOARD OF HEALTH

The Board of Health has not determined the specific action it will recommend to the Town to solve the refuse disposal problem. However, after evaluating the various alternatives the Board has requested \$50,000 in FY-77.

The Capital Budget Committee, because the existing method of disposal can be used for another year, recommends that the Town appropriate \$20,000 in FY-77 and \$15,000 in FY-78 and FY-79 anticipating that the Board of Health will resolve this problem within this period, and request Town Meeting approval of the required funding to implement their decision.

HIGHWAY

The Town receives grants-in-aid from the State and the County (Chapter 90) annually for highway construction which must be matched by the Town. These improvements being of a permanent nature are included in the schedule and recommended by the Town.

Also included is \$10,000 for sidewalk construction along School Street from the Ball School to Cross Street, which has been petitioned by the townspeople, and \$10,000 for an engineering evaluation of the Highway Bridges in accordance with the State Department of Public Works directive that all bridges be posted their allowable weights.

The Committee has been alerted to other needs of the Highway Department which are not included but which it wishes to present to the Town although specific recommendations are not submitted. They include a highway barn, equipment, and bridge reconstruction.

POLICE

Our original schedule in 1973 included a request for a new police station because the Department should have more modern facilities to provide more effective and efficient service for the Town. Accordingly the Committee recommends the station be included in FY-80.

SCHOOLS

In March of 1975 the Mendon-Upton Regional School Committee finally received the deed for the property on Pleasant Street opposite the Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational High School from the State. Congratulations are in order to the Committee members and the Superintendent of Schools for their untiring efforts in accomplishing the transfer.

The School Committee, we understand, proposes to erect a new high school on this property and has advised that funding will be requested for planning, designing, constructing and equipping the new facility in the near future. The estimated cost is \$4,750,000 which will be shared 55% Upton and 45% Mendon. The State School

Building Assistance Bureau may reimburse the district up to 75 percent of the total cost including interest.

SELECTMEN

The Selectmen have requested \$12,000 for the purchase of materials to be used in the renovation of Town Hall offices for town officials.

The materials will be installed by workmen obtained by the Selectmen through the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act of the Federal Government. The Committee recommends the Town appropriate the amount requested.

WATER AND SEWER

Recently the Federal Government has released funds for the construction of sewerage facilities. Because of this the Committee has recommended that the Town appropriate \$15,000 (\$4,000 in FY-76 and \$11,000 in FY 77) for the infiltration/inflow analysis so that all preliminary requirements of the Environmental Protection Agency and the Massachusetts Water Pollution Control Division will have been satisfied if funding for sewerage systems becomes available.

The Town appropriated funds for the construction of a second well field and the installation of water mains connecting the well field to the existing system at the last annual Town Meeting, and the Committee does not recommend any additional improvements to the water system.

The Committee is concerned and somewhat distressed over the failure of the Board of Water and Sewer Commissioners to promulgate a policy for assessment by betterment or other equitable basis the construction of sewerage system improvements. Said policy should be submitted to the Town for adoption or ratification as required.

The lower section of the schedule shows the existing indebtedness of the Town. A total of four items with annual payments during the period of this report (FY-76 to FY-81) ranging from \$95,701 in FY-77 to \$59,511 in FY-81. Impact on the tax rate ranges from \$6.00 to \$3.72 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation.

The Committee's recommendations, plus the existing indebtedness and appropriations to the Stabilization Fund totals \$200,000 for FY-76, FY-77 and FY-78 and \$220,000 for FY-79, FY-80 and FY-81. Assuming that each \$16,000 or appropriated funds equals one dollar additional on the tax rate, the proposed capital improvement program for FY-76 to FY-81 will increase the tax rate by \$3.25.

Palermo, Milk Inspector; Leo Morin, Health Agent who had replaced Mr. Francis and Mrs. Sandra Francis, Clerk. John Kinney who was appointed to fill out the unexpired term of Mr. Alvin Nichols was appointed Health Agent.

Mrs. Shirley Kirby covered the office as temporary clerk until a clerk, Mrs. Ruth P. Grillo was appointed.

