CALL MEETING TO ORDER

Pursuant to Governor Baker's March 12, 2020 Order Suspending Certain Provisions of the Open Meeting Law, G.L. c. 30A, §18, and the Governor's March 15, 2020 Order concerning imposition on strict limitations on the number of people that may gather in one place, meetings in the Town of Upton are being conducted via remote participation to the greatest extent possible. No in-person attendance of members of the public will be permitted, but every effort will be made to ensure that the public can adequately access the proceedings as provided for in the Order.

Pursuant to Governor Baker's March 12, 2020 Order Suspending Certain Provisions of the Open Meeting Law, G.L. c. 30A, §18, and the Governor's March 15, 2020 Order concerning imposition on strict limitations on the number of people that may gather in one place, meetings in the Town of Upton will be conducted via remote participation to the greatest extent possible. We will strive to provide access to such meetings via a link to call in, or other similar option. Board of Health & Finance Committee

Discuss Trash & Recycling

Upton's curbside trash and recycling program, overseen by the Board of Health, is paid for through the budget, partially offset by trash bag fees. Upton extended its contract for one year with E.L. Harvey, giving town officials time to determine the future of the trash and recycling program.

To eliminate recycling with Harvey, will still cost \$77,000 a year and by canceling recycling the state can impose thousands of dollars in fees. Options discussed were:

- eliminate curbside pick-up, making residents responsible for their own trash and recycling but with financial impact to those on a fixed income
- the town to do its own pickup but would be expensive – personnel and truck cost

40 • establish a transfer station but would need to find a site and follow state guidelines.

42 Finance Committee Chair Paul Flaherty stated the town's program is not sustainable. "In two
43 years, it has increased \$170,000," he said, noting from FY 2019 to 2020 it rose \$127,000 and
44 from FY 2020 to 2021 by \$43,000.

46 Town Manager Derek Brindisi explained Northbridge does not have a municipal trash pick-up
47 program, but pays Blackstone \$7,500 a year to handle the town's recycling. Three containers
48 are placed behind the Northbridge Fire Station, where residents bring recyclables on Saturdays.
49 Trash is self-subscribed with Northbridge residents choosing from six approved trash haulers,
50 who could also provide residents with curbside recycling. Brindisi stated the total costs of
51 Upton's trash and recycling program is \$600,000 and the revenue from trash bags fees is
52 \$215,000, showing a net cost to the town of approximately \$385,000 in the FY21 budget.

54 Selectmen will continue investigating a trash and recycling program for Upton.

Discuss the Town's position to Opt Out from Aerial Spraying

56 Governor Baker signed into law a program that gives state officials some expanded authority to
57 engage in mosquito control only after the Department of Public Health confirms there is an
58 elevated risk of the EEE virus in the region. Municipalities may opt out entirely from pesticide
59 spraying; the process for towns to do so is underway.

61 Chair Simas said he believed the articles were voted down because residents didn't want
62 spraying in the community. However, Board of Health member Al Holman felt the opposition
63 could have been about spending the \$50,000.

65 At a future meeting, the Board will discuss a town Mosquito Control Board to be overseen by
66 the Board of Health.