Following the election in May, Esther K. Bird and Joseph Gorman, Jr., newly elected members were properly sworn into office. At the organizational meeting Esther K. Bird was appointed chairman, Jean Fowler — treasurer, and Joseph Gorman — Acting Board of Health Agent.

In June an Anti-Rabies Vaccination Clinic was held with well over 250 dogs vaccinated.

Roger Clark, Warren Street, Upton was appointed Board of Health Agent.

Contact was made with Middlesex Laboratory regarding food handlers inspection and consequently a meeting was held with its representative, Mr. Robert W. Rimbach.

The Board met with the Finance Committee requesting funds for a professional food handlers' inspection. A warrant was submitted at a special town meeting for \$550.00 for this inspection, which was granted and the inspector was then contacted.

Due to conditions at the sanitary land-fill, commonly known as the "dump," it seemed feasible to close the dump, Tuesdays and Wednesdays and stay open On Mondays, Thursdays, Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays. These new hours were not eagerly accepted at first. To continue along with the sanitary land-fill, the Board received word from the State Dept. of Public Health that the land-fill had 16 violations, being the second warning against us. Measures are being taken to remedy these violations; again, the hours will be changed. The Board members have attended recycling meetings, visited land-fills, incinerators and other disposal plants meetings.

In December Mrs. Marjorie R. Wilcock, R.N. resigned as town nurse. Following her resignation, the Milford Visiting Nurse Association terminated its contract for supplying nursing supervision. Other means are being pursued to have supervision continued.

The Board of Health met several times with the Professional Advisory Board regarding nursing service policies. A new nurse was appointed and will begin her duties in January 1975.

Meetings were also held with the Central Massachusetts Mosquito Control to discuss its program for this town. Dr. Lawrence W. Smith, Jr. and his staff attended.

Several properties have been investigated. Property on Route 140, bordering Lake Wildwood was condemned for a faulty septic system and building structure. The state engineer was called in and the situation is under study. The Upton Inn Associates were informed that they were not to use the sanitary-landfill for demolition material.

It has been a full year with many problems and challenges. We wish to acknowledge with thanks the cooperation of the Board of Selectmen, Finance Committee and townspeople who have helped in any way.

REPORT OF THE WATER AND SEWER COMMISSIONERS

For the year ending December 31, 1974

During the past year, the townspeople accepted the recommendation of the Water-Sewer Commission concerning the need for additional water supply and approved the purchase of a new well field site and installation of connecting main lines on West River and Mendon Streets. Also, approval was given for a new pumping station on West River Street. Land was acquired on Pearl Street for future use as a site for a new standpipe.

As of December 31, 1974, the well field installation has been completed as has approximately 95% of the main line project. The balance of this work and the new pumping station should be finished early spring, 1975.

During the year, 70,322,800 gallons of water was pumped, with the month of August being the highest with 8,371,000 gallons, and February being the lowest with 6,157,600 gallons. (No meter was in use from September 25 to November 25, as it was being rebuilt.)

REPORT OF THE LOCAL SUPERINTENDENT OF INSECT PEST CONTROL

Dutch Elm and Insect Pest Control

Chapter 657

During the year 1974, twenty-eight (28) elm trees were removed that were infected with Dutch Elm Disease. All twenty-eight (28) tree samples were taken by your Local Superintendent of Insect Pest Control, and sent to Shade Tree Laboratories at the University of Massachusetts, Amherst, Massachusetts.

All roadside elm trees were sprayed with a mist blower for the control of the Elm Leaf Beetle.

Once again the town was hard hit by the Fall Web Worm, and many small cherry trees were cut down, and caterpillar infested branches were burnt at the town dump. In some cases a long pole was used with cloth rags tied over the end of it, the cloth was set on fire, and the infested branches ignited. The nests were burned with little, or no damage done to the trees.

I wish to thank public officials, state and district supervisors, town officials, and townspeople for their help and cooperation in 1974.

In June, Deputy Chief, Thomas Francis, retired from the fire department. He had served as a fireman and a member of the board of engineers for 36 years. The board wishes to thank him for the many years of faithful and dedicated service to the town and to the department. Robert J. Prentiss, a member of the department for 27 years, was named to succeed Deputy Chief Francis.

During the past year a rebuilt water tank truck has been put in service. The chassis of the truck has been loaned to the town by the U.S. Army through Ft. Devens. The town appropriated the money to have a 1500 gallon tank built on the chassis. The 1941, 1200 gallon tanker, in use for several years, is now out of service.

A new state law, which becomes effective in 1977, requires that all personnel in the ambulance service be registered Emergency Medical Technicians. The law states that every member of an emergency ambulance service must attend the 81 hour Emergency Medical Technician Training and pass both a practical and written examination. The department has one registered Emergency Medical Technician at the present time and several other members of the department are now attending the course at Milford Hospital.

Through the use of Federal Emergency Employment funds, a full-time fireman is now on duty at the Church Street fire station. He is subject to call for fires, ambulance service, and work in the station. He is on duty Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Among the many problems the Mendon-Upton Regional School District Committee has to solve each year, the most prevalent one is space. As a possible solution to this problem, representatives from Mendon, Upton and Hopedale (otherwise known as the Regional Planning Committee) continued working toward Regionalization.

In February, 1974, the Regional Planning Committee worked on educational specifications and facilities for a proposed new three-town regional high school. After many meetings and countless hours of work, the case of Regionalization was brought to the people. Regionalization was defeated in March.

We thank the Selectmen, Finance Committee Members and the State Department of Education for the time they gave to our communities in trying to carry out Regionalization.

On May 28, 1974, it was voted to employ Dr. John E. Marshall as Educational Consultant. After studying a report presented by Dr. Marshall, the School Committee voted to go in the direction of a new high school. The size of the School Building Advisory Committee was increased to five members from each town, one of the members from each town was a school committee member. The School Committee members, along with the School Building Advisory Committee members, have visited several high schools in the surrounding communities and are gathering information from various sources. In 1975, we will be asking the voters of both towns to approve the construction of a new high school.

The transferring of properties (VanBossuyt and Cardinal) for the land off Pleasant Street in Upton is impending. There have been many road-blocks with this transfer which have caused aggravating delays but the end is near.

In order to help alleviate the space problem, portable classrooms were rented for Mendon and Upton in 1973. However, this is not a solution to the problem but only a temporary relief. The problem of space can be further recognized by the fact that the school population has increased from 1,496 in the year 1973, to 1,573 in the year 1974. Because of the increase in kindergarten enrollment from 112 in the year 1973, to 139 in the year 1974, a third kindergarten class had to be established in a small room in the basement of the Henry P. Clough School and a third classroom was added at the Memorial School. At this writing, it is not known how much of an increase will be forthcoming for the next school year.

Because of our overcrowded situation, needs in the occupational training areas are not being met. It is the children who are being deprived. As voters, we need your support. We have space needs in our school system and we need your help.

According to State law, Chapter 766 had to be implemented by September, 1974. This has been a learning experience. The School Committee joined the Blackstone Valley Special Needs Collaborative along with six other towns for the fulfillment of Chapter 766. Cooperating in this way, we have been able to solve needs for our children in these special areas at a minimum cost.

Through the efforts of our Principal, Mr. Anthony H. Gulla, Jr., Miss Lucille Gilbert, Business Education - department head and the staff at Nipmuc Regional High School, we received approval of two Federally funded projects. One grant, in the amount of \$9,513 was for Office Occupations and the other grant, in the amount of \$20,865 was for Typing and Related Occupations. Under the Federal grant, Felice Shechtman was appointed as Work-Study Program Director.

Among the many occurrences in 1974, was the implementation of a school radio station at Nipmuc Regional High School which was started by the students in February and was in full operation by May. The Music department had several exchange concerts with other communities. The Open Court reading system has been very successful and extended from kindergarten through the third grade. Title I summer program which is very successful has been continued. Several meetings with the Student Advisory Committee members were held. These meetings helped the School Committee to become aware of the ideas and thoughts of the students and to allow for better communication. Release days were continued in order that the teachers could better coordinate their various programs, kindergarten through grade twelve. The year 1974, also brought the retirement of Richard Hickmott, custodian at the Henry P. Clough School. We appreciate his efforts over the past years. Also, we appreciate the efforts and support of the Upton Citizen's Advisory Group (CAGE).

Ceremonies were held dedicating the gymnasium at Nipmuc Regional High School to the memory of Wilho Frigard, a devoted principal for many years.

It is also with deep regret that we recall the deaths of Janet Stockwell, school nurse for the District for 14 years; Laurie Thompson, bus contractor in the system for many years, and Attorney J. Laurence Doyle, School Attorney. Attorney Henry C. Walker was appointed School Counsel.

Mrs. Nancy Bradley of Mendon and Mrs. Cynthia Seitz of Upton were re-elected as School Committee members. Mr. Allan Byrne was appointed Vice Principal at Nipmuc Regional High School after the resignation of David Flynn. Steven Gressak was appointed to the Guidance Department.

For the first time, the teachers had a Massachusetts Teachers Association Negotiator and the School Committee had Attorney Henry Stewart to help them work on a contract. As a result, a two-year contract was agreed upon. A two-year agreement has also been worked out with the secretaries, custodians and cafeteria.

Because of the energy crisis at the beginning of 1974, school buildings were closed to outside organizations but as the crisis eased, they were reopened to be used by many groups for diversified purposes.

The School Committee is very grateful to our Superintendent and all other staff members, and to the townspeople for their cooperation during this past year.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

Once again, the single most important problem facing Nipmuc Regional High School is the lack of space. Of parallel importance to the citizens of Mendon and Upton is the continuing effort of the School Committee to present to the communities an organizational and facilities plan which, through adoption and implementation, will provide educational space at the high school and elementary school levels for the present and the future.

Nipmuc Regional High School should provide the following:

1. Education for all students in grades 8-12
2. Equality of educational opportunity
3. Comprehensive programs for all students
4. Individualized student programs

We at Nipmuc Regional High School are proud of the school which the towns of Mendon and Upton have provided for the education of their children. Within our limited facility, we are trying to offer the best education possible to meet the needs

of the individual student; however, the changing needs of society, of which the students are members, dictate that our curriculum must change. The present school building is not capable of handling the curriculum needed to educate students entering present-day society. To counteract this deficiency, we are seeking the construction of a new regional high school that will adequately house the curriculum that we believe is necessary to satisfy the needs of these communities.

A new regional high school can help us improve our curriculum in the following areas:

ART DEPARTMENT

The Art Program is continually expanding to include not only hobbyists but also students developing salable skills. The present situation limits the number of students, the variety of offerings, and the space available for work. In addition to expanded facilities and programs, a new school could simultaneously provide the following: subject interaction and inter-relationships, storage and supply areas, and project availability.

BUSINESS DEPARTMENT

The department is in need not only of expanding its facilities but also of modernizing its present offerings. It seeks to provide a realistic atmosphere reflecting today's business environment in order to prepare its students for their entrance into the world of work.

Perhaps the most notable changes in the program are the expansion of the data processing situation and the introduction of distributive education, a sales and service unit. Both areas provide alternate career choices to students who are oriented to today's business world.

HOME ECONOMICS

At this writing, the students in grades below grade nine receive no home economics course work and/or training. Any expansion of this program, therefore, is designed to provide for these students as well as for high school groups.

The home economics program takes on a new dimension in this age of career-oriented education. The expansion of the high school program and the accompanying facilities is necessary to open doors to large numbers of students seeking either exploratory or intensive course work.

INDUSTRIAL ARTS

At present, only a limited number of learning stations are available in the shop areas; thus, it becomes impossible to expand programs to include students who are not "majors" in the fields. At the same time, the number of work areas available keeps the subject choices of "majors" narrow and limited. Expansion of facilities will allow additional student choice, a greater variety of offerings, and increased availability of training stations. The future of this area in the curriculum includes a service-vocational approach designed to provide skills with which a student might enter the career world.

MUSIC

Music is an area which demands immediate attention in any expansion of our facilities. The present program is conducted in the auditorium and in one classroom used by other departments. All music lessons, choral work, and instrumental work are taught there on a limited basis. There is no room for any theory or history courses which might be necessary to the futures of music-oriented students.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

The present indoor and outdoor physical education facilities at Nipmuc Regional High School are important factors in the limitations of the physical education program. The lack of variety in teaching stations greatly narrows both the number and types of offerings and, at the same time, the exposure of our students to many additional activities.

The physical education plant is a major concern of any new building because the physical education facilities provide services for the student not only during the school day but also during many hours when school is not officially in session.

PHYSICAL SCIENCE

Science education is undergoing a dynamic revolution not only in curriculum but in teaching methods and techniques as well. Course offerings in science emphasize the inquiry approach. The facilities must, therefore, be adequate in order to provide for inquiry in a variety of ways: reading, observation, experimentation, study of models, films, charts, preserved specimens, etc. This multi-faceted approach requires additional laboratory spaces and supporting facilities.

SPECIALIZED SPACES

Of vital importance to any language program is the understanding of aural-oral language patterns which can best be learned through an individual approach. This understanding can be developed most effectively in the language laboratory, which provides for individual attention, a variety of techniques, and an individual pace-setting approach. In addition to a laboratory, a small seminar room is necessary for the advanced study groups in order that these students may improve conversational skills and discuss literary topics.

The social studies laboratory provides an area for students and teachers to observe and conduct experiments in the social sciences and simultaneously provides a resource area for other social studies programs. This type of isolated area makes possible much more student-teacher contact as well as a team approach to preparation of materials.

A reading laboratory consists of facilities, equipment, materials, and schedules so organized that a teacher can provide intensive individualized instruction for students with a wide range of abilities. The laboratory approach has evolved in education as the most efficient means for offering reading instruction to an increasingly large number of secondary students.

A resource room which will provide areas and activities for the special needs child in the high school is vital. Under the recently enacted Chapter 766, small group instruction and individual instruction for students having severe academic difficulty or learning handicaps will be required. A resource room should be large enough for a classroom and convertible into small special-service areas.

LIBRARY

An Instructional Media Center (IMC), housing all the resource materials around which learning takes place, must be the focal point of any educational structure. The purpose is to support, supplement, and service the needs of the students within the structure. Thus, great emphasis must be placed on the IMC and its role in any new building or addition.

The variety of learning materials of today's education requires physical facilities which provide space for their effective and efficient use and storage. Space is necessary for books and other print and audio-visual materials; space is required for work and study by students and teachers; space is needed for audio-visual equipment, audio-visual production, repairs, and maintenance.

ENGLISH, MATH, LANGUAGE, SOCIAL STUDIES

The creation of a new building or an addition to the old for the purpose of implementing a program will have a tremendous effect on those departments not requiring specialized spaces. Eighteen interchangeable classrooms will afford each department a chance for a greater variety of offerings.

Each department will be able to centralize itself and, at the same time, involve itself in inter-related activities with other departments.

In June, the Nipmuc Warriors baseball team, better known as the "Green Machine," won the Tri-Valley Conference title. Unfortunately, they were eliminated in the first round of state tournament play. Our congratulations are extended to Coach Grant and to each member of that winning team.

Mr. David Flynn, vice principal, left Nipmuc Regional High School in August to take a similar position at Framingham North High School. He was replaced by Mr. Allan Byrne, a very capable person from within our own staff.

A new sport, soccer, was introduced at Nipmuc Regional High School in the fall of 1974. This year it was primarily played on an intra-mural level, but we are looking forward to its becoming part of our athletic program in the fall of 1975.

Many students have become actively involved with our Ski Club. Under the guidance of Mrs. Hankin, ski lessons and trips are planned for this school year.

Two new programs have been implemented at Nipmuc Regional High School this year, both funded through the Federal Government. One, a simulated office practice program, was established under the direction of our Business Department Head, Miss Gilbert. Under the guidance of Mrs. Shechtman, a work-study program was implemented to help provide work opportunities for students.

Pupil personnel staff (guidance, health, special education, reading, speech, and learning disabilities) have been meeting regularly to develop plans and implementation of the new law known as Chapter 766. Chapter 766 is designed to provide full educational opportunities for pupils with "special needs," a designation which includes visual and auditory difficulties, emotional problems, physical handicaps, and learning and behavioral problems. The law applies to pupils aged 3-21 (age 16-21 applicability limited to those without a high school diploma); the existence of special needs is determined by an evaluation by members of the Core Evaluation Team (CET). Parent involvement in the formulation of the educational plan is an important provision of this law.

Chapter 766 is presently working in our system; however, we have a long road to follow to reach maximum implementation from both a financial as well as a professional standpoint.

I would like to pause here a moment to remember the warmth and friendliness of Mrs. Janet Stockwell, school nurse for the District for many years. Her death was a great loss to all of us and we shall miss her very much.

I wish to thank all persons who in any way helped in the operation of the high school during the past year.

REPORT OF THE ELEMENTARY SUPERVISOR

The major problem in the school district is space and facilities. A new high school is needed to alleviate space problems at the elementary level. Our school committee is pressing ahead with plans to solve the difficulty, and your help, understanding and support are needed. As Elementary Supervisor, I invite you to visit our schools at any time to view the conditions as they exist. Please, reserve judgments until you actually see the situation.

For the 1975-1976 school year, an additional first grade teacher will be needed at the Henry P. Clough School. The Henry P. Clough School has three sections of kindergarten classes while grades one through seven have only two classes each. The present kindergarten class has an enrollment of seventy-five (75) pupils. Educationally, we cannot allow for only two teachers, each with thirty-seven pupils in the first grade for next year, or any grade for that matter. There has to be three (3) first grade teachers next year. Where do we put the additional class next year? If we are to keep the pupils in the Henry P. Clough School, another portable classroom will be necessary.

The elementary schools in both Towns do not have adequate space for special needs services, music, art, etc. These students are placed in closets, hallways, boiler rooms, i.e. wherever a station is available.

A kindergarten through grade four organizational plan, with minor modifications, would alleviate the situation for some years to come depending, of course, on the immigration factor.

The Open Court Correlated Language Arts Program now operates in grades kindergarten through three with excellent reports from staff and parents. This program will be adopted for grade four next year.

Title I Federal Funds were again used to conduct a summer program for pupils needing help in reading. The plan was written and directed by Gordon Merten.

Mrs. Barbara E. Burke, Elementary School Librarian, reported a good program for the year. Mrs. Burke made good use of local, Federal and in Upton, the Risteen Fund for the enhancement of the library system. The libraries in both Towns are staffed with parent volunteers whose services are vitally needed and appreciated.

Mrs. Joyce Hoberg and Mrs. Elvira Townsend, school nurses, have been involved in clinics, home visits, school registration, in addition to the normal routines of the nurse's office and other activities related to school health problems.

It is with deep regret that we recall the death of Mrs. Janet Stockwell on November 16, 1974. We were deeply saddened for we not only lost a professional nurse, but a true friend who was totally dedicated to all the needs of our children and community. Mrs. Stockwell was one of the most compassionate, kind and understanding persons I have ever known. She was always giving and asking for nothing in return. We sincerely miss her.

In closing, I am confident that the citizens of both Towns, the school committee and the administrators and staff of the Mendon-Upton Regional School District will combine our resources and solve our problems so that we better educate our children.

DAY PROGRAM

A. January – June 1974

1. Enrollment

At the beginning of 1974, 121 boys were in the senior class, 129 in the junior class, 141 in the sophomore class and 135 in the freshman class, making a total of 526 boys enrolled at the Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical High School.

2. Pupil Selection for the Fall of 1974

During the months of January and February all the schools in the member towns were visited by the Director of Guidance in order to give information to the students in the eighth grade about the courses that are offered at the Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical High School. Applications were distributed and the students were requested to indicate their first, second, and third choices among the courses offered. Specially designed information forms were given to each school administrator, to be completed for each pupil who planned to make application for admission to the Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical High School.

At a later date, applicants from the various towns were brought to the school so that they could visit each of the departments and actually see the program in operation. During the day they were given a series of aptitude tests involving verbal reasoning, numerical ability, mechanical reasoning, abstract reasoning and spatial relations. The scores on the above tests and the information sheet provided by the sending school were evaluated in order to produce a profile of each applicant's characteristics. Each applicant's profile was recorded in a compilation sheet which served to identify the most qualified students in each town. Every effort was made to admit the best qualified applicants in each town, to give them their course preference, to distribute the courses as equally as possible among the towns, and to select each applicant for the course in which he appeared to have the best chance of success. This year we admitted 225 boys out of the 475 who applied for admission. That means that over 250 young men who wanted to attend this school could not due to lack of space.

This year for the first time we had applications from girls wishing to enroll in our school. A total of 43 girls applied for admission to the following programs: Culinary Arts, Graphic Arts, Painting and Decorating, Carpentry, and Auto Body Repair. We were unable to admit the girls because the agreement between the towns specifically stated that the school was established for boys.

However, the School Committee has always considered that at some future date they would provide programs for girls as soon as the need was demonstrated. Long before any legislation was passed requiring the admission of girls as well as boys in vocational programs, the School Committee made a study of our future needs, and hired the architectural firm of Korslund, LeNormand, & Quann to help them make a 10-year plan for additional facilities to provide additional programs for both boys and girls. The School Committee has reaffirmed its position of being willing to provide vocational programs for girls by voting to change the Agreement Between the Member Towns so that it would provide vocational education for both boys and girls. At the present time ten out of the thirteen member towns have voted favorably on this amendment and we hope to be able to admit girls in September 1975.

3. Fifth Graduation

The fifth graduation of the Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical High School was held on Sunday, June 2, 1974. 118 seniors received both their high school diplomas and their occupational certificates from the chairman of our school committee, Herman Buma.

In spite of the fact that this area had one of the highest unemployment rates in the entire state, we were successful in finding jobs for our seniors. Approximately 11 percent of the graduates are continuing their education at institutions of higher learning.

B. September - December 1974

1. Enrollment

In September we started our ninth year of operation with 124 seniors, 131 juniors, 160 sophomores and 186 freshmen for a total of 601 pupils. The number of boys from each of the towns was as follows: 59 from Bellingham, 28 from Blackstone, 23 from Douglas, 74 from Grafton, 23 from Hopedale, 18 from Mendon, 82 from Milford, 81 from Millbury, 9 from Millville, 87 from Northbridge, 34 from Sutton, 29 from Upton and 54 from Uxbridge.

2. Exploratory Program

This year, based upon the experience of the previous years, we again decided to have all freshmen spend the entire first semester in their assigned department, with the understanding that all students who were not sure that they were in the right department would be given the opportunity to explore other departments of their choice during the second semester. Less than 10% of the freshmen asked to go into the exploratory program, which clearly indicates that the vast majority of them were satisfied with their original choice.

3. Cafeteria

Our cafeteria staff continued to do an outstanding job for the students of our school. Once again our cafeteria was rated in the top ten in Massachusetts by the Massachusetts Bureau of Nutrition Education and School Food Services. The most meaningful rating is the extent of pupil participation. Our students

participated to the extend of 136%, while the average participation throughout the state was 68%. To paraphrase an old saying – “the proof of the rating is in the eating.”

4. Lincoln Arc Welding Foundation Awards

For the seventh successive year, Blackstone Valley Tech has finished first in the entire United States in awards won by its students in the annual Lincoln Arc Welding Foundation contest.

Competing with hundreds of high schools throughout the country, six Valley Tech students won a total of \$1100 in prize money for themselves and the school. They won a Second National Grand Award and three Regional Awards.

The Lincoln Electric Company created the James F. Lincoln Arc Welding Foundation in 1936 to encourage interest and study in arc welding. The Foundation sponsors the Arc Welding Awards annually for full-time high school, technical or vocational school students in the United States 19 years old or younger. This award program offers an opportunity to compete for the best written reports describing arc welded school shop projects. The entry must not be more than 25 pages in length and should contain detailed descriptions of the operations, all necessary calculations, photographs, sketches and drawings.

5. Cooperative Training Program for Seniors

The Cooperative Training Program is for seniors who have been certified by their instructors as being qualified to perform the work of their specialty in a highly satisfactory manner. This program involved on-the-job training during the time that the student would ordinarily be in his school shop.

A student works in industry under close supervision for three weeks and then returns to school for three weeks. When the student returns to school, a second student goes to work for the same employer doing the same type of work. These two students work as a team so that the employer always has one skilled student working for him throughout the senior year.

Cooperative students must be paid wages during the work-weeks at the cooperating establishment reasonably comparable to those paid to other persons doing similar work in the same company. While the students work the same hours and under the same conditions as other employees, they are legally considered as members of our student body rather than employees in the usual sense of the word.

At the present time over 70 seniors are in the Cooperative Training Program and we hope to place all those who wish to participate in this program within the next two months. We feel that this program has been very successful because it gave our seniors an opportunity to get on-the-job training while they were still in school and at the same time it provided the employer an opportunity to have the services of a young man who has both skill and technical knowledge. The majority of the seniors became full-time employees of the cooperating companies upon graduation.

ADULT TRAINING PROGRAMS

1. Evening Trade Extension Courses

The first session of the 1974 Evening Adult Program started January 7, 1974. These classes are open to persons over 16 years of age who are not attending school and who can show evidence of trade contract with the specific training desired. The following courses were offered: Auto Body Repair, Automotive Technology, Mill and House Carpentry, Electronics, Electrical, Machine Shop, Metal Fabrication, Plain Maintenance,

Machine Drafting, Graphic Arts (Printing), Plumbing and Blueprint Reading. 399 adults were enrolled in the first session.

The second session of the 1974 Evening Adult Program started October 7, 1974. The same courses as above were offered and 405 adults were enrolled.

2. Manpower Development and Training Program

This program was organized for unemployed young men under the provisions of the Manpower Development and Training Act. It was developed with the cooperation of the Milford Ancillary Manpower Planning Board and is designed to train tool machine set-up operators. During the summer this program operated from 8:00 A.M. to 4:30 P.M., and during the school year it operated from 3:30 P.M. to 10:00 P.M. This program is provided at no cost to the member towns inasmuch as it is financed entirely with federal funds.

3. Massachusetts Firefighting Academy

During the past year we have cooperated with the Massachusetts Firefighting Academy by providing space and equipment during weekends and evenings in order to train members of the local fire departments. The following courses are offered: Fire Service Training, Electricity, and Aerial Ladders.

NEW ADDITION TO OUR SCHOOL

At the end of 1974 our new addition is about 95% complete and starting January 1, 1975 all sections will be used with the exception of the Automotive Technician Department. Due to shortages of materials and strikes the addition was not ready in September of 1974 as we had expected. However, through the cooperation of the students, faculty, and staff we have been able to operate in a satisfactory manner in spite of the incomplete facilities. We hope that by February 1st the entire building will be ready and in use.

NEAS&C ACCREDITATION

In 1972 our school was one of the first vocational-technical schools in New England to receive a full ten-year accreditation from the New England Association of Schools and Colleges.

In order to maintain accreditation each accredited school must submit a two-year report describing the improvements that have been made in the educational program during that period of time. The Association through its Commission on Vocational-Technical Schools evaluates the two-year report to determine if accreditation should be continued.

We are happy to report that we received a favorable evaluation and that we continue to be fully accredited. The entire staff and the School Committee are to be commended for this fine achievement.

JAMES S. MULLANEY

We were all greatly saddened to learn that James S. Mullaney passed away on August 3, 1974. Mr. Mullaney was the main driving force behind the establishment of the Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical School and without his extraordinary dedication this school might never have come into existence.

The School Committee was voted to dedicate the school gymnasium to his memory and it will be known as the James S. Mullaney Gymnasium.

The students in the Drafting Department have designed the letters that will be made in the Metal Fabrication and Machine Shop Departments which will be used to make an appropriate inscription on the front wall of the gymnasium.

CONCLUSION

The Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical High School is operating efficiently and effectively in this, our ninth year. We continue to offer many different services to the residents of our regional school district and they have responded enthusiastically as the following figures show:

1. 601 freshmen, sophomore, junior, and senior students in the day program.
2. 399 men and women in the first session of the Evening Trade Extension program.

3. 405 men and women in the second session of the Evening Trade Extension program.
4. 15 young men in the MDTA Machine-Tool program.
5. 35 firefighters who participated in the Firefighting Academy program.

Thus we have offered a large number of people the opportunity to further their education and to increase their vocational skills. We have used our school to maximum advantage by conducting vocational programs from 8:00 A.M. to 10:00 P.M. five days each week.

At the close of 1974 we feel that the past year was one of satisfactory achievement and one in which we continued to maintain the fine standards set in previous years. With the completion of our second addition we look forward to a brighter and busier future for the Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical School.

In closing I want to express my sincere gratitude for the loyalty and cooperation of the students, staff, and the School Committee who have made the success of the past year possible.

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
